Ottawa, April 18.—The Hon. Wm. Stevens Fielding, during the past seven years, made some excellent budget speeches. There was something, however, about his utterances of Thursday which was unusual. His manner was good, but his manner was poor. Chinese For South Africa

Commissioners From Transvaal Go to Canada to Import Coolies for Mines.

One hundred Thousand Migrants Needed They Say to Supply Demand.

H. Ross Skinner and H. H. Noyes, who are to sail for Hongkong on the steamer Empress of China, when they reach the Orient on May 15, are bound to China to investigate the feasibility of importing 100,000 Chinese laborers to work the gold mines of the Transvaal.

"Since the close of the Boer war," says Mr. Noyes in letters from Hong Kong, "mining in South Africa has gone ahead with tremendous strides, but the future development of the industry is seriously hampered by the want of cheap labor.

"I have a high opinion of Chinese as mine laborers. I was stationed in the Orient for some years and have seen many of them in the capacity of industrial laborers. In the Transvaal, which produces four-fifths of the world's supply of gold, they are employed with entire success in the cultivation of the soil and in the mining industry.

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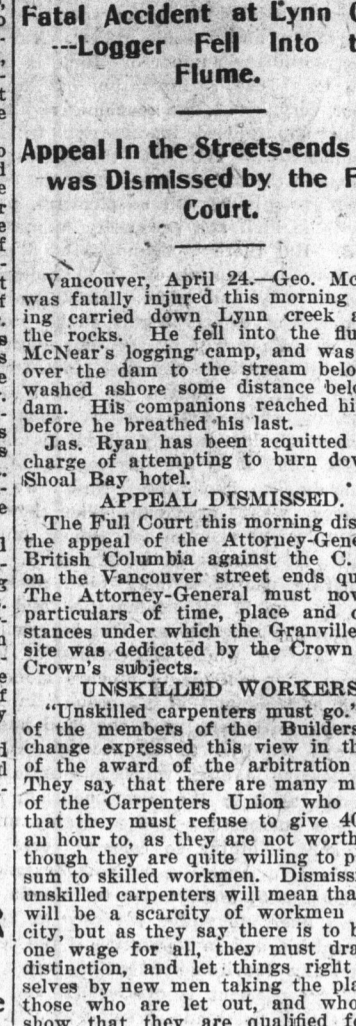

THIRD PRESS AND RELIGION.

The Nineteenth Century for April affords conclusive proof of the great activity of the popular mind and the ascendancy of the popular interest in topics bearing directly or indirectly upon religion. Out of seventeen articles in that review, six deal with questions of religious interest. There is an article entitled "The Crisis in the Church," another "The Church's Laymen," another "Loyalism and the Prayer Book," another "An Appeal to the Dean and Canon of Westminster," another "The Gospel of Mr. F. W. H. Myers," and another "From This World to the Next."

It is true that some of these articles deal with a special corner of the church of England, but that raises the question of religion in life in one of the most acute forms in which it could appear to English people, although it has to do with ecclesiastical polity and not with doctrinal belief. In its present form the crisis has been raised by the difference between the Church of England and the attitude of that party in Scotland during the ten years' conflict from 1833 to 1843, which, upon the disruption of the church, became the Free Church of Scotland. This party was the High Church party among thebyterians. While it believed in a connection between church and state, it would not tolerate interference by the state in what it considered spiritual matters. Similarly the High Church party in England is speeding towards a disruption in the Church of England. As the words of Lord Halifax: "A strong detachment of High Churchmen have long ceased to regard disestablishment as a positive evil, and are only asking themselves whether the time has come to work for it as a positive good?"

MANCHURIA.

If Russia is to secure Manchuria without any effective protest, the question at once suggests itself, at what step in Russia's acquisitions in the Far East will effective protest begin. The Russian occupation of Manchuria will give Japan an interesting time in dealing with the Russian aggression. Yet the control of Manchuria is a matter of national importance to both countries. Russia is a piece of the Japanese archipelago, accidentally attached to the mainland of Asia. When that is taken over by Russia, Japan will most certainly fight. We should not be surprised if Japan wishes to fight now. If the effect of the Anglo-Japanese alliance is to restrain her from doing so, that fact will not increase the popularity of the alliance in Japan. The joint action of the European Powers, and the United States may be included, in any case of such a nature.

DOCTORS DISAGREE.

A Professor Pearson of the University of Pennsylvania, recently reported to the National Academy of Medicine at Washington that rabies was a disease to be reckoned with, and that as many as five people had died of it in one year in the United States. Dr. Dulles, of the same institution, declares: "I have never seen a case of rabies in my life, and I do not believe it exists in this country."

It is practically certain that for many years both the British and the American Republics will continue to be engaged in a struggle for the reconquest of the Pacific. The United States is averse to the idea of a British Empire in the Pacific, and the British are equally averse to the idea of a United States Empire in the Pacific.

The demand for extra labor during harvest time will certainly afford some relief. But the extraordinary number of people is likely to make the remuneration of that labor very low. The economic results of this unparalleled immigration will not immediately manifest themselves. So long as the money brought by the colonists is spent on the local market, prices will be high and prosperity unimpeded. But there is to be a pinch when the capital of the immigrants gives out, and before their combined labor and capital begins to be productive. What will be the only resort of the new settlers when that pinch comes? He will be obliged to resort to the money lender and borrow upon the value he has already given his lands. His doing so is not only legitimate, but absolutely inevitable. Now we all know what it means when there is a universal demand for money. It means adequate means of satisfying it. The private usurer is only too ready to spring up in all communities and feed upon the necessities. But here will be a case of whole settlements of large population obliged to procure money at all hazards and upon the most onerous terms. In Australia settlement upon the land has always been required to be accompanied by extensive loaning, which has there been undertaken by the government, in most cases successfully and profitably undertaken. Nothing so colossal ever occurred in Australia as the Zepherus and the present immigration to Canada. We are likely to suffer severely in actual hardship and in reputation if the economically inevitable financial aspect of this settlement is overlooked, and provision is not made in some way to provide for the increased value of the land, which may be secured by borrowing at reasonable rates of interest. To the foreseeing eye the question is serious now. It will become pressing and calamitous if action is not prepared to meet it.

The population of the Northwest is shortly to be enriched by the Nestorians, a companion Russian sect to the Doukhobors.

If the effect of the Anglo-Japanese alliance is to restrain her from doing so, that fact will not increase the popularity of the alliance in Japan. The joint action of the European Powers, and the United States may be included, in any case of such a nature.
