QUEBEC.—NEW YEAR'S DAY, Epiphany, Annunciation, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Ascension, Corpus Christi, Queen's Birthday, St. Peter and St. Paul, Dominion Day, All Saints, Conception, Christmas Day.

ONTARIO, NEW BRUNSWICK AND NOVA SCOTIA. — Christmas Day, New Year's Day, Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Queen's Birthday.

Also throughout the Dominion, any day appointed by proclamation for a general Fast or Thanksgiving Day.

ECLIPSES FOR THE YEAR 1891.

During this year there will be four eclipses, two of the Sun, and two of the Moon.

I.—May the 23rd there will be a total Eclipse of the Moon, partly visible as a partial Eclipse.

First contact with the Penumbra...10.42 mo. of May 23rd
 Beginning of total phase..... 0.55 ev. "
 Middle of Eclipse..... 1.35 ev. "
 Last contact with the Penumbra... 4.27 ev. "

II.—June 6th, there will be an Annular Eclipse of the Sun, visible as a partial Eclipse.

Begins on the earth generally, 2h. 3m. 4sec. mean time at Greenwich, in longitude 132° 33' west of Greenwich, and in latitude 25° 15' North.

Central Eclipse, at noon, June 6th in longitude 110° 6' east of Greenwich, and in latitude 71° 11' N.

III.—Nov. 15, there will be a total Eclipse of the Moon visible.

First contact with the Penumbra.....4h. 52m. ev.
 Middle of the Eclipse..... 7h. 24m. ev.
 Last contact with the Penumbra.....11h. 07m. ev.

IV.—Nov. 30th Dec. 1st, there will be a partial Eclipse of the Sun, invisible here.

Begins on the earth generally, November 30th, 21h. 44m. mean time at Greenwich, in longitude 75° 26' west of Greenwich, and in latitude 35° 46' S.

Ends on the earth generally, December 1st, 1h. 18m., in longitude 10° 47' east of Greenwich, and in latitude 59° 17' S.

NOTE.—There will occur a TRANSIT OF MERCURY across the Sun's disc, May 9th, 91, partly visible. External contact at ingress, 11h. 53m. 44s. mean time at Greenwich. External contact at egress, 16h. 50m. 25s. mean time at Greenwich.

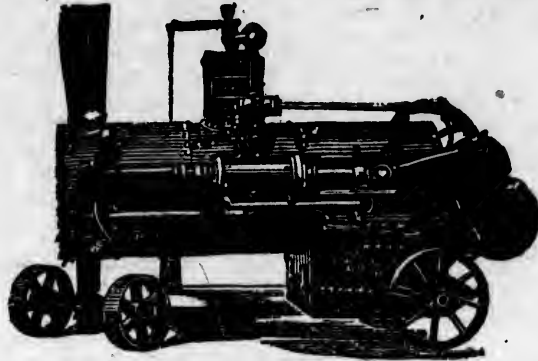

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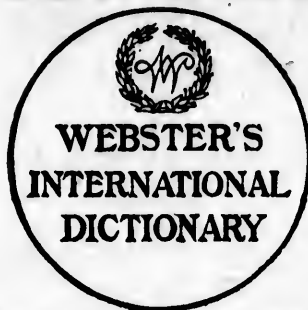

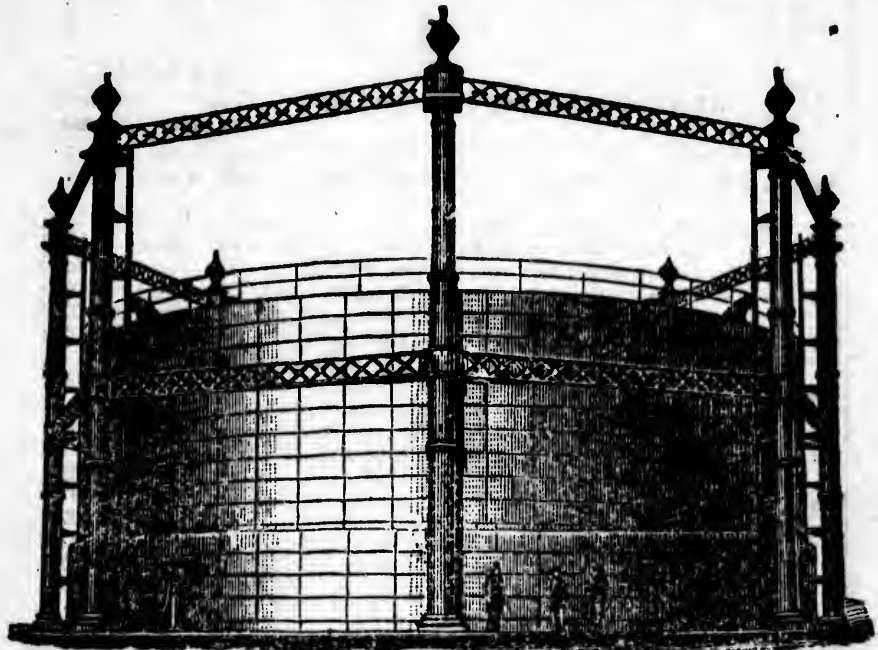

Hochelaga, Point St. Charles, and St. Gabriel—Three deliveries daily, 8 a. m., 10 a. m. and 2 p. m.

Every effort is made to secure the satisfactory working of these arrangements. If, however, irregularities occur, they should be at once reported to the Postmaster.

Letters addressed from or to places in Canada and United States 3 cents per 2 ounces.

City or drop letters for City delivery 2 cents per ounce.

For Cote des Neiges, Cote St. Antoine, Cote St. Louis, Cote St. Paul, Hochelaga, St. Jean Baptiste, Mile End, Notre Dame de Grace, Point St. Charles, St. Cunegonde (including Dorchester and Metcalfe Avenues), St. Gabriel de M., St. Henri (Tannery West), St. Lambert and Longueuil, one cent per ounce.

