THE TIDE IN THE TIDE.

Is the Parliament of Canada about to take a great forward step toward public ownership—public ownership of a transcontinental system, from ocean to ocean, of over ten thousand miles in length, connecting up Vancouver, Edmonton, Calgary, Winnipeg, Port Arthur, North Bay, Toronto, Ottawa, Montreal, Quebec, Moncton, St. John, Halifax, etc.; going thru every province in more or less detail, save Ontario west of Toronto, and giving the first and only approach to the Peace River country in the great new west? That is what The World is ready to believe, until it be otherwise shown that it is not, the logical and necessary outcome of the proposal now before parliament in connection with the Canadian Northern.

The nation now owns the Intercolonial Railway from Halifax to Montreal, and we are to get 40 per cent. of the stock of the reorganized Canadian Northern and all its allied companies for a guarantee of \$45,000,000 worth of bonds that will enable the company to complete the road from Quebec to the Pacific. Their two lines will make a transcontinental system.

It is true we start as only a forty-per-cent. partner; but we are thus put on the way to get control, and nothing can stop us getting control the moment the people declare for it.

Not even the warmest advocate of public ownership had hoped a year ago for such a possibility, such a probability, nay such a certainty coming in sight. And yet it is here today. Great movements are slow to get under way, but once under way, no power can stop them.

And the human instrument whereby this new movement is to be realized in Canada would appear to be the men least of all expected, Sir William Mackenzie and Sir Donald Mann. The World can sufficiently dispense the situation to say that once the road is completed a year hence, these men who have the 60 per cent. will be willing to sell out their control for a reasonable price. The system, we believe, is worth more than its cost, and more than what it is valued at in the statements now before parliament.

In every great movement of this kind, it is the facts as they are that have to be dealt with. Ideal conditions never did exist, and yet all great advances are built on existing situations and the facts, disagreeable or otherwise, which created them.

The Mackenzie and Mann organization may constitute the absolutely essential facts to public ownership at so early a date—not the stumbling block thereto, as some would think. At all events, press and people, parliament and government, must deal with existing facts and the best of a situation must be realized therefrom. The wisest statesman is not he who imagines that he can realise his ideals by a wave of the hand, but he who seeks to approach his ideals, or the ideals of others, by taking advantage of things as they are and who steps ahead on each occasion, whenever he may.

The mistakes of our past in railroad building were many and grievous; but without such errors we would not be disciplined into the course that will lead us back to the path of safety. It is comparatively idle to berate the men and acts of the past; but it is our duty to try, and to do our best possible, to get back on the right road.

The day is dawning in Canada for the public ownership of our great public services and things are about to move in a surprising way in that direction.

From this time on, our public money, and public credit, and public franchises are to be kept for the people, not given away to private corporations or individuals, and by one method and another, by a step here and a step there, are to get back again that with which we parted foolishly.

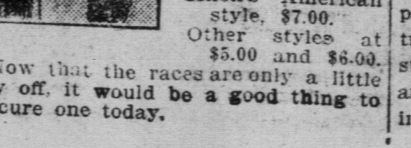
HUERTA CLINGING TO POWER DESPERATELY

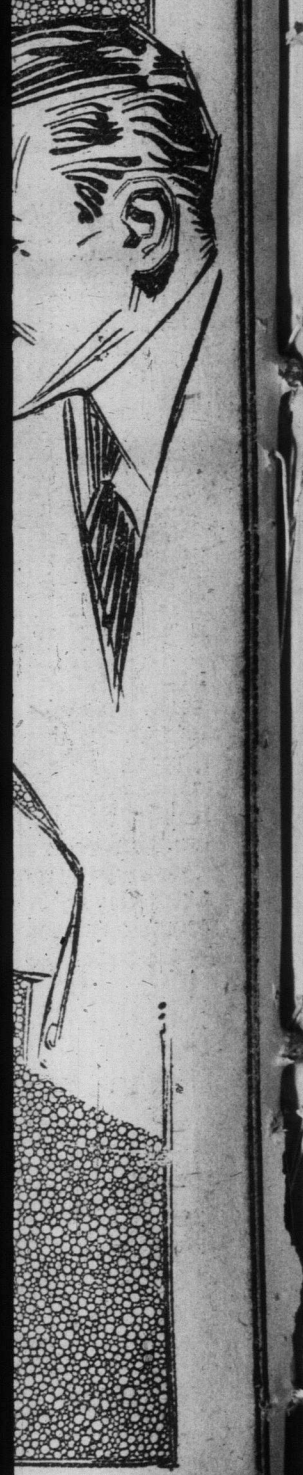

SIMPSON SPEAKS AT EARLS COURT

Addressed Hillcrest Association on Civic Issues Last Night.

