Ottawa, June 10 - It is understood that Lieut. Col. Smith, D.L.O., of 250, 1st district, will command the Camp of Instruction which is to be held at London. The following officers will constitute his staff: Lieut. Col. John Irwin, 29th B.D., W. H. Lindsay, 7th B.D., W. White, 20th B.D., and Major J. H. Cooper, 29th B.D. Their precise positions have been decided, but will be left to Col. Smith, Surgeon Major Hanover will be principal medical officer of the camp. No. 3 District Camp, Niagara, will be conducted by Lieut. Col. Buchanan, Acting Major. The following is the staff: Major Pellatt, Q.O.R., brigade major; Major McLaren, 18th, supply officer; Capt. Cartwright, permanent corps, camp quartermaster; Major Macdonald, 48th High Landers, instructor of musketry; Surgeon Major Strange, principal medical officer. District No. 3, Kingston - Lieut. Col. Cotton, D.A.G., in command. The staff is as follows: Major Heron, G.C.F., supply officer; Major Biggar, 16th, camp quartermaster; Capt. Horn, 14th, instructor of musketry; Lieut. Macleod, 8th, Hussars, orderly officer; Surgeon Major Neilson, principal medical officer.

WILL NOT INTERFERE.
Hendershot and Weller to Hang on the
18th of this Month.

Ottawa, June 10.—Miss Mary Hender-
shot has been appealing for the
release of her father and her husband.
The authorities, however, will not inter-
fere. Weller will suffer the extreme peni-
tence for their crime on the 18th of this month.

The Jack Tied Up.
Port Huron, June 10.—The Canadian
steamer Jack, which was wanted on a
libel for \$100,000 for the sinking of the
steamer Norman off Alpena, and which
got away from Port Huron on Saturday
morning, still remains in the hands of
Marshall Pettit, who is in the fast
trap. When she was finally
released, she was to be sent to
Kingston, a wealthy man, and will
undoubtedly have her released on bond.

Novia Scotia Lieut.-Governorship.
Halifax, June 10.—The rumor in
circulation that Sir Charles Hibbert
will succeed to the Lieutenant-Governor-
ship of Nova Scotia for the next term,
his time expires next month. There
has been an idea that Mr. Daly
would be appointed, but on the other
hand it has been understood that there
has been some objection to his ap-
pointment, and that the position
will probably be filled by the ap-
pointment of Sir Charles Hibbert.

Propose to Save \$25,000.
St. John's, Nfld., June 10.—One of the
Whitney's, June 8.—Dr. Dennis J. Seaman
and Mrs. Alice Lane were arraigned in the
Recorder's Court yesterday on the charge
of manslaughter, in having by criminal
operation performed January 25 on Emily
Hall of Halesworth, England, caused the
death of the girl on February 3 following.
The prisoners refused to plead, and a plea
of not guilty was entered. The trial of
Dr. Seaman was set for June 17. This is
the case in which the English clergyman
Bell was implicated.

Caleb Hartley's Insurance.
Bramford, June 8.—Mrs. Hartley, who
was charged with the murder of her hus-
band, Caleb Hartley, at the Fall Asizes
here last year, has entered an action
against the Canadian Home Circle for the
amount of \$2,000, which is the sum her
late husband was insured for in that
society. The Home Circle has paid the
amount into court, and the son Fred will
contest his deceased father's rights to
alter the certificate to his (the son's) ex-
clusion and in favor of Mrs. Hartley.

Disciples of Widd.
London, June 10.—As a result of his
inquiries, June 8.—The case of the great
public schools, the investigation having
been expedited since by those who con-
sidered it was not what it should have been.

Start by a Falling Telephone Pole.
Halifax, June 10.—A heavy telephone
pole was being felled by a Bell telephone
gang on Saturday, when it got
loose and fell in a direction
across the sidewalk, crashing through
large plate glass windows of an estab-
lishment, striking and severely in-
juring Amy McLennan and Grace Ridley,
two little girls, in its descent.

Overboard with Pig-iron.
Cleveland, June 8.—The large new
passenger steamer Macon sank in the
Cuyahoga River off the custom house
dock here on Saturday. The Macon was
partly loaded with pig-iron, and had tied
up for coal. When the lines were loosed
she drifted down the river, and in
settling in 30 feet of water, leaving only
the tops of her masts above water. The
Macon was bound for Hamilton. No pas-
sengers were on board, and the crew was
easily rescued. The cause of the accident
is said to have been overloading.

Revenue Returns for May.
Ottawa, June 10.—The revenue for May
shows an increase of \$49,000, accounted
for chiefly by an increase of \$100,000 in
customs and of \$93,000 in excise, due to
the re-warehousing of spirits and sug-
gar during the first three days of May, just
prior to the tariff increases on May 8.
The total revenue to date for the eleven
months of the fiscal year falls short of
the previous year by \$2,800,000. The total
expenditure for the eleven months is
about half a million in excess of that of
1894.

FINANCE AND COMMERCE
Toronto, June 10.—The market is
fairly steady and the market is steady,
in sympathy with the advance in the
western markets. The price of red and
