**Hudson Maxim**

Has Perfected a Device to Make Ships Immune from the Dangers of the Submarine.

New York, May 29.—Hudson Maxim announced yesterday that he had invented and perfected a device which will make ships immune from the dangers of the submarine. He said that torpedoes, even when fired at close range, and striking their targets, would explode harmlessly against the hulls of their intended victims.

"The inventor made the announcement at a luncheon given in Brooklyn. He asserted that the invention soon will be demonstrated by the government, which already had been advised of the details."  
"The invention is practically for every type of vessel," he said. "It can be applied within a few months, at a comparatively cheap price, to the hulls of ships already constructed. The only change necessary in vessels already built will be a slight enlargement in their beams. My device is of solid material and encircles the entire hull of the ship from the bow to the stern. It in no sense or manner resembles either a screen or net."

The Coming Session By the time we go to press the fourth session of the twenty-third assembly of our legislature will have been formally opened by the Governor: whether it will prove the last session remains to be seen. It is in many respects peculiar and for many reasons of more than usual importance. It is regrettable that the date is necessarily such a late one, for it is likely that the already thinned ranks of the House will be further depleted before the session is concluded by the departure of several members to their homes. The House of Assembly is unprecedentedly small, lacking, since last year, the presence of Messrs. John Dwyer and M. J. Kennedy, who have died; Mr. Kent, who has been elevated to the Bench of the Supreme Court; Mr. Chas. Emerson, now Registrar of the Supreme Court; and Mr. Clapp, who has taken up his residence in England. Similarly, the Upper House misses Hon. J. A. Robinson, who has become Postmaster General and will be a sore loss to the Government. Mr. Bowring, who may, however, be present during next month; and Hon. P. Templeman, who is in the United States. It is to be hoped that this diminution in its members will not cause the House to give its attention any the less seriously to the matters that must occupy it. The most important feature of the present session is announced by the Daily News this morning. We are not favoured with an inside view of political workings, but we knew that the Government contemplated offering to share its responsibilities for this once, and possibly until the end of the war, with the Opposition. Whatever the faults of the Government in the past, this was the proper step to take and we are glad to see that it was taken. We are equally disappointed to learn that the members of the Opposition have not seen fit, for what reasons we do not know, to accept the offer. If they have been actuated by party motives, we cannot see how their own prestige in that respect can help suffering. They have been open and unsparring in their criticisms of the Government. It is necessary to share its task and to help initiate and frame such legislation as is necessary, when they have refused the opportunity to correct or prevent them before made? Their action is an indirect hint that they sit in hostility to the Government, that they will use all their energies to demolish, when the crying need of the country is for their help in construction. It is moreover unparalleled and unprecedented. Everywhere else in the Empire Government and Opposition have joined forces in the common

duty, which far transcends all misadventures of party. Everywhere except in Canada, where it has not been permitted to, and where to-day New Zealand's representatives strongly urge it. The members of the Opposition seem to think they have a duty to their party. We would remind them that they have a first and greater duty to the country. Possibly their refusal has reference to the question of an election this year. It is hard to see how the two matters are related, but if it be so, we think we can speak for the country in saying that it is in no mood for elections under present conditions. It is in no mood for the game of party politics while the game of winning the war is on foot. It is, or should be, bending all its energies and spending thousands of dollars towards that end; it will not willingly divert its energies and waste thousands of dollars more in the useless business of putting this man or that man in office. What the country wants is to do its duty to the Empire and its Allies, and for that purpose to be properly represented and directed. The Opposition had the chance to help in this in the most effective, in fact the only practical way. They have thrown it away. If failure comes through faults at the head of affairs, on them will rest the responsibility.

The Opening of the Legislature. At three o'clock this afternoon, His Excellency the Governor formally opened the Legislature. Weather conditions were ideal and helped to make the scene outside the House a brilliant and impressive one. Guards of honor consisting of detachments from the Regimental Naval Reserve and Police lined the approach to the steps. Following are the speeches of the Governor to both Houses. Address in Reply was moved in the Legislative Council by Hon. John Harvey and seconded by Hon. John Anderson; in the House of Assembly by Mr. T. J. Devereaux and seconded by Mr. W. J. Higgins.

