This road, Canadian from end to end, will start from North Bay or thereabouts, traverse the Lake Superior region 50 or 100 miles north of the Canadian Pacific line to Port Arthur, and run thence to Winnipeg, entering probably by way of West Selkirk, over the old Mackenzie route.

The Railway Blockade. The west is suffering from a congestion of traffic which has almost reached the proportions of a blockade, and is crying out for relief. According to the Regina Leader the situation is continually getting worse. So unreliable has the freight service become that merchants are afraid to place large orders for seasonable goods, not knowing whether they will arrive before the opportune season is past. By actual count, not less than ten days ago, there were 200 freight cars on the sidings in Regina, some of which had been in the yards for weeks, and were unloaded because teams could not get at them. On April 19, there were 123 loaded cars in a gravel pit at Pilot Butte, many of which were consigned to Regina, only eight miles distant, and had been lying there for weeks. A party of United States immigrants was detained at the town for three days, because the C. P. R, had not a spare engine to haul their train. The Leader asserts that these conditions prevail over the whole Northwest. Premier Balfour Hints That It May Be Reinstated in the Near Future.

London, May 7. - The agitation in favor of the retention of the grain duties has not been ended by the announcement of the Chancellor of the Exchequer in the House of Commons yesterday. The Morning Post, commenting upon

Tuesday's meeting of the Associated Chambers of Agriculture, points out that as the abolition is not planned to take effect until July 1, there is yet time for repentance.
Rt. Hon. Henry Chaplin, M. P. for the Sleaford division of Lincolnshire, and a former Conservative Minister of Agriculture, was most outspoken at the meeting. He declared that he "would support the interests of agriculture against all the premiers in the

Rt. Hon. James Lowther, M. P. for the Isle of Thanet, said that the Government's act in repealing the grain duties was cowardly and contemptible. Canada's disappaintment at the repeal of the cereals duties was constantly referred to at the meeting. The Duke of Rutland, an old pillar of the Tory party, wrote declaring the abandonment of the duty must be regarded as a great disaster by those here and in Canada, who anticipated happier fiscal relations with the colonies. Lord Henetge and other speakers declared the repeal an act of political

The Pall Mall Gazette tonight warns the ministers that they have imperiled their own position, and shaken the loyalty of an important section of their followers. Nevertheless, Government had better stick to the repeal for the
