Shields, England, April 19 (1.45 p. m.)—Survivors of the British steamer Chic, which was recently torpedoed and sunk while on a voyage from Halifax for Manchester with a cargo of pulp, have arrived here. In an interview with the Daily Gazette the men say the steamer was fired on without warning by a German submarine, two of the shots taking effect. The submarine then submerged. Seventeen members of the crew of the steamer took to a lifeboat, which capsized and one of the men was drowned. 

WEAK TONE IN THE FINAL HOUR

Market Furnish Striking Proo of Inherent Strength, How

SEVERAL EXTREME LOSSES RECORDED

Wilson's Decision Came as

New York, April 19—Although special stocks suffered general and severe reversals, impartial observers were of the opinion that today's market furnished striking proof of its inherent strength in the face of highly disconcerting conditions. President Wilson's decision to submit the question of a continuance of the country's diplomatic relations with Germany to congress came as a great surprise, which was indicated in the weak tone of the opening and final hours.

During the intermediate stage, and long before the President's address had gained general circulation, the market evinced a disposition to restore some of its early impairment. The rally proved to be the basis, however, for a fresh outburst of liquidation, lowest prices being registered in the later dealings and depressing the general average far below recent levels. Little evidence of support was seen at this juncture, especially in the war group. Total sales amounted to 735,000 shares, of which fully two thirds represented the munitions and affilliated equipment, industrial and petroleum stocks. The day's operations included, to a greater extent than at any recent seession, offerings from out of town speculators. This was evidenced by the activity of commission houses whose connections embraced the more important seetions of the country. There was little doubt, also, that many "stop loss" or ders were uncovered in the course of the decline, provoking much enforced selling.







Immigrant Inspector Charles Miller is enquiring into the case. It is claimed that the schooner could not find men in Maine and as she was being sent to the Magdalen Islands for a load of fish, the owners regard the infringement as largely technical.

Lumber Contractors Guilty.

Gates, of Cookshire, Que, have been found guilty by the United States district court of New Hampshire of violating the alien contract labor law in hiring men in Canada and taking them to the lumber camps of that state. Wood was fined \$100 and costs; Gates, \$1,000 and costs, and Cottino \$500 and costs. Twenty-two Canadians, held as witnesses, were ordered deported from the United States.