THE GOVERNOR'S SPEECH. Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council; Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly. The invitation by His Majesty's Government, late in December, of the Prime Ministers of the Self-Governing Dominions, and India, to attend a Conference at London, for the consideration of questions arising out of the war, having been accepted by my Prime Minister, postponement of the session of the Legislature was considered desirable. Hence the delay in calling you together—a delay which, I am sure, you will regard as amply justified by the circumstances. This epoch-making assemblage in the Capital of the Empire, which will be a sore loss to the Government, was the first occasion when the spokesmen of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, with those of the Mother Country and the Great Empire of India, sat in conclave, in full partnership, marks an onward step towards cementing more closely the relation between the separate states making up our Great Empire. It forms a happy augury of what is to follow when Peace once more returns to the world, and I am satisfied you will join with me in rejoicing at the fact that the Crown, was privileged to participate in this great council. The questions with which the Imperial Conference dealt, will from time to time, form the subject of legislation by the Motherland and the Dominions concerned. The Great War, raging now for nearly three years, continues with unabated fury, and has gradually drawn in other countries, until now the United States, hitherto the greatest neutral power, has felt compelled to draw the sword in defence of its liberties, outraged by the German nation. The advent of the American Republic into the struggle will stimulate the valour and heroic efforts of the allied nations for the bringing of the conflict to a successful conclusion, and will materially assist in hastening the end. It must be a source of intense pride to every Newfoundland in the participation by this country in the struggle, through its gallant sailors and soldiers, has earned for them undying glory and the recognition by their Sovereign, that they are the bravest of the bravest of the British public, of the posses-

sion by our valiant defenders of the qualities of manliness, courage and devotion to duty that are the birthright of the British people from whom they have sprung. The proud place won by the men of both forces, has not been obtained without grievous sacrifices of life, and the inevitable accompaniment of heartbreak to hundreds of homes in this country; but it will be a proud consolation to those who have lost representatives, that they can cherish the heritage of duty well done in the greatest crisis that has ever threatened the civilized world. The War has necessarily caused changes in every aspect of our Colonial existence, and in none more than in the steadily growing cost of the necessities of life. My Ministers have appointed a Commission to inquire into the most favourable situation of this problem in its particular application to our own Colony, with a view to recommending such measures as may be adopted to help in minimizing the burdens due to high prices. Apart from this, however, it has been borne in upon the Government that the situation calls for relief to the Civil Servants by an increase in their salaries, and the necessary measures to give effect thereto will be laid before you in due course. In the same way in due course of Education for a substantial augmentation that service, have been realized by my Ministers, and you will be invited to make an additional grant for that purpose.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly: The Revenue for the last financial year showed a substantial increase over the expenditure, and the resultant surplus was applied towards the Colony's war expenditure. Another large surplus is anticipated for the fiscal year shortly to terminate, and it is proposed to apply this to the same purpose. The Estimates for the several Departments will be laid before you shortly, and will, I am sure, receive your most favourable consideration, notwithstanding that they represent a large increase over those of the current year, they have been framed with due regard to economy and the exigencies of the unparalleled situation which now confronts us. The inequality of the pay provided for the men of the Royal Naval Reserve, as compared with that of the men of the Newfoundland Regiment, has been removed by my Ministers to take measures to remove this anomaly, and your acceptance will be invited of a measure designed to place the men of both services on the same footing.

Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council; Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly: The various industries of the country were conducted with more than the ordinary measure of success during the past year, and thanks, in part, to the improved markets for the commodities which we export, the returns from the various industries have been increased. The value of our total trade has increased from twenty-five million dollars to thirty-five million dollars. The present year has opened auspiciously with a successful Seal Fishery, for the first time since the late war, and has secured unusually high prices. The outlook for the Cod Fishery is an encouraging one. It is eagerly to be hoped that the conditions will prevail throughout the rest of the season which will enable this staple product to be exported at remunerative prices. At the same time, whilst desiring prosperity, it is important to note that those responsible for the conduct of the fishery in the Mother Country, the Great Dominions and the nations with whom we are proud to be allied, have emphasized the need of prudence and economy, and I feel sure that you in your deliberations, and that the people in their personal pursuits, can make no mistake in practising these same virtues, and in that spirit, commend your efforts and theirs to Divine Providence.