The above rates must in every case be prepaid by postage stamp. When posted wholly unpaid they cannot be forwarded, but will be sent to the Dead Letter Office. Insufficiently paid letters for Canada, on which the first ounce rate of postage is fully prepaid, are forwarded, charged with double the deficient postage.

Insufficiently paid letters for or from the United States, on which a single rate of postage or more has been paid, are charged with the deficient postage on delivery.

The prepaid postage on letters for the United Kingdom and Newfoundland is 5 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce. Wholly unpaid letters for or from the United Kingdom and the other Postal Union countries (except the United States) are charged double postage on delivery, and insufficiently prepaid letters double the deficiency.

No letter, &c., can be forwarded registered to any destination unless both the postage and registration fee have been fully prepaid.

POST CARDS.

Post Cards issued at one cent each cannot be transmitted to any place beyond Canada and United States. Post Bands can be obtained at the rate of \$1.25 per 100.

Post Cards for Correspondence between Canada and the Postal Union Countries, are sold at the Stamp Agencies at 2 cents each.

RE-DIRECTED LETTERS.

To any place in Canada, the United States and Postal Union Countries.

Re-directed letters to places within the Dominion or United States, will be forwarded without any additional charge, if not taken from the office, or if handed back at the moment of their delivery, but if taken from the office and subsequently re-posted they must be prepaid at least one rate, in default of which they will be sent to the Dead Letter Office, Ottawa.

Letters *originating* in Canada re-directed to any of the Postal Union Countries, will be forwarded, even if taken out of the Office and subsequently re-posted.

MATTER WHICH CANNOT BE FORWARDED THROUGH THE POST.

Any Explosive Substance, glass, liquids, or other matter likely to entail risk or injury to the ordinary contents of the mail, will be sent to the Dead letter Office, Ottawa.

Spectacles and eye-glasses, if securely put in cases not likely to allow the contents to escape if broken in course of conveyance, may be sent by Post within the Dominion on pre-payment of parcel post rates.

Letters containing Gold or Silver Money, Jewels, or Precious Articles, or anything liable to Customs duties, cannot be forwarded by Post to any of the Postal Union Countries, except to the United States.

REGISTERED LETTERS.

Letters intended to be Registered, when addressed to places in Canada or Newfoundland, must be prepaid by stamp, 5 cents each; to the United States 5 cents each, in addition to the postage rate.

All classes of matter may be Registered to the Postal Union Countries, and the sender may entitle himself to an acknowledgment of delivery from the party addressed by the payment of a fee of 5 cents in addition to the registration fee.

All letters for registration should be posted 15 minutes before the hour of closing ordinary mails, and 30 minutes before closing of English Mails.

Registration Stamps only are admitted in prepayment of Registration Fees.

NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

published regularly at intervals of not more than one calendar month, having a full title, the place, date of publication, and the number of the issue printed at the top of the first page, posted by the publishers in the Post Office at the place where they are printed, and addressed to regular subscribers or newsdealers, residents in Newfoundland, the United States, or Canada, except at the place of publication, are transmitted free of postage.

TRANSIENT NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS ADDRESSED TO PLACES IN CANADA, NEWFOUNDLAND AND UNITED STATES.

On all newspapers and periodicals other than those from the offices of publication, including all newspapers and periodicals published less frequently than once a month, the postage rate is one cent for 4 ounces, which must be prepaid by postage stamp.

Newspapers and periodicals weighing less than one ounce may be posted singly; if prepaid by postage stamp, one-half cent each.

Newspapers from Offices of Publication posted for City Delivery are not delivered by Letter Carrier unless prepaid one cent each by stamp.

Newspapers and periodicals published in the United Kingdom, and reported by News Agents to regular subscribers, are not liable to any additional postage.

PARCEL POST.

Parcels closed at the ends and sides, and not exceeding 5 lbs. in weight, may be posted at any Post Office in Canada for conveyance to any Post Office in the Dominion (with the exception noted below), at the following rates.

Not exceeding 4 ounces, 6 cents.

“ “ 8 do. 12 do.

For each additional 4 ounces or fraction thereof, 6 cents.

The size of the parcel must not exceed two feet in length, or one foot in breadth or thickness. The postage must be prepaid by stamps, and the parcel should be marked "PARCEL POST." Parcels may be registered by affixing a 5 cent Registration Stamp thereto, in addition to postage.

PARCEL POST FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.

Parcels securely and substantially packed and closed for the United Kingdom, limited in weight to 3 lbs., and in size, to 2 feet in length by one foot in width or depth, will be received at the wickets of the Enquiry Office, under conditions explained there to the senders, for transmission in the weekly mails despatched by Steamers of the Canadian Lines. Rate 25 cents per lb., or fraction of a pound.

MISCELLANEOUS POSTAL MATTER.

Books and pamphlets, printed circulars, prices current, handbills, book and newspaper manuscript, Printers proofs, maps and prints, engravings, sheet music, photographs, insurance policies, militia and school returns, seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, in Canada, Newfoundland and the United States, may be posted, prepaid by stamp at 1 cent per 4 ounces, provided they be sent in covers open at the ends or side, and so put up as to admit of the contents being, if necessary, easily withdrawn for examination; if enclosed with written communications, or in sealed envelopes notched at the end or sides, letter rate of postage will be charged.

The following are excluded from the reduced rate: Legal documents, stamps or forms of prepayment, whether obliterated or not, as well as all printed articles constituting the representative sign of monetary value.

Packages of miscellaneous matter are limited in size to 24 inches in length, and 12 inches in width and depth, and to the weight of 4 pounds for Newfoundland and Canada.

The limit of weight or book packages addressed to offices in the Dominion is 5 pounds.

Post Bands with an impressed 1 cent stamp for this purpose, may be obtained at any Stamp Agency, at the rate of four for 5 cents.

The term "printed circulars" is intended to include circulars produced by the electric pen or other mechanical process, easy of recognition by the officers of the Post Office, as well as when printed by the ordinary processes of printing type or lithography.

