Quebec Members are Found Guilty

They Received Money From Detectives in Connection With the Fair Bill.

Quebec, Feb. 12.—Both the Legislative Council and Assembly investigation committees made public their reports to-day, and, as was expected, Messrs. Bejard, Bergevin and Mousseau are found guilty by their colleagues. The reports contain no recommendations to the House, and there was little discussion upon their findings, but it is possible that their consideration may be taken up next Tuesday.

The Assembly committee finds the evidence proved that Mr. Mousseau received from the American detectives, Biddinger and Mahoney, the sum of \$4,150 in connection with Bill No. 158 to incorporate the Montreal Fair Association of Canada.

Mr. A. Labelle, the advocate in charge of the Bill, received from the American detectives in connection with this Bill an amount of \$1,557.57, but he declares that he neither offered nor promised nor paid anything to any member of the Legislative Assembly. The evidence shows, however, that Mr. Labelle was aware that Mr. Mousseau received one or more sums of money in connection with the Bill with a view to bribery.

The committee says the accusations made against Messrs. Bergevin and Bejard have been justified by the evidence. It has been established that after having in the first place refused, they ended by taking money in connection with Bill No. 158.

FIRE ALARMS.

Yesterday afternoon an alarm of fire summoned the Central and Eastern Companies to the residence of Mr. George Morris, Field Street, where a slight blaze was in progress. By the aid of the chemical fire was promptly extinguished, but not before a great deal of damage was done to the stock in the shop on the ground floor.
At 11 p.m. a slight fire, caused by a hall stove, occurred in the dwelling on Long's Hill, occupied by D. Thistle. The fire was successfully put out with a few minutes and very little damage was done.

BRILLIANT LECTURE NAPOLEON BONAPARTE.

TO KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS.

The Knights of Columbus and their lady friends were entertained with a brilliant discourse on "Napoleon" by Rev. W. P. Kitchen, Ph.D., at Columbus Hall last night. The reverend lecturer was introduced by Mr. C. P. O'agan, who in doing so said that only in accordance with custom was it necessary to induce one so well known for his oratorical abilities as Rev. Dr. Kitchen. The rev. gentleman began with the birth of this great commander and genius in Corsica, and for over an hour reviewed the different phases of his life up to the close of his earthly career at St. Helena. After dealing with Napoleon's military education, he went on to show the important part he played in the French revolution. Though on the threshold of his military career, he displayed the abilities of a consummate general. His tactics were at all times remarkable for precision of movement and concentration of forces. Following Napoleon's successful career, the rev. lecturer reviewed the events that led to his appointment as First Consul, and later his acceptance of the sceptre and coronation as Emperor of the French. In the battle of Austerlitz the superior genius and masterly tactics of Napoleon were allied into play, and resulted in giving him one of the most brilliant victories recorded in the annals of war. The failure of the Russian expedition brought shadows on the life of the great general, and though he displayed his intrepidity in a marked degree, he was finally compelled to abdicate his throne. The restoration of the Bourbon dynasty saw the fallen emperor at Elba, whence he escaped, and reorganizing his army, met the English at Waterloo, where the closing scene of his military career was enacted. His subsequent imprisonment at St. Helena and his death, attended by the consoling comforts of religion, were vividly described by the lecturer. The lecture was a scholarly and entertaining one and was profusely illustrated with lantern slides. At the close Mr. C. J. Cahill proposed a vote of thanks to the rev. lecturer, and in doing so paid a glowing tribute to Rev. Dr. Kitchen for his eloquent and instructive discourse. The vote was unanimously accorded and the rendition of the National Anthem brought the entertainment to a close.



Ornamental Ears.

They say a man's features express his character and personality. But there are a great many people in this world who would have enormous mouths and almost invisible ears if it were literally true.

In case you do not readily recognize the type I mean, let me introduce you to one of them.

I met her last summer. She was a charming, vivacious woman, delightful to meet and most interesting to talk with. It seemed to me at first that I had never met a woman with a better mind.

But before I had known her a day I realized that I had overestimated her. For she had the giving out intelligence but not the receiving intelligence.

Did you ever have your telephone set out of order so that while you could speak into it and make yourself heard perfectly, you couldn't hear a thing the party at the other end of the line was saying? Well, this woman's personality was like that. She could talk but she couldn't listen.

When she was talking she was all animation and vivacity, but when other people talked she became inert and disinterested.

