Report of Engineers Will Be Submitted to International Joint Commission at an Early Date—Cost of Construction of Proposed Waterway May Be Defrayed by International Bond Issue.

Ottawa, June 16.—The engineers' report on the St. Lawrence improvement scheme, by which it is proposed to virtually bring tide water to the head of the Great Lakes and permit outgoing vessels to penetrate thither, will be submitted to the international joint commission next week.

The international joint commission, to which the question has been referred by Ottawa and Washington, have three months within which to consider the report and make recommendations thereon.

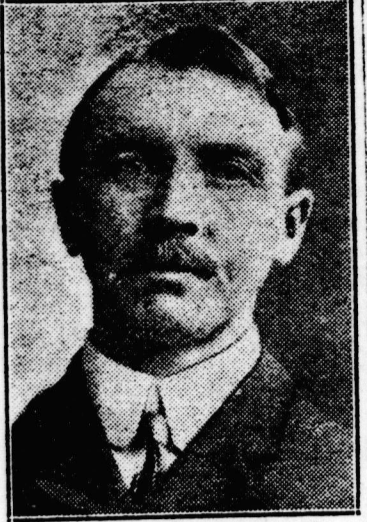

FINDING OF MACHINE GUNS ON SHIPBOARD BEING INVESTIGATED

New York, June 16.—The federal espionage act of 1917 authorizing seizure and confiscation of arms or munitions intended for illegal exportation, will be applied to the machine guns seized by customs officials on the steamer East Side, and believed to have been destined for Ireland. The shipment is now held by Hoboken police on a search warrant.

Private investigations were in full swing to determine how the arms and ammunition got on the ship, and to whom the shipment was consigned.

GOVERNMENT WILL FIGHT INJUNCTION IN GRAIN INQUIRY

Arguments Will Be Presented To Show Probe Should Proceed.

VALIDITY QUESTIONED

Ottawa, June 16.—Lieut.-Col. O. M. Biggar, chief electoral officer for the Dominion will in conjunction with R. A. Bonnar, K. C., and another Winnipeg lawyer, represent the Government in opposition to the injunction restraining the grain inquiry body from proceeding with its investigations.

MANY LONDON VETERANS TO TAKE ADVANTAGE OF GOVT. LOAN FOR HOUSING PURPOSES

Will Pay Interest at Five Per Cent and Have Thirty Years in Which To Pay Principal—Ontario's Share Is \$2,000,000.

Many London veterans are expected to take advantage of the opportunity at an early date to benefit from the \$2,000,000 loan granted by the Federal Government to ex-service men.

Secretary A. E. Foster of the local G. W. V. A., said that he had received communications from the provincial secretary, stating that \$12,000,000 had been set aside for the whole Dominion, and that Ontario would probably secure about \$2,000,000 of this for use in the different cities where housing commissions are now operating.

"If you delay much further, people everywhere will inevitably conclude that you have no concrete plan at all or else that you propose to put party harmony above world welfare," declared Mr. Holt.

"You have not yet given the American people the slightest inkling of the terms of this Harding association that you propose shall supplant the Wilson league," the letter continued.

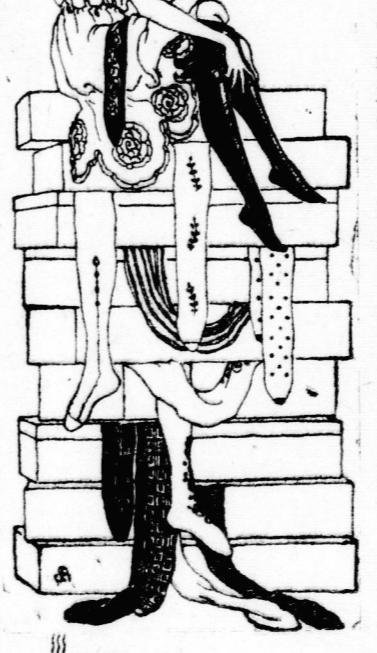

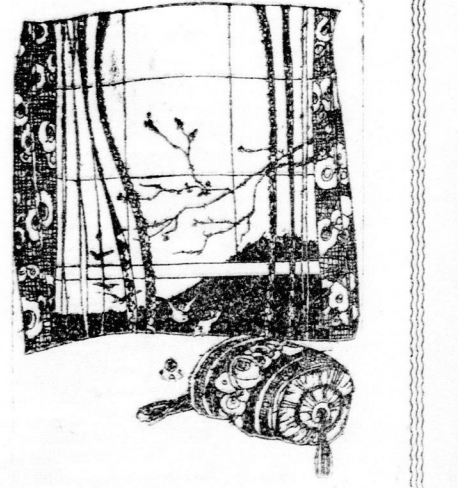

Shipment of 500 Machine-Guns Seized At Hoboken Were Consigned To Ireland

Federal Officers Clash With Customs Officials, But Secure Possession of Weapons—Member of Crew of S. S. East Side Said To Have Given Warning To Police.