WOULD INCREASE WAGE

Claimed That Twenty-Five Cents Per Hour Should Be Minimum.

Addressing the Hillcrest Ratepayers' Association last night on "Pressing Civic Problems," Controller James Simpson said with regard to Toronto for Hillcrest and Earlscourt that he would ask the council not to sell the four acres at the corner of St. Clair and Bathurst street...

Improved Accounting. Mr. Simpson then referred to the good work done by the civic survey in improving accounting system. By the unit method which he had advocated it was now possible to see at a glance the profit and loss in any department of the city's work.

With regard to the water supply he was confident that after the water-works were being operated on a sound financial basis Toronto people would get their water cheaper than the citizens of any other city on the North American continent.

At the close of Mr. Simpson's address a resolution was carried asking the board of control not to sell the four acres at the corner of St. Clair and Bathurst for sale until the Gage property or some other suitable site for a park had been secured.

EAST TORONTO—DEATH OF WILLIAM WORRELL

Founder of the Toronto Conservative Club—Sewer Work Delayed.

After a week's illness of pneumonia, William Worrell, one of the best-known residents of east Toronto, died yesterday morning at his residence, 21 Langley avenue. Mr. Worrell, who was 51 years of age, was prominent as the founder of the Toronto Conservative Club and was a member of ward one executive for many years.

Sewer work in East Toronto is progressing slowly on account of the pressure of so much work in the neighborhood. Operations on Main street are being conducted in the vicinity of Gerrard street, and it is expected that the work will be completed in about four months' time.

N. TORONTO—OPENING OF NEW POSTOFFICE

Station K at Eglinton—Big Meeting Tonight to Discuss Transportation.

George Ross, general superintendent of postoffices, has announced that he will open the new postoffice station K at Eglinton this (Saturday) afternoon at 2 o'clock. Mr. Ross has been invited to take part in the opening.

Transportation Question. The fight for improved transportation is likely to be renewed with increased vigor by residents north of the best line railway. The question of sewerage question has been disposed of for the present. With the air traffic railway project being discussed, Toronto people have been awaiting events, but now it seems that patience is at an end and a meeting will be held this evening in the old town hall to try to decide what is the best method to take towards getting a satisfactory sewerage system.

MOUNT DENNIS WANTS POSTMAN AND DENTIST

Everything Ready For Mail Delivery Now—Streets Are Numbered.

The trustees of school section No. 28 of York Township have decided that a new school is one necessary for the southeastern part of the section, and the secretary, J. Marshall, will call a meeting of the ratepayers for the evening of the 20th inst. for the purpose of sanctioning the expenditure involved—approximately \$28,000. This will make the third school in the section. The second school, three rooms of which have been occupied since Easter, is only now ready for completion. It is proposed that the new school should be a four-room one, but that it be designed in such a way that additions can be made as the needs of the district demand.

Big Increase. The quick growth of Mount Dennis is responsible for this activity in school building. Mr. Marshall is confident that the present year will see an accession of population of nearly 3000. F. Goddard & Co. report the sale of a parcel of land on the east side of road, next to Mount Dennis postoffice, at the price of \$60 per foot, and they report also that they have just sold two solid brick houses, which are not yet completed. There is not a house in Mount Dennis for rent, this firm says, and houses are being sold long before completion. Real estate business is increasing at a most favorable rate.

Ready for Postman. The citizens of Mount Dennis are complaining that the postal delivery system, promised for the beginning of May, has not yet come into force. Streets have been renamed, houses have been numbered. "All is ready now," say the residents. "Where is the postman?" Besides the lack of postal delivery in Mount Dennis, the citizens regret the fact that there is no dentist within reasonable distance.