If you referred to what others had said on previous occasions she usually looked blank. Either she had not listened at all, or had somehow failed to take it in.

She was very well read and was always quick to adduce a pertinent quotation or an interesting anecdote. But when someone capped hers with another as good, she never seemed interested, but slipped quickly away into some other subject.

Now this woman was of course an exaggerated and unusual type of intelligence which is as slow to receive as it is quick to give. But I think the milder examples of the type are to be found everywhere. Most of them do not display this trait as openly as she did; they do not permit themselves to appear disinterested when others are talking; indeed they always keep a bright surface of alertness and interest. But it is only a surface, as you soon find out if you come to know them.

I remember a woman of this type at a boarding house at which I once took my meals. To the casual observer she was a most sympathetic listener, and yet the following was the sort of thing that was continually happening. Another boarder had lost her umbrella. She was told about her loss at the table at least twice, and the first woman had all the appearance of listening to her. And yet a day or two later when it rained and the lady of the lost umbrella came downstairs bemoaning her lack of protection, and addressed some remark about it directly to this woman, she said brightly, "What have you lost your umbrella, isn't that too bad?"

Ears in themselves are not particularly beautiful things. If I supposed they were given us to use rather than to wear as ornaments. And to us to listen to other people's voices as well as to our own.

OTTAWA, To-day.
The Dominion Trades Commission will meet in Canada next year. The commission is at present in South Africa. It will, during the present year make a tour of Newfoundland and Canada, beginning in Newfoundland toward the latter end of July and go right across Canada to the Coast spending three or four months in all.

LONDON, To-day.
The British War Office System of confidential reports by which officers of the army may be condemned to professional ruin without being heard in their own defence was seriously censured by a Judge in the King's Bench Court, just awarded Major Adam Normey, Royal Irish Fusiliers the sum of \$10,000 damages against Sir Edward Ward, as his capacity as permanent Secretary of War Office.

LONDON, To-day.
The first bye-election necessitated by recent change in the cabinet resulted in the defeat yesterday of C. F. G. Masterman, Southwest division of Bethnal Green, by 24 votes. The Unionist candidate, Major Wilson, being elected. Masterman was appointed Chancellor of the Duchy Lancaster to succeed C. F. Hobhouse, who became Postmaster General. Wilson's success is a triumph for the fact it was a triangular fight in which the Socialist candidate secured 316 votes, most which they claim would have otherwise been given their candidate, though the result must damage the Government, it cannot be taken as a direct verdict of the Irish question. Since Home Rule evoked little genuine interest during the brief campaign.

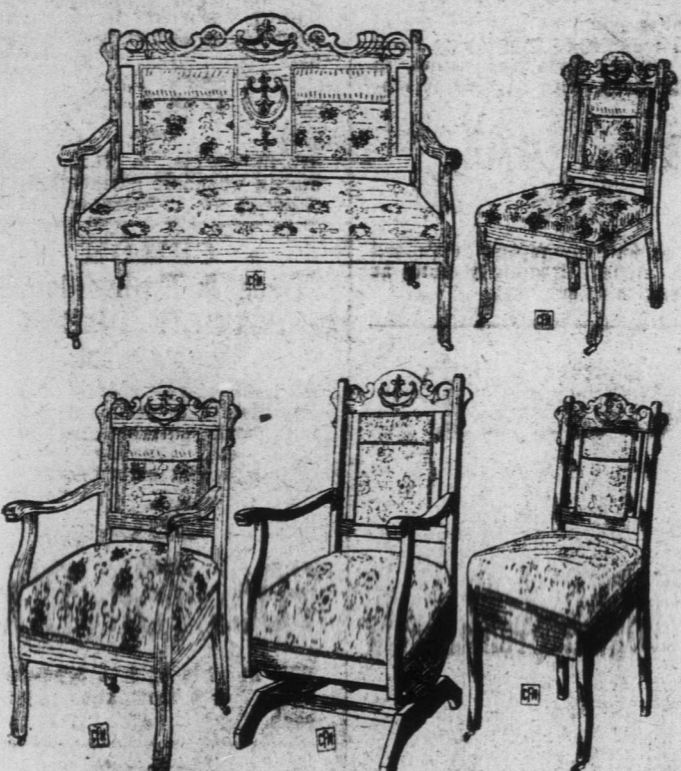
Train Notes.