PATTERN AND SAMPLE POST FOR CANADA.

Patterns and Samples of merchandise, not exceeding 24 ounces in weight, when posted in Canada for places within Canada, must be prepaid by postage stamps at the rate of 1 cent per 4 ounces weight, and put up in such manner as to admit of inspection. Goods sent in execution of an order, however small the quantity may be, or articles sent by one private individual to another, not being actually Trade Patterns or Samples, are not admissible as such.

MISCELLANEOUS MATTER FOR THE UNITED STATES.

With the exceptions of Seeds, Cuttings, bulbs and roots, the rate of postage on miscellaneous matter for the United States, is 5 cents for the first 10 ounces and 1 cent for each additional 2 ounces, to be prepaid in postage stamps.

USEFUL HINTS.

Register all valuable letters, and use sealing wax for letters containing money.

Transmit money by Money Orders.

Make complaints and enquiries in writing.

Preserve and request correspondents to preserve envelopes of mis-sent or delayed letters.

Send to the Post Master envelopes of letters about which you seek information or makes complaint.

Business men should be careful to authorise but a limited number of persons to receive their letters, and only those in whom they have full confidence.

Please return promptly to the Post Master, or at the Enquiry Office, misdelivered letters or other mail matter.

A letter or packet once posted becomes the property of the person to whom addressed, and must be forwarded to its destination. On no application, however urgent, can it be delivered back to the writer. Business men are requested not to ask for the return of letters posted by mistake or otherwise.

Letters addressed to initials or to fictitious names cannot be delivered, but will be returned to the writer through the Dead Letter Office, unless the address contains a designated place of delivery; thus, a letter addressed to A.B., Post Office, Montreal, would be returned to the writer, but a letter addressed A.B., care of John Jones, box No. 781, or No. 1500 St. Catherine street, would be delivered at the address designated.

MONEY ORDER OFFICE.

In sending money by mail it is always best to transmit by Money Order, if possible. If sent by letter, it should always be registered.

(A. & B.) Limits of weight and size: 5 lbs. for the United Kingdom, and 4 lbs. for other countries, 18 inches in length and 12 inches in width or depth.

(C.) Limits of weight and size: 8 oz., 8 inches long, 4 inches wide and 2 inches deep. By exception, the limits to Belgium, France, Luxemburg and Greece, are 12 inches long and 4 inches deep.

When such value exceeds \$2,500, there shall be levied for every \$400 over the last-mentioned rate (\$175) an additional rate of \$17.50.

Tax on distilleries at the rate of \$80 for every \$400 rental of premises.

Tax on brewers at the rate of \$60 for every \$400 rental of premises.

Tax of \$120 on proprietors of theatres.

Tax on circuses, menageries, etc., \$100 for every day of performance, and compels owner of same to obtain license, with a proviso giving to the mayor authority to reduce such tax when exhibitions or performances are of minor character and importance.

Tax of \$200 on pawnbrokers, and to obtain a license at the City Hall.

Tax on pedlars at the rate of \$20 with a cart or other vehicle, and \$8 without such cart or vehicle.

Tax on junk dealers, \$5.00. Rag pickers, 25 cents for license. Statute labor money, \$1.00.

Tax of \$200 on ferry steamboats plying to the city from any place within nine miles distant therefrom.

For every 4 wheeled close carriage, drawn by 2 horses.. \$20.00

For every 4 wheeled half-covered carriage, drawn by 2 horses..... 12.00

For every 4 wheeled close or half-covered carriage, drawn by 1 horse..... 10.00

For every double dennet..... 8.00

For every gig, buggy, or other vehicle mounted on springs and drawn by 1 horse..... 6.00

For every waggon or other vehicle, not above specified, adapted for draught, drawn by 2 or more horses..... 8.00

For every 2 wheeled vehicle or carriage kept for hire by livery-stable keepers..... 3.00

For every 4 wheeled vehicle or carriage kept for hire by livery-stable keepers..... 4.00

" Provided that in all cases of rate-payers having two or more pleasure vehicles in their possession, they shall not be liable to pay the tax on more vehicles than they have horses to drive the same; the highest description of vehicles, however, to be assessed in preference to those of a lesser value."

Dogs—to be licensed annually at the office of the Chief of Police; amount of license,—\$2 for a male, and \$3 for a female dog.

Tariff of Rates.—To be collected annually by the Chief of Police for licenses issued to carters and others using hackney-carriages or vehicles for the conveyance of passengers, or the transport of goods, wares, merchandise, building materials, produce or other articles in the city of Montreal.

Tax on billiard tables, etc., as follows:—

When there is only one table..... \$25.00

When there are more than one table:

1. For the first six tables, each..... 25.00
2. For each and every additional table..... 15.00

(b) The said tax may be paid in two instalments, that is to say: on the first day of May and November every year, and shall be subject to a semi-annual license to be obtained through the Police Department. The Chief of Police, or his deputy, is authorized to issue and sign such license on payment of the tax aforesaid;

(c) All such licenses shall expire on the first day of May or November next after the issuing of the same (as the case may be) and may be renewed every six months on payment of one half the said tax;

(d) An annual tax of twenty dollars is imposed and shall be levied upon each and every billiard table kept and used by any private club in the said City;

(e) No person shall keep or use any billiard table as aforesaid without having previously paid the said tax according to the respective rates hereinbefore specified and (in the case of public billiard tables) without having obtained the said license:— Provided that private clubs established exclusively for the purpose of providing an innocent amusement for the youth and wherein the use of intoxicating liquors and playing at cards or other games, for money, are strictly prohibited, shall not be held liable to pay the said tax.

An annual tax is imposed and shall be levied upon each and every mississippi or pigeon hole table kept for public use in the said city at the following rates, viz:

When there is only one table..... \$50.00

When there are two or more tables:

1. For the first table..... 50.00
2. For each and every additional table..... 25.00

An annual tax of fifty dollars is imposed and shall be levied upon every ten-pin alley or other similar game kept for public use in the said city.