For to fight for the country he cherished so dear; The eyes of his friends they are moistened with tears. Bonavista is mourning a true native son. But it pleased the Almighty to call him away. Washington, D.C., May 22.—The Pershing expedition, consisting of a Division of American Regulars and a regiment of Marines, will be followed almost immediately by a force slightly smaller than a division, which will bring Pershing's command on the western front almost to two divisions. THE TAXICAB

The taxicab is a four-wheeled device which carries passengers to the Union station and before leaving collects the price of a new set of tires. It is a distant relative of the hansom cab, but has improved considerably upon the bookkeeping methods of the latter.

Taxicabs are usually composed of automobiles which have been in the livery business for twelve years, but have been rebuilt with a fresh coat of paint and a new steering wheel. They contain two cubby holes, one of ample size for a lean passenger and his overcoat and another for the driver. These apartments are separated by a plate-glass partition, so that the driver may keep one eye on the passenger and detect any attempt to escape before the mileage has been counted. Some taxicabs are also supplied with a speaking tube and a cigar lighter, which should be used with care, as both are attached to the meter.

The cost price of a trip in a taxicab is determined by the meter, which measures each mile travelled and converts it into bills of the largest known denomination. The ease

Taxicabs are always driven by reckless persons who learned the trade by looping the loop in a bi-plane with the blind staggerers. These drivers become so expert that they can share the fetlocks of a furniture van at thirty miles an hour and roll a cigarette with the other hand. They are a valuable adjunct for the man who has four minutes in which to make the 10:45 train, buy a sleeper ticket and walk the full length of the yards in search of his car, and when it comes to accidents, their batting average is fully .430.

### Your Boys and Girls.

Nursing bottles should be so constructed that the inner surface should contain no corners to collect milk. After each feeding the bottle should be scrubbed with a bottle brush with soapy water and filled with water containing boracic until time to boil them before refilling with the next day's supply. They should all be scrubbed each morning before putting in a kettle and covered with cold water, and allowed to boil.

This often relieves the difficult breathing. Another method of giving relief is to wrap absorbent cotton saturated with melted white orange-wood stick for this purpose only.

Washington, May 22.—Men seeking exemption from service in America's new selective service army because of their support of more than one dependent must be sure that the person they have in mind is "solely" dependent on them. Otherwise they must not "hide behind petticoats or children." This warning was given by Provost Marshal Crowder in explaining questions arising out of June 5th registration regulations. The mere fact that one claims exemption will not necessarily exempt him.

## War News.

### Messages Received Previous to 9 A. M.

**WAR SUMMARY.**  
NEW YORK, May 29. On the southern line near the head of the Gulf of Trieste in the Austro-Italian theatre, the Italians for the moment have ceased their titanic effort to press forward toward Trieste, but heavy fighting again is in progress in the north around Gorizia, Plava and Vodice. East of Gorizia and on Vodice the Austrians attempted to carry an offensive. The Italians, but the artillery fire of King Victor Emmanuel's men stopped their assaults and in the last named sector the Italians delivered an attack and despite stubborn resistance, made progress on the south-eastern slope of Hill 52. Likewise in the Plava region the Austrians were driven back and lost 100 men made prisoners. Around San Giovanni and Duina, at the lower end of the line, the Austrians heavily bombarded the Italians in their new positions and ineffectually tried to oust them. Both sides are claiming the capture of large numbers of prisoners since the new battle from Tolmino to the sea began, the Italians asserting that they have taken 23,681 men, and the Austrians 14,500. Tuesday passed with relative calm on both the British and French fronts in France. Following the reports of increased Russian artillery activity against the Austrians in the western theatre, comes the statement that there has been a re-encouragement of activity by the Russo-Romanian forces against the Teutonic Allies in Rumania, and that early attacks by them are expected. The visits to Jassy, the new capital of Rumania, of M. Thomas, French Minister of Munitions, and M. Kerenky, Russian Minister of War possibly may be connected with the revival of activity of the Russo-Romanian troops. Again another act of gross inhumanity has been perpetrated by the Teutonic Allied submarines. This was the sinking in the Mediterranean of the British hospital ship Dover Castle. Although the vessel was carrying sick and wounded, two torpedoed were sent into her vitals, the first without warning. Fortunately all aboard, except six men of the crew, were saved. A submarine also accounted for the British armed merchant cruiser Hilary, which was sunk

in the North Sea with the loss of four men killed by an explosion.

