DENMARK AND HER STAMPS.

HENRY A. CHAPMAN

Denmark is a small country, about half as large as South Carolina, yet she has for many years held a prominent position in European affairs. It is not worthy, however, that during a period of nearly fifty years since her first stamps were issued, her stamps have not been graced(?) by the head of her King. The present ruler has held his position for 37 years, being known as the "Grandfather of Europe." He was an officer in the Danish army when, in 1842, he married Princess Louise of Hesse, who was then 25, a year older than himself. "Christian" has been a name identified with the history of Denmark, our subject being known as Christian IX. In Erald's veire we read:—

King Christian stood by lofty mast
In mist and smoke;
His sword was hammering so fast,
Down went the foeman's hull and mast
In mist and smoke.

The young couple were possessors of "blue blood," but money was a "minor variety" with them then. Louise mended Christian's garments, and the three daughters born to them had to sew for themselves. It was hardly expected that in the future, one would wear a dress worth forty thousand dollars, as she did in the Kremlin at Moscow.

However, Christian became King of Denmark in 1863, and I believe that year was marked by the war in which Schleswig-Holstein was taken away from the little kingdom. Six children were born to the royal pair before they became possessed of the throne. The crown

prince was the oldest child, but two of his sisters made royal marriages a head of him, and the whole six, thanks to their match-making mother and Queen Victoria, have done well in a royal sense. As Frederick the oldest son, has had nine children, plenty of boys among them. Denmark will be supplied with Kings for a long time to come, one of the boys, heir presumptive, is named Christian.

Denmark is a good country to specialize in. Less than half a dozen of its stamps of the regular issues are high priced, and they are not particularly steep. Speculation as the term is often defined, does not seem to have touched Denmark, probably because her stamps have no special claim to beauty. Crowns, shields, wreaths and swords are made use of in their make-up. At first sight, not having on my glass, the earlier issues made me think of the skull and cross-bones, but better vision showed that a crown surmounted crossed swords, surrounded by a wreath. On the shield which was made use of later, are three animals which are probably meant for a trio of lions, I shouldn't dare to call them so, for fear certain critics would call me down as in the case of my designation of the "monkey" stamp of Congo.

The stamps of Denmark are comprised in a little over one hundred in number. Her dependency in the West Indies has barely twenty issues, and these are mostly within reasonable bounds. At present there seems to be a likelihood of the United States buying the

Danish Antilles, and if this county of ours cares to pay \$7,000,000 for the 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ square miles in question, it seems as though the Danes would close the bargain quickly. Perhaps U.S. surcharges may mark the stamps of the Danish West Indies in the opening year of the twentieth century. In passing, it may be worth noting that several minor varieties are in existence, both as regards perforation or a lack of it, and there are many differences in shades. Former catalogues give two official seals which are rather attractive and there are plenty of collectors, including yours truly, who put them in the album. It is noteworthy that two stamps of Schleswig-Holstein of 1850 date, when the provinces belong to Denmark, are held at \$18 in unused and \$60 in used condition, and that the stamps of Schleswig and Holstein both in after years are held at rather stiff prices. The stamps became obsolete in 1868, when superseded by those of Germany.

Nova Scotia Cent Series.

EDGAR NELTON

The series of stamps issued by the Nova Scotia Government contemporary with the change of currency in 1860-62 have always been exceedingly interesting to collectors generally on account of their beautiful designs and exquisite coloring. Interest in this handsome series has received a new impetus recently on account of the discovery and placing upon the market of the remainders of five values.

These stamps were engraved and printed by the American Bank Note Co, and were not only finished in the highest style of the engravers' art at that period but quite equal to any and are far superior in delicacy of design and clearly defined colours and printing to much that this well known company has since produced.

The 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ c value was known among old-time collectors as the queen of stamps and is indeed a beautiful engraving. It has always been a moderately difficult stamp to obtain, especially on the original cover, having been used formerly to England and foreign countries.

One of the finest counterfeits ever produced of this stamp was made many years ago, but what its history was and by whom made I have never been able to ascertain beyond the fact that I found and purchased three specimens in Montreal some years ago. The engraving is almost equal to the splendid workmanship evinced in the original, and the artist who produced the forgery exhibited abilities worthy of a better cause. Probably it was figured at the time that this stamp would become very rare like its distinguished predecessor, so much like in its general appearance, the famous 12 pence of Canada.

Just why these forgeries were never more widely circulated I am also unable to imagine as they would readily deceive even fairly well informed collectors, but as a matter of fact they did not and are worth *for purposes of comparison* and interest to the specialist in British North America far more than the original, so none may fear being swindled by counterfeits of Nova Scotia cent stamps altho' there are miserably poor forgeries of 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 10c in existence and also fair imitations 1c and 2c values, also very scarce like 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ c forgery and worth far more now than the originals.

The recent discovery of Remainders has disgruntled some speculators and large holders of these stamps, but is a good thing for the philatelic world at large as many collectors have now the opportunity of filling up this is a small figure which may decline still farther yet. A careful examination of the Remainders offered show them to be genuine originals beyond all doubt, and enquiry at offices of the American Bank Note Co. show no Reprints have ever

been struck from the originals plates, or is there little chance there ever will be. I regard the two papers as two different printings of this issue at two distinct periods.

