Local News.

Chatham is likely to purchase a steam fire engine.

The population of the township of B'anshard has decreased 666 since 1861.

The Provincial Synod has decided to petition the Governor General for the establishment of inebriate asylums.

They are given to killing horses up to the County of Perth. A farmer there had a fine colt shot one day last week.

A little son of Mr. Morrison, of Brantport, was poisoned on Wednesday by eating the fruit of the thorn apple. The effects were not fatal, but nearly so.

A large number of stores and private dwellings have been erected in St. Mary's during the past season.

Whiskey Mason has imitators. A detective named Strong, from Toronto, paid Brantport a visit a few days ago, and several of the hotel keepers and grocers were \$20 poorer.

It is said that a man in the County of Peel raised 100 bushels of Diehl wheat of two acres, and sold the grain for seed at \$2 per bushel. That is successful farming.

The Nestorian arrived off Father Point on Saturday last, having made an unusually quick passage. Among her passengers are Judge Hagarty, Hon. D. L. McPherson, Hon. George Brown, and their families.

An old woman, ninety-four years of age, named Jane Wallace, died suddenly on the train from the east on Friday, between Prescott and Kingston. She was an emigrant from Edinburgh, Scotland, having come out by the steamer *St. David*.

The English Cricketers, composing the All England Eleven, arrived in Toronto by special train of the Great Western at one o'clock this morning. They put up at the "Rossin" and will proceed to Montreal to-day, for the purpose of playing a united military and civilian twenty-two.

Mr. McKellar, of Plympton, and an old resident, was returning from Wyoming on the 10th inst., when his horses took fright, and running away threw him out of the wagon, the wheels of which passed over his body, inflicting such injuries that he died in a few hours.

The "Victorias," of Ingersoll, will meet the "Young Canadians," of Woodstock, on Tuesday next, to try if they can again win the ball and championship. The *Sentinel* talks as if it thought the "Young Canadians" were being subjected to a species of persecution by having to play so often.

CATTLE FOR THE EXHIBITION.—The Great Western took down this morning nine carloads of cattle and sheep to the Exhibition at Hamilton. The animals were the property of a few well-known stock breeders in this locality. A number of articles were taken down by wagon.

COLONIAL SOCIETY.—Late English newspapers bring intelligence of the formation of a company under the above head, having for one of its principal objects the dissemination of information about Canada. At its first meeting, which was presided over by Mr. Chichester Fortescue and attended by Sir Stafford Northcote and many other leading Colonial politicians, Lord Bury was chosen President, and the object of the promoters was stated to be to provide a place of meeting for all who take an interest in Colonial affairs.

DESTRUCTIVE WORM.—In the neighborhood of London, at this season of the year, there is a description of worm which infests the butts of fruit trees, and invariably finds its way to the part where the sap runs out. If the insect is allowed to commit its depredations, the tree will not survive the winter. The only way to remove the annoyance is, by cutting out the worm, and filling up the cavity with a little dung, not forgetting to bind a rag or woolen cloth well around the same.

PUBLIC OR PRIVATE.—It is said that the Grand Jury at the Ottawa Assizes recommended that Whelan's execution should take place in private, similar to the manner in which executions are now conducted in England, and it would certainly prevent a most injurious display of feeling could the law allow such a course. The law seems to be so framed that such a course could be pursued, and it only remains for the Attorney General to direct that the Sheriff perform his duty as he think best. The law in England renders it imperative that the execution should be in private; while here either course would appear legal.

ACCOMMODATION TO HAMILTON.—The Great Western Company will give the additional facilities afforded by a special train for going to and coming from the Provincial Exhibition. In addition to the regular trains the special will run to and from Hamilton every day during the week. It is timed to leave Guelph at 7:45 a.m., reaching the city at 10:15 a.m. Returning will leave Hamilton at 5:30 p.m., arriving at Guelph at 7:55 p.m. Messrs. Marriott & Ewing have also started a line of stages to run during the week. The fare is \$1.50 for the double journey. The stage leaves Miller's saloon at 6 a.m., and makes Hamilton in three hours and a half. Returning leaves Hamilton at 5:30 p.m., and arrives at Guelph about half-past 9.

Not True.—The Hamilton *Times* is authorized to say that the report in circulation, to the effect that the Hon. David Christie declines to exhibit his imported stock at the Provincial Fair this week, from fear of the cattle disease, is unauthorized and without foundation on fact.

THE HOUNDS.—The Wellington hounds were out for the first time this season on Saturday last. They had but indifferent success. Throwing off at Bushy farm the dogs entered a large swamp, and though two foxes were raised it was found impossible to bring them out on open ground. The rain cut short the sport and the huntsmen, of whom there were about thirty, were obliged to betake themselves homeward without having enjoyed anything that could be called a run.

