Marshal De La Torre headed the movement and the leading men of the old O'Donnellist party sustain it. Several towns have joined in the insurrection and the most intense panic prevailed at Court in Madrid. Troops were despatched to the South, Gen. Concha having been commissioned to command the loyal troops. A rumour prevailed in Paris that Queen Isabella, who met Napoleon at San Sebastian, had abdicated the Throne, but it is not stated whether in Madrid at San Sebastian or at Biarritz on French territory, whither she went immediately after Napoleon's return from the interview with Her Majesty at San Sebastian.

New Governor General of Canada Lord Monck was on Saturday advised by cable despatches from the Duke of Buckingham, that Sir John Young has been appointed Governor-General of Vanada. He was Gover-nor-General of New South Wales, and acted as Lord High Commissioner of the Ionian Islands during a critical period. He is not expected here before November, as Lord Monck leaves about the 15th of that month. The New Governor is thus described by Burke, in his Peerage: — "The Right Hoa. Sir John Young, K. C., G. C. M. G., second Baronet, was born in 1807; succeeded his father Sir Wm. Young, in 1848; was educated at Eton and Corpus Christi College, Oxford, B. A., 1829; was called to the bar at Lincoln Inn, 1834; was alled to the bar at Lincoln Inn, 1834; was a Lord of the Treasury, 1841-4; Secretary to the Treasury, 1841-6; Chief Secretary for Ireland, 1852; M. P for Cavan County, 1831-55; and Lord High Commissioner of the Ionian Islands, 1855-9; has been Governor of New South Wales since 1860; was made a G. C. M. G., 1855; a K. C. B., 1859; married 1855, Adelaide Arabella, daughter of E. Dalton, Esq., and the late Marchioness of Headfort. the Ionian Islands during a critical

The Revolt in New Zealand.

The war with the Maori natives is increasing in importance. Col. Mc-Donnell was authorized to raise about 300 volunteers for special service. A small party of these men were sursmall party of these men were surprised by a band of the natives, and 9 of their number, including the officer in command, were butchered and mutilated. A few escaped to a neighboring redoubt, and the position was gallantly defended by four men until assistance arrived. While these events were taking place in the Patea district, news was received that the Hau-hau prisoners, who were supposed to be in safe keeping on the Chatham Islands, had effected their escape, and reached the mainland somewhere in Poverty Bay. These men overpowered their guard, seized a schooner lying in the adjacent harbor, and compelled the European erew to set sail for New Zealand, which was reached in due time. Altogether, about 200 prisoners are supposed to have escaped. On landing, they entrenched themselves in a very strong position, and contrived to secure a full supply of arms and ammunition. After remaining a day or two in the stronghold they had selected, the runaways endeavored to move inland. A Western Mushroom Town.

The Chicago Times has a very lively corespondent on the Western Plains, who moves westwardly on the Pacific Railroad from town to town, as one frontier mushroom town after another springs into existence in the progress of this line. He has an ingenious way of praising the good order and morals of each town he visits, upon general principles, and following this by a catalogue of crimes, outrages and lynchings just perpetrated by its residents. At last accounts he had got as far as Rawlins, a place Dacotah teroitory, just laid out as a town, and which "has already a population of nine hundred, two large dancing halls from Benton, about fifteen drinking saloons and eating houses or tents." He first tells us that Rawlins is "as orderly as if it had a Metropolitan police," and then adds the information that "night before last a man was garroted and robbed"—that "last night a similar outrage was committed on another victim," and that "three men have been notified to quit the town, and if not gone in twelve hours, they will go up a telegraph pole and come down with a jerk—a rope in lieu of a necktie. I may have to chronicle their decease in my next." This is not bad for two day's work at Rawlins, in the very beginning of its existence. We presume that by this time there have been at least three score first class crimes, and two score lynchings.