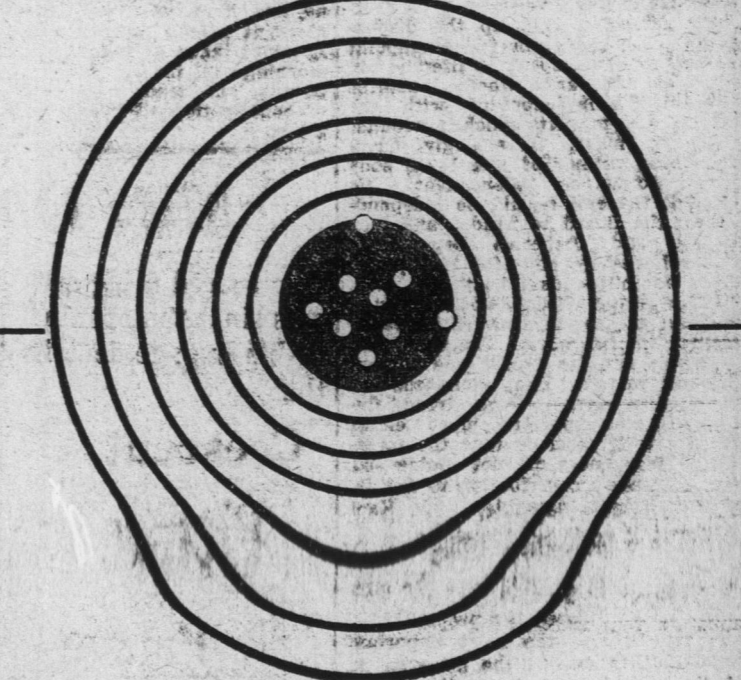

THE FISHERY RESOLUTIONS.

Last night the House of Assembly was taken up on a useful debate on the Fishery Resolutions introduced by the Prime Minister. The introducer had already set forth his views and contented himself by expressing the hope that party feeling might be kept out of the discussion.

Mr. Hickman took up the discussion and spoke from the standpoint of one who had spent a lifetime in handling fish and whose business brought him into contact with the needs of the markets which Newfoundland fish enters. He strongly advocated the calling of a body which would be independent. He thought the bill should be independent of the Board of Trade, and the Marine and Fisheries Department, and believed we had in the police force an independent body of men, fearless in the discharge of their duty, who as ex-officers could be easily trained for the work. The standardization of fish for export was a more difficult matter. The standards in the foreign markets were already fixed and fish exporters must either comply with them or take the financial consequences of not doing so. Mr. Hickman's contribution to the debate was most valuable. Mr. Kent spoke in a most encouraging way of the attempt to grapple with the situation and considered the proposals before the House the most important which could occupy the attention of the members. He thought the Marine and Fisheries Department was not living up to what should be required of it in a country whose staple industry was fish. It should be a Bureau for the collection and dissemination of information connected with the fisheries. Mr. Downey and Mr. Moulton and Mr. Devereaux spoke with an extensive practical acquaintance with the problems before the House and contributed valuable suggestions to the debate.

The resolutions passed and a committee was appointed to sit with a committee of the Legislative Council yet to be appointed. The committee consists of the Prime Minister, the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, the Minister of Finance and Customs, Mr. Kent, Mr. Hickman and the Speaker. It is a matter of regret that one representative of more of the P. F. U. did not see their way, owing to the course of events in the House, to serve on the committee. It is also regrettable that the head of the Fisheries Department should have been held up in Burin and away from the House when such important topics were under discussion.

THE CITY'S HEALTH.—Only two cases of infectious disease have been reported to the Health Authorities during the week. Both are suffering from diptheria and are being treated at home.

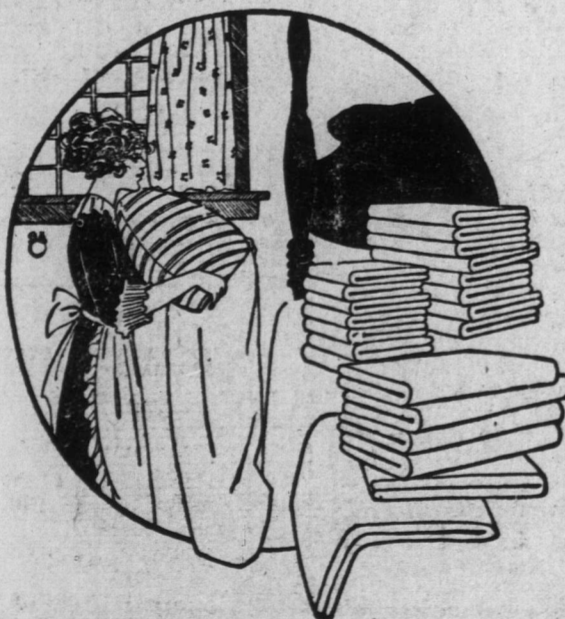

Another Letter From Shimri.

