Upon the peremptory demand of Prince Hilkoff, the Minister of Railroads, the budget covering the remuneration of railroad employes will be revised to meet the promises made last spring. Unless this was done, the prince announced, he would resign.

Prof. Boni Uncovers Battle-ground of the Misty Past.

Rome, Oct. 26.-Prof. Giacomo Boni, who is directing the excavations of the Roman Forum, made important discoveries today. After having gone through 29 archeological strate reached a muddy plain, where he found evidences that the plain was at one time inhabited.


