### Federal Troops Are Reported In Force Close to Vera Cruz

Canadian Press Despatch.

VERA CRUZ, May 8.—There were various reports today of large bodies of federal troops near the city. These reports were characterized by Brig.-Gen. Funston and other army officers as exaggerated.

The military officers are agreed that some extension of the American lines is desirable for the protection of the food and water supply of Vera Cruz. They desire the extension to embrace the district all about the city. The orders from Washington that the lines be not extended thus far have prevented any action being taken, but it is believed the army officers are pressing the war department for permission to broaden the line so as to make the military situation complete.







A Home Made Refrigerator

ONE OF THE IMPORTANT things about housekeeping is to know how to care for food properly after it is brought into the house. So important is this knowledge deemed by many wise persons that whole books have been written on the subject to show that the health

A cool, clean basement is rarely found in glass containers or in tin boxes, you have one, food may be placed in glass containers or in tin boxes, perforated to admit air, or in crocks, and kept in it very well. Paper bags, too, are now made especially for holding cooked and uncooked foods, and are practical, as they are air tight, but nothing equals a firstclass refrigerator and plenty of ice.

Since ice is manufactured so cheaply and is so easy to secure even in

the suburbs, it may be classed as the staff of summer supply insisted upon even in rural districts.

In selecting a refrigerator choose one with piece of ice lasts twice again as long as a small piece In modern apartments coolers are built in the walls in such manner that the ice can be put in from the outside. This keeps the water out of the kitchen, and saves time for the ice man and the maid. In my kitchen the drain pipe in the ice chest is attached to a pipe leading outside, so that there are no pans of water to empty. Frequently the chest is emptied, and after a thoro washing with hot water and sal-soda it is flushed

will east with cold water from a hose and this cleans the drain pipes.

Every ice box and refrigerator is furnished with a little cup that fits into the drain hole in the bottom of the box. This cup must be removed often and sterilized and replaced, as it holds water, and prevents in hot air from reaching the interior of the box.




### You May Transplant Your Lemon Lilies, Now.

The lemon lily is another of our oldest-fashioned perennials—one that the garden can not possibly do without. wonderful tints with afternoon a day lily, and unlike orange lily is

> But orange lily is a much larger plant in every way-root, long lance leaves, flowers and flower-stalk. Both plants are so similar as to roots and bulblets that only by long experience can I happen to be very gross. I have learned however, no later than this very spring that lemon lily branches from its runners rather more profusely than the other plant. TIME was not so long ago when the great hospitals. were kept full of victims of the dread malady, where solors and foreigners lived closely hundled together. But no more! Now the beds of those same places are kept filled with patients from the more refined and better kept suburbs. Instead of typhoid striking low the ignorant foreigner or benighted laborer, who innocently drinks filthy water and worse milk, it now attacks the very flower of America's sons-natives born and bred in

"Why is it, doctor," asked a patient the other day, "that there is always such a howl about one instance of yellow fever, leprosy, or smallpox when it shows its head in a town or even the whole state, and no one notices the DR. HIRSHBERG presence of two or three dozen cases of typhoid fever? Is typhoid such a

The answer to him is warning to the guardians of the health. Typhold is much more insidious, dangerous and serious to a community than yellow fever, leprosy or smallpox, because these latter are tensely dramatic in their appearance; they cannot be masked or appearance; they are feared by virtue of the biblical and protano account of What Vaccination Does.

scourges handed down unto the third and fourth generations.

Yet such dramatic troubles as the black playre, yellow fever, Asiatic cholera, leprosy and smallpox are literally jokes alongside of that hidden, creepy disease, typhoid fever. The total deaths of all ithe former scary maladies in 190 years in the whole United States does not equal the yearly deaths today of typhoid fever. Deaths of these diseases, to state cold facts, were little over 15,000, while in 1911 there were 250,000 cases of typhoid fever, with a quarter of a million families thrown out of work, and near 3,000,000 weeks of idleness for those attacked. Worst of all, 40,000 wage-earners died last year of typhoid fever.

Where Germs Lurk.

What Vaccination Does.

Flies, next to water, are the accessories to the typhoid crime. A man just feeling a bit ill with the first symptoms of the disease, will milk millions of the serms into the milk of a whole dairy. Flies will drop them into the salads, fruits and exposed dishes of the household, even after the milk is boiled.

