An Important Vote.

On Friday the ratepayers of this Municipality will be expected to record their votes at the polling places of the several wards in which they are assessed, in favor of or against the by-law under which the Council propose to raise the amount required of them by the Board of School Trustees for the erection of the new Central School building.

We shall not pass in review the history of the steps taken by the Board of School Trustees in past years to procure a site on which a Central School should be erected—how the very lots which have ultimately been chosen were set apart for that purpose long ago—nor how, in the movement that has been more recently made, the selection has again fallen upon them after they had passed out of the possession of the Board.

Objections have been urged to the erection of the new building on the ground of expense, and appeals have been made to the merchants to vote against the by-law because of the burdens it would impose. We think these objections will not bear intelligent consideration. The By-law itself states that the assessment is to be at the rate of 1 1/2 mills a dollar, so that every one who knows the rate of his assessment can calculate the payment he must make yearly.

Should the By-law be defeated on Friday, what will be the result? Either the Town Council must again submit it to the ratepayers, in the same or in a modified form, thus incurring the expense of a new election; or they must proceed to levy from year to year the sums necessary to meet the expense of the erection as it proceeds.

We ask the ratepayers to ponder carefully these facts, and to let nothing prevent them from turning out to vote next Friday.
