## Waiting For the Chance.

The last year of the Morris administration has dawned, and so far as human probability can gauge, the advent of another year will see the People's Party a defeated party.

It is already a discredited party and the electors are patiently awaiting to administer the happy despatch in order that they may come once more into possession of their own.

For the past three and a half years the sins of commission and omission of the Government have been accumulating until they are now so heavy that they are dragging down the Government to political perdition.

Never in the history of any government in Newfoundland has there been such a scramble for Crown Lands by brothers, relatives, business and professional partners of members of the Government. Never before have we seen a Minister of Justice interesting himself in the formation of a company to obtain grants of timber lands from the Government of which he is a member.

Never before have we seen such a company obtaining the right to cut timber over such an enormous area on the Labrador or elsewhere within our jurisdiction as 14,000 square miles.

Never before have we known a Minister of Justice to write in his private capacity (or even in any capacity) a letter suggesting that a license might obtain a good deal of lumber from adjoining Crown Lands.

Never before have we known a man in Mr. Morison's position to plead ignorance of a law with which he had as much to do as Mr. Morison had.

Never before have we known a Prime Minister to back up such a plea in order to save the face of a Minister or for any other purpose.

There is no doubt that the Orange Bay letter staggered the community as much as it did the Governor. But we venture to assert that the plea was as bad as the original offense, and that the worst feature of all was the Prime Minister's endorsement of that plea of forgetfulness.

But the Prime Minister himself

suffers from strange lapses of memory.

How otherwise can be explained the statement he made during the last session of the Legislature, when he asserted that he never at any time had held any interest in any timber property in Newfoundland.

On several occasions we drew his attention to this statement of his, and asked him how he could tolerate in his Ministry a man who had made a specialty of becoming interested in an extraordinary degree in timber deals.

Somewhat later we drew the Prime Minister's attention to a document on file in the Registry of Companies which shows himself (Sir E. P. Morison) holding a large interest in a lumber company.

We have directed the attention of the Prime Minister to this document on several occasions, and have asked him to reconcile it with his statement in the House. He has never done so, so far as we know. Evidently he has forgotten.

What conclusion does the Prime Minister wish to be drawn from his silence?

He has not had the audacity to plead forgetfulness. He has not told us he forgot the holding of a \$40,000 interest in a lumber company which he avowed he had never held any interest in lumber property in this country.

Of course he might have put forward a plea of forgetfulness, and have obtained from the Attorney General an opinion that any other plea would have been perfectly ridiculous. But he has not done this. He has preferred silence, and perhaps it is the wisest course he could pursue.

For these political sins, and for many others, some of which we have commented on and others which we shall deal with at a future time, and which may shock the country as much as the Orange Bay letter, we have no hesitation in stating that the days of the Government are numbered and that electors are but biding their time.

## Narrow Escape.

A few days ago on Bell Island about 30 men had a very narrow escape from being killed as they came up in four cars out of the slopes of the N. S. Co.'s mine. The man "on deck," as it is technically called, or who had charge of the raising apparatus on the surface was intoxicated and brought the cars up at such a high rate of speed that they jumped the track. The men on them saw that something was wrong and jumped clear in time to avoid being killed. Several of them were considerably bruised, one had his legs cut and another had his back hurt and was placed in hospital. Two bosses were on the cars and so incensed were they that on getting to the surface that they assaulted the man who thus jeopardized their lives. He was instantly dismissed by the management.

## Sudden Death.

Mr. William MacDonald, the tinsmith, who was so well known and esteemed in this city, died very suddenly at his residence, British Square, last night. Mr. MacDonald who had worked at Diamond's establishment on Water Street for years, came home from work in apparently good health and spirits and retired at his usual hour. Later his family were shocked to find him dead in his bed. Heart disease was the cause of his demise. To his sorrowing wife and family the Telegram extends its sympathy.

## The Dog Act.

Dear Sir.—I beg to draw the attention of the authorities of the law in the city of St. John's to an open violation of an Act passed prohibiting the keeping of dogs in such districts, as proclamations have been issued prohibiting their being kept. Magistrate O'Toole had a dog in his possession. He gave it to a gentleman here at the beginning of the sporting season; but after a few fruitless attempts in pursuit of game the sagacity of the animal was proven worthless, and the animal was consequently and subsequently handed back to its owner, Mr. O'Toole. Now the animal is at large terrorizing the sheep which are not accustomed to such an unwelcome visitor. It roams from Conception Harbour to Harbour Main without a caretaker. What is Constable Devlin about? Why doesn't he do his duty in this matter and summon the law breaker? Constable Quinlan would not tolerate such a violation of Chapter 141, Consolidated Statutes. I wonder what will Inspector General Sullivan say when he learns of the policeman at Harbour Main suffering dogs to roam about without taking steps to enforce the law. 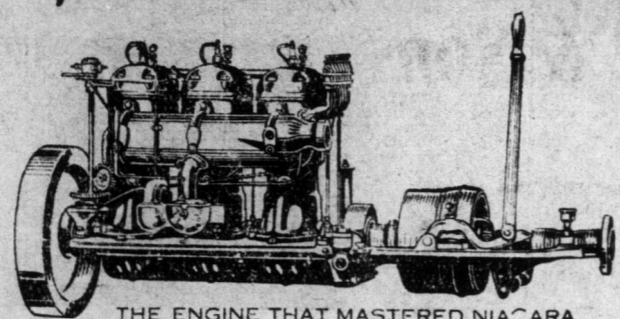