Greater and better as a preventive than any of these hygienic measures, however, is typhoid vaccination. This procedure, simple, harmless and sure, is in general use all over the world. In the United States army and navy there has been no case of typhoid since Jan. I, when over 100,000 enlisted men were given three hypodermic injections of cooked typhoid germs. Before that there were hundreds of cases every year.





Plants for Shady Gardens By May Eldridge

THE garden becomes more and more interesting every day, now the spring is advanced. Spring flowers, such as daffodils, primroses, wall-flowers, etc., enliven the borders with bright colors, and trees and shrubs have opened flowery border in summer. their fat, green buds, revealing the ten-

their fat, green buds, revealing the tender leafage or flowers. The gardening season has entered fully on its course.

Many are buying hardy plants for their gardens at the present time. If the border should happen to be one getting little or no sun it is important that plants, suitable to the position should be chosen. Here are the names of a dozen or so suitable kinds for shade: Aconitum napellus bicolor, blue, four feet; Anemone japonica, rose and white varieties, three feet; columbines, various colors, six inches; cauriculas, various colors, six inches; cauriculas, various colors, six inches; campanula latifolia, blue, and its white variety alba, three feet; foxgloves, various colors, four feet; Doronicum excelsum, yellow, two feet; Lysimachia, clethroides, white, three feet; Lysimachia, clethroides, white, three feet; Thalictrum aquilegifored in the season has entered fully on its course.

Interesting Papers Read on Crown Begins Weaving Problem of Proper Milk Supply.

### CHILDREN SACRIFICED

Child's First Right is Robust Health, Declares Dr. W. E. Struthers.

The third annual conference of the Ontario Health Officers' Association was concluded yesterday afternoon when two excellent papers were given on hygienic conditions among school children, by Dr. S. F. Millen, of Essex County, and Dr. W. E. Struthers, of County, and Dr. W. E. Struthers, of Toronto. The conference was attended by over two bundred medical health officers, representing almost every county in Ontario. From an attendance standpoint the conference was by far the best yet held, and all of the papers which were contributed were of a very high standard. On every hand, the members of the association commented on the practical value of the information which had been given out by the speakers.

At the morning session two papers were read by Dr. D. A. McKillop, M.O.H. St. Thomas, on "The Milk Supply of Smaller Towns and Cities," and by Hoyes Lloyd, B.S.A., Toronto. on the "Urban Milk Supply." The problem was said to be much simpler Toronto. The conference was at-

problem was said to be much simpler in the smaller towns, as the milk reached the consumers when it was only a few hours old, while in a large city, it was often sixty hours before the milk reached the customer. The

city, it was often sixty hours before the milk reached the customer. The matter of the impurities, dilution, and adulteration was thoroly gone into, and practical hints were given as to how to insure a pure milk supply. If the milk was tampered with, analysis would reveal the fact, and then conditions would remedy the defect.

A luncheon was tendered to the medical health officers in the Parliament Buildings, which was attended by practically all of the delegates. Addresses were given by Rev. John McNeill of Cooke's Church, and by Hon. W. J. Hanna.

Rural school conditions were described by Dr. S. F. Miller in his paper on "Sanitation." The death rate for children between the ages of five and fourteen years should be very low indeed, he claimed, but statistics showed that it was fully half as great as that of persons between the ages of 50 and 60. By far the greater number of these children died of preventable diseases. The duty of the health officer, the speaker claimed, was to minimize the prevalence of these diseases. Thirty-five per cent. of the mortality among school teachers was found to arise from tuberculosis, while that among the whole population was only 7 per cent.

Inspection Was Needed.

Describing conditions in the County of Essex, he said that matters had advanced to such a stage that the board of health had considered it advisable that he make an inspection of

Very bad conditio were found to exist there. The wells were in very bad shape, the seats were too small for the children, ventilation was bad, and in one case the the cold could not be kept out during the winter season. As a result of the investigation, conditions were remedied during the year, and the health conditions of the school children had

been greatly improved. Dr. Struthers, in his paper, deal with urban conditions in schools. The greatest evils were imperfect ventila-