CEDEVALE—NEW SCHOOL COST EIGHTY THOUSAND

There was a large attendance at a meeting of ratepayers held in the Palmer Avenue School for the purpose of obtaining a school site and arranging for a permanent school building. The reports read showed the remarkable increase in the population of the district during the past year, and it was stated that only six teachers were engaged for the 323 pupils which the school had on the school day. From the large number of children who have been seeking admission to the school of late, it was estimated that two further temporary buildings would be necessary in the near future.

After a good deal of discussion it was decided to issue debentures for the amount of \$80,000 to cover the additional property purchased and the erection of ten-roomed school.

ISSUE INJUNCTION TO STOP SMELLS

Mayor Tells Ward Seven Ratepayers That M.O.H. Will Act.

TRANSPORTATION TOPIC

Claims That Legislature Supported Minority in By-law Bill.

"I want to say that I have been connected with the government of the city since 1891, and there has never been a better proposition submitted to the people of Toronto than that of the Toronto Street Railway and Electric Light Companies," said Mayor Hocken yesterday morning at a meeting of the Toronto Street Railway and Electric Light Companies' board of directors. He said that he was not in favor of the bill which the legislature passed last night, and that the price we propose paying is one which in seven years you would see was most reasonable.

"We had thought," went on the mayor, "to have been able to construct a line on Bloor street this year, but the Ontario legislature has taken the matter out of our hands, and it is now quite impossible for us to submit the bill until next January. We intend to submit by-law for the purchase at that time and it would be therefore January, 1916, before such a by-law could be submitted. Even if we could submit a double-barrelled by-law coupling both propositions, it would be the middle of next year at the earliest before such a line could be constructed."

Commissioner's Report. "The works commissioner has given us the following information regarding Bloor street: At present a pavement can be laid from Dundas to Keele street, and also a line of street railway. From Keele to High Park sewer construction is still under way, and it will not be advisable to lay a sewer for some time. A year should elapse before a pavement is constructed on newly filled ground. The bill on Bloor street near Clendenen avenue will be submitted and completed by the end of this year to enable traffic to use the street."

"The mayor strongly criticized the provincial legislature for passing the Gooderham bill. 'These men,' said he, 'took the side of the minority in a purely municipal issue and have prevented us from giving you the relief in transportation you need.'"

Smell Nuisance. "And now regarding the smell nuisance. The medical officers of health have been unable to act before because he could not ascertain whether things were being done which should not be done. He has, however, through his inspectors, recently found out things which have been done, and he has been confirmed in his opinion by the officials of the provincial board of health. As a result, he informed me today that he is immediately applying for an injunction to close up the abattoirs in the northern part of the city, which are pouring out and obnoxious effluent into your sewers. I hope that within a very short time there will be no more of these offensive odors of which you have been justly complaining."

Short Term Difficulty. E. O. Henderson: "The mayor has painted a gloomy picture of the scheme which is most dear to the hearts of ward seven ratepayers, and that is the construction of a line on Bloor street. I don't think that the purchase of the Toronto Railway will affect the construction of such a line, but it offers an opportunity to provide for that Bloor street extension. 'The purchase would settle this question, since the city would then immediately build the line which a branch of the unified system.' 'If the city were to construct the Bloor street line, would the street railway operate here?'"

"I don't think," he replied, "that the fares anyway on their regular line would be affected. We would pay the fares anyway on their regular line and it wouldn't pay them." Mr. Weir asked for some assurance from the mayor that the Bloor line would be commenced next year.

Should the purchase be defeated, replied the mayor, "it will be an easy matter to have the cost, which will only amount to about \$150,000, in the estimates for that year. This city will not commit next year's council and therefore cannot promise the money."

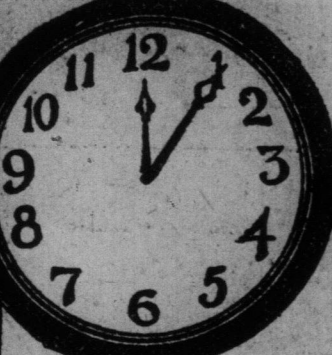

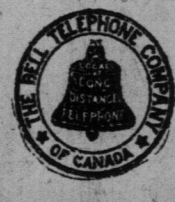

COUNTESS WAS AGAIN HONORED

International Council of Women Almost Unanimous in Approving Re-Election.