The words "ten-pin alley" in this section shall mean an establishment with one or more ten-pin alleys or other similar game.

The tax in both cases may be paid in two instalments, that is to say: on the first day of May and November every year, and shall be subject to a semi-annual license to be obtained through the Police Department. The Chief of Police, or his deputy, is authorized to issue and sign such license on payment of the tax.

All such licenses shall expire on the first day of May or November next after the issuing of the same (as the case may be) and may be renewed every six months on payment of one-half the tax.

No person shall keep any mississippi or pigeon hole table or ten-pin alley or other similar game, for public use as aforesaid, without having previously paid the tax according to the respective rates hereinbefore specified and without having obtained the said license.

TAXES COLLECTED BY CHIEF OF POLICE.

Hackney Carriages.—For a two-wheeled cab or calèche, one horse, \$8; for a four-wheeled carriage; one horse, \$10; for a four-wheeled carriage, two horses, \$14.50; for an omnibus or stage coach, two horses, \$21.50; for a street railway car, two horses, \$25.

Carts, Trucks and Waggon.—First Class includes all carts, trucks and waggons used as vehicles for hire. For a two-wheeled cart or truck, one horse, \$4.75; for a four-wheeled waggon, one horse, \$8.75; for a four-wheeled waggon, load under 4000 lbs., two horses, \$12.25; for a diable, two horses, \$9.25. Second Class includes all carts or waggons used by merchants, manufacturers, contractors, etc., for the purposes of trade. For a two-wheeled cart or truck, one horse, \$7.25, for a four-wheeled waggon, one horse, \$11.25; for a four-wheeled waggon, load under 4000 lbs., two horses, \$14.75. Third Class includes all carts or waggons used by expressmen, bakers, brewers, distillers, farmers, gardeners, milkmen, or undertakers. For a two-wheeled cart or truck, one horse, \$9.75; for a four-wheeled waggon, one horse, \$13.75; for a four-wheeled waggon, two horses, \$17.25; for a two-wheeled cart, for farmers, one horse, \$9.75; for a four-wheeled cart, for farmers, one horse, \$13.75.

Special.—Scavengers, \$4.75; milk vendors, two-wheeled vehicle, one horse, \$5.75; milk vendors, four-wheeled vehicle, one horse, \$9.75; milk vendors, no vehicle, \$1; chimney sweepers, \$7; wood corders, \$1; stamped measures for corders, 25 cents; pocket numbers for drivers, 25 cents; owners of dogs, male, \$2, female, \$3; hcarces, four-wheeled, one horse, \$10, hcarces, four-wheeled, two horses, \$14.50.

TARIFF OF FARES FOR HACKNEY CARRIAGES.

ONE HORSE VEHICLES—BY THE DRIVE.

Time Allowed, Fifteen Minutes.—For one or two persons, 25 cents; for three or four persons, 40 cents.

Time Allowed, Thirty Minutes.—For one or two persons, 40 cents; for three or four persons, 60 cents.

ONE HORSE VEHICLES—BY TIME.

For the First Hour.—For one or two persons, 75 cents; for three or four persons, \$1.00.

For Every Subsequent Hour.—For one or two persons, 60 cents; for three or four persons, 75 cents.

TWO HORSE VEHICLES—BY THE DRIVE.

Time Allowed, Fifteen Minutes.—For one or two persons, 50 cents; for three or four persons, 65 cents.

Time Allowed, Thirty Minutes.—For one or two persons, 65 cents; for three or four persons, 75 cents.

TWO HORSE VEHICLES—BY THE HOUR.

For one or two persons, \$1.00; for three or four persons, \$1.25.

Baggage.—For each trunk carried in any such vehicle, 10 cts.

No charge for travelling bags, valises, boxes or parcels which passengers can carry by the hand.

When the drive exceeds half an hour, hour rate to be charged, fractions of hours for any drive exceeding one hour shall be charged *pro rata* hour rates as above established for drives by the hour.

For drives between midnight and four o'clock in the morning, 50 per cent. shall be added to the tariff rates above established.

The tariff by time shall apply to all drives extending beyond the city limits, provided the engagement be made within said limits.

Children under five years of age, and sitting on their parent's or their guardian's lap, will be admitted free of charge, and shall not be held as being included in the word "persons" in the said tariff.

The word "drive," wherever it occurs in the tariff, shall be held to admit stoppage within the time fixed for said drive.

TARIFF OF CARTAGE.

From any place to any other in the First Division, or from any place (exclusive of the Harbour Wharves) to any other place in the city, and *vice versa*, provided the distance does not exceed three-quarters of a mile.

Articles not herein enumerated (of a convenient bulk) not over 1,500 lbs., 15 cts.; Ashes, Pot or Pearl, two barrels, 15 cts.; Beef, Pork or Fish, five barrels, or three tierces, 15 cts.; Coals or Coke, half a chaldron or half a ton, 15 cts.; Crockery, one crate or one hogshead, 15 cts.; Flour or Fruit, seven barrels, 15 cts.; Grain, not over 1,500 lbs. weight, 15 cts.; Lumber, Sawn, from yard to boat, 500 feet, board measure, 15 cts.; Salt or Rice, six bags or six barrels, 15 cts.; Firewood, dry, from boat yard, half a cord, three feet long, 15 cts.; Firewood, green or from

rafts, half cord, three feet long, 20 cts. ; Furniture or Luggage, per load, 20 cts. ; Lumber, green or hard, from rafts, 500 feet, board measure, 20 cts. ; Molasses, Sugar, or Oil, one puncheon, hogshead or load, 20 cts. ; Pig Iron, Lead, Copper, or Tin, one ton, 25 cts. ; Bar Iron or Steel, one ton, 30 cts.

From any of the Harbour Wharves to any place into the Second or Third Division, within half a mile distance of the boundary line of the First Division, and *vice versa*, or from any place (exclusive of the Wharves) to any other in the city, and *vice versa*, provided the distance does not exceed $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles, the rate shall be 10 cents extra.