**DOVER CASTLE SUNK.**  
LONDON, May 29. The British hospital ship Dover Castle has been torpedoed, it is announced officially. The British armed merchant cruiser Hilary also has been torpedoed and sunk, and a British destroyer has been sunk after collision. The Dover Castle, 5,271 tons gross, 476 feet long, owned by the Union Castle Mail Steamship Co., of London, was built in 1904. The Hilary was a Booth liner of 6,329 tons gross, 420 feet long, built in 1908.

**BRAZIL'S DECISION.**  
WASHINGTON, May 29. Brazil's decision to revoke her decree of neutrality is construed here as little less than a declaration of a state of war with Germany. Brazil's action is believed to indicate a general breakdown of the German propaganda all over the Southern Continent.

**SATISFIED WITH CONDITIONS IN RUSSIA.**  
TOKIO, May 29. "I am immensely satisfied with conditions in Russia including Siberia," said Prof. Bakmetieff, the new Russian Ambassador to the United States on arriving here to-day. "I think the new regime is carrying on the work of organization successfully and will soon be able to launch an offensive against the enemy." He is at the head of a special commission of forty on its way to the States. During the trip from Petrograd, Prof. Bakmetieff said he was impressed by the desire of the people to co-operate with the Government and to continue the war to victory, which was essential to the salvation of Russia. We found local committees at work everywhere. At Irkutsk and Vladivostok governors have been elected, and they are controlling the situation ably. Among the members of the commission which will sail for the States on the steamer Emperor of Japan, on Friday, are General Ropp, who will be attached to the American army, M. Lomolhoff, a railroad expert, M. Nortizky, representing the Finance Minister, M. Borodin, representing the Minister of Agriculture, and M. Oranovsky, artillery expert.

**HELD CONFERENCES.**  
LONDON, May 29. It is officially announced to-day that Premier Ribot of France, J. Cambon General Secretary for the French Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Paul Cambon French Ambassador to Great Britain, Prof. Paul Hainlev French Minister of War, General Foch and

their military and diplomatic advisers, yesterday held a series of conferences with the British war cabinet on important matters affecting the two countries. It is announced a complete agreement was reached on all points and the French representatives returned to France yesterday afternoon.

**HENDERSON TO VISIT RUSSIA.**  
LONDON, May 29. It is officially announced that Arthur Henderson, member of the British Cabinet without portfolio and of the War Council, has undertaken an important Government mission to Russia and that George Nicol Barnes, Minister of Pensions, has been appointed a member of the war cabinet without portfolio during Henderson's absence. Mr. Barnes since August, 1914, has been a strong advocate of a vigorous prosecution of the war, and has used his great influence with the workmen steadily in that direction. He lost a son in the war. Although, according to the official statement, he enters the Council temporarily, it is understood it will be necessary to appoint a new Pension Minister, which may involve further Ministerial changes. Another event considered almost certain to be announced very shortly is the resignation of Lord Devonport. The position of Food Controller involves daily increasing pressure of work and anxiety. Lord Devonport's health is far from satisfactory, and he is very desirous of being relieved of the strain of office.

**OPERATIONS IN EAST AFRICA.**  
LONDON, May 29. An official communication issued to-night concerning operations in East Africa, says: The exceptionally wet season having ended, the improved weather conditions brought a renewal of military activity. The early days of May witnessed a general southward movement of the German forces in the Rufiji Valley, and in the coastal area of Some to Matusu Valley, while farther south raiders invaded Portuguese territory and approached the border of Nvassal, burning native villages, terrorizing the inhabitants and robbing the food in Portuguese depots. There were many partial encounters and occasional collisions between larger forces. The German columns which evacuated Mahenge district in February, moved rapidly in two main parties, one to the Portuguese border, and the other commanded by Major Wintgens, breaking northward. On May 6th the latter was pursued by British Rhodesian and other troops, and Wintgens was captured on the 22nd in the vicinity of Lukalanka, 61 miles S.W.

of Taboraly. A Belgian column is co-operating with the British, having its base on the central railway.

