LAKE PROPERTY OPTION SECURED.

Town Making Preparations
to Obtain Increased water
Supply.

LAKE PRICE \$3000.

Committee recommends that
Property be purchased
and Developed.

A meeting of the Town Council was held on Tuesday evening. Couns. Taylor, Jardine, McLennan, McLean, Andrew and Miller being present.

Coun. Taylor occupied the chair the Mayor and Deputy Mayor being absent.

Applications were read from Harry Jones and Daniel Murray for position on police force to fill vacancy caused by resignation of Officer Savoy.

Harry Jones was appointed to the position at a salary of \$40.00 per month, dating from July 3rd.

Coun. Andrew from Water and Sew. Com., submitted report stating that an option had been secured on the Smith Lake property with a view to increasing the water supply. The price to be paid is \$3,000. A survey had been made and with a ten foot dam it would be capable of holding about 115 million gallons; with an additional four feet on the dam the capacity would be increased to about 200 million gallons. The present capacity of the pipe is about three-quarters of a million gallons, so that the reserve would last for a period of 260 days provided all other sources of supply were cut off.

The committee recommended that the lake be purchased and developed.

Some discussion followed on the matter and the proposal of the committee was favorably commented upon but it was thought advisable to lay the report on the table until next meeting for discussion by the full board.

Coun. Jardine brought up the matter of the offer of Mr. St. Onge to move his building occupied as a telegraph office on Andrew St. back off the street for the sum of \$1.50. It was thought the price was rather high, but the matter was left in the hands of the Street Com. to deal with as they thought best.

On motion the Water and Sewerage Com. were given authority to engage a competent engineer to make a survey and plan of Smith Lake proposed to be purchased by the town.

Council adjourned.

BARK ROLF, AGROUND HERE, IS TAKING IN MUCH WATER

Entangled Her Yards in Those of Another Vessel and
Became Unmanageable

WAS OUTWARD BOUND WITH DEALS AND PULPWOOD

The Russian bark Rolf, Captain Debrost is aground near the government wharf as the result of her yards becoming entangled with those of the ship Westland.

The Rolf came here two weeks ago to load deals and pulp for Libau, Russia. The loading was completed yesterday morning and the Rolf started to put to sea. The ship Westland was moored at the same pier and in some unaccountable manner the yards of the two vessels became entangled. The tide was running out at the time and the Rolf suddenly freed herself from

the other vessel ran aground before she could be put on her proper course.

Immediate efforts were made by tugs to haul her off, but all to no avail. This morning efforts were again made, but with the same result. The bark is taking in a good deal of water today and it is thought she is badly damaged. It is expected that she will be towed off at high tide tomorrow morning by the Lady Eileen which has been engaged for the purpose.

The Rolf was loaded by the Wm Richards Company. Her cargo consists of about 2,000 cords of pulp wood and a half a million feet of deals. It is not known yet to what extent, if any, her cargo is damaged.

"BOOZE" FLOWED AS FREELY AS WATER

Fred McLean and Angus
Dugay had a whole
Case full.

BUT IT WAS STOLEN

Police Believe McLean Got
It in Waverly Bar when
No one was Looking.

Fred McLean had just invited his companion, Angus Dugay to "have another" when the police pounced down upon the pair, Monday afternoon, in rear of the Shives Lumber Company's stable off Water street. The police had been searching the highways and byways for McLean and Dugay for some time. Both Policemen Duncan and I. C. R. Policeman Savoie had been informed that the pair had a case of liquor concealed about their persons, and suspecting that the "booze" had been pilfered, the officers started out in search of the pair. Suddenly Savoie came upon them, apparently having the time of their lives. He called Officer Duncan, who was near at hand and handed Dugay over to him. Then the officers started with their charges for the police station.

On the way to the station they met Chief of Police Gray and Officer Savoie handed McLean over to him. The chief had been notified at his house by telephone of the suspicious actions of McLean and Dugay and hastened down town immediately.

