BIG C. P. R. PLANS IN FAR WEST

Practically Three Systems Will Soon Be Threading the Prairies.

Montreal, Jan. 22 .- Mr. Wm. Whyte, second vice-president of the Canadian Pacific, announced today that as a result of conferences that had been held between Sir Thomas Snaughnessy himself during the past few days with regard to the company's construction policy so far as western lines are concerned, it had been decided that new mileage would be added to the system to the extent of some 350 miles.