Canadian Press Despatch. ROMÉ, May 8.—The Countess of Aberdeen today re-elected president of the International Council of Women. Her re-election was almost unanimous. The countess will hold office for five years. Mrs. May Wright Sewall of Eliot, Maine, was re-elected honorary president. Among the other officers chosen to-day are: Mrs. Jules Siegfried, France, first vice-president; Mrs. Henni Forchhammer, Denmark, second vice-president; Mrs. Henry Dobson, Tasmania, president; Mrs. Fraulein Dr. Van Dorp, Holland, laws concerning the legal position of women; Mme. Avril Sainte-Croix, France, equal moral standards and traffic in women; Mme. Girard Mangin, France, public health; Mrs. Ogilvie Gordon, Scotland, education; the Countess Danieli Canozzi, Italy, emigration and immigration. When the announcement of her re-election was made, the Countess of Aberdeen delivered an address to the assembly. She said she had hoped a woman of another nationality would relieve her of the responsibilities of the office president of the council. The members of her family, she added, desired her to abandon the trying position and she had only consented to be a candidate for re-election when she was unanimously requested to do so.

ORDERS GIVEN BY SEELY TO PAGET

Ex-Minister for War Gives Further Light on Curragh Affair.

Canadian Associated Press Cable. LONDON, May 8.—The late war secretary, Col. Seely, publishes his record of the verbal instructions to General Paget regarding officers serving against Ulster in an official paper to-day. Seely says that "at a conference at the war office, Gen. Paget strongly urged that in the few exceptional cases where officers have direct family connections with the disturbed area in Ulster, so that in the event of a serious trouble arising their future private relations might be irretrievably compromised if they were permitted to remain behind, either on leave or on furlough, they should be ordered to return to the front." FOUR NEW TRAINS ON C. P. R. SYSTEM

Chicago - Toronto - Montreal Run Cut by Several Hours.

NEW WESTERN SERVICE

Company Will Also Run Extra Trains to Ottawa, London and Montreal.

A cut of several hours in the time between Toronto and Chicago, and the operation of a solid day-luxury train, including observation, compartment-library car and electric lighted sleeping car is announced by the Canadian Pacific Railway, following the agreement just completed with the Michigan Central Railway, the new service to be inaugurated May 31. The Canadian Pacific also comes out with the announcement of three other new trains to be placed in operation. This will be by the placing of an additional express train between Toronto and Montreal, another train between Toronto and London, and the opening of a service to the west coast of Ontario via the new lake shore line. This means that in spite of the fact that two of the leading railways of the United States, the Pennsylvania and the New York Central, have cancelled and hundreds of trains each during the past month, the Canadian road is about to add four more trains to the system. The end of the month is also to see a resumption of the two-train daily service between Toronto and Winnipeg and Vancouver. A change in train for the west coast compared with that operated last fall. The new train will leave here at 5:40 p.m., and will be run as a solid vestibule, electric lighted, observation compartment and sleeping car train. The new train to be operated between Montreal, Toronto and Chicago is to leave Montreal at 8:45 a.m., arrive Toronto 5:40 p.m., leave Toronto 6:10 p.m., arrive London 9:15 p.m., leave London 9:23 p.m., arrive the M. C. Tunnel Station at 12:10, arriving Detroit 11:35 central time, and Chicago 7:40 a.m. following morning, making but one night on the road between Montreal and Chicago, using the C.P.R. tunnel and railway from Windsor to Chicago. Passengers to Detroit will go into the new Michigan Central depot at Detroit. On the return trip the train will leave Chicago, M. C. depot 8:30 a.m., arrive Toronto 11:20, depart 11:40, arrive Montreal following morning 9:00 a.m.

Canadian-American. The east coast limited train over the M. C. and Canadian Pacific will be known as No. 20, "The Canadian West bound" will be known as No. 19, "The American." To perform the above fast train service the Canadian Pacific will run an additional express train between Toronto and Montreal, to be known as No. 35, to leave Toronto at 9:20 a.m., and No. 36, to arrive Toronto from Montreal at 6:45 p.m., will do all the local work, thus permitting the new train limited in each direction, making but a few stops at the most important places. They will also put on an additional train between Toronto and London, to leave Toronto at 7:00 a.m., arrive London 10:40 a.m., returning, leave London at 6:00 p.m., arriving Toronto 10:00 p.m. Also commencing May 31, a limited train service will be inaugurated between Toronto, and Vancouver, to be known as No. 3, to leave Toronto at 5:40 p.m.