Meanwhile the bartender at the Waverly Hotel discovered that a case of whiskey was missing and searched high and low for it without success. He had just about concluded that the case must have fallen from the team on the way from the station when Chief of Police Gray entered and apprised him of the arrests.

It is alleged that McLean went into the Waverly bar in the absence of the bartender, coolly shouldered the case of whiskey, walked across the street to the Campbellton Hotel, entered it by the front door, passed through the hall and out through a door in the rear where he laid the liquor down. It is alleged he then got a man to cart it down to the ferry wharf for him.

On the way to the ferry McLean encountered Dugay and invited him to accompany him and join in a Bacchanalian feast. When the ferry wharf was reached it was found the ferry had departed; so it was decided to return up town. The man who carted the liquor down to the ferry was given a bottle for his trouble and McLean and Dugay repaired to a sequestered nook in the rear of the Shives Lumber Co's stable where their orgie was destined to be short-lived.

The pair were taken before Magistrate Matheson, Tuesday morning, charged with theft. Dugay went

FIVE OR SIX SHOTS FIRED.

Alex Cook charged with
Firing at Patrol Boat, be-
fore Justice Bassett

OFFICERS GIVE EVIDENCE

One shot went within few
Inches of Helmsman's
Head

The preliminary examination of Alex Cook, charged with discharging a loaded gun at fishery patrol boat No. 1, was commenced, yesterday morning, at Dalhousie before Magistrate Bassett.

George Miller, fishery overseer for the Restigouche River was the first witness called. He proved that the patrol boat was in the service of Canada and that her officers were discharging their duty at the time of the shooting.

Charles McDonald, captain of the patrol boat deposed that six shots in all were fired at his vessel. One shot went through the window casings of the wheel-house. He produced the bullet, which was one used by large rifles. Another shot passed through two doors of the wheel-house.

Helmsman Gotchie swore he was at the wheel, at the time of the shooting. He corroborated the captain's testimony and added that one bullet passed within five or six inches of his head.

Engineer Smith swore that at the time of the shooting he could plainly discern five or six clouds of smoke in front of a house, just south of Cook's net.

At the conclusion of Mr Smith's evidence the case was adjourned until Friday morning. Jas. A. Harquail represents the department of marine and fisheries at the hearing and W. A. Mott is defending Cook.

SEELEY TO FACE MURDER CHARGE

Counsel for Widow of Peter
Fontaine asks for a
Warrant

ARREST EXPECTED SOON

Civic Official at Dalhousie
Pays a high Tribute to
Officer Seeley.

R. A. Lawlor, K. C. acting for the widow of Peter Fontaine who was killed while being arrested at his home in Balmoral last month has applied to Magistrate Bassett, Dalhousie, for a warrant for the arrest of Policeman George Seeley on a charge of murder. The warrant will be issued in a day or two and the preliminary examination of Seeley will be before Justice Bassett. W. A. Mott will conduct the defence, Jalbert, the owner of the house in which the arrest was attempted will have a warrant issued for the arrest of Officer Gallop on a charge of assault.

A prominent civic official of Dalhousie in speaking to a reporter for "Events" yesterday paid a high tribute to Policeman Seeley. He said that since that officer had been engaged by the town rowdiness had materially decreased and that the town was now one of the most orderly to be found anywhere. Except on one occasion, he had never known Seeley to use a baton on a man and on that occasion it was necessary to do so. Seeley had been able to keep order without making himself in the least obnoxious and was generally regarded as a kind-hearted though dutiful officer.

TELEGRAPHIC TICKS

A London despatch to the New York Sun says that Indian despatches represent the trouble in India as increasing.

James Barnes, M. P. P., Kent, has been appointed a member of the provincial government without portfolio.

Peter Curran, a socialist and trades union officer, was elected last week to represent Jarrow in the British House of Commons.

The Galt Old Boy's of Hamilton sent a congratulatory telegram to Tommy Burns, champion heavy-weight pugilist of the world. Burn's old home is in Galt.

The Missouri board of librarians have barred a recent novel out of their libraries because they say that young men do not need to be taught how to make love.