BILIARDS.—The exhibition of billiards by the celebrated Joseph Dion, of Montreal, at the Billiard Rooms here on Saturday evening, was witnessed by a large number of spectators. He played a friendly game of 1000 with Mr Samuel May, of the Revere House, Toronto, the latter who is a good player, only scoring 205 points. At the conclusion of the game Mr. Dion exhibited some of his wonderful shots each of which drew forth loud bursts of applause from the spectators. We regret that in his late match with McDevitt he failed to recover the golden cue, for in our young Canadian we would have a worthy representative of the champion billiardist of America. Dominion Rifle Match.

The firing at the 1,000 yards in the "All Corners" Match was completed on Saturday. Marston of Hamilton, and Field of Montreal, scored 99 points each. The first prize was awarded to Marston, he having made the largest number of counts—4 bull's eyes to Field's 3. Capt. Piers, of Halifax, N.S., who scored 27, and Field, entered a protest against the decision, asserting that Marston had rested his elbows when firing. The Council decided that Marston and Field should "play off" three shots each, at 1,000 yards on Monday morning. Marston refused to abide by this decision, and is sustained by many officers and men on the ground.

The Affiliated Association Match came off on Friday. Ranges, 300, 600, and 900 yards; three shots at each range; any rifle coming within the Wimbledon regulation; possession of the \$200 prize to be left to the decision of the winning Association. Hamilton made an aggregate score of 133, Ottawa 110, Toronto 95, London 85, Prescott 76, Brockville 73, Haldimand 67, Ontario 66, Tenth Royals (Toronto) 64, 3rd Brigade Division 64, Peterboro' 48, Guelph, represented by Ensign R. Tribe, 30th Batt., Lieut. A. McBride, do. do, Ensign J. Hooper, do. do, N. Wheelman, do. do, and Private H. Smith, do. do. 86. The prize of \$200 was awarded to Hamilton; the individual prize of \$30 to G. Gawker, of Hamilton.

The "Battalion Match" was completed on Saturday. The first prize (\$250) was secured by the "Victorias" of Quebec. Their score was 155; the Peterboro' men losing by one point. The largest individual score was made by Private Andrews, (of Montreal)—83.

The "Dominion Match," commenced on Saturday afternoon, and was completed at 300 and 400 yards. Sergeant Sandford, of the New Brunswick Volunteer Artillery, made five consecutive bull's eyes at the four hundred yards. Clune, of the Grand Trunk Brigade, (Toronto) made four bull's eyes and an "outlet," and Capt. Leslie, (of Montreal) four bull's eyes and a "centre." There were over four hundred entries for this match.

A large number of men from the Province of Ontario, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, have left dissatisfied with arrangements and conduct of the match.

The volunteers of Quebec entertained their brethren of Ontario and the Maritime Provinces to a sumptuous dinner on Saturday night.

Queen Victoria has been the first British Sovereign to set foot in Switzerland.

Despatches to the Evening Mercury

Munich, Sept. 19.—Mr. Bancroft, the American Minister, and Prince Hohenlohe, the Minister for Foreign Affairs for Bavaria, to-day formally exchanged the ratification of the treaty relative to citizenship.

London, Sept. 19.—It is reported that George Peabody will soon purchase a large estate in Hungary.

Jno. Wilson Patton, M.P., for North Lancashire, has been appointed Secretary of State for Ireland, vice Earl Mayo, appointed Governor General of India.

New York, Sept. 19.—Steamer Guiding Star sailed to-day for California, taking 600 passengers. The loss by fire in Higgins' carpet factory this morning, was \$175,000. Some 1,100 people are thrown out of work by the fire.

London, Sept. 20.—The apprehensions of war have partially subsided during the past week. The efforts of the Parisian press to extract a warlike significance in the speech of the King of Prussia have proved a failure. It is evident that peace is sincerely desired by the governments and people of Europe with the exception of the Emperor of the French, whose purpose is unknown. A growing indignation is manifesting itself at his ambiguity and indecision.

Dublin, 20th.—At a meeting of Roman Catholic Clergymen of Galway, a resolution was adopted pledging those present to oppose all candidates for parliament who do not support Gladstone's resolves for the disestablishment of the Irish Church.

Pesth, 20th.—The Hungarian Diet proposes to establish universal religious toleration throughout the country.

Paris, 20th.—Queen Isabella of Spain made a visit to the Emperor and Empress at Biarritz soon after the return of the latter from St. Sebastian.

An insurrection is said to have broken out in Andalusia, Spain.

London, 20th.—According to tenor of advice from Central Asia are presumptive. Hostilities on the part of Russians in Bokhara is expected in October next.

Southampton, 20th.—Steamer Germania from New York arrived.

London, midnight.—The following important news has been received from Madrid: The Prime Minister, Gomez, Broca, and Mayayo, and Belida, members of the Spanish Government, have resigned. The Marquis of Havana has been requested to fill their places *ad interim*. The Queen is returning to Madrid. Martial law has been proclaimed in the Capital.

Paris, 20th.—The Journals here have reported that a general movement against the Queen has commenced in Spain, and that it is headed by Gen. Prim and by the generals who were recently exiled. Some accounts say that the Rebels are moving upon Madrid in force.