Toronto-Ottawa. In addition to the above, a service will be performed between Toronto and Ottawa via the lake shore line, to leave Toronto at 8:05 a.m., arriving Ottawa early afternoon. The return train will leave Ottawa in the morning and arrive Toronto about 6:50 p.m. This will make a service to and from Ottawa via the lake route as well as via the present main line via Peterborough, in addition to a local service to leave Belleville 7:00 a.m., arrive Toronto about 11:00 a.m., returning, leave Toronto 6:30 p.m., arrive Belleville 10:30 p.m.

A new service between Port McNicoll and Toronto will be inaugurated on May 31, to leave Port McNicoll at 6:00 a.m., arrive Toronto 11:00 a.m., leave Toronto 5:00 p.m., arrive Port McNicoll 10:40 p.m. There will also be a new double daily service operated between Bobcaygeon and Peterborough. The present service between Toronto and Goderich will be considerably shortened on account of operating solid trains between Toronto and Goderich, instead of making transfers at South Junction. The Toronto-Owen Sound service will also be improved in the running time. Train No. 631 between Toronto and London that has formerly been leaving here at 2:15 p.m., will be set back to 2 p.m. in order to give western Ontario people coming into Toronto, a late service out and allow them to spend more time here.

RAILWAY BOARD SUSTAINS ORDER

Dismisses Application of Essex Terminal Railway to Share as Carrier.

Canadian Press Despatch. OTTAWA, May 8.—In a judgment handed down today by H. L. Drayton, chairman of the railway commission, and concurred in by the other members of the board, the application of the Essex Terminal Railway objecting to the order of the board made some time ago, removing the company from participating as a carrier in tariffs and supplements applicable to international traffic, is dismissed. 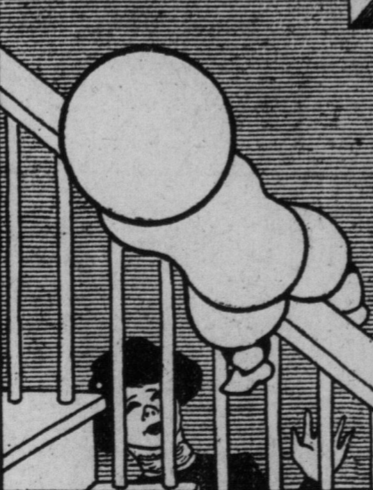

A SUCCESSFUL MUNICIPAL ENTERPRISE. In the course of the propaganda carried on by franchise-holding companies, for the purpose of dissuading the principles of state and municipal ownership and control of public services, it has not infrequently been represented that the credit of Australia and New Zealand has suffered because of their advanced legislation.

Adelaide, the capital of South Australia, possesses one of the most successful municipal enterprises in the Commonwealth in the shape of its electrical street railway system. It serves the capital and the suburbs, and is managed by a trust mainly composed of elected representatives of the various municipalities concerned.

Public Play. Britain is sometimes represented as a country where sport is confined to the few, while the crowds that attend the great football and other matches are only onlookers. This idea is far removed from the truth.

ASSESSMENT INEQUALITIES. Few of the taxpayers seem to realize that the city council has only a minor part to play in setting the tax rate. They may make it 13.4 mills, or they may make it 25 mills, or 13 mills, but they have only a secondary place in determining the rate.

The assessment commissioner in Toronto is no worse than any other assessment commissioner. He does not keep the law, and, indeed, regularly boasts that he breaks it, and that he violates his oath of office, but so do most of the others.

The law was passed, presumably, on the assumption that all men were honest. On this assumption the honest men get it in the neck, a premium is put on dishonesty, and dishonest men prosper. The law says that real property shall be assessed at its actual value.

A notable example of this description was illustrated in yesterday's World, when property of Ald. Wanless, assessed at \$90, is seen to be surrounded by other properties in a similar location, some of them admittedly of inferior value, rated all the way up to \$165.

The bureau of municipal research recommended some changes to meet these difficulties. If anyone finds out that his neighbor is under-assessed he may appeal to the court of revision and undergo the odium attaching to the informer and possibly the enmity of some powerful social interest.

