OUR NATIONAL GAME.

The Lacrosse Season Astonishingly Opened in London.

LONDON, June 7. - The first lacrosse game of many years took place here yesterday between the newly-organized London club and the Ontario Indians.

The game itself was a scorcher for the Indian eleven that came up from Ontario to take away the scalp of the white men.

The red men were a lot of fast runners and generally very alert fellows, but they were out of practice, "and any way they weren't his best," was the way that the captain, Chief Elin Ninkam, explained the defeat of his team.

Before the game began the Indians, headed by the Seventh Band, paraded the streets and then marched to the grounds.

The London boys set a fast pace at the start, but the Ontario proved themselves a swift lot of fellows, and certainly did some clever dodging and checking. But they utterly lacked team play, and were out in a lurch at every opportunity. They narrowly missed scoring the first goal after ten minutes of play, but the next minute the rubber shot between Ontario posts. The second goal was a little longer coming, but it came, and at the end of half-time the score was 2 to 0.

The resumption of play the home team tallied a third goal, and thus did the good work go on, until the end of the second half, when the Indians are a good-natured lot of chaps, but their extreme earnestness in the play, coupled with their unique and certainly varied costumes, were their main merit. The opening was certainly auspicious, and a successful season seems assured.

Mrs. Hayes and her daughter arrived in the Crown Inn, Walkerville, a few weeks ago.

Her husband came to see them at intervals during the past week, but remained only a short time. He called to see them Monday and was heard of again until Friday, when a man entered the inn and informed Mrs. Hayes that her husband had been seen leaving Detroit with a young woman. He said that Hayes sent word with him advising her to return to her parents' home at Whitby, Ont., and that he had left Detroit for Toledo with a woman who he loved better than his wife and child.

Hayes, with his wife and child, first went to Windsor from Toronto, where they had conducted a store, on Tuesday, May 1. He had a trunk with him, containing what he said were his belongings, and returned to the International again May 21, and there secured a woman of admirable character, and the wife of the proprietor.

A few days later three men came and stated to the hotel proprietors that they were detectives sent by the police to investigate the matter. They were advised about it, and the latter told what he supposed was the reason for the detectives' coming. He had done so while away during the past few weeks he had eloped with a woman he had become infatuated with.

Mrs. Hayes, who is a woman of admirable character, was nearly distracted with grief and she and her child were left at an advanced age, and with her child she was at the home of her parents at Whitby, Ont. She thinks that her husband is again under the influence of liquor and will return.

Holds Presbyterian Views and Leaves the Congregationalists.

A resolution asking the delegates present to do their utmost to raise this average to one cent to \$1 was carried on a standing vote.

Peter Jackson accepted the National Amateur Athletic Union's offer to fight Corbett, his willingness to meet Corbett. The latest American fighting champion declined, saying the purse was too small, and declared that the ducky boxer must meet him in Jacksonville, Fla. Corbett is a well-known pugilist against colored fighters and long ago Jackson announced that he would fight Corbett in England and directly stated that he does not want to meet Jackson. If he did he would endeavor to fight him in England and accept the London offer of \$15,000 purse.
