War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A. M.

ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE FRENCH TROOPS.

ITALIAN HEADQUARTERS IN NORTHERN ITALY, Jan. 1.—The magnitude of the achievements of the French troops in the Monto Tomba region grows as full details are received. In addition to the 1,248 men, including 44 Austrian officers several of high rank, were made prisoners and a large number of guns captured, the booty includes sixty machine guns, several trench quick firers and a great deal of other booty, but the chief object of the stroke is the offensive tactics and stirring enthusiasm and sureness with which the French delivered their blow against the enemy lines.

LOYD GEORGE'S APPEAL.

LONDON, Jan. 1. Premier Lloyd George in his New Year message to the nation appeals to all at home to do their utmost for the cause for which the democracies of the world are leagued together especially by practicing economy and saving money to lend to the Government. The message concludes: "To every civilian I would say that your firing line is at the works or office in which you do your bit, the shop or kitchen in which you spend or save, the bank or post office where you buy your war bonds. To reach that firing line and to become an active combatant yourself there are no trenches to grope along, no barrage to face, no horrors, no wounds. The duty is clear before you, follow it and it will lead ere long to safety for our own people and victory for our cause."

OPERATIONS IN PALESTINE.

LONDON, Jan. 1. The official statement regarding the operations in Palestine, says: The latest information shows that the operations on this front were severe. It appears that on the 27th the enemy made with German assistance a determined attempt to retake Jerusalem. His attacks pressed with vigor and continued from 2 o'clock on the morning of the 27th for 46 hours. General Allenby immediately counter attacked against the west flank of the front on which the Turks attacked. On the 27th this attack progressed two and a half miles over very difficult country. Seeing that the Turkish attack was spent on the 28th, he made a general advance, the British on the Nablus (Shechem) Road advancing east and driving the enemy back before them. By the morning of the 29th General Allenby had secured a line of Burmahras el Tabuch ran-Allah el Fish-Wadi el Kiehl. Thus the result of the Turkish attack to recapture Jerusalem is that on the northwest we have gained several miles of ground instead of one. The Turks suffered heavily in killed and wounded, the killed alone being estimated at 1,000. So far 600 prisoners and 20 machine guns have been captured.

LONDON, Jan. 1. The British Government recognizes that the Brest Litovsk peace proposals constitute a grave and new factor of which official cognizance must be taken, says the Daily Chronicle, in reporting as did the Manchester Guardian yesterday that the British Government intends to return a serious

A Good Beginning. Great pressure on our space to-day compels us to make our editorial remarks briefest that we could have wished in view of the extraordinary nature and importance of the present political situation.

view of the extraordinary nature and importance of the present political situation. We will content ourselves with emphasizing the chief feature that distinguishes it at the present moment. It is a most hopeful one. We spoke on Saturday of the political housecleaning which is an imperative necessity to this country. If we are correctly informed, the first effective steps towards it have been taken by His Excellency the Governor, to whom the country's thanks are due and will most certainly be shown. We understand that he has insisted on the observance of a principle which goes to the very foundation of the British system of representative government and which has been scandalously and flagrantly violated by the Morris and Coalition Administrations. Dr. Lloyd, who is the Solicitor of the F.P.U. Trading Company, will not be permitted to lead a government or to sit in the Executive of one while he fills that position. The close relation of the Company with the government in the past and the closer relations it would have with the new Government in such case absolutely forbid such a combination of capacities. The same principle exactly will apply to the cases of Mr. Coaker and Mr. Hallyard. Similarly, we understand that Mr. Higgins, who has been a member of the Executive of the F.P.U. since its formation, must make choice between that position and the continuation of his professional relations with the F.P.U. The most flagrant case of all, however, is that of the Hon. John Crosbie, who has been permitted to hold an important administrative post while the virtual owner of the Newfoundland Produce Company, which is in actual contract with the Government. When an act is put to this sort of thing, it will be time to hope for an end also of some of the graft and corruption that disgraces our political life and has been a constant source of shame to this country. For nine years the Reid Newfoundland Company has governed Newfoundland. It has lately formed an alliance for political purposes, with the F.P.U., looking to a joint control, many times more comprehensive, of public affairs and legislation. The country is beginning to realize the danger that threatens it and to know that it rests with itself to avert it. Meanwhile, until we have the opportunity to do so, the absolute severance of the personal links that have joined these corporations to the Government will go far towards restoring their political influence and paving the way for the establishment in power of men who will come to clean hands, men honest by name and deed, men who will not be swayed and moved by fear of none. We indicated, in the broadest possible manner, on Saturday an instance of the irregular practices that have lately been carried on by certain ministers. Our remarks called forth a characteristic reply from the Advocate, the composition of which leaves no doubt as to its authorship. Since we mentioned no names and gave no clue whatever to what we had in mind, this outbreak is rather an amusing example of the cap fitting, though Mr. Coaker is apparently not satisfied with wearing it, but calls the public to witness how well it fits. We will merely propound to our readers a very, very difficult conundrum: Why is Mr. Coaker so credited by "base institutions" which do not contain his name, and which, in any case, are a tissue of falsehoods without even a shadow of justification? 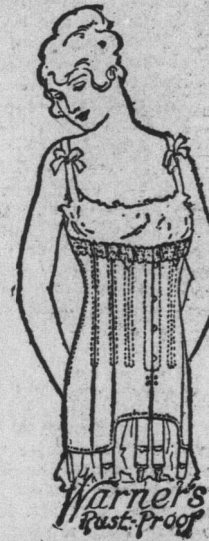