Any citizen can go up to the city hall and demand to see the assessment rolls. It is a right few care to exercise, and it has led to no practical good. The suggestion of the bureau of civic research is that the assessment roll be published in sufficient time before the assessment is finally confirmed, to give opportunity for appeals.

W. Sanford Evans in Ottawa Concerning Georgian Bay Waterways Inquiry.

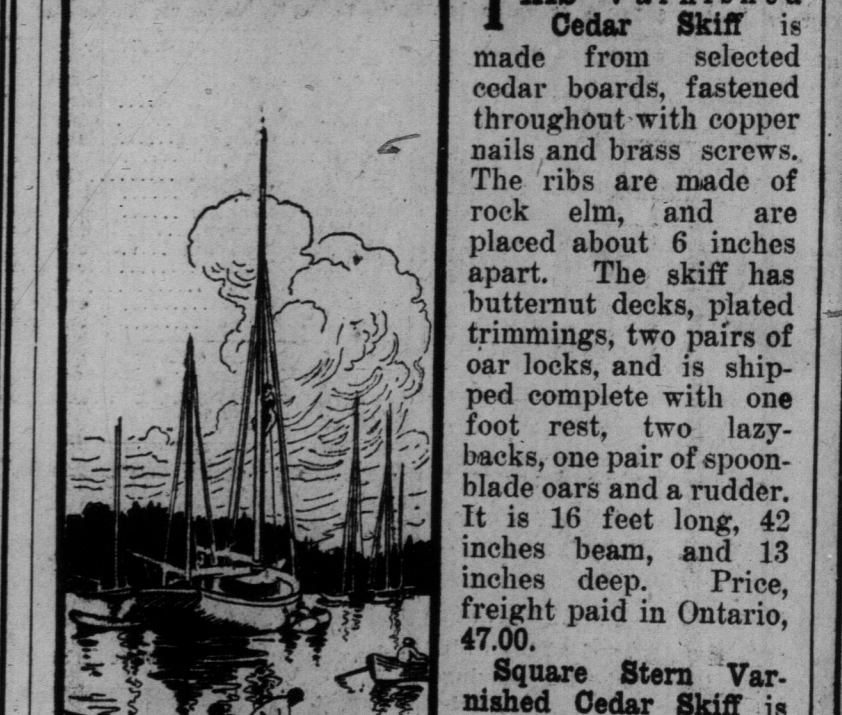

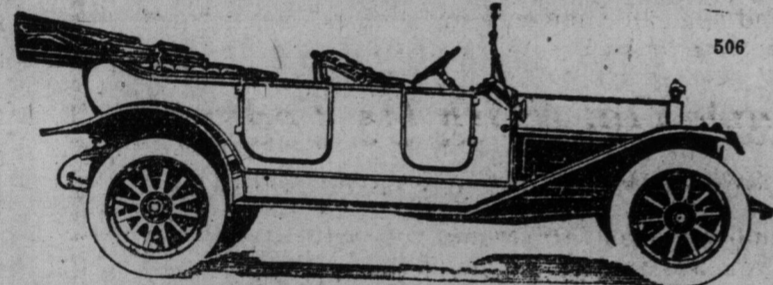

MINIMUM WAGE CONTESTED POINT

Employees Want It in City Contracts and Employers Do Not.

ARGUMENTS ADVANCED

Board of Control Hears Two Sides to the Story at City Hall.

Labor men filled the board of control committee room yesterday in support of the proposal to fix a minimum wage of \$15 per week on all contract work for the city. Various organizations of employers sent letters, but no members attended save the secretaries. After the letters were read the labor men asked time to give a written reply, and the matter comes before the controllers one week from Thursday next.

The Employers' Association of Toronto gave as a reason for its opposition that the city's move would create an expectancy in private cases and employes on private work must then be paid more. They strongly objected to imposing a minimum that is above the maximum wage in other places. The increase would raise the taxes by \$1,500,000, most of which would go to foreigners, since street workers were 90 per cent. in that class. It would create "grave industrial unrest." Besides, Toronto was not getting its share of industries because of prevalent high wages.

