Fraser Companies Limited Expanding Royal Securities Corporation Offers \$2,000,000 Issue

known to bond market followers, generally as some other large Canadian lumber concerns and pulp producers solely due to the fact that the Company has always been a close co-operation, Fraser Companies Ltd. ranks among largest manufacturers of spruce lumber and cedar shingles. Its limits covet 1661 square miles of very exceptional timber in Northern Quebec and New Brunswick. Annual lumber production totals 100,000,000 feet B.M.of cedar and spruce and 135,000,000 cedar shingles. The buisness was founded in 1877 by the late Donald Fraser and has behind it a record of over fourty years, solid growth and expansion. Foreign Credits for the Sale of Canadian Wheat

J. A. Maharg, M. P., says that Canada cannot expect to expert to United States wheat of the 1919 crop. The fixed price in that country will keep out the Canadian product, for the Americans would not allow cheaper Canadian wheat to undersell their own, which remain at the

1918 fixed price. This means that Canada's exportable surplus of wheat must find a market abroad, which further means that it must be sold on time. Mr. Maharg says that many solvent nation wants it, but that they cannot pay cash, so if sales are to be made large credits must be granted.

The Dominion Government is willing to grant these credits, but its ability to do so is dependent on the extent to which it can borrow money from its own people. If the money is forthcoming all the credits requirred will be granted, but Canadians must make these possible. For Canada to borrow money abroad for this purpose would be out of the

War Saving Ssamps help solve the problem of credits, for they enable the Government to borrow at home the money it repuires. Besides, the prices of the stamps is placed so low, \$4, that every person earning wages in Canada can afford to buy them. The farmers of the West should be eager to get them, for Beef, Pork, Butter and Eggs: they are vitally interested in seeing that foreign credits are granted.



On Liarch 25th, George M. Harlow was transported from ms nome in Deep Prook to ms home in our father's mansion in glory. He is not dead he has only gone before. The memorial service was neld at his late residence. mucted by his pastor, kev. A. McNintch, assisted by the Revs. C. A. The smit A, W. L. Smith. The emaining members of his family are his widow who was Louisa Beals, of Inglisville, Annapolis / County, two daughters, Mrs. Charles Dexter, Leominster, Mass, Mrs. Arthur Jefferson, Bear River and his son, Cleveland, at home. Mr. Harlow was a native of North Brookfield where he lived until nine years ago when he moved to Deep Brook. Though his residence here has been so brief yet in the declining years of a long life by his sterling christian character and fidelity he won a large place in the esteem and confidence of the whole community. He was a loyal member of the Baptist church which he joined when twenty one years of age. As the charch building in which he had his religious home was built upon the solid rock formation of Brookfield Corner, even so his faith and hope were firmly founded upon the eternal Rock of Ages. He was one of a scrong band of Christian men who stood solidly against the invasion of the liquor traffic and from the beginning of its history succeeded in keeping Brooked to figuor saloons. Even in the days of the gold boom maing camps were

cursed with"si wash"and other grog Brookneld nad no such cesspools. re belonged to a race of Pioneers, e at least of his progenitors, Stephen Hopkins was a mayflower passenger; others may have been. All his American progenitors were members of the infant Plymouth Colony; they were a strong people who, with great daring and sacrifice, laid the foundation of the new continent of a great nation, free from the medieval intolerance that could apply its Uniformity and Test Act, where they would worship God in freedom of their conscience according to his inspired word. In 1759 a ship load of pioneers, among them the N. S. progenitors, of Mr. Harlow sailed from Eastram in the Plymouth Colony, o the newly acquired Acadia and pitched their tents on the banks of the river, founded the town of Liverpool and began the settlement of Queens County. Forty years afterward William Burke led the way into the forest primeval and began a farm on the Medway River at South Brookfield. Among those followed was George Harlow with his wife Azubah Cole, the parents of the subject of this sketch. They took in their homestead on the shore of

Rosette lake, one of the most romantic and beautiful spots in the northern district. Here they cut down the forest. cleared the land and culivated a snlendid farm, while they raised a family of noble sons and daughters. Thus we see the home and parentage of George M. Harlow. He was the scion of a strong liberty loving ancestry who pioneered the American wilde. The stury Puritan spirit and principles of his ancestors were characteristic of his life and character; he one of God's poblemen and he ment to his rost, on the mines of implicit faith and hope in the all aufficience of the coving and of prifering race of the Lord Josus \_C. 


