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

The estimated revenue on the existing basis of taxation is \$773,850,000, giving an available surplus of \$54,083,000.

Victorian Order Of Nurses Fund

Endowment Plan Explained in an Address By Lady Minto.

Eleven Hospitals Have Been **Substantially Aided** Thus Far.

As has already been briefly referred to in Ottawa despatches, Her Excellency the Countess of Minto requested some of the business men of Ottawa, to be good enough to meet her at Government House on April 8, at 3 o'clock, in order to secure from Ottawa assistance towards this object. In response to Her Excellency's invitation the following were present: Hon. W. C. Edwards, Mr. Justice Burbridge, Mr. G. H. Perley, Mr. John Manuel, Mr. H. K. Egan, His Worship Mayor Cook, Mr. F. W. Avery, Mr. W. J. Anderson, Mr. A. Lumsden, Mr. A. Gill, Mr. A. B. Broderick and Mr. J. M. Courtney.

Letters of regret were received from others approving of the scheme to establish an endowment fund. A map was exhibited showing the localities where the order was in operation. the order was in operation.

part: "I must thank you very heartily for having found time to attend this meeting. I was most anxious to show you by the map the work that has been accomplished. Two years after Queen Victoria's death, I appealed to the country to contribute towards these memorial hospitals; about \$26,000 was raised, and with this money we have assisted the districts which were considered most in

THE NEW HOSPITALS.

"I should perhaps explain that a good deal of thought was given by competent judges in the selection of these places. In most cases the money for the building in party raised in the district, and the maintenance of the hospital guaranteed; the necessary grant was then given to complete the hospital—this varies according to the need of the place, from \$500 to \$3,000. The first year or two the hospitals may need a supplementary grant to help to pay the nurses' salary, but generally the hospital is able to be maintained from the patients' fees, and local contributions. Ten hospitals are now in working order; out of this number one at Pictou belongs to the government, one at Fort William has been lent us, and a beautiful one at Copper Cliff has been affiliated to the order. 




