NATURAL CROOKEDNESS

The Tribune says:—
The trouble in referring to the appeal case of the town for the illegal shutting off of the Tribune motor asks will it continue. The council are alone able to answer the question. The telegram received last Friday evening judgment in favor of town, was some what of a surprise the following evening when the Tribune stated a new trial had been ordered. No one knew better than the wise men that the court was asked to set aside the verdict of the jury, and enter one against Mr. Crockett.

Mr. Crockett is the one to decide whether the case will continue or not. If he drops the matter it is not likely the town will voluntarily pay him \$1500 or any portion of that amount.

No such telegram was received as stated above. The telegram stated that judgment favored town, new trial granted on ground of excessive damages.

The Tribune tells only half the truth in its statement that the court was asked to set aside the verdict of the jury and enter one against Mr. Crockett. The town asked above for a new trial. Mr. Crockett knew this as the Town Solicitor carefully explained it to him, but with the characteristic untruthfulness and crookedness of a Crockett, he only published that portion of the story which suits his own case.

Further in reporting the judgment of the court he omitted to add and also that there had been no finding by the jury on material facts involved in the case. This was a hard crack for the Tribune, which brought in the verdict and of course, must be suppressed.

Further, he omits nearly every citizen of Campbellton when he publishes the statement that he is upheld by every honorable man in the community in the stand he has taken. With the exception of a few unprincipled men, who for their own benefit and only use what little influence the Tribune has, and who can mold the pliant figurehead, who is supposed to edit that paper, to do their dirty work (probably for a consideration), we have yet to hear a right thinking citizen make the statement that the Tribune is in the right. At every chance that paper has knocked the town, the citizens, (with the above exceptions), and done all in its power, which fortunately, is limited, to injure the standing of this community.

PLENTY OF MONEY FOR ANNUAL MILITIA CAMPS

OTTAWA, Feb. 10.—The fear expressed in some quarters that the cutting down of the militia estimates this year by \$500,000, on the item for annual drill, as compared with the expenditure for the same purpose last year, means a curtailment of the number of men to be drilled in the annual camp next summer is not borne out by the facts. The decrease in the item is due to the fact that this year there will not be the expense of the militia display involved in the Quebec Tercentenary last year. In 1906-7 the whole militia force was drilled for \$550,000. This year the appropriation is \$500,000, which will be ample for all requirements.





SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry, by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead and a farm of at least 90 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader may stand pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may purchase a homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 100 acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.
