





First News of

British Were Warned by W. Brendish, a Telegraph Operator.

The following story of the Indian mutiny is told in the London Daily Mail:

There has just been retired from the service of the Postmaster-General a servant who may be said to have practically saved India to this country. This is W. Brendish, tele graph master, the sole survivor o those who were present in Delhi i May, 1857, and who, in the courageous discharge of his duty on the nemeorable 11th of that month, renlered invaluable service to the state It was Mr. Brendish, who, without

orders and acting on his own respon sibility, despatched the telegran which warned the authorities of the Punjub of the outbreak of the terrile mutiny. "The sepoys have com n from Meerut and are burning verything," he wired. "Mr. Todd is lead, and, we hear, several Europe ins. We must shut up."

The fatal news was sent to Lahor by Mr. Brendish, who was then but youth while the mutineers were pur suing their work of slaughter in every part of the cantonment. It has been acknowledged that this presence o mind on the part of young Brendist saved India. The story is told by dr. Brendish in a modest narrative his services on that eventfal day The telegraph staff at Delhi, he says consisted of Mr. Todd, assistant i ocal charge, and two young signal ers, Brendish and Pilkington.

On Sunday, the 10th of that month n the forenoon, the signallers at the Meerut office wired that eighty met of the 3rd Cavalry had been confine ind were to be blown away from guns for refusing to bite the Enfiel cartridges only recently issued to the roops. No further news was receiv d, and at 4 p.m., the line with Merut was found to be interrupted. On he following morning Mr. Todd took dark and started for Meerut, to ascertain at what point along the road the break had occured. He got no 'urther than the bridge of boats over Jumma, for he there met the mutin-

ous 3rd Cavalry, who killed him. The signallers remained at their post in the telegraph office, which was fortunately outside the city walls, about one mile distant from he Kashmir Gate and from the Flagstaff Tower. They saw a regiment of native infantry with two guns pass along the road from cantonments to wards the city, and learned afterwards that they had joined the 3rd Cavalry, Later on, heavy firing was heard in the city, and Brendish, who was at the signalling instruments. kept on wiring to Lahore all news that was brought to him.

At noon he went out on the road o see what was going on, and presently there passed a wounded British officer, driving from the city, who called out: "For God's sake get inside and close the doors.

"We did so," says Mr. Brendish but even then Pilkington and I did not feel we were secure, as we were but two lads encumbered with the wife and child of Mr. Todd, whos sad end was not yet known to us, and surrounded by servants who perhao were prepared to take our lives, bu who were doubtful as to the termina tion of events."

For two hours more the boys held on listening to the firing within the walls. At 2 n.m. Brendish went to the Umballa instrument for the last time and signalled to the hands at the other end of the wire the historic message ending "and now I'm off," the meaning being that they were leaving the office.

He and his comrade had persuaded Mrs. Todd to accompany them to the Flagstaff Tower, where a number of Europeans had already congregated as it was the only possible place of safety. They remained there until sunset, and witnessed the blowing u of the magazine. That night the re fugees fled, and the two signallers eventually got safe to Umballa,







Placentia Notes.

In my last notes I stated the condition of the town as regards the coal famine. A few days later I read an item in the Daily News saying that the M. T. White was laying up at Har-bor Breton for 10 days, awaiting a favourable time to sail for Placentia with a load of coal. Reports reach-ed here after that the vessel was dis-charged there owing to her condition. This caused another big delay. OWENS DECLARED NOT GUILTY. The Court resumed sitting at 2.30. George Butt, one of the men who surveyed the schooner at the instance of the master, deposed to surveying the schooner, and of the report of the survey being drawn up by Owens, the accused. Upon its being read over by Owens, he objected to signing it. because it stated that the bottom of

the vessel was broken. This was stricken out by Owens, and the report was then signed by Butt: Samuel Butt was the next witness called; his evidence was a corroboration of that of the previous witness.


closed. The prisoner was then put in the box by his counsel, Mr. Gibbs, and deposed that he was 65 years old, lived for a number of years at Bay of Islands. When he was asked to go in the vessel he objected to the rate of wages, and wanted \$30.00 a month, which was agreed to. He then described the voyage of the vessel to the Labrador, and her arrival at Pigeon Island. When she got to Pigeon Island there was considerable water in her hold, which was pumped out. Butt, the Captain, remarked at the Butt, the Captain, remarked time that if this was the way she was going to act he would fi. her. He then detailed the movements of the vessel until she anchored at Forteau where trading began. While at Forteau, which, he said, was an unsafe harbour, he was left on board three nights by himself. In order to save the vessel at Forteau on a couple of occasions, while there, he had to drop a second anchor, as it blew very hard. He was not aware of any arrangement between Butt and Buckle to lose the vessel until they had been in Forteau some time. The first he knew of it was when Buckle told in the forecastle that he and the Captain had decided to lose her. Nothing was said to Buckle. He denied in the most rositive manner having assisted in the casting away of the vessel. So far as he knew, when they left Forteau, the intention was to anchor under Green Island for the night, but on coming to Isle au Bois the Captain asked him to take the wheel, which he did, and while at the wheel he was ordered to bring her up in the wind. When this was done, he heard the anchors let go. It was then dark. When she brought up on her anchors, the Captain and Buckle came aft and tried to unship the rudder. The witness refused when called on to assist. The Captain, finding that he could not unship the rudder, prized the head off with the windlass bar. He did not assist or help in any way. When this was done, they all went forward, and the Captain and Buckle undid the chains. The Captain made a line fast to one chain, unshackled the other chain from the windlass, threw the shackle overboard, and then paid it cut. Austin Butt had the dory ready for them to get into. They got into the dory, and Buckle cut the rope which held the chain, and then they lowed clear of the vessel, which went ashore on the rocks. There was a good sea on at the time. He swore that he had no interest in the loss of the vessel, or the cargo. He was not offered anything, nor had he received anything, in fact there was wages still due him. The prisoner gave his evidence in a clear and intelligent


Yesterday was very disagreeable, and as the walking was bad few peoole were about. Shop-keepers tell us that trade is dull for this season.