The Chicago Tribune of July 5, says thirty-seven men, women and children are dead and 2,153 are maimed, lacerated or burned as a result of yesterday's excess of patriotism in the United States.

Mayor Eugene Schmitz, of San Francisco who is awaiting sentence under conviction of extortion, in an interview authorized the Associated Press to say that he will be a candidate for re-election to a fourth term, and that he has already begun the preliminary work of campaign.

At Hopewell Cape last week the jury in the New Ireland murder case reported they could not agree, standing seven for acquittal of the accused, Collins, and five for conviction. The jury were discharged and Collins remanded till Sept 17, when he will be tried again before Chief Justice Tuck.

A very sensational robbery took place at New York last week by which the Windsor Trust Company lost about \$100,000 and incidentally its paying teller as well. A reward of \$2,500 was offered by the company for the capture of the robber, who is Chester B. Runyan, their pay-teller. Runyan was captured through the confession of a woman companion.

By the capsizing of a canoe in St Croix Lake, near Howe Brook, Aroostook county, Thursday three employees of the Fish River Lumber Company were drowned. The victims were Fred Logan and Thomas Hilliard, of St John, N. B. and Charles Gough of Fredericton, N. B. The bodies have been recovered.

While combing her hair at the window of her room, Nimpa Grizanti, a nineteen-year old Italian girl was killed in New York on Thursday by a bullet which passed through her head. Another shot buried itself in the wall of her room. Several arrests have been made of Italians living in rear of a flat of houses on Mott street, which is opposite the house where the girl was shot.

Todd Russell arrived at Salisbury from Boston last week with the body of his brother, William, who died in the Boston City Hospital of appendicitis. When the corpse was taken into the home at Scott Road the young man's mother, Mrs. Convers-Russell, dropped dead. She had been much agitated for some days over her son's illness and death. Mrs. Russell was sixty-six years of age.

Hill went to the house tonight and it is supposed that a quarrel was started. It is said that there has been trouble between Hill and Mrs Hill over property.

The sub-committee of the Hague Peace Conference on the rights and duties of neutral powers in times of war, etc., met last week. The French proposition providing that there shall be a declaration of war before the opening of hostilities and the amendment of the Netherlands establishing a day of twenty-four hours between a declaration of war and the opening of hostilities was lengthily discussed.

Farm Facts & Fancies

SOWING GRASS SEEDS
 It is difficult to sow grass seed by hand and secure an even "catch" and the seeder should be used in every case. It is not always that a seeder can be found on a farm where the seed drill is used, but broadcast seeding is best done by seeders especially adapted to such work. It is important to sow the seed evenly so as to prepare the soil as poor seeding adds to the expense of seed and reduces the yield.

FOOD FOR HORSES
 Some horses will eat at all times, and consume almost any quantity of food without appearing to improve in condition, although they may not be doing much work. Horses differ and what is best for one may not give as good results with others. Good grooming is an important matter, but there is not, as a rule, sufficient variety in the food of horses. ENGLISH IN CANADA

An Associated Press despatch containing the observation that one Orchard, a self-confessed multi-murderer spoke with a "slight Canadian accent," leads a writer in the Toronto "Saturday Night," to betray his surprise that anyone could be imbued with the idea that Canadians, like our Yankee friends and English cousins, corrupt the dear old mother tongue. In a screed more or less lengthy, he points out some of the errors in speech common below the forty-ninth parallel and some that take the gilt-edge of the English tongue in the land of its birth, and proudly boasts that none of these errors are ever committed in Canada by Canadians. Of course not; but while the native born denizens of this broad dominion do not "twang" out their words, talk through their noses, or drop their h's, they commit other errors of speech which are just as unpardonable. It doesn't matter whether one is in Halifax or Vancouver one will hear with disgusting frequency such corruptions as "doncha" for don't you, "edehcation" for education and "git" for get. Also, Canadians frequently fail to pronounce in full words ending with "r." For instance one will hear on the street "comin'" much oftener than coming, and "goin'" much oftener than going. While the chief thing is to make oneself understood, it is to be regretted that some care is not bestowed upon the pronunciation of the words employed for that purpose and it is the plain unvarnished truth that no where on the face of the earth is there less regard for correct pronunciation than in Canada. Of course, among the cultured classes in this country, as in all countries, English is spoken as it should be, but among the masses there is little regard for the proper thing. Yes, indeed! We have our lingo the same as the British Isles and the United States; and as many of our school masters are habitual offenders we are likely to have it for at least another generation.