The master painters and decorators' organization called the plan preposterous. The Dominion Bridge Co., the Hamilton Bridge Co., the Toronto Structural Steel Co., Canada Foundry, McGregor and McIntyre, all opposed the increase. In a letter they said the "artificial standard" would attract too many workers and scarcity of work would again occur. They wanted the "united" strikers out and in substitution a schedule of wages for different work inserted in the clause.

C.M.A. Objection
The Toronto Manufacturers' Association, writing in protest, stated they did not want the unions to raise the wages scale. It would make business unworkable. Both factions are determined to win the issue, and will return before the board one week from Thursday to back up their arguments.

TO LAY PAVEMENT ON LAKE SHORE RD.

Works Committee Recommends Improvement West of Sunnyside.

COST FORTY THOUSAND

Commissioner Asks to Be Allowed to Use Several Varieties of Paving.

More than one mile of pavement is recommended by the works committee to be laid on the Lake Shore road, between the west end of Sunnyside bridge and a point a few hundred feet east of the Humber bridge. The pavement is to be exactly 5400 feet long, 24 feet wide and will cost \$40,000. This amount is recommended to be placed in this year's estimates.

NOVEMBER BUDGET CALLED IMPOSSIBLE

NEW TRUNK ROAD IN NORTH ONTARIO

Provincial and Federal Houses Now Considering Its Construction.

THIS YEAR'S PROGRAM

Colonization Department Plans Several Important Undertakings.

The Ontario and Federal Governments are now giving consideration to a trunk line of roadway which will loop across the whole northern part of the province and connect in the same extension Ottawa and Sault Ste. Marie. If the proposal is adopted, which seems likely, the work will be carried on by the colonization department of the provincial government, with the costs of construction being shared equally by the two administrations.

At the situation stands at present there is a direct cross-country break from North Bay to the Soo, and this would centralize construction activities. The rest of the line would follow the old military road from Ottawa to Mattawa to North Bay. Representatives have already been made by the counties principally affected, and the rapid settlement is said to warrant it.

The colonization department has some important projects on the year's program. The entry of the Ford Nickel Company into Garson Township, and the heavy business expected to be handled by the English syndicate in charge, is the cause of a new trunk road running out of Sudbury and Coniston.

An important connection which will be begun at once is that between the Transcontinental and C. P. railways in Washagoon Township. The two points, Quibell and Vermilion, will be linked up and gangs are being sent up at once, because of the rapid drift of settlers and the demand for traffic arteries.

Work in the pulpwood district of Espanola begins Monday, and Supt. R. B. Egan, provincial forest superintendent, will be in charge of the Gowanus road operations next week. The favorable nature of the climate this spring is enabling the work to begin a month earlier than usual.

SCARBORO BEACH OPENING.

A week from today Scarborough Beach Park will be open for the season. James Carey, the famous New York cab driver, making alterations in the permanent attractions and putting in a couple of new ones. In the old House of Nonense, a new entertainment, "Joyland" has been installed. The old Midway Building has been removed and in its place will be found the new glass, which is said to be one of the most popular of the many amusements at Luna Park. Some special vaudeville acts have been booked from New York for the opening week, but undoubtedly the most popular will be the return of D'Urban's Royal Italian Concert Band of 35 pieces.

THE STOLEN NECKLACE.

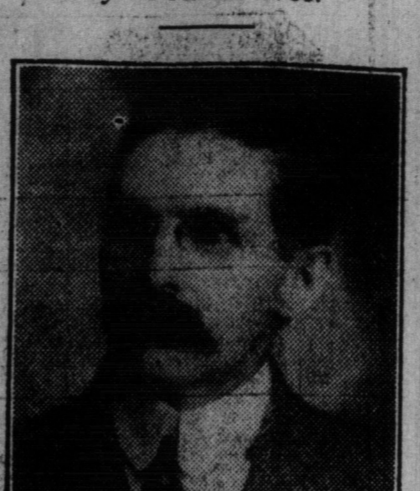
FATHER MINEHAN'S VIEW.

TREMBLAY CASE YET UNFINISHED

Argument Continues in Quebec Marriage Case Before Privy Council.

Canadian Associated Press Cable. LONDON, May 8.—The Tremblay marriage case from Quebec, where the wife appeals against the annulment of a marriage granted because they were cousins in the fourth degree and married without dispensation, was continued today before the privy council.

Arnold Wainwright concluded the arguments for the wife, St. Germaine, speaking for the husband, maintained that the French law and canonical law were identical.