NEW YORK, June 15.—Customs officials have seized nearly 500 modern machine-guns, alleged to have been found concealed aboard the steamship East Side, tied up in Hoboken, loading for an Irish port.

Seized by Federal Agents.

This became known late today, when the Hoboken police clashed with the customs men over possession of the arms. The guns finally were taken to Hoboken police headquarters. According to Chief of Police Hayes of Hoboken, the arms were seized yesterday by the federal agents. This morning, he said, a man giving the name of Frank Williams appeared in recorder's court and swore out a search-warrant claiming the weapons.

Refuse to Discuss Seizures.

The Hoboken police say that when they went to the pier where the East Side is tied up, they were told there were no machine guns there. Later, they said, they found them being loaded on to a truck and took possession of them after some argument with the customs men. The federal agents declined to discuss the seizure, but officials of the department of justice admitted they were investigating a report that plans were afoot for shipping arms to Ireland.

Got Tip From Member of Crew.

According to the Hoboken police, the guns were seized by federal agents on the charge that their shipment was illegal because no permit had been obtained from the state department to send them out of the country. Chief Hayes asserted the customs men had obtained their first information concerning the presence of the weapons aboard the East Side from a member of the crew.

ORDER INVESTIGATION.

WASHINGTON, June 15.—The department of justice tonight ordered its agents in New York to make an investigation of the arms seized on the steamship East Side, at Hoboken, to determine whether they constituted a shipment for abroad. The report probably will be transmitted to the state department, officials said, in case it is found that a shipment was intended for a decision as to whether it can move.

Starting Developments Expected At Inquiry Into Calgary Fire.

CALGARY, June 15.—Mrs. J. J. Routledge and her four children were burned to death on Tuesday night in a fire which destroyed their home, eight miles east of Innisfail. Mr. Routledge, Mrs. Routledge's sister, and another child escaped. The origin of the fire is unknown. Provincial police are investigating.

The bodies of Mrs. Routledge and three of the children were found in the cellar, but the remains of the fourth child have apparently been entirely consumed by the flames. An inquest will be held, when it is expected there will be some startling developments. According to reports the fire broke out when the members of the family were asleep, and it was only with the greatest difficulty that Mr. Routledge, his remaining child and sister-in-law escaped.

FATHER AND SON NOT GUILTY OF BLACKMAIL

BRANTFORD, June 15.—"Not guilty," was the verdict returned by the county court jury in the charge of extortion laid against Herschel and Howard Swagzie, father and son, who were charged with endeavoring to secure \$5,000 from a well-known local woman by means of a threatening letter. Handwritten expert reports called in over the case, submitted in evidence, and W. H. Brewster, K.C., for the defence, asked that the case be taken from the jury for lack of evidence. Judge Hardy allowed it to continue, however, with a verdict returned for the defence.

SILESIA WILL BE BATHED IN RED, SAYS HOEFER

German General Believes the Wrong Course Has Been Taken by Allies.

Gaultier to permit the British to read to strike until the Entente could re-establish order, he said: 'Then the Poles would make another Northern France out of Upper Silesia.'"

SIX FIREMEN KILLED AND TEN INJURED IN CRASH WITH EXPRESS

Fire Truck Collided With Train At Railway Crossing in Perth Amboy.

SAFETY GATES OPEN

Some Firemen Thrown Under Wheels of Fast-Moving Train.

PERTH AMBOY, N. J., June 15.—Six firemen were killed and ten others injured, when a fire truck crashed into a tender of a Barnegat express at the Central railway crossing of the Central railway at New Jersey at 5:50 o'clock this evening. The firemen, members of the Eagle Hose and Chemical Company, a volunteer organization, were on their way to a small warehouse fire when the accident happened.

At 40 Miles An Hour. Fire department officials declared tonight that the safety gates at the crossing were not down when the express, bound from Jersey City to Barnegat and traveling at the rate of more than 40 miles an hour, hove into sight. The driver of the motor truck, also driving at a fast clip, tried frantically to avoid the collision, witnesses said, but crashed into the tender of the fast-moving train. The flames on the truck were thrown to the ground and some of them fell beneath the wheels of the train, being instantly killed. The injured were rushed to the Perth Amboy Hospital.

GRADE SEPARATION OF G. T. R. TRACKS WOULD BE COSTLY

Engineer A. S. Going In Arbitration Proceedings Quotes \$46,000,000.