Editor Evening Telegram.
 Sir,—I have brought down the wrath of the High Church Party upon me because I dared to use the term Protestant in connection with the Church of England, and a correspondent in your Tuesday's paper, signing himself "Catholicus Anglicanus," attacks me with much venom and very little of that charity which might be expected from him.
 I am amused at the evident hatred aroused in "C. A." by my use of the term "Protestant," a term which has been applied to the members of the Church of England in Newfoundland for the past 250 years, and accepted by them without demur, a term which is in common parlance applied to all Christians who do not belong to the Roman Catholic Church or to one or other of the Ancient Churches of the East.
 If the term Protestant does not apply to the Church of England, what is meant in the Bill of Rights by the "Protestant Religion"? Did these words exclude the Church of England, as well as the Roman Church, and did it only refer to those "heterodox bodies" spoken of so uncharitably by "C. A." After all what were the reformers of the Church of England? What were Cranmer, Goodricke, Randles, Day, Skip, Taitby, Ridley, May, Taylor, Heynes, Rodman, Cox and Robertson, but Protestants, men who protested against "old errors," "innovations against apostolic traditions," &c., &c.
 I am quite aware that the term "Protestant" has never been applied officially to the Church of England, or to any other, save in the wide sense of embodying for many the conception of liberty, of the right of private judgment, of toleration for every progressive idea in religion as opposed to the Roman Catholic principles of authority and tradition. One Church, however, does style itself the "Protestant Episcopal Church," viz., that part of the Anglican Communion organized in the United States after the War of Independence, by the scattered parishes of the Church of England which survived the war.
 In the Church of England of late years the High Church party has repudiated the name Protestant, using it sometimes in a derogatory sense as applied to their fellow Churchmen, who still uphold in their integrity the principles of the Reformation.
 But what sole right have members of the Church of England to the term "Catholic Churchman"? I will be told that the Prayer Book is the authority, that the Creeds of the Church speak of the Holy Catholic Church, and that there can be only one Catholic or Universal, (as the word means) Church, and that is the Church of England. My answer is that the Catholic Church mentioned in the Creeds does not mean any particular body of Christians. Thomas Sæcker, D. C. L., Archbishop of Canterbury, in his lectures on the Church Catechism says: "The word 'Catholic,' applied to the Church in our Creed, is no where used in Scripture, but frequently by the early Christian writers; and it means 'universal,' extending to all mankind," and again "The Church of Rome," both in faith and love, hath presumed to call itself the whole Catholic Church, the Universal Church; what it no more is, than one diseased limb, though perhaps the larger for being diseased, is the whole body of man."
 "The Church of England pretends not indeed absurdly, to be the whole Catholic Church; but is undoubtedly a sound and excellent member of it." Other authorities can be quoted, such as Dodwell's "Athenasian Creed, vindicated and explained," Collins, Comber, Kennis, King, Pearson, Vincent Waterland, Welchman, &c., but the above is sufficient just now to show that the members of the Church of England not only are Catholics but are Protestants also, protesting against those innovations which have taken place since the time of the Apostles.
 "C. A." gives us a dissertation on the Geneva Bible and the reasons why it was supplanted by the English or "Authorized Version." He does so in order to prove that the Church of England was not Protestant. I have not time or space to prove, as I could, that "C. A." is wrong and misrepresents matters. Let him read J. G. Carlton's "The part of Rhemes in the making of the English Bible" (Oxford 1902) and let him note that of the large number of scholarly revisers that were appointed by King James there were as many Puritan Clergy as of the other party, just as in the revision in 1870, when many of those who belong to what "C. A." calls "heterodox bodies," were appointed on the Committee of revision by the Convocation of Canterbury. The fact is that men of the stamp of "Catholicus Anglicanus" do not realize the state of England at the time of the Reformation, and the large amount of help that the English Divines obtained from the Continent. When Archbishop Cranmer, in 1535 proposed to review the Liturgy of 1548, he called in the assistance of Martin Bucer, and Peter Martyr, two foreigners, whom he had invited over from the troubles in Germany, who, not understanding the English tongue, had Latin versions prepared for them; one Alsace, a Scotch Divine, translating it on purpose for the use of Bucer, and Martyr being furnished with the version of Sir John Cheke, who had also formerly translated it into Latin. Thus it can be clearly seen that the revisers of the Bible, known to us as the "Authorized Version," and the Revision of our Prayer