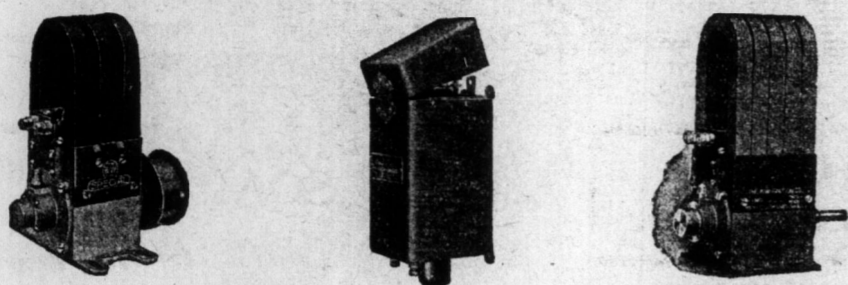

**At the City Hall.**

The weekly session of the Municipal Council was held yesterday afternoon.

The Secretary reported that he had interviewed those who objected to Mr. J. C. Oke making alterations to his workshop on Prescott Street, but nothing definite was arrived at. Mr. Oke was given permission to build on motion of Councillors Mullaly and Coaker providing that there is proper protection against fire.

Sir E. P. Morris replied to a communication repairs to South Side Road from lower Dundee premises to Gunners Cove. He stated that after a consultation with his colleagues Messrs. Bennett and Kennedy \$200 would be voted for repairs.

J. Butler, Notre Dame Street, complained of stable drainage running into his house. Referred to Engineer and Health Inspector.

Mr. J. M. Power made claim for amount due him a number of years by the Council. Will be looked into by Reid Company acquainted with the Council that they had installed the arc lights on Streets in the City requested some time ago.

A debate took place over the Reid Company laying a water connection to the main on Water Street to supply their garage. The Board denounced this course of action as no authority had been given the Company to do so. Water connection can only be allowed at \$10.00 per automobile or \$50.00 per year for the five cars that are to be kept in the garage.

The trees for Garrison Park have arrived and will soon be planted.

J. Cole objected to permitting Mr. Hayes, his land owner, to build porches at rear of his dwelling on Gower Street. Referred to Engineer.

D. Gorman wrote that water and sewer pipes had been laid on Freshwater Road. Referred to Engineer.

Mr. T. Kent asked permission to make repairs to house, Holytown. It was referred to the Engineer, as was also a request from Harvey & Company to convert a brick store into a stable.

R. E. Job asked for connection to water main to his residence on Long Pond Road, which is outside the city limits. Granted on condition that applicant pay tax of \$50.00 per year for house and stable.

As regards Mr. Coffin's request to install motor in an annex to his premises on New Gower Street, the Engineer reported on the matter. The place must be safeguarded against noise which might annoy residents in adjoining households.

The Engineer reported 150 feet of trenching opened on the South Side for new water main.

Secretary Slattery reported that some companies were working in the city that might be subject to taxation. The Secretary and Solicitor will enquire.

Waterman John Flynn asked for long rubbers and rubber coat. Such applications were considered to be a nuisance and could not be entertained. Councillor Ryan drew attention to the filthy condition of Dicks' Square. It will be looked after.

With the passing of pay rolls and bills the meeting adjourned.

VIENNA, Nov. 8. The Reichspost correspondent says that the Turkish troops have been repulsed from the principal points on the Thessalonika line, and that the fall of that town is expected immediately. ## The Tangle in the East.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
PARIS, To-Day.  
The threatened rupture between Austria-Hungary and Servia on the question of a Servian access to the Adriatic Sea and numerous other political quibbles caused by the collapse of Turkey, are causing grave concern in diplomatic circles in Paris when intimate accord is more desirable than ever before. It is pointed out that two groups of European nations, known as the Triple Alliance and the Triple Entente, which altogether composed the Concert of Europe, find themselves badly out of tune and arrayed in hostile camps. With Russia leading, France and England are inclined to support the Servian claims, on which Austria-Hungary, encouraged by Germany and Italy, have apparently placed a direct veto. Among other bustling international difficulties are the compensation Romania demands as a set-off for the agrandisement of Bulgaria in its future standing of the Dardanelles, Constantinople, Saloniki, Turkey in Asia, and Aegean Islands. Along with these comes the news of the proclamation of a Russian protectorate over Chinese territory equal in extent to one-third of the whole of Europe.

## Shannahan, Delaney and Tucker

Have a Chat on the Recent Election.  
Up to Tucker's last night all the "boys" were gathered, discussing the result of the Presidential Election. Tucker, read out the news, while Delaney, The Cute Man, and Mrs. Tucker held their breath in silent wonder.  
"Every dog has his day," said Delaney and every politician meets his Waterloo when the time arrives. 'Tis a strange thing, says Tucker, but somehow or other sentiment gets in the air, and no matter how strenuous a leader was, he must take a back seat when the tide turns against him, and 'tis just as well to try and stem the falls of Niagara, as expect to win out once the change sets in.
