

I believe there is a subterranean river

running from Lake Superior through Lakes Huron and Michigan, under Lake Erie, and emptying into Lake Ontario. There is no other way in which to explain certain mysteries connected with our great lakes. The surface of Lake Superior is about 650 feet above tide, while its bed is 260 feet below tide level. Lake Huron's surface is 50 feet below that of Superior's, and its bed is about on a level with Superior's. The surface of Lake Michigan is 300 feet lower than Lake Huron's, and its bed is sunk a corresponding distance to the level of the other two lakes. Lake Erie's surface is nearly as high as Lake Michigan's, being 565 feet above the tide, but its bed is also above tide, being 350 feet higher than the ocean level, consequently its bed is 250 feet higher than those of the lakes above it. Lake Ontario's surface is the lowest of all the great lakes, being less than 500 feet above tide, but its be is 250 feet below the ocean, or about the same level as Michigan, Huron and Su perior. Winnipeg, May 31.—In the Legisla-ture resterday, Mr. Norquay stated the intentions of the Government in reference to the terms sent down from Ottawa. He read a somewhat lengthy paper, the gist of which was a complete rejection of the terms offered. His stand was unanimously endorsed by the legislature, and a committee was appointed to put the reply into shape for transmission to Ottawa. Mr. Martin, of Portage La Prairie, proposed that Attorney-General Miller be recalled from his mission to England on the ground that the Dominion Government had refused the province the public lands. The motion was voted down.

# DYNAMITE.

The Metropolis Greatly Excited Over the Late Explosions

Club Shuttered—Attempt on the Nelson Honument—Bitter Feeling Against the Irish—Bribes for Informers.

LONDON, May 31.- I was sitting in the smoking-room of the Junior Carlton Club last night about half-past 9 o'clock, when the whole house trembled. There was a dull roar and the gaslight went out. We first thought it was another earth quake, but one of the waiters ran in and said the back of the club house on St. James' square was blown in with dyna-mite. We went down stairs and found that the explosion had taken place in the area opposite the scullery and back kitchen windows, which were all blown The poor girls who were engaged in washing up after dinner were the chief sufferers. They were cut and mangled with broken glass and flying porcelain. They were at once sent to the hospital.

I went out into Piccadiily and as for as the Nelson Column, where sixteen packages of dynamite were found, sufficient to have destroyed the monument. There was also another explosion in Scotland yard. I afterward called at the Charing cross hospital to which the sufferers had been removed and learned that they were all doing well. The excitement both last night and this morning has been

Daylight showed the damage by the

wreckage untouched until an examination by Col. Majendie.

At St. James' theatre, a hundred yards distant, the explosions sounded like two claps of thunder. The audience was alarmed and there was nearly a panic. Several ladies fainted. The men started to stampede but were reassured by shouts bidding every one to sit still, as no harm was done.

The second bomb in St. James' square exploded against the residence of Sir Watkin Wynn and produced a huge white fracture four feet in height and The windows were three in breadth. mashed and furniture damaged. The explosion created great havoc in

iron steps leading to kitchens and cellars, and placed in the cellar under the pathway with a lighted fuse. The upward force of the explosion broke a large hole in the pavement, and wrecked the basement departments of the club.

"Ever see any political riots?" Well, no. But I've seen a few disagreements and a little unpleasantness result occasionally. "Become enversant with politics?" Oh, no; didn't need to become; was born and raised in them. Took to them as a duck does to water,

you know.

The first election after confederation The first election after confederation was very hotly contested in Huron. My father took an active part on the Reform side and when Messrs Cameron and Gibbous were returned over Messrs. Ritchie and Carling great was the rejoicing that followed the hard-carned victory. I resided near Exeter, and with a few others waited all night for returns, and before leaving we agreed with a few of the boys to come out the following night and celebrate the event by a big bonfire. This was a risky business. The village was a Tory hot bed, (I am pleased to know that with better facilities for education a great change has came over its politics) the few Reformers in it being accorded the treatment usual in such cases. But the Thames Road settlement was with us, and we looked for a turnout from there.

Well, we went—about a dozen of us—and after waiting for the reinforcements, which, owing to a misunderstanding, did not come, we concluded to fire up alone. A big pile of inflammables was soon on the street and ablaze while we cheered and fired off our guns as rapidly as we could load and fire. We had not long enjoyed ourselves thus when a big crowd was seen coming up the street armed was seen coming up the street armed with all sorts of weapons from stick and scythe blades to bayonets and two or three with formidable looking old swords, and we saw a row or run was to swords, and we saw a row or run was to follow. When they got near us they began to swear and—but you can't have any idea how an Exeter Tory mob can swear. Why if the hatches of the bottomless pit were bettened down for a few aions and then the bottled-up profanity suddenly turned loose it might beat it; but it wouldn't be a safe thing to bet on. Well, that mob just opened its mouth and howled and then went for its mouth and howled and then went for our fire. One fellow seized a brand and an uncle of mine, who was there, put his foot on it. Three or four rushed at him and his brother and another of our boys and his brother and another of our boys who had guns loaded heavily with powder, blazed away. One of the mob was knocked over and pretty well scorched. Bruce B— who had been trying to get a rusty charge of ball out of his rifle, lowered and snapped it, but fortunately it didn't explode. The next thing I didn't explode. The next thing I didn't explode. was to get up out of a fence corner. I didn't go there of my own free will and I've always suspected that the careless fellows in scattering that fire must have crowded me. The condition of my ribs led me to infer this.

The weather for sometime after wasn't particularly healthy for our boys. Sefore I was on deck again one of them had 'got pretty badly kicked, cut and stabbed, but escaped, minus his gun. 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# Prehistoric Man in Egypt and Syria.

A gala meeting was held by the Victoria Philosophical Institute of London in the second week in May, at which its members gave a worthy welcome to Vice-Chancellor Dawson, C. M. G., of McGill University, Montreal, at whose instance the British Association visits Canada this year. The Society of Arts kindly lent its premises for the occasion, and its great theatre was crowded in every part long before the hour of meeting The chair was taken by Sir H. Barkly, G.C.M.G., K.C.B., F.R.S., who-atter the new members had been announced by Captain F. Petrie, the secretary— welcomed Dr. Dawson amid loud applause, and asked him to deliver his Address: It was on "Prehistoric Man in Egypt and Syria," and was illustrated by large diagrams, also flint implements and bones collected by Dr. Dawson himself on the spot during his winter tour in the East; Professor Boyd-Dawkins, F. R.S., kindly assisted in the classification of the bones. In dealing with his subject, Dr. Dawson remarked that, Great interest attaches to any remains which, is countries historically so old, may indicate the residence of man before the dawn of history.