For every additional half mile, 10 cents.

From any place in the Western Section of the Third Division, and *vice versa*, for one load : to the Stores and Wharves below Wellington Bridge, north side to Lachine Canal, 20 cts. ; the Stores and Wharves below Wellington Bridge, south side of Lachine Canal, 25 cts. ; the Basins above Wellington Bridge, north side of Lachine Canal, 25 cts. ; the Basins above Wellington Bridge, south side Lachine Canal, and the Stores, Stations, Factories, &c., at Point St. Charles, 35 cts. ; the Stores, Factories, &c., at and above St. Gabriel Locks, north of Lachine Canal, 30 cts. ; Bonaventure Railway Station, 20 cts. ; Bonaventure Railway Station, from the Lower Wharves of the Harbour, 25 cts.

From any place in the Eastern Section of the First Division, and *vice versa*, for one load, 5 cts. additional.

For any excess over the quantity or weight fixed for a load, additional *pro rata* rates shall be paid. If delay is caused to the carter by the employer beyond the time usually required for loading, the carter shall be paid *extra* for such delay, at the rate of 5 cts. for each quarter of an hour. If the carter is called, and there be no load for him, or if he be unable to load the goods or articles for want of assistance, he shall be paid as if he carried a load the distance thus unnecessarily travelled.

Divisions of the City.—The First Division comprises the East, Centre, and West Wards (including the south-west side of McGill Street and the north-west side of Craig Street), and shall be sub-divided into two sections (Eastern and Western), the line of demarcation between them being the centre of St. Lambert and St. Jean Baptiste Street.

The Second Division comprises the St. Ann, St. Antoine, and St. Lawrence Wards (exclusive of McGill and Craig Streets).

The Third Division comprises the St. Louis Ward (exclusive of Craig Street), the St. James and St. Mary's Wards.

MONTREAL WATER WORKS.

Extract from Bye-Laws Nos. 65, 66, 82, enacted 20th April, 1873.

Sec. 5. It is expressly forbidden to any occupant of a house or building or any part thereof, supplied with water from the said water works, to furnish water to others, or to use it otherwise than for his own use, or to increase the supply agreed for, or to waste it, or to practice any fraud upon the said Corporation with regard to the water so supplied.

Sec. 6. All persons taking the water shall keep the distribution pipe within their premises in good repair and protected from frost at their own expense, and they shall be held liable to the Corporation for all damages that may result from their failure to do so.

Sec. 7. No person shall fraudulently connect any pipe with the water pipes of the Corporation, or with any pipe, cistern, or apparatus connected therewith, or to or into which the water from the said water works shall flow or proceed; or shall fraudulently use or otherwise misappropriate the water supplied by the city, or knowingly permit the same to be fraudulently used or misappropriated.

Sec. 8. If any person supplied with water by the Corporation do or permit to be done, anything in contravention of this bye-law, or fail to do anything prescribed by this bye-law, the superintendent or his deputy may cut off the water supply, and cease to supply such person with water so long as the cause or complaint remains, or is not remedied.

Sec. 9. No person shall wrongfully cause or suffer any pipe, valve, cock, cistern, bath, soil-pan, water closet, or other apparatus or receptacle to be out of repair, or to be so used or contrived that the water supplied to him is, or likely to be wasted, misused, or unduly consumed.

Sec. 10. No alteration shall be made in any of the pipes or fixtures inserted by the city, except by its agents or officers.

Sec. 11. No person supplied with water from the said water works by meter shall be allowed to connect, or cause to be connected, any pipe or other fixture between the Corporation's service pipe and the meter.

Sec. 12. No person, unless duly authorised by the water committee, shall open any hydrant in the said city, or lift or remove the cover off, or draw water from the same.

Sec. 13. No person shall turn on or turn off the water in any manner, or interfere with any of the water pipes or valves belonging to the city without the license of the water committee or of the said superintendent.

Sec. 14. No person shall pass the railing enclosing the reservoir of the said city, or shall defile or deposit any filth or

offensive matter in the said reservoirs, or on the bank or ground adjacent thereto, belonging to the said city, or shall allow any dog or other animal to jump into the said reservoir, or upon the said bank or ground, or shall pass or remain upon the said bank or ground after ten o'clock in the evening; or shall do or cause anything to be done tending to defile or corrupt, to disturb or agitate the waters of the said reservoir.

Sec. 15. No person shall draw or use water from the River St. Lawrence, or elsewhere, for the purpose of selling the same, to any part of the city.

Sec. 16. No person shall draw or use water from the water works in the said city for private fountains, or for hand hose for watering purposes, or for building or manufacturing purposes, unless such person shall have previously obtained from the superintendent of the said works a written permission to that effect, and paid the respective rates charged in the subjoined tariff for the supply of water in such cases; and in no case shall said hose be used for sprinkling or watering the streets between 9 o'clock in the forenoon and 5 o'clock in the afternoon.

Sec. 17. No person shall use a hand hose of a larger size or nozzle than one-fourth of an inch orifice, or use any hand hose for the purpose of washing horses, coaches, omnibuses, or other vehicles.

Section 18. No meter shall be used for determining the quantity of water supplied by the said works, unless the same shall have been previously submitted to and approved by the said superintendent.

Sec. 19. The several rates enumerated and specified in the tariff contained in the subjoined schedule, shall be, and the same are hereby imposed for water to be supplied from the water works of the said city.

Sec. 20. The said rates shall be due and payable to the city treasurer, in advance, on the 15th day of August, every year, by the occupant or lessee, or occupants or lessees, of all buildings, part of buildings, or tenements in the said city, supplied with water from the said works, as well by those who shall consent as by those who shall refuse to receive the water pipe to supply the said water or to use the same.

Provided that in all cases of tenants or occupants of dwelling houses assessed on a yearly rental of one hundred and twenty dollars or under, the said rates shall be payable every year in two instalments, viz: on the fifteenth August and Fifteenth November.