MONTREAL, June 15.—Montreal grade separation for the Grand Trunk with the proposed new Bonaventure station broke into the Grand Trunk arbitration proceedings this afternoon with some emphasis, when A. S. Going, engineer of construction for the Grand Trunk, was called by government counsel to testify regarding the cost of such separation during the coming twenty years. The cost was figured at \$15,000,000. In Toronto somewhat similar plans would involve a cost of \$25,000,000, of which the Grand Trunk's share would be about \$11,000,000, including London, Ontario, Detroit, Mich., South Bend, Indiana and Chicago. The grade separation would cost in all about \$46,000,000. He thought none of this work would start before Mr. Going's evidence was still being heard when the board adjourned until tomorrow.

KENT COUNTY COUNCIL ASKED TO MAKE GRANT TO CITY HOSPITAL

Sixty-Eight Per Cent of Patients Cared For Are From County.

CHATHAM, June 15.—A deputation waited on the county council this morning asking for a grant in aid of the memorial wing to the Chatham General Hospital. The question was referred to the finance committee to report this session. While no definite sum was asked for by the deputation it is believed that if the grant is made it will be at least \$25,000. The city council recently made a grant of one million on the city assessment amounting approximately to \$15,000, to the two local hospitals, and as 68 per cent of the patients cared for at the General last year were from outside the city, it is thought the county will make a grant of at least one-half million or a sum of about \$25,000. A short session was held this afternoon after which the members went out to Cedar Springs to inspect the gravel site.

A deputation from the city and county will wait on Hon. Frank Biggs, Friday morning, urging that some action be taken on the construction work on the provincial highway in the vicinity of this city. As yet no work of any consequence has been done on the road in this section. The work, if gone ahead with this summer, would relieve the labor situation, which at the present time does not look very bright.

WINNIPEG, June 15.—During the last week the weather has been ideal over the three western provinces for rapid growth of the crops and soil moisture and other conditions continue excellent. It is stated in the weekly weather and crop report, which will be published by the Grain Trade News tomorrow. The banks, railways and government reports all state that prospects at this date are better than they have been in any year since 1905.

KEEP THEM IN HAND.

The behavior of the parliamentary majority in supporting Mr. Meighen's usurpation of power during the past year is enough to make honest and sensible Canadians consider seriously the plan of "recall."

It has been the usual thing in recent times to call the members "our representatives." They are empowered to stand in our place, and to some extent use their own judgment or follow the judgment of their leaders in doing what is "in the best interests of Canada," as Mr. Meighen would say.

It would be well, then, if Canadian members of Parliament would consider themselves as delegates rather than representatives. They should be bound by the instructions contained in the platform on which they were elected, with an occasional referendum to the electorate on new points, and the recall by the constituency when a member flagrantly violates the confidence reposed in him as a delegate.

AGRICULTURAL REPRESENTATION. It is certainly to be regretted that the Middlesex County Council at its last session turned down the appeal which was made for a grant of \$500 towards office expenses in connection with the division of the county in the matter of agricultural representation.

It is pointed out that the Lincoln County Council a few days ago voted a supplementary sum of \$1,000 to the work of the department, one-half of which was to be used towards the support of another agricultural representative.

ANGLO-JAP TREATY WILL BE OPPOSED BY PREMIER MEIGHEN

Australian Premier Will Demand Renewal of Treaty—Will Point to Canada's Failure to Aid in Empire Naval Protection—Claims Treaty Is Necessary to Australia's Safety.

LONDON, June 15.—(By Grattan O'Leary, Staff Correspondent, Canadian Press Limited.)—The advisability of renewing the Anglo-Japanese alliance, a question in which Canada is vitally interested, will be the first item before the conference which opens today in London.

On Three Grounds. The premier of Canada will base his opposition to the treaty on three main grounds: First, that the reasons which made it necessary in 1911 have since disappeared; second, that renewal of the treaty would be regarded as a challenge to the United States; and third, that the formation of special alliances is antagonistic to the spirit of the time and in Government circles world is making toward disarmament and peace.

Ask Postponement. The Canadian premier contemplates asking the conference to postpone until the next constitutional conference, or at least until the international situation is more settled.

United States and Japan Open Direct Negotiations Over Various Questions. Matters For Consideration Include the Island of Yap, the Immigration Question, the Alien Land Question and the Return of Shantung To China—Baron Shidehara To Meet Secretary of State Hughes.

WASHINGTON, June 15.—Direct negotiations have been begun between the United States and Japan for the settlement of the questions pending between them.

Four Big Questions. These include the island of Yap, the immigration question, the alien land question and the return of Shantung to China by Japan.

The negotiations are being conducted by Baron Shidehara, the Japanese ambassador, and Secretary of State Hughes.

Will Evacuate Shantung. Japan's promise to return Shantung to China, it is said, is being executed as soon as practicable, and without reference to the question of a European tribunal.