Book was not wholly and solely the work of the Church of England, as "Catholicus Anglicanus" wrongly states.
 The remaining points in "Catholicus Anglicanus'" letter, respecting the Sacraments, and the wilfully erroneous interpretation of Article XXV., I must leave for another letter, as they will require a little more space than you can allow me just now.

Vesuvius.
 Mr. F. Buntingham has been down to the new mouth of Vesuvius—a descent of 1,200 feet into the crater—an expedition undertaken on behalf of the British and Colonial Kinematic Graph Co.
 Describing this romantic adventure in the Times, he says Vesuvius is getting ready for another eruption.
 "Although the danger of a descent into Vesuvius is very considerable the difficulty has been over-emphasized. Hundreds of Alpinists each season take much greater risks without thinking very much about them. It is true there are three almost perpendicular drops, separated by ledges leaning outwards and downwards, but the highest is scarcely more than 30 feet, and with ropes there is little difficulty to anyone with nerve who does not suffer from seasickness. Lower down on the N. Wall, one descends on a long, steeply-angled slope, inclined at an angle of about 40 degrees. This leads to the floor of the crater, 1,500 feet down, which is large and in places quite flat, and is filled with large stones, or boulders which have fallen from the crater's walls above. The inside of the funnel, the 200 feet deep opening in the crater's floor, at the bottom of which the new mouth is very steep.
 "The greatest danger of a descent into Vesuvius is that of avalanches and falling stones. The second danger is from asphyxiation.
 "So long as there is little wind the main column of smoke from the new mouth, being very hot, forms its own chimney and rises intact through the basin of still, cool air inside the crater. The morning we descended this smoke rose in sharply defined contours to a point several hundred feet above the volcano, when it spread out like a gigantic mushroom. This proved a great advantage to us for the mushroom, or umbrella of smoke, reflected the sunlight into the crater, increasing considerably the possibility of getting photographs.
 "At the very bottom of the crater, 1,212 feet down, the spectacle is extraordinary. The whole mouth is encircled with a white substance, and out of this abyss, the depth of which Professor Mercalli estimates at

HALIFAX, Feb. 19.
The Provincial Parliament opened to-day.

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., Feb. 19.
Mrs. Stevenson, widow of the famous novelist, Robert Louis Stevenson, is dead.

LONDON, Feb. 19.
Lord Lansdowne, in the Lords to-day, moved for the appointment of a committee, including a couple of law lords, to enquire if Lord Murray obtained all the Marconi shares he applied for, and who was the actual owner of the large block of shares acquired by the Cabinet Ministers. The Marquis of Crewe offered no objection, and the motion carried without division.

LONDON, Feb. 19.
The Marquis of Salisbury, addressing the Herefordshire Chamber of Commerce, declared that if the landowners were deprived of their existing authority and power, they will spend no more money on land, but will sell out and quit. Extra burdens now being thrown on land were denounced by Lord Salisbury, as intensifying the evils of the old system. The adoption of what reformers call "strictly fair rents" would, he said, increase present rates in some cases four-fold.

NORFOLK, Va., Feb. 19.
Wireless calls have been sweeping over the sea from all radio towers on the middle Atlantic coast, while revenue cutters and numbers of steamers have to-day been searching in vain for the five-masted schooner Kineo, of Bath, Maine. She was reported yesterday as making 12 inches of water in an hour, and in a disabled condition. The schooner with a crew of eleven has been in bad for some time. Last month she had her sails blown away, and put into port for safety. When she was sighted by the steamer, City of Atlanta, yesterday, it did not seem necessary for the liner to take off the crew. The revenue cutter, Onondaga, began the search for the Kineo, then 160 miles north of the West Diamond Shoals. The wife and two-year-old child of Capt. Farrell, the commander of the Kineo are with him aboard.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.
President Wilson has pressed further for repeal of the Exemption Clause of the Panama Canal Act. In a conference with Congressmen to-day, he talked with Senator Kern, the majority leader, who said in the afternoon that the Senate first would dispose of the arbitration and probably take up the tolls question immediately after. He thought that probably the Senate would act on repeal before the House would. Although Kern had voted the exemption, he said to-day the President had told him of various international phases of the question, which were not before the Senate when the Canal Act was passed. He added he was not prepared to announce his position. Representative Underwood, it is understood, while still believing in the tolls exemption clause, will not organize any opposition to the President in the House. Representative Palmer, Chairman of the Democratic caucus, said to-day when he voted against exemption he would work actively for repeal.

