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U. S. SHOEMAKERS ARE HARD HIT

New York, Oct. 27.-Governor Douglas will call upon President Roosevelt in the near future to lay before him the conditions in the boot and shoe industry of the United States, and to recommend legislation looking to the removal of the tariff on hides and a change in the foreign relations of this country, according to a dispatch to the Herald from Boston.

Reports were current last week that the Central Leather Company proposed to advance the price of sole leather. The statements caused consternation among the great boot and shoe manufacturers of New England, who have been paying high record prices for many months for their raw material.

So great was the wave of opposition among the shoemakers to the contemplated advance in leather prices that the Central Company postponed, or, at least, did not announce, the price advance.

INVALIDS PERISH IN HOTEL FIRE

Six Bodies Taken From Ruins of Hotel at Hot Springs, Arkansas.

Hot Springs, Ark., Oct. 26.-Six bodies have been taken from the ruins of a railroad hotel located at the corner of Elm and Olive streets, here, which was gutted by fire early today. Of these, two are unidentified and charred beyond recognition.

The dead are: Harry Bradley, a waiter; Edward Snyder, a porter; Mrs. Mack, a musician; A. L. Mann, a railroad conductor, believed to be from Denver, and two unknown men.

The ruins have not yet been thoroughly searched, and there may be other bodies in them.

The hotel is a two story frame building containing thirty rooms, all but one of which were occupied by from one to four persons. The hotel was patronized by invalids and cripples who were under treatment. The fire is believed to have been caused by an exploding lamp. The only exit from the second story was a narrow stairway and many persons were compelled to jump from the windows. In this way F. Overton, of Hot Springs, was probably fatally injured.

CITY OF LONDON HONORS BOOTH

Head of the Salvation Army Presented With Freedom of British Capital.

London, Oct. 25.-The freedom of the city of London was today bestowed on General Booth, head of the Salvation Army. The presentation was made in the presence of a distinguished company, including city officials, several thousand citizens and many officers of the Salvation Army.

The general in reply referred to the difficulties which beset him in his early days and which only now were becoming officially recognized.

Instead of the usual gold casket, the address was enclosed in an oaken casket, the remainder of the money being at the request of General Booth, given to the Salvation Army for the benefit of the city.