### BERLIN, To-day.

day yesterday violent artillery raged in the Monte Tomba sector of the Northern Italian Front. The French took the offensive. Official statement issued by the German General Staff reads:—Italian Front: In the region there were violent artillery throughout the day.

### HEROIC ROUMANIA.

JASSY, Roumania, Friday. The Roumanian Parliament opened an address by King Ferdinand. "However painful the sacrifice we still have to make in order to realize our legitimate aspirations, the King," he has the deep conviction that they will be recompensed in the decisive day when there is to be the reign of justice and equity in relations among nations." King bestowed warm praise on army, saying that its valor and would form part of the history of only of Roumania but of the world. He thanked Parliament for the constitutional reforms enacted at the session and for the laws providing for the appointment of the land for the people and for equal suffrage.

### LONDON, To-day.

Emperor William of Germany has had a three volume work on "Kaiser William in war time." The proofs being revised and will be submitted to the General Staff and Foreign Office, according to an Exchange graph despatch from Amsterdam. The work will comprise all the Emperor's speeches delivered during the war.

### ITALIAN WAR COMMITTEE.

ROME, To-day. A decree creating an Italian War Committee to be presided over by King Orlando was published in the Official Journal. The Committee consists of Baron Sonnino, Minister of Foreign Affairs, Signor Meda, Minister of Finance, Gen. Alfieri, Minister of War, Vice-Admiral Delbo, Minister of Marine, Gen. Dallo, Minister of Colonies, and another Minister to be nominated by the Premier. The Committee will sit in the Committee of the Navy and Militia of the War Office. The Committee doesn't diminish the authority of the Cabinet to whom its decisions will be communicated by Premier Orlando.

### AUSTIN, Texas, To-day.

Very available ranger of the Texas forces has been despatched to Alamo and vicinity by Adj. General. It is reported that the Texas Rangers were planning a raid over border near that point.

### WASHINGTON, To-day.

Chief from the cold wave in the West and it began to grow thither to-night. While the East is being from the cold, the West warmer weather is being reported. The South temperatures below freezing were predicted for to-night, ending into Central Florida.

## Don't Forget the Old Hymns.

In many ways I am a lover of change, but there is a certain fondness of the old which disturbs me when it comes to my attention. I refer to the dear old hymns, the Carols and especially by the Sunday Schools and Young People's Societies of the beautiful old hymns.

The Sunday evening meeting of a young people's society which I attended the other night seemed to me a typical example.

During the service six hymns were sung. One of these was a fairly familiar one (though not one of the old standbys), another bore an old name but the music had been changed beyond recognition.

The other four were distinctly modern hymns with, so far as I could see, little in either words or music to recommend them.

The Congregation Gave It Up.