Sec. 21. All charges for specific supplies, or for fractional parts of the year, shall be payable in advance and before the water is let on.

Sec. 22. In buildings occupied as offices, where there are water closets in the building, each tenant of an office, or suite of offices, will be charged, in addition to the tariff rate, a water closet tax.

Sec. 23. A discount of five per cent shall be allowed to all

water tenants who will pay in one instalment the whole of the said rates on or before the fifteenth August in each and every year.

Sec. 24. In all cases of non-payment of the rates imposed by the present by-law, for thirty days after the same are due, the said Council, or any duly authorized officer charged with the management of said works, may cut off the supply of water from any building upon which the said rates shall be due, or from any one in default to pay the said rates, which shall not prevent the said rates from running as before, and the water shall not be let on for the use of any such defaulter, except upon payment of all arrears due.

Sec. 25. Any person offending against any of the provisions of this by-law, or of the said tariff, shall, for each and every such infraction, be liable to a fine not exceeding twenty dollars and costs of prosecution, and in default of immediate payment of the said fine and costs, to an imprisonment in the common gaol for a period not to exceed two months, the said imprisonment to cease upon payment of the said fine and costs.

WATER TARIFF.

DWELLING HOUSES.

For every tenement or dwelling house occupied by one family only:

- 1. When assessed at an amount not exceeding \$30 per annum..... \$5.00
 - 2. When assessed at an amount exceeding \$30, but not over \$40 5.75
 - 3. When assessed at an amount exceeding \$40 but not \$50, 6.50
- And so on, continuing according to the same scale, that is to say, adding for every additional sum of \$10, or any part thereof..... .75

For every additional family lodging in or occupying any part of such tenement or dwelling-house, an additional rate shall be exacted equal to one-third of the rate imposed for a single family.

STORES, SHOPS, OFFICES, &c.

For each house, part of a house or tenement, occupied as a store, shop, office, warehouse, manufactory, or other place of business:

- 1. When assessed at an amount not exceeding \$50 per annum..... \$4.00
- 2. When assessed at an amount exceeding \$50 but not over \$75 5.00
- 3. When assessed at an amount exceeding \$75 but not over \$100 6.00

And so on, continuing according to the same scale, that is to say, adding for every additional sum of \$25 or any part thereof..... 1.00

Stores, shops, offices, and other places of business, when attached to a dwelling occupied by the same party, to be charged at dwelling-house rates on the full rental of the whole tenements when such rental does not exceed \$100 per annum.

SCHOOLS, CHURCHES, HOSPITALS, &c.

Every building used as a college, academy, seminary of learning or school, all churches, poor or almshouses, nunneries, houses of industry, and generally all religious or charitable institutions, hospitals or reformatories, shall be charged at shop rates, to be based and determined upon the interest at 4 per cent of the actual value of the property in such case, the said value as set forth and established in and by the assessment roll last made and revised. Provided that all such institutions, with the exception of churches, may, if they see fit, use water by meter, and pay therefor, at the same rate as distilleries, breweries and other establishments hereinafter mentioned.

Charitable institutions, wholly supported by means of public subscriptions, shall be charged at the rate of one and one-half cents per hundred gallons.

HOTELS AND TAVERNS.

- For every hotel or tavern : per annum.
1. When assessed at an amount not exceeding \$100 per annum \$12.00
 2. When assessed at an amount exceeding \$100, but not over \$150 17.00
 3. When assessed at an amount exceeding \$150, but not over \$200 22.00
- And so on, continuing according to the same scale, that is to say, adding for every additional sum of \$50, or any part thereof 5.00

Hotels whose assessed rental per annum will be \$400 or over, and containing at least twenty furnished bedrooms for the accommodation of travellers, shall take water by meter, and be charged therefor at the same rate as distilleries, breweries, etc.

HAND HOSE. per annum.

For the right to attach and use a hose of not more than one-fourth of an inch orifice, for watering purposes \$2.00

BUILDING MATERIALS.

- For every thousand bricks, the water therefor to be charged (payable in advance) 0.06
- For every toise of masonry, the water therefor to be charged (payable in advance) 0.06
- For every thousand yards of plastering (payable in advance) 4.00

FOUNTAINS.

Fountains shall only be supplied with water at the discretion of the water committee, and when so supplied shall be charged as follows :

For every one hundred gallons of water 0.03
 The quantity used to be determined in all cases by the estimate of the water committee, or by meter.

BATHS.

Public baths, or baths for the use of which a charge is made by the occupants—for each tub.....\$3.00
 With power to the water committee to charge by meter if they see fit.

HORSES AND COWS.

A uniform rate shall be charged for horses and cows, as follows :

For each horseper annum \$2.00
 For each cow..... 1.00
 Livery Stable Keepers shall pay for each single stall, whether occupied or not..... 1.00

WATER CLOSETS.

per annum.

For each Pan Closet supplied from a cistern, with a service box and valve.....\$4.00
 For each Pan Closet with Underhayes, or any other regulator approved of by the Water Department..... 3.00
 For each Hopper Closet with Underhayes, or any other regulator approved of by the Water Department..... 3.00
 For each Closet of any kind, with cistern, service box, and double valve... 4.00
 Trough Closets, for each seat, or for every two lineal feet.. 3.00
 For any other kind of Closet, each..... 15.00

One additional Water Closet will be charged at half rates for each dwelling where there is more than one water closet.

In dwelling houses or tenements assessed on a yearly rental of one hundred and fifty dollars or under, no charge shall be made for water closets: provided that the exemption thus granted shall not be held as depriving the City from the right to cut off the supply of water in all cases of non-payment of the ordinary annual water rates.

URINALS.

For each Urinal with self-acting valve, or cock, running only when used :

per annum.

In a Dwelling House or Store.....\$ 1.00
 In a Bank or Public Building 1.50
 In a Hotel, Restaurant, Saloon, or Tavern 3.00
 For any other kinds of Urinals..... 15.00

STEAM ENGINES.