New York, 21st.—Herald's London special says: Telegrams from Madrid state that the Queen's Admiral Topete, commanding the naval force off Cadix, with the whole of the men serving under his order, has revolted against Isabella's Government—the result of political revolutionary agitation which has been silently but actively progressing among the royal sailors since the period of banishment of military generals and exile of the Duke and Duchess of De Montpensier.

The generals so lately sentenced to banishment have returned from the places assigned to them under the royal warrant. Marshal De La Torre headed the movement and the leading men of the old O'Donnell party sustain it. Several towns have joined in the insurrection and the most intense panic prevailed at Court in Madrid. Troops were despatched to the South. Gen. Concha has been commissioned to command the loyal troops. A rumour prevailed in Paris that Queen Isabella, who met Napoleon at San Sebastian, had abdicated the Throne, but it is not stated whether in Madrid at San Sebastian or at Biarritz on French territory, whither she went immediately after Napoleon's return from the interview with Her Majesty at San Sebastian.

FRENCH ATROCITY.—The Hamilton *Times* learns from Paris the circumstances of a deed of appalling atrocity, which occurred on Saturday last in the neighborhood of that town, the victim being an aged blind man named Crittenden. This unfortunate man lived in a retired locality, and was reputed to be possessed of some little means, having some years since received a windfall in money, although his wife labored industriously as a washerwoman, wherever she could find employment. It was during her absence attending to such duties, on Saturday, that a woman and a young girl visited the house for the purpose of robbery, and finding the old man alone, they endeavored to compel him to reveal where his wealth was secreted. He was stripped entirely nude, tied to a bed, and tortured in a manner revoltingly indecent, his injuries being of a most serious nature. Failing in their expectation of finding money, these unnatural females finally departed leaving their victim still tied and suffering great agony, and it was not until an hour afterwards that his condition was discovered by his wife. Mrs. Crittenden, after releasing her husband, started in a high state of exasperation in search of the perpetrators of the outrage, and came upon them a short distance off, seated by the roadside, the possession of Crittenden's clothing, which they had carried off, being sufficient evidence of their guilt. The enraged wife assailed them, and a fierce contest ensued, the other woman losing a greater portion of her hair, and being stripped of most of her clothing. The conflict was finally quelled by parties who happened to come up the road in a wagon. The perpetrators of the outrage escaped.

At the British Association meeting at Norwich, a Miss Fellows opined that "at present a girl who had finished her education," as it was termed, was generally about as empty-headed a creature as could be found on the face of the earth."

The Mayor of Norwich, at a meeting last week, stated that a friend of his went into a barber's shop, and that worthy tradesman had said, "I don't think much of this British Association; mine out of ten don't shave at all, and the others shave themselves."

New Governor General of Canada.

Lord Monck was on Saturday advised by cable despatches from the Duke of Buckingham, that Sir John Young has been appointed Governor-General of Canada.

The Revolt in New Zealand.

The war with the Maori natives is increasing in importance. Col. McDonnell was authorized to raise about 300 volunteers for special service.

Hard on the Provincial Secretary.

The London Prototype condemns in the severest terms and justly too, the conduct of Mr. M. C. Cameron for hurrying up from Whelan's trial to defend a notorious ruffian, the keeper of a house of ill-fame, for shooting a man who quarrelled with him in front of the house.

THE LOCAL LEGISLATURE.—The Toronto Telegraph of Saturday states that the Ontario Legislature is to be convened for the despatch of business, on Tuesday, Nov. 3rd.

WHELAN'S SPEECH.—The N. Y. Times, in referring to the speech made by Whelan before he was sentenced to be hanged, says: "Whelan, the Irishman who has been convicted of the assassination of his eloquent countryman D'Arcy McGee, made the same sort of declaration in court that was made in behalf of Mrs. Surratt when she was sentenced to death for complicity in the murder of President Lincoln."

A Western Mushroom Town. The Chicago Times has a very lively correspondent on the Western Plains, who moves westward on the Pacific Railroad from town to town, as one frontier mushroom town after another springs into existence in the progress of this line. He has an ingenious way of praising the good order and morals of each town he visits, upon general principles, and following this by a catalogue of crimes, outrages and lynchings just perpetrated by its residents. At last accounts he had got as far as Rawlins, a place Dakota territory, just laid out as a town, and which "has already a population of nine hundred, two large dancing halls from Benton, about fifteen drinking saloons and eating houses or tents." He first tells us that Rawlins is "as orderly as if it had a Metropolitan police," and then adds the information that "night before last a man was garroted and robbed"—that "last night a similar outrage was committed on another victim," and that "three men have been notified to quit the town, and if not gone in twelve hours, they will go up a telegraph pole and come down with a jerk—a rope in lieu of a necktie. I may have to chronicle their decease in my next." This is not bad for two days' work at Rawlins, in the very beginning of its existence. We presume that by this time there have been at least three score first-class crimes, and two score lynchings.
