A REASONABLE OFFER.

San Francisco Present the Lowest Tender for the Sewerage Work—other Council Features.

Mayor Oppenheimer, of Vancouver, was an interested and honored guest at the adjourned meeting of the city council last Thursday, at which Mayor Grant presided and all members but Ald. Robertson were present. The sewerage commissioners, Messrs. Earle, Turner and Tague, also took seats about the board.

The council plunged into business as soon as called together, a motion being introduced to the effect that the sewerage tenders be now opened. After a short and unimportant debate, this resolution was adopted, and Hon. Mr. Turner and Mr. Earle took seats beside the clerk to assist him in the opening of the tenders.

The tenders, with guarantee checks accompanying, were then announced as follows:

H. P. Koefer—\$340,117.40; check, \$18,000.
H. H. McDonald—\$301,667.75; check, \$17,000.
Trenery & Sinclair—\$471,904.11; check, \$24,000.
Elliott & Smith—\$468,488.93; check, \$24,000.
A. McLean & Co.—\$368,770.44; check, \$14,000.
D. McGillivray—\$320,228.92; check, \$1,000.
Barr & Jeffrey—\$302,838.32; check, \$24,000.

Mr. Koefer accompanies his tender with a note explaining that he has figured on purchasing all goods and material at local prices from local firms.

Ald. Vigilius moved the acceptance of the tender of A. McLean & Co. of San Francisco, it being much the lowest. He would enquire, however, if the specifications stipulated that no Chinese be employed on the streets.

Ald. Harrison—That's been looked after.

Ald. McKillop seconded the motion to adopt the tender of the San Francisco firm.

Ald. Harrison moved in amendment that the tenders be referred to the Sewerage committee and commissioners, with power to act, and with power for them to also engage the assistance of a duly created engineer.

This amendment was adopted, the Sewerage commissioners promising to lose no delay in awarding the contract to the lowest bidder. It is understood that the issue of the successful tender will be formally announced this (Friday) evening.

FORTY FOOT STREETS.
Ald. Harrison moved the second reading of the amendment to the Streets' by-law, to authorize the taking over by the city of certain 40 foot streets.

Ald. Holland urged that there were other 40 foot streets in the city than those mentioned, which were equally deserving of consideration. They had been registered prior to the passage of the Streets' by-law, in 1887. He might mention David street as an example.

The by-law was amended as suggested to include any other streets forty feet in width for their entire length. No further opposition was offered, and the amended by-law was adopted.

The by-law amending the Sewerage Commissioners' Appointments was also passed without discussion.

is given to local boards of health in the other provinces of the Dominion.

It is well that it should be, as the boards can more readily deal with the question, and can determine the time in which the bodies may be returned and carry out the necessary precautions in the way of disinfection, etc., which may be required, in the interest of public health.

I would therefore, in view of the law as it stands, suggest that the Corporation of Victoria ask at its next meeting of the Aldermen an amendment to the Public Health Act, giving the City authorities power to so deal with the matters which we have been considering.

Mayor Oppenheimer, president of the B. C. Exhibition Association, wrote to request a donation in aid of the association's funds. The matter was referred to the incoming council for favorable consideration.

A disputed account of the Albion Iron Works was presented by Ald. Smith, and after the facts connected with it had been explained, was referred to the water commissioners for adjustment under the terms of contract.

The council then rose.

RACING FOR LIFE.

A Retriever and an Alligator Swim Tandem Across a River.