For stationary high pressure engines, working not over twelve hours per day:

	per annum.
For each horse power.....	\$7.00
Or for every hundred gallons of water (the supply to be determined by meter).....	0.03

For stationary low pressure engines:
 For every 100 gallons of water (the supply to be determined as above by meter)..... 0.03

All rates herein imposed for Steam Engines shall be separate from and over and above any other rate for water imposed on the premises.

DISTILLERIES, BREWERIES, Etc.

Distilleries, Breweries, Dye Houses, Railway, Printing, or Photographic Establishments, and all Manufacturing Establishments, Colleges, Seminaries, Nunneries, and Hospitals may be supplied by meter and charged as follows:

When the quantity used averages 1,000 gallons per day or less, at the rate of 30 cents per 1,000 gallons; when the quantity used averages from 1,000 to 2,000 gallons per day, at the rate of 20 cents per 1,000 gallons.

From 1,000 to 3,000..28 cents.	From 6,000 to 7,000..21 cents.
" 3,000 to 4,000 .27 "	" 7,000 to 8,000 .19 "
" 4,000 to 5,000..25 "	" 8,000 to 9,000..17 "
" 5,000 to 6,000..23 "	" 9,000 to 10,000..15 "

When the quantity averages over 10,000 gallons per day, 15 cents per 1,000 gallons.

METERS.

The meters shall be furnished by the city and placed within the premises of the consumer, whose duty it shall be to see that the same are protected from frost or injury, the whole under the direction of the Water Department. Such meters shall at all times be acceptable to the Corporation Meter Inspector.

An annual rent shall be paid by the consumers for the cost and care of such meters, as follows:

For a 1/4 inch meter.....	per annum.
" 1/2 " ".....	\$ 3.00
" 1 " ".....	3.75
" 1 1/2 " ".....	4.50
" 2 " ".....	8.00

The rent to be paid semi-annually, that is to say: One-half on the first day of May, and the other half on the first of November in each year.

If the meter gets out of order and fails to register, the consumer will be charged at the average daily consumption previously registered by such meter, and for the purpose of average the year shall be deemed to be 300 days.

Persons desiring to supply their own meter may do so with the previous sanction and written permit of the Superintendent of the Water Works.

When water is required for purposes not specified in the foregoing tariff, the rate shall be fixed by the Water Committee.

The Water Committee shall have power to ascertain by meter the quantity of water used in any of the above cases and charge accordingly.

Bye-Law concerning the Qualifications of Persons in Charge of Steam Engines and Boilers.

Passed 8th July, 1885, taking effect January 1st, 1886.

Sec. 1. No person shall take charge of the working and handling of a stationary, semi-portable, or portable steam engine or boiler, either as engineer or fireman, who is not twenty-one years of age or over, and has not obtained a license as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 2. It shall be unlawful for the owner of any such steam engine or boiler to employ for the working and handling thereof, under steam pressure, any person who is not licensed as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 3. Any person claiming to be qualified to take charge of the working or handling of a stationary, semi-portable, or portable steam engine or boiler, as engineer or fireman, shall apply to the Inspector of Boilers, who shall examine the applicant, and the proofs he produces in support of his claim; and if, upon full consideration, the Inspector is satisfied that his character, habits of life, knowledge and experience of the duties he has to perform are such as to authorise the belief that he is a suitable and safe person to be entrusted with the powers and duties of such a position, the Inspector shall give him a license to that effect, signed by him, and in which he shall assign the appropriate class to which the candidate is entitled as hereinafter specified; provided, it shall not be competent for the Inspector to refuse any such license for bad character and habits of life, before his decision shall have been previously reported to and confirmed by the Fire Committee.

Sec. 4. For the purpose of this Bye-Law there shall be four classes of persons entitled to take charge of a steam engine or boiler:

- (a) The first-class shall be engineers qualified to take charge of any steam engine or boiler.
- (b) The second-class shall be engineers qualified to take charge of any steam engine or boiler not exceeding twenty nominal horse-power, calculated as per annexed schedule.

- (c) The third-class shall be engineers qualified to take charge of any steam engine or steam boiler not exceeding ten nominal horse-power.
- (d) The fourth-class shall be firemen qualified to take charge of any boiler used for heating, boiling, or drying purposes; they may, however, take charge of a steam boiler used for motive power, when under the immediate supervision of an engineer of the first, second, or third-class.

Sec. 5. The licenses, issued as aforesaid, shall expire on the first day of May next after the date thereof, and shall be renewed every year.

Sec. 6. The Inspector shall be entitled to demand and receive annually from each applicant as aforesaid, the following fees, viz:—

- 1. For first-class engineers \$2.00
- 2. For second-class engineers..... 1.00
- 3. For third-class engineers50
- 4. For firemen25

The Inspector shall also be entitled to demand and receive from each applicant an entrance fee of 50 cents, to be returned to the applicant if he be successful in his examination.

Sec. 7. Any license granted as aforesaid may be revoked by the Inspector upon proof of negligence, unskillfulness, or drunkenness.

Sec. 8. In his examination of persons claiming to be qualified as aforesaid, the Inspector shall be guided, as far as possible, by the rules laid down in the annexed schedule.

Sec. 9. Any engineer or fireman who may feel aggrieved by any act or order of said Inspector may, within one month thereafter, appeal from his decision to the Fire Committee, who may confirm, modify, or disallow such decision.

Sec. 10. The Inspector shall make regular weekly payments to the City Treasurer of all monies received by him for and on behalf of the city under the provisions of this Bye-Law.

Sec. 11. He shall, at the end of every year, report to the Fire Committee, giving full particulars of the work performed and the amounts received by him as such Inspector.

Sec. 12. The Fire Committee shall have full power to regulate the time when, and the manner in which, the examinations shall be held in accordance with the provisions of this Bye-Law, and may, at their discretion, appoint assistant examiners to act conjointly with the Inspector.