The Remainters come as follows: 2 and 10c on white paper, 1, 8½ and 12½c on yellowish paper, the 5c value, being the ordinary domestic rate, seemed to have been all used up and one of this value were found unused. It is easily obtained in a used condition, however, cheaper than any of the others. The issue on white paper shows usually in the thickness of paper especially on the 8½c which in much thicker than same on yellowish paper.

The 10c on white paper *used* 8½c on yellow, *used* 12½c on white *new*, 10c on yellow *new*, and 8½c on white *new* or *used* with the 5c on yellowish either *new* or *used* are very difficult to obtain and under-rate stamps.

The 5c also comes on bluish paper (at least bluish on face of stamp) caused by a shallow matrix in the plates and occasional neglect of the printer to clean the ink from the same.

The 8½c is also a rarity on the original cover and is usually found used to Newfoundland, Cape Breton and the U. S. The other values except the 12½c are not so difficult to obtain on original letters, but still are more valuable and just about hard enough to secure in this shape to give zest and interest to collectors of entire covers.

Taken all in all Nova Scotia is, I believe, a most interesting and satisfactory country to collect and even the youngest amateur may now hope to have it complete some day, altho the shilling of the pence issue or first series may give him considerable difficulty to secure.

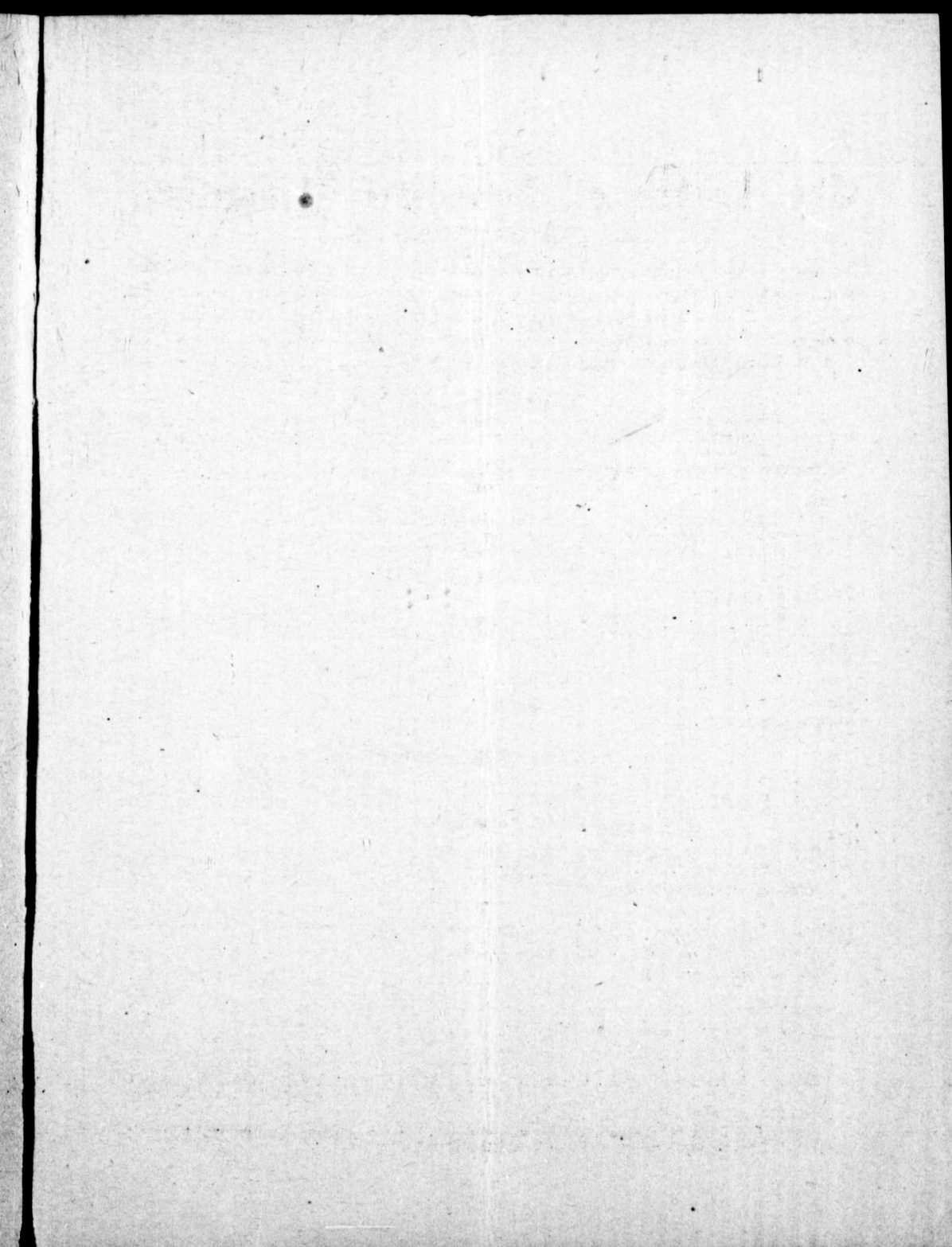
