BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

The Queen's Speech Contains No Reference to Newfoundland.

Lord Salisbury Seriously Ill-The Prince's Death Creates Sympathy for the Royal Family.

London, Feb. 9.—At the opening of Parliament the interest of the aristocrats, especially the largest portion of this class, was centered in the House of Lords, where the Earl of Dudley, noted for his skill as a gentleman rider, was selected to make his maiden parliamentary effort by moving the address in reply to the Queen's speech.

London, Feb. 8.—A large number of ladies were present in the House of Lords. All were attired in mourning out of respect to the late Duke of Clarence and Avondale. The chief interest was centered in the to the late Duke of Clarence and Avondale. The chief interest was centered in the House of Commons, where the popular members, as they entered and took their seats, were welcemed with hearty cheers. John Henry Maden, the Gladstonian who was elected to succeed Lord Hartington (Liberal-Unionist) as member for the Rossendale division of Lancashire, was cheered by the Opposition when he entered. George Lambert (Gladstonian), who in the South Molton division of Devonshire turned a Liberal-Unionist majority of 1,600 into a minor of 1,200, came into the House for the first time as a member for that constituency. He received an enthusiastic welcome from the Opposition benches.

MADRID, Feb. 10.—The four leaders of the anarchists who attacked the town of Xeres were executed to-day. The platform upon which the garrotes were fixed was in the plaza directly in front of the jail. The four men passed their last night on earth in their cells, where two of them who professed to be Christians received religious consolation from the priests in attendance. Early this morning the final mass was said, and shortly afterwards the prisoners were escorted by a number of guards and priests to the plaza. Here the executioners fixed the collars about their necks, and in an exceedingly short time they paid the penalty of their crimes with their lives.

A report was presented, as below, from the Committee on Agriculture:
Your committee begs leave to report that while they do not enjoy as high a degree of prosperity as they have had in past years, they have, however, abundant reason for gratitude for the bountiful harvest of last year, which, with the exception of a partial failure in some sections, has been very favorable on the whole, supplying abundance for man and beast, through the length and breadth of the land. Comparing our condition with that of people in other lands, the lines have fallen to us in pleasant places. At the same time there is plenty of room for improvement in many departments. The practice of constant cropping heretofore prevailing, to use a common phrase, has been played out, and the farmer under changed conditions must necessarily adapt himself to altered circumstances. If one department of farming is overdone to the neglect of another, he must govern himself accordingly. No general rule would suit all parts of the country alike. That which would be applicable to another part, so that no arbitrary rule can be laid down that would do justice to all the rest. The time was when the raising of wheat was the most profitable product of the farm. After that failed, cattle and horses took the place of wheat. Now we find that they in their turn have become a partial drug. Dairying is now recommended by many as the surest and most profitable industry for the farmers of Ontario. Your committee would, therefore, recommend a mixed system of farmers to farmers to prosecute that industry which is best fitted for their own part of the country.

BRITISH OPINION ON CANADA.

The Great English Newspapers on the Ottawa Scandal.

Men Guilty of or Aiding and Abetting in Public Plunder Should Be Driven From Power.

The leading newspapers in Great Britain, without regard to politicial predilections, have condemned in the strongest terms the wholesale corruption that was laid bare at Ottawa during the last Parliamentary session. They have also condemned the crookedness exposed at Quebec. For the plundering of the people of Canada, to the extent, we believe, of millions of dollars, the men in power at Ottawa must be held responsible, and the people of the Dominion, by their votes, must punish them. As for the boodling in Quebec, the punishment of those guilty of wrongdoing must be left to the people of that Province, just as in Ontario the Provincial Government, when put on trial, must be condemned or indorsed by the people of this Province by their votes at the polls.

Seeing this is the state of affairs, it will do no harm, and may effect much good, to reflect upon the views of the great English papers after studying the disgraceful exposures at Ottawa, which, by the way, will have to be resumed when the House reassembles this month. The only persons that could complain would be the Canadian twine manufacturers; but they, like the sugar refiners and salt manufacturers of our country, would be willing to take a smaller percentage of profit than allow manufacturers of another country to undersell them. The same arguments to a great extent will apply to coal oil. Permit me to congratulate you upon the success that we have met with in the past in shaping legislation for the farmers. Nearly all the questions considered by you last year and adopted in your report upon legislation, and submitted to the Outario Government, have been made the law of our land, and in enacting such laws it has in no way injured any other class or business of the country. 

Winter Thunder Storms.

Record.
Winter Thunder Storms.
Thunder storms, rare in winter, prevailed on Sunday night over Lake Erie and Lake Ontario. In the night between Feb. 7 and 8, 1803, a gust of thunder and lightning passed over Toronto, attended with a heavy shower, a mixture of hall and rain; the lightning was very brilliant and vivid in different directions, and the thunder distinctly to be heard for a considerable time. Eighty-nine years after the record was precisely the same, between Feb. 7 and 8, a fact which may be noted by local meteorologists. The records of Toronto Observatory go back only 51 years. During that time but twelve thunder storms have been recorded in winter. They occurred on the following dates: Jan. 29, 1842; Jan. 15, 1847; Feb. 28, 1850; Jan. 1, 1852; Feb. 18, 1857; Feb. 20, 1859; Feb. 22, 1860; Jan. 30, 1873; Feb. 12, 1874; Feb. 10, 1876; Feb. 6, 1877; Jan. 8, 1882.