Sec. 13. The term "Inspector," wherever it occurs in this Bye-Law, shall mean the Inspector of Boilers appointed by the said council.

Sec. 14. Every person offending against any of the provisions of this Bye-Law shall be liable to a fine with costs or an imprisonment, or to a fine, and in default of immediate payment of said fine and costs, to an imprisonment, the amount of said fine and the term of said imprisonment to be fixed by the Recorder's Court, at its discretion, but such fine shall not exceed forty

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dollars, and the imprisonment shall not be for a longer period than two calendar months, the said imprisonment to cease however, at any time before the expiration of the term fixed by the Recorder's Court upon the payment of said fine and costs; and the said offender shall be liable to the same penalties for each and every day that such violation or contravention shall last, which shall be held to be a distinct and separate offence for each and every day as aforesaid.

Sec. 19. This Bye-Law shall come into force on the first day of January, 1886.

MILITIA DEPARTMENT.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.

The three Militia Districts into which the Province of Quebec is divided are sub-divided into 68 Regimental Divisions, comprised within eight Brigade Divisions.

The boundaries of such Regimental Divisions are identical with the Electoral Divisions into which the Province of Quebec is divided, with the following exceptions, viz. : Montreal Centre forms two Regimental Divisions, known as First and Second Montreal Centre ; the First Division comprising the East Ward, and the Second Division comprising the Centre and West Wards.

Chateauguay forms two Regimental Divisions, known as First and second Chateauguay. The First Division comprises the Parishes of St. Philomene, Chateauguay, St. Martin, St. Urban, and the Second Division comprises the portion of the County not included in the First Division.

The Counties of Richmond, Wolf, Drummond, Arthabaska, Chcioutimi and Saguenay, each form a Regimental Division.

The Brigade Divisions are numbered from West to East, from One to Eight, and embrace the following Regimental Divisions for each respectively.

Fees 2 cents per barrel and 1 cent per bag of 100 lbs., 1½ cents per bag of 140 lbs., 2 cents per bag of upward of 140 lbs., for inspecting and branding exclusive of cooerage, "when any less quantity than 100 barrels of flour offered for inspection, the inspector shall be entitled to receive the full fees that would accrue to him on 100 barrels. When the inspector deems it necessary to verify the weight of flour given to him for inspection, and if said lot of flour is short weight, he is then entitled to an extra 2 cents per barrel, and sees that said short weight barrels are filled up before being branded.

Beef and Pork.—J. Doheny, Government Inspector, 185 Grand Trunk street. "For each inspection and branding, the inspector shall be entitled to receive, of and from the person submitting the same for inspection, for each and every barrel and half barrel, tierce or half tierce of beef or pork so inspected, salted, packed, pickled and branded, 25 cts. for each barrel, 15 cts. for each half barrel, 35 cts. for each tierce, and 15 cts. for each half tierce, exclusive of cooerage, and repairs shall not exceed 15 cts. per barrel, tierce or half tierce; in consideration of which charges all barrels or half barrels, tierce or half tierces shall be delivered in good shipping order."

POST CARDS.

Mailed from office of publication to subscribers or agents in Canada and the United States, are transmitted free. Transient newspapers within the Dominion, or to the United States 1 ct. for every 4 oz. to Newfoundland or the United Kingdom 1 ct. for every 2 oz., and on specimen newspapers 1 ct. per lb. or fraction of a lb.

Periodicals and Books for the United Kingdom and European Countries and the United States, 1 ct. per 2 oz. or fraction thereof the limit weight for a single packet is 5 lbs.

Newspapers, Manuscript, printers proof sheets, corrected or not, maps, prints, drawings, engravings, lithographs, photographs, sheet music, documents partly written and partly printed not being letters or intended to serve the purpose of letters, such as deeds, insurance policies, militia and school returns, or other documents of a like nature, and on all matter not otherwise provided for, 1ct. per 2 oz., or fraction of 2 oz.

PARCEL POST.

Closed parcels. For Dominion only, 6 cents per 4 oz. limited to 5 lbs. in weight and 2 feet in length or one foot in breadth or thickness, and should be marked "by Parcel Post."

Parcels for the United Kingdom must not exceed 5 lbs. in weight or 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth, must be securely packed and plainly directed and a customs declaration of the contents and value must be filed in at the post office by the sender.

As parcels from the United Kingdom will be liable to Canadian Customs duties, they must be examined by an officer of the Customs.

Rates 25 cents per lb. or fraction of a pound.

5th CLASS MATTER.

Miscellaneous articles of merchandise, and generally transmissible by mail in Canada and not of the nature of a letter, and not entitled to be posted at a lower rate than 5th class under one of the other classes, when addressed to Canada or U.S. and under 5lbs. in weight, 1 ct. per oz. or fraction of an oz.

THE RIGHT HONORABLE FREDERICK ARTHUR STANLEY, BARON OF PRESTON, 1st Baron, P.C., second son of 14th Earl of Derby, K.G., born January 15th, 1841; educated at Eton; formerly Captain, Grenadier Guards; is Honorary Colonel, 3rd and 4th Battalions King's Own (Royal Lancaster Regiment); a Supernumerary A.D.C. to her Majesty, and a J.P. for Lancashire and Westmoreland; was Civil Lord of the Admiralty, August to November, 1868; Financial Secretary to War Office, 1874-7; Secretary to Treasury, 1877-8; Secretary of State for War, 1878-80, Secretary of State for Colonies, 1885-86, and President of Board of Trade, 1886-8, since when he has been Governor-General of Canada and Commander-in-Chief. Sat as M.P. for Preston (C), 1866-8, for North Lancashire, 1868-85, and for Blackpool Division of Lancashire, 1885-6. Created Baron Stanley of Preston (Peerage of United Kingdom), 1885-6. Married, 1864, Lady Constance, eldest daughter of 4th Earl of Clarendon. Appointed 1st of May, sworn in 11th of June, 1888.
