

LONDON, Dec. 31.

Britain is posting up the ledger of 1917 with a somewhat wry face. There is a balance on the right side, but the year's gains are far below expectations. SECRETARY BAKER'S WEEKLY REVIEW.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.
What the beginning of the New
Year finds at the battle front is outlined by Secretary Baker in his weekly review of the military operations issued to-night by the War Depart. In the west, he says, the British dominate the Flanders Plain with a great wedge into the principal Ger-man line of defence at Cambrai, while the French with their own lines unroken hold the key to the Laon area through the capture of Chemin des Dames. Italy, supported by the Allies, is holding firm, while the enemy after battering in vain for six weeks against the defenders, is busy preparing a renewed offensive. In Russla, the review merely says, the Germans are endeavouring to persuade that country that they are eager to assist in restoring normal conditions and that the German Embassy build-ing at Petrograd is being made ready for occupancy. While the operations of American troops at the front have been confined to narrow limits, the Secretary says their presence has heartened the Allies and increased saith in final victory.

We record with profound regret the passing of Mr. James P. Howley, who entered into his rest vesterday morning after a short illness. He was in apparent good health the day pre-vious. At 11 p.m. he prepared to re-tire and while saying his prayers was summoned, but a few hours later his soul fied to the Great Beyond. James Howley, Royal New-foundland Regiment and Lieut.-Commander Richard Howley, R.N., at Halifax; also three daughters, Mrs. J.