NOTE AND COMMENT

The customs revenue of the Dominion for the month of June shows an increase of \$1,229,032 over June of 1906. The total revenue for the month from this source was \$5,321,444. For the first three months of the current fiscal year, the revenue was \$15,122,092, an increase of \$2,964,391 over the corresponding period of last year. It must be observed in this connection that the average duties under the new tariff are less than under the old, and yet the receipts are the largest in the history of the country.

If war between the United States and Japan doesn't occur in the near future it will not be the fault of the newspapers. Professional interviewers have been working overtime, during the past few weeks, obtaining statements from public officials of both countries on the prospects and probable results of such a war. The more inflammatory the statements, the more space they are accorded. The newspapers would like nothing better than to see a clash between the Mikado's forces and those of the United States. Such a conflict appeals to the editorial sanctum and business office alike. But, in their selfish efforts to precipitate a conflict the newspapers do not reflect the spirit of the age.

St John is to have another daily newspaper. The "winter port," as it likes to call itself, will then have more daily newspapers, in proportion to its size, than any

other city in the world. Is this an enviable distinction? We doubt it. What St John needs is less printer's ink and more factory whistles. We venture to say that a promoter would find it a tough undertaking to float a company in Amherst for the purpose of publishing another newspaper in that town, but that if he wanted to start a manufactory there, the monied men of the town would unhesitatingly rally to his support; and Amherst makes cars, etc out of hard pine and steel billets landed by steamers at St John.

The New York Morning Telegraph is sore because Richard Croker's challenge to Capt. Greer to race the chestnut colt, only winner of the Derby, against the Captain's speedy gelding, Slave Gallion was rather curtly turned down. The Telegraph appears to think it was a rather shabby trick to play upon the expatriated American politician emphasizing its remarks with this caustic observation. "It is a fine piece of goods this British Fair play." The English racing people are evidently bent on giving Croker a cold shoulder. They probably object to him on the ground that he was a one-time grafter. If an American of the type of Theodore Roosevelt owned a horse like Orby he would doubtless be welcomed to the ranks of the English racing people with open arms.

Oyster Bay, the summer capital of the United States, as it proudly regards itself, has hitherto had in Mr Roosevelt a glorious fourth of July attraction capable of filling the town with visitors and giving Oyster Bay front-page headlines in all the morning-after papers. This year, however, the president cruelly declined to be an asset of the Oyster Bay committee. Not even a few remarks suitable to the occasion could be dragged out of him. Mr Roosevelt's bitterest critic will not venture to denounce him on this account as lacking in patriotism. The simple truth is that he has been Oyster Bay's whole show so many years that he wears of the function that the position of first citizen has brought upon him. This reminds us of the melancholy fate that will be Oyster Bay's when Mr Roosevelt is finally separated from the presidency of the United States. Who now ever hears of Gray Gables? Even the obscurity of Esopus may be in store for the Long Island town.



Fred McLean, arrested here on a charge of stealing a case of liquor (was taken to Dalhousie, yesterday by Chief Gray.

The Great Northwestern Telegraph Co has just completed running a new wire from Quebec to Moncton. Fifteen or twenty men have been engaged at the work for the last three months.

The board of management for the I. C. R. employees superannuation and provident fund which has recently been organized will meet in Moncton in a short time, when the applications for a superannuation by old employees will be taken up.

The bazaar under the auspices of the Sisters of the Hotel Dieu which has been held every night for the past ten days will be brought to a close this evening. The bazaar has been a huge success in every respect, and the young ladies and gentlemen who have striven so hard to make it so are entitled to the highest praise.

