



Resignation of Secretary Bryan.

the resignation of Mr. Bryan, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, we direct the attention of our readers to an article we re-publish on the third page of this issue from the Boston Transcript, under the caption of 'Demands an Ultimatum." It throws a light on the differences between President Wilson and the Secretary over whose name the former American Note was sent to Germany. The Boston Transcript says: "For the last three weeks the country has rewas not consulting his Secretary of State even indirectly regarding the Government's course in dealing with Germany, and we hope that admir-able example there set will be adhered to in the Government's subsequent steps." Apparently President Wilson and Secretary Bryan do not see eye to eye as to the course which should be pursued by the United States in its rejoinder to the German Reply. That probably accounts for the interview which took place between the President and the Ambassador and the despatch of a German attache from Washington to Berlin, said to be prompted by Bryan. It also accounts for the delay in the despatch of the American Rejoinder, to

which Bryan apparently declined to attach his signature, and it moreover indicates that President Wilson's despatch will be firm and determined, and will not accord with Bryan's wishes that the Note should be of such a character, that would in n circumstances involve the United States in grave complications with Germany. Secretary Bryan's resignation takes effect to-day and we may expect to learn the tenor of the American Note immediately.



WASHINGTON, To-Day. William Jennings Bryan, three times Democratic candidate for the Presiency of the States, and author of nearly thirty peace treaties with the principal nations of the world, resigned yesterday. It was a dramatic se quel of his disagreement with President Wilson over the Government's policy toward Germany. The resignation was accepted by the President and the Cabinet, then approved of the response which had been prepared to the German Reply on the Lusitania Note. Acting-Secretary Robert Lansing will sign the document to-day and it will be cabled to Berlin.