Lord Moulton said they had to find a consistent meaning for Article 127 of the code, which speaks of "the other impediments recognized, according to different religious persuasions, arising from relationship or affinity or from other causes, remain subject to rules hitherto followed in different churches and religious communities."

The framers of that article, continued Lord Moulton, "might mean that they do not take upon themselves to fix in general any civil consequences of ignoring this provision."

Mr. St. Germaine said that for a century and a half it had been understood that Roman Catholics were to follow the rules of their church as to marriage.

The lord chancellor said: "This is so, but on the other hand, you legislate for the whole Province of Quebec, which is partly Protestant."

FISH-JAM ELECTION IS EXCITING BRITAIN

Contest in Grimsby Is of a Decidedly Picturesque Character.

Canadian Associated Press Cable. LONDON, May 8.—Of the three bye-elections pending, that in Grimsby is certainly the most interesting. Both the present candidates, T. G. Bannister (Unionist) and Alfred Bannister (Labourist), are of the same family, belong to home waters. The former is a jam maker, the latter is a trawler owner. The present contest, in fact, is known as the fish-and-jam election; the Unionist candidate starts electioneering at four o'clock in the morning, addressing a meeting in the early hours at the docks. Seven of the eight sons are serving equally hard with him. The point which the Unionists most strongly insist on is that that there must be no coercion of Ulster.

WARRANT GOVERNMENT TO TAKE OVER THE C.P.R.

St. John, N. B. Labor Council Wants Line Finished by Country.

ST. JOHN, N.B., May 8.—The trades and labor council decided to send a petition to Ottawa requesting the government to take over the Canadian Northern Railway in its present condition and continue the building of it as a public work. The petition came from the Single Tax Association of Ontario, and will be forwarded to Hon. J. D. Hazen, minister of marine and fisheries.

HEALTH OFFICERS HEAR ADDRESSES

Interesting Papers Read on Problem of Proper Milk Supply.

CHILDREN SACRIFICED

Child's First Right is Robust Health, Declares Dr. W. E. Struthers.

The third annual conference of the Ontario Health Officers' Association was concluded yesterday afternoon when two excellent papers were given on hygienic conditions among school children, by Dr. S. F. Millen, of Essex County, and Dr. W. E. Struthers, of Toronto.

The conference was attended by over two hundred medical health officers, representing almost every county in Ontario. From an attendance standpoint the conference was by far the best yet held and all of the papers which were contributed were of a very high standard.

At the morning session two papers were read by Dr. D. A. McKillop, M.O.H. St. Thomas, on "The Milk Supply of Smaller Towns and Cities," and by Hoyes Lloyd, B.S.A., Toronto, on the "Urban Milk Supply."

The problem was said to be much simpler in the smaller towns, as the milk reached the consumers when it was only a few hours old, while in a large city, it was often six hours before the milk reached the customer.

A luncheon was tendered to the medical health officers in the Parliament Buildings, which was attended by practically all of the delegates.

Dr. Struthers, in his paper, dealt with urban conditions in schools. The greatest evils were imperfect ventilation, and poor dental conditions among the school children.

The prevention of bad health among children was said to be the school physician's first duty. The child's first right was that he or she should possess robust health, and the great and primary object was prevention of disease.

The season opened in April, with an offering of 37 white and 104 colored, with an average price of 10.55 for both lots. May furnished 2242 white and 2837 colored, a total of 5079, with an average price of 11.24.

BOILER QUESTION GROWING ACUTE

Conference Will Be Called to Agree on Uniform Regulation.

Will Meet in July Enormous Traffic in Boilers Influences Minister to Take Action.

The provinces of the Dominion, according to present expectations, will send representatives from the local government boiler inspection branches to confer with Ontario in July, as to striking a uniform regulation for Canadian inspectors.

The stand of Ontario will be for having boilers built here subject to provincial regulations, accepted at face value in the western provinces.

At the present time, regardless of the fact that Ontario has the most stringent rules in existence, Alberta and Saskatchewan sometimes feel it incumbent to cut down the pressure.

Arrangements are also under way to have inspectors in connection with the large American insurance companies particularly interested in boiler conformity to the regulations obtaining here.

Since the new rules came into force last July 31 mechanics have been exhibited and approved.
