Parliament Having Refused to Sanction Daylight Saving, Govt. May Try to Compel Railways to Adhere to Standard Time

Representatives of Rural Districts May Insist On Such Action Being Tried-Minister of Railways Is Now Considering the Question-Ottawa City Council Will Call a Special Meeting For Purpose of Reintroducing Daylight

Ottawa, March 28.—Possible developments arising out of the refusal of Parliament to sanction daylight saving, and the apparent determination of the railways to make their timetables conform to those of the United States when the scheme comes into effect in that country, are being discussed in the corridors of Parliament today. It was pointed out during the course of the debate last night by A. E. Fripp, Ottawa, that if the railways conform to the American time the situation would be much the same as it was last year for the farmers, and that they will be handed a 'lemon." The representatives of rural constituencies in the House will be disposed to insist on the Government compelling the rail-

ways to stick to standard time. When questioned in regard to this aspect of the matter in the House last night, Hon. J. D. Reid said that he had not considered the matter and would not cross the bridge until he came to it. The question naturally arises as to what action the Government can take to compel the railways to keep in line with the opinion expressed by Parliament short of the passing of an act of Parliament. It is understood that the matter is being considered today by the minister of railways.

The question incidentally arises as to what Parliament do in the event of Ottawa adopting daylight saving. Complications will ensue for members if the House sticks to standard time and the city clocks are advanced an hour. While Parliament may exercise its undoubted power over the railways, there would be no attempt to interfere with Ottawa's municipal rights, and it is quite possible that April may see the business of the House building conducted by standard time with the city clocks an hour ahead. It is held by some legal authorities that Ottawa municipality has authority over civil service time. If this is so, the service would conform to city time, no matter what Parliament

RAILWAYS WILL ADVANCE TIME TABLES IF GOVERNMENT ACTS

Montreal, March 28.—The executive committee of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association considered daylight saving yesterday. No report of the meeting was handed to the press, but it is understood that it was strongly in favor of the reintroduction of the scheme.

A meeting of all the important business organizations in Montreal will be held at the city hall this afternoon, when the administrative commission will be urged to pass a municipal bylaw introducing daylight saving to Montreal.

Should the Government decide not to permit the railways of Canada should the Government decide not to permit the railways of Canada to adopt the daylight saving, railway officials pointed out today, if will in any case be necessary for the railway companies to set their timetables ahead one hour. They must make connection with the United States lines at the border, and even if it is not technically known as daylight saving, it will be necessary that timetables be advanced one hour.

SUMMER TIME IS LIKELY TO BE ADOPTED BY MAJORITY OF PLACES

Ottawa, March 28.—Defeat of the daylight saving resolution in the House last night ends the possibility of a Government bill to re-enact summer time this year. But, although clocks will not be advanced by federal statute, the decision of the railways to adopt summer time will have the effect of virtually putting it into effect, as it is regarded as probable that most municipalities will put on their clocks to avoid confusion.

A young Londoner recently returned from an ism. verseas service of more than four years. He enlisted in August, 1914, and has been at the front or in training during the time when ordinarily he would be fitting himself for a career. The only pusiness he learned while in England and France was the business of war, and he cannot apply that to the earning of a living, because war as a business has gone out of existence.

As he was quite young, below military age, in fact, when he enlisted, he returns to the country without a trade or profession. He commenced to learn the electrical business before war, but Many times since that day of decision he wondered what he could do when he returned to Canada. He was in it for the duration of the war, but the years were passing when he could be training himself to make a living under peace conditions. He was glad to read in his home newspaper about vocational training and the candidates.



The voting of \$100,000 by the Ontario Government towards making conolidated schools in Ontario a possibility, will no doubt prove a great impetus in his direction throughout the province. For, although the amount seems very small, when viewed in the light of the hundreds of large, well-equipped buildings which will be necessary, before the system is complete, it is big enough to solve the chief difficulty in question—that is, the transportation of pupils from all parts of the district terms. parts of the district to the community school.

Just as the modern house has outgrown the spinning wheel, so has the farm listrict outgrown the old, pioneer, one-room school. The consolidated school alms at giving all the advantages of a city school, in the country district, and ius placing a good education within the reach of every farm boy and girl. And not only does this type of school make a good education possible, but ere is a movement on foot at the present time to frame the educational sysem in such a way that courses leading to the profession of farming will be stituted in the schools. And the practical part of farming will be considered the curriculum.

The consolidated school is but the first step in the centralizing of the activies of the country district. Some very advanced persons go so far as to suggest ne community building, housing the school, church and auditorium. But whatever may come eventually, the first step has been taken, in the granting of 100,000 to make consolidated schools a possibility.

OVERSEAS MINISTER OF CROWN FROM FLOOR OF LEGISLATURE

Declares Riots at Rhyl Camp Were Justified and the Results Prove It, But Protests at 80 Canadians "Lying in English Dungeons."

[Special to The Advertiser.]

TORONTO, March 27 .- A sweeping denunciation of the red tape in the overseas administration of the Canadian army, together with charges of the most serious nature against many officials at Argyle House, London, and in Canadian camps, was made in the Legislature today by Lieut.-Col. A. C. Pratt, Conservative M. P. P. for South Norfolk. He said the reason for the Rhyl riots was that the men were not being treated properly and that subsequent events proved that the outbreak had been worth while, as the men had promptly been given their pay, and 20,000 had been sent home within a week.

Outrageous Holdup. He charged that members of the Royal Air Force, who could not get home because of alleged lack of shipping accommodation, found that by "salving" the hand of a ticket-seller they could get a berth and get passage to Canada. These ticket-sellers made at times £75 a week. Col. Pratt charged also that two years ago an officer and two N. C. O.'s from Argyle House Canadian administrative headquarters overseas had passed through a train

carrying people homeward and collected about £3,000. The member for South Norfolk cited many examples of where improper treatment had been accorded to Canadians, both officers and men. He told of the "bull-dozing" methods which a major had to tolerate, and asked: "When a major is treated like that what is a Tommy going to expect?"

Col. Pratt spoke before the orders of the day were called. The galleries were crowded. His exposure of conditions overseas, while not coming within the scope of the Legislature, was frequently applauded by members from both sides of the House.

HALF SHIPS SUNK IN WAR CARRIED THE BRITISH FLAG

Great Britain Has Lost 3,147 Ships Out of 6,000 Total.

STATES LOST BUT 125 Neutrals and Some of Smaller Nations Suffered Heavily.

WASHINGTON, March 27.—American shipping suffered comparatively little at the hands of German submarines during the war, according to complete figures on allied and neutral ship losses, made available today.

Only 125 American vessels were lost, as compared with 3,147 British. In tonnage figures we lost 355,967 tons, against Britain's 7,818,870, navy department figures show.

Neutrals and some of the smaller entente nations suffered more than the United States. Greece lost 162 vessels and Norway 781.
