#### THE OCEAN RATE WAR

to Meet the Cunards.

New York, Aug. 23. - All of the leading transatlantic lines now have reduced their minimum first and second cabin east-bound to meet the Cunard eduction made several days ago, says the Journal of Commerce. Both the North German Lloyd and the French Line yesterday took a hand in the cutrate war by announcing a sweeping re duction in first-class rates both to Plymouth and Cherbourg, and to Bre men on the largest vessels of the line and also on steamships of the Barbarossa type. On the Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse, the Kaiser Wilhelm II., and the Kron Prinz Wilhelm, the minimum first-class rate to Plymouth and Cher bourg was cut \$40, and a reduction of \$30 was made in the same class rate to Bremen. A cut of \$30 was announced in the first-class rate to Plymouth and Cherbourg on vessels of the Barbar-ossa type, of \$20 to Bremen. The reductions in second cabin rates are not as heavy as in the first-class rates. On the steamship La Lorraine, and La Savoie, the French Line made a cut of \$30 in first-class rates east-bound minimum, and of \$10 in the second cabin rate. On all other vessels the first-class rates were reduced by \$20 and the cabin by \$12 50.
