REV. T. DEWITT TALMAGE.

Our Dead Still Live His Subject at the Tabernacle.

An Intensely Interesting Discourse.

The Hope of Immortality Beyond the Grave.

BROOKLYN, Dec. 8.—The Rev. T. De Witt Talmage, D. D., preached today on "Our Departed Still Living." His text was Genesis xli, 27, 28: "And when he saw the wagons which Joseph had sent to carry him, the spirit of Jacob their father revived, and he said unto his brethren and to his servants, 'I see Joseph, and he is yet alive.'"

The Egyptian capital was the focus of the world's wealth.
