

Sin: the old law maxim "caveat emptor" is still in force as every one knows to his cost, when he is purchasing goods or articles with the nature and value of which he is unacquainted. Modern civilization, whether wisely or not is an open question, deems it unadvisable to compel traders to sell goods of the nature and value they assert them, with such oily glibness to be, so a person when purchasing buys at his own risk, and hence the maxim "caveat emptor."
