OTTAWA, Ont., June 10.—The official portion of the funeral was hardly so long as was expected, though its expeditiousness may be due to the admirable way in which it was managed. Eastern Province men are not buying, and claim they will not until prices are lower. Prices in this market have Dowered 3e per bushel and 5e per 100 ths. Closing values were \$1 per bushel and \$1 65 to \$1 68 per 100 lbs.
