CORONATION CLAIMS

An Interesting Dispute as to Who Shall Bear the Great Spurs.

It is expected that two millions of visitors will be attracted to London by the magnificent proceedings in King George and Queen Mary. To many the appeal made by those pro-ceedings will be merely the appeal of many the appeal made by those proceedings will be merely the appeal of the spectacular; they will be drawn to the coronation as they would be to a Durbar in India, or to the enthronement of a Czar and Czarina, which for gorgeousness and lavish splendor outrivals the greatest spectacles East and West. For many the coronation ceremonles in London will have a high patriotic and religious significance. To others they will appeal strongly on the historical and heraldic side, and these latter will be interested in the hundreds of cases which are being considered by the Court of Claims—cases of hereditary claims to do certain things, or occupy certain places at the coronation proceedings. The case which is attracting the greatest amount of attention, as it is giving the Court of Claims the greatest amount of trouble, is the three-cornered one between Lord Grey de Ruthyn, the Earl of London, and Lord Hastings, to bear the Great Spurs at the ceremony. Each of the three can claim descent from the baron who carried the Great Spurs at the coronation of Richard II. The suggestion that the matter might be settled by the Court of Claims ordering a three-handled silver dish to be made, in which the Great Spurs should be carried, each of the three claimants holding a handle of the dish, would be regarded, of course, is little short of sacrilege by the upnolders of the sacredness of all these fee points of ancient qualitaness and historic ceremonial, which are remainders ers of the sacredness of all there fine points of ancient quaintness and historic ceremonial, which are remitders of the acts of personal service to the sovereign, upon which estates and titles used to be held. Viewed in the right historical perspective, they have their import, and play their part in making the coronation the coronation apageant of historical interest and value.

It has been offered, as an act of homage, by its owner, to the King, who has signified his acceptance of the gift. The robe is in a perfect state of preservation, having apparently been laid in a cedar box, from which it has recently been taken. It is of the finest cloth of gold, and as fresh in appearance as if it had but just left the loom. It is an admirable example of the handloom industry of the Spitalfields weavers, and has woven into its surface the badges of the three kingdoms of England, Scotland and Ireland, in this respect to the control of the presents a man admirable example of the handloom for King Edward, on which the badges were embroidered by hand. The robe is surrounded by a deep fringe of pure gold threads.



LIBERAL ASSOCIATION LATE CAPTAIN ROST. MARSHALL WAS GENTLEMAN RANKER.

> He Tried to Be a Lawyer, But It Proved Irksome and He Enlisted-Dra matic Writing Took Most of His Attention, and In 1898 He Produced "His Excellency the Governor," Which Made Him Famous.

Which Made Him Famous.

A notable career is brought to an untimely close by the death, at the early age of 47, of Captain Robert Marshall, which occurred at a London West end nursing home. For some years Captain Marshall's health has been the subject of considerable anxiety to his friends. By the advice of his physician, Captain Marshall spent most of the winter months abroad, but even this step was powerless to arrest the progress of a malady which, before it had developed very far, was recognized to be incurable. Slowly but surely it has run its course, and now, despite the most patient care and nursing, the end has come. It has fallen to the lot of few authors to make such a sudden leap into fame as was the case with Captain Marshall, or so consistently to maintain a high level of excellence with his work. He owed no small measure of his success to his faculty for writing bright and witty dialogue, and to a ready gift of imagination which bordered closely on the fantastic. Robert Marshall was born in Edinburgh in 1863. His natural bent for the stage speedily made itself manifest by the eagerness with which he devoted himself, whenever opportunity occurred, to amateur theatrieals. Various professions were suggested, none, as it happened, to his liking, and, after a brief experience of the law, he suddenly took his fate into his own hands



ted as a private in the Highit Infantry. Thence he was
d to the Duke of Wellingiment, with which he served
he years in the West Indies.
This time he had fallen a victim
to the passion of dramatic writing,
and a little piece from his pen, entitled, "The Subeltern," had the honor of being presented by a company





Many and varied are the pro-blems which engross the attention of our civic rulers, for which we are all willing to make allowances, but the conditions which now obtain in Campbellton are most pernicious in their influence against the best interests of our growing town, and the ratepayers now desire these conditions rectified by a little more action and less talk, deeds and not resolutions only, enforcement of By-Laws and less reference to them. We seem to have looked in vain for the council to make a move towards the upholding of its own laws, and although it is perfectly true that any ratepayer can take action against any person infringing the By-Laws, we can only ask where does the Council stand in this matter? If we as ratepayers are to see to the enforcing of these legal eractments which govern the town, there is no necessity for us to place the reins of government in the hands of the Council for those who pay the piper are entitled to the tune. And we are paying for it. What answer can the Council give us regarding the promised legislation affecting the taxation of real estate? Before beginning our buildings we were promised that this exemption was going through the House at Fred-

ericton, and only the land would be taxed. Under this promise many of us have built and are building large and costly places and if these are to be assessed for taxation purposes it means that the assessable value of the town is being raised by dishonest methods. What the public want to know is, was this Legislation dropped? If so, why has there been no report given regarding it? Why are we kept in the dark regarding this and many other things? It is only right that the public should have the entire confidence of its rulers, and no good ever comes of trying to play hide-and-seek with

promises given to the people.

Another point is that with great acclamation the Coundil greeted an injunction clause to be tacked on to the By-Laws giving power to restrain any person from building in defiance of the By-Laws. This has also proved a fizzle for before any injunctions can be granted, the town will require to go to St. John to get the necessary papers, and all the shacks in Campbellton could be built before a writ of restraint could be issued. Still another point: Some time ago petitions were presented from two Churches asking permission to build in wood. The By-Laws make no allowance for exempting any building and the Council have no power to grant exemption, yet nothing has been done with these petitions and in the meantime the churches are going on with pre-parations for building without permit or authority of any kind.

These things may be embarrass These things may be embarrassing in a slight degree but we have every confidence that the Council is quite able to remedy these matters once they are brought to their notice. Many more points could be taised but we believe everything will yet be cleared up, and we can only say to the Council. and we can only say to the Council Gentlemen you have all the backing you want. Go ahead.

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
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