**DRUNKENNESS IN RUSSIA.**  
PETROGRAD, May 29. The increase in the illicit sale of vodka and the general wave of intoxication which threatens to spread throughout the country provoking disorders and endangering the internal peace of the country, is the subject of a stirring appeal to the citizens issued by the Executive Committee of the Council of Workmen's and Soldiers' Delegates.

**DISTINGUISHED VISITORS.**  
TORONTO, May 29. Rt. Hon. W. F. Massey, Premier of New Zealand, and Rt. Hon. Sir Joseph Ward, Minister of Finance and ex-Premier of the Liberal Party, the chief ministers of the war time national government of New Zealand, arrived in Toronto this morning on their way home from the Imperial Conference. They were accompanied by Mrs. Massey and Lady Ward. They were received at the Parliament buildings by Premier Hearst and his Cabinet. After a formal civic welcome at the City Hall the party were entertained at a civic luncheon at the King Edward Hotel, many prominent citizens being present. Premier Massey, in reply to speeches of welcome, prophesied closer trade relations between the British peoples of the southern zones and those of the north and congratulated Canada upon the conduct of her share in the war, saying, there is no brighter page in British history than the one recently added recording the answer of the British Dominions to the call of Empire. When the State is fighting for its life, he said, it is essential to have the services of its whole people, and I don't believe it can be better provided than by universal compulsory military service. Sir Joseph Ward advocated an Imperial Preference Trade Treaty and a similar treaty with friendly neutrals to combat German subventions by government bonuses in fighting for trade after the war, and advised Canada to adopt a national form of government during the war composed of men of all political parties. This has been done in Great Britain, New Zealand, Australia and South Africa.

**GERMANY TRIES TO CREATE FRICTION.**  
WASHINGTON, May 29. Secretary of State Lansing, testifying to-day before the House Commerce Committee in support of the Trading with the Enemy Bill, said the Government had evidence that Germany, while the United States

is still neutral, had sent an agent here who organized a company and advanced money to put grain aboard a ship in order to raise an issue with Britain and France over seizure upon her leaving port. There are many cases, he said, doubtless inspired by Germany, while we were neutrals, of organizations effected in this country for the sole purpose of creating friction with Britain and France.

**FREEDOM OF FOREIGN COMMERCE.**  
RIO JANEIRO, May 29. The seizure of German ships and the adoption of naval measures against Germany in collaboration with the Entente Allies, is recommended by the Diplomatic Commission of the Chamber of Deputies, to which was referred the message of President Braza regarding the tor-

pedoing of the Brazilian steamer Tijuca. The Commission decided to submit to Congress a bill authorizing the President to utilize German ships in Brazilian ports, provide for the defence of Brazilian navigation and reach an understanding with the Allied nations with regard to measures which will ensure the freedom of foreign commerce and revoke the decree of neutrality.

**THE BRITISH MISSION.**  
OTTAWA, May 29. The British mission will leave here to-morrow for Montreal, where Balfour will be entertained by the Canadian Club and later receive an honorary degree from McGill University. Before leaving Canada, Balfour hopes to visit the industrial districts of Ontario.

**SCIENTISTS REACH AMERICA.**  
NEW YORK, May 29. The British and French Scientific Commission named by their respective Governments to work with American scientists on problems connected with the conduct of the war, arrived here to-day on a French ship. The Commission consists of (British), Sir Ernest Rutherford, who was awarded the Nobel Prize for Chemistry, in 1908, and Commander Bridge, of the British Navy; (French), Commandant Fabry, Professor of the University of Marseilles, Commandant Henri Abraham, Professor of the University of Paris, Capt. De Grammant, and Capt. Dupouey. The Commission will work with the National Research Council, and expect to make their headquarters in Washington.