About one hundred tourists bound for points down the coast reached here Monday on the Maritime express. The train was late and the Lady Eileen proceeded to Dalhousie without them. Two cars containing the tourists were coupled to the local at the junction and connections were made at Dalhousie. The bulk of the tourists were bound for Gaspe.

Emisic LeBlanc, a veteran fisherman of St Omer, had a narrow escape from drowning on Friday. He had purchased a large fishing boat at Grand River and was attempting to sail it up to Campbellton alone. When off Bonaventure a squall struck his craft, capsizing it. LeBlanc clung desperately to the upturned boat. He was about four miles offshore and it was useless for him to try and swim the distance. After being in the water for about half an hour he was picked up by another fishing boat. When rescued he was thoroughly exhausted and could not have lasted many minutes more. His boat has not yet been recovered.

The Inch Arran at Dalhousie, which has had more or less of a checkered career was opened this season by Mr. Deaf, an insurance man. Last week there were a number of boarders in the house, but one day the majority left, for some reason or another. Their places were quickly filled, however, by others and at the present time the Inch Arran houses quite a number of tourists, among whom are the Carsley's of Montreal.

The employees of the various branches of the Intercolonial Railway service have for the past two weeks been preparing for the marriage of the General Superintendent, Mr. David Pottinger to Mrs. F. P. Reid, and many valuable presents have been purchased by the different divisions to show the esteem in which the former is held by his men. Those employed in maintenance of way and telegraphic services have joined forces and on Wednesday presented Mr. Pottinger with a handsome automobile, purchased at a cost of three thousand dollars.

The Moncton Times will occasionally reprint an item from "Events" and fail to give this paper credit for it. We have never offered any objection to this, but when the Times reprints one of our stories and credits it to another North Shore paper, as it did on Saturday, we think we should protest.

I. C. R. police inspector Duncan Noble, of Campbellton, was in the city to-day. All is quiet in police circles on the north shore, he reports. A number of men employed on railway construction by Contractor Malcolm recently left, and are being conveyed on I. C. R. trains to Montreal. They have given no trouble so far—Moncton Transcript.

The recent heavy storm has almost ruined the potato crops, as well as a part of the grain crops throughout the country. Even the grass crop which up until this week, gave promise of being above the average, was considerably battered down and destroyed by the hail storm of Tuesday. This is particularly the case where the soil is fertile and the ground, consequently strong and heavy. Unless cut early and dry weather sets in much of it will be useless.

A Fredericton despatch to the St. John Globe on Saturday said in part—The local lumbering concerns, although very much interested, are not worrying to any great extent over the proposition which has been put forward in St. John to have a fee of from five cents to ten cents per thousand and charged on all lumber shipped down the river and reloaded at the St. John harbor from scows or wood boats to ocean steamers, etc. The general feeling is that the necessary regulations would never be passed by the legislature, as there would be such united opposition on the part of the lumbering interests all over the province.

Thomas E. O'Connor, formerly of Campbellton was among the number killed in a train wreck which occurred at Butler, Ont., the other day. Mr. O'Connor who for the past five years has been a resident of Vancouver was on his way east in charge of two hundred Chinamen. At Butler his train collided with the west bound Pacific express. Besides Mr. O'Connor ten Chinamen were killed and many others more or less injured. A card bearing the name and address of a young woman in St. John was found on the person of deceased, but when a St. John newspaper reporter hunted up the young woman it was found that she was not acquainted with O'Connor. It is surmised that he had been asked to call on her by some friend in Vancouver. Deceased was a native of this town. He was a son of Edmund O'Connor who was long employed as engineer with the Shives Lumber Company, but removed to Vancouver with his family about five years ago. Tom, as the deceased was familiarly known, was a great favorite with the young men of the place. For some time he has been in the employ of the Cavanagh and Holden Real Estate Agency, Vancouver as a broker and had gone on the trip to St. John as guard merely for the novelty of it. His family consisting of mother, father and twelve brothers and sisters reside at 1019 Seymour St., Vancouver.