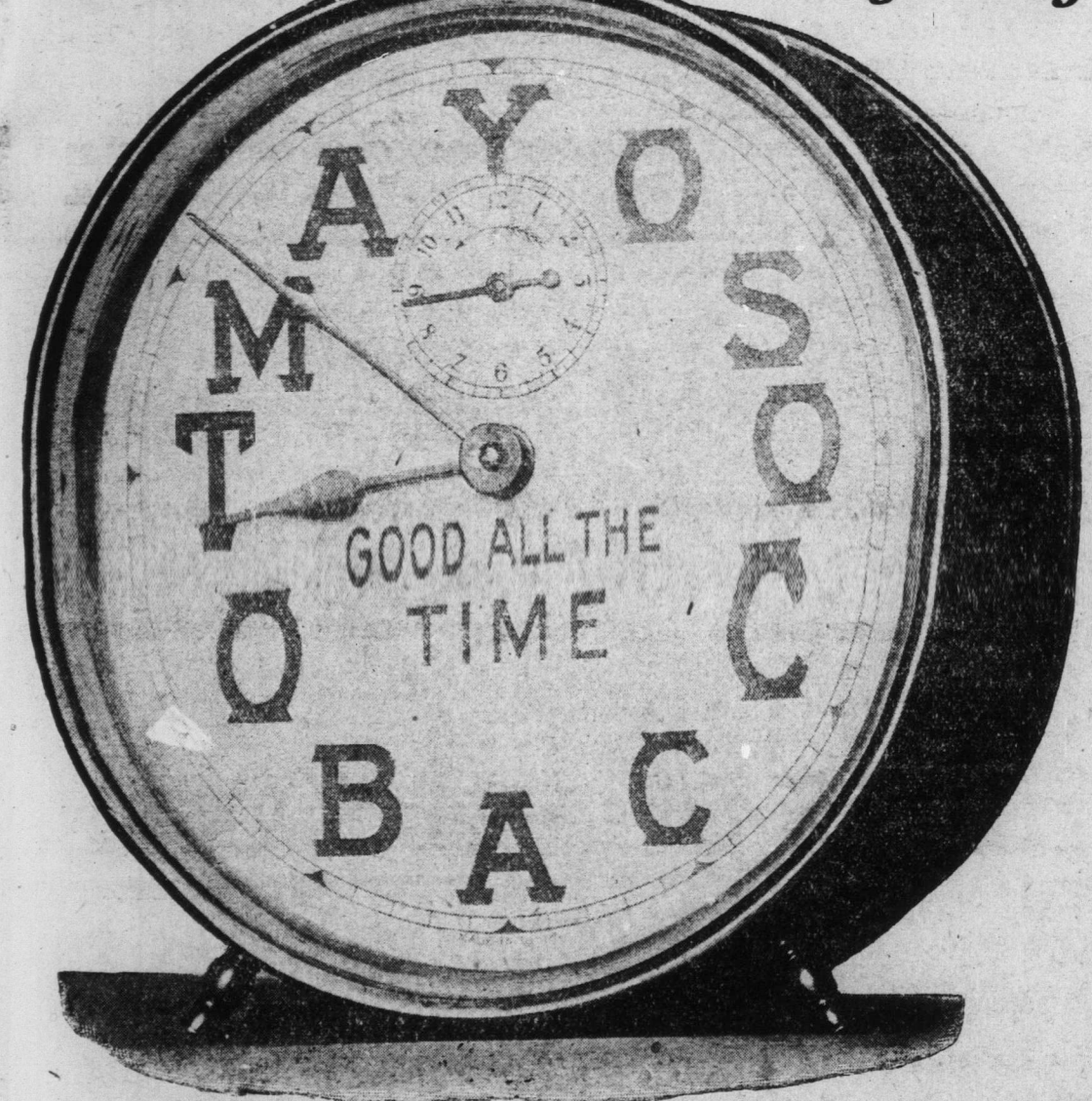