They were all pitched so high that the majority of the singers had to forego a line or two now and then, and the music of one reached such altitudes that halfway through most of the congregation gave it up entirely and at the end only one person, the choir soprano, was still singing.

It is often claimed for these new gospel hymns that they are very catchy and have a swing to them that attracts the young folks. Of the four I heard only one could have laid a claim to half as much swing as the old standbys. And the words—well none of them had any particular beauty or distinction and the words of one (especially requested by a young member of the choir) were almost maudlin.

Tucked Away In The Back Of The Book.

I picked up the hymn book and looked it through. Yes, the old hymns were listed in the index but where do you suppose I found them when I looked them up? Tucked away in the back of the book in small print. There were such fine old trumpet calls as Onward Christian Soldiers; Hallelujah, Holy, The Son of God Goes

Forth to War; Come Thou Almighty King. There were my tender old friends, Jesus, Lover of My Soul; Lead Kindly Light; Rock of Ages; Sweet Hour of Prayer; There were Fanny Crosby and Watts and Charles Wesley, thrust aside; pushed into the background; made (in the parlance that befits the act) "to take a back seat."

Let's Have The Best Of Old And New. Yes, I know it is foolish and narrow to assume that all the good hymns have been written and not to be willing to look for merit in the new. But my heart is sore for the slight to my old friends. I want them reinstated in their places, both in the books and the young folk's hearts. I am willing that the best of the new should stand beside them but I am not willing that a hodge-podge assembly of new hymns usually commonplace and sometimes cheap should elbow them into obscurity.

## Your Boys and Girls.

One busy mother has solved to her satisfaction the problem of fresh air for the baby. She bundles him up in his fuzzy coat and poke bonnet, puts fur mittens on his tiny hands, a hot water bottle at his feet and deposits him in the big clothes basket. No matter how cold the day the window is thrown wide open and the doors leading to the other rooms are closed to avoid draughts. The air in the room is very soon as cold as it is outside, and baby, sitting in the sunshine, amuses himself by the hour watching the plants in the window, trying to catch the curtains as they blow and laughing at the passing people.

When a child is doing something that is forbidden, or when he is crying, it is a simple matter to frighten him into silence or inaction, but untold harm is often done in this way. Not only is the child's physical well-being affected but the mental and moral effect of such treatment is often very serious. It is cruel as well as unintelligent to frighten him and then taunt the boy because of his resulting cowardice. We must try to teach our children to be fearless in action but cautious in planning. They must have courage and caution, both as a result of a fuller knowledge of the world and its dangers.

THE ONION. 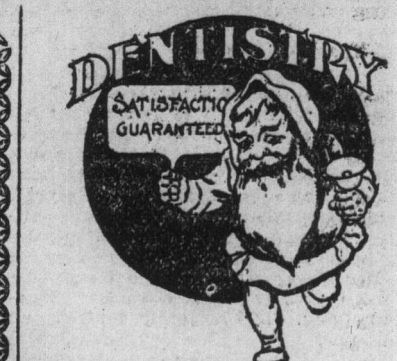

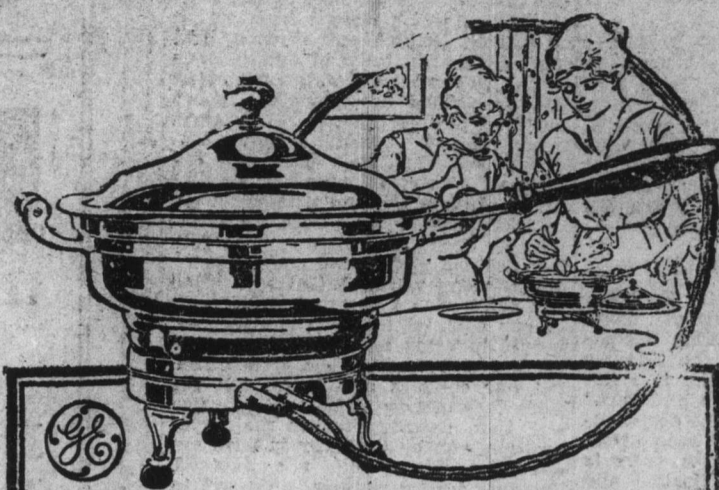
