


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

### REGISTER OF ROYAL LETTERS.

#### To THE EXCHEQUER.

Right, &c.—Whareas, for the mantenance of a secound minister at our churche of Halieroodhous, and for the use of the poor of the Channogaet, wee have been pleased to signe ane signatour of the upsettis of tradis of the small impost of wynes, and of the benefeitt of alterages and hospitallis dotit by some religeous persones of old for pious uses within that paroche, And efter the reformatione of religeone gifted by our dearest grandmother Queen Marie, of blissed memorie, to the churche of the Channongaet, for the interteinment of a minister and ther poore whareof (as wee are informed), wee nor our predecessouris have never receaved any benefeitt, which wee wer the rather moved to doe because the course is much agreable to our intentione in our decree, and may save us from a forther charge for the mantenance of ane second minister at that churche, which necessarilic requirethe a helper in regard of the eminencie of the place and greatnes of the charge: Oure plesoure tharefore is, that you consider of the premissis, and if you find it not materiallic prejudicious unto us, nor any of our subjectis, that furthwithe you caus exped the said signatour in due and competent forme, according to the tennour thareof: And for your see doing, &c.—Whitehall, the fourth of Januare 1630.

#### TO THE CHANCELLARE.

Right, &c.—Whareas, at the time of/our agreement with the Marques of Huntlie for his shirrefships of Aberdeen and Innernes, wee wer pleased that he should be relaxed from all horning whareunto he was denunsit for not apprehending of those persones whome he hade charge to tak, the doing whareof (as wee are now informed) is delayed till he should apprehend such of them as he is bound to exhibit, as landeslord of the boundis where they dwell; sieing wee have granted a commissione to the Lord Gordoune, whoe may best performe that which his father should have done tharein, Wee doubt not bot he will assist his sone to give us contentment in anything that concernis our service: And sieing wee desire not theis shirrefshipps being dimitted that the expressing of our fayour towardis him be see strictlie interpreted, wee have thought it more fitt to acquent you, then otherwayis to doe it in a more publict maner, that it is our plesour, and wee doe heirby require you, to caus relax the said Marqueis fra all horningis used aganis him as Shirreiff or landslord for not apprehending of papistis before repairing to our court: And to the effect he may the better shaw his affection to our service in causing apprehend those persones, that you grant him licience to repair northward: And whareas his dochters are to be removed from him, according to the course intended to be taken with such noblemen's childring by the generall ordour, sieing they are mariageable, wee hold it not expedient that they at this time should be taken from there mother, but will that point in there behalff to be dispensed with till our forther plesure be knowen: And as wee have signified our plesour what we wold have done heirin, soe, being confident of your affectione to our service, wee remitt the conditiones and maner how it may be most convenientlie done unto you, that the same may be performed, or that you will adverteis what forther is requisite from us to be done in that purpose: Which specialie recommending to your care, Wee bid you fareweell.-The 4 of Januar 1630.

#### TO THE COUNSELL.

Right, &c.—As we wer pleased to wreat to you before in favours of . . . Maistir James Hannay, minister at our churche of Halierudhous, requiring you to considder of the reasones which wer exhibited unto us in his behalff, and inclosed in our former lettres, concerning the provisione of that churche with ane honest and compotent mantenance to the minister, according to the eminencie of the place and greatnes of his charge: And wee being informed that the same could not convenientlie be performed before the pronuncing of our decreit: Oure plesour tharefore is, and we doe heirby anthorise, will, and require you, that now, after the publicatione of our said decree, you tak the said reassones in your serious considerationes, and with all convenient diligence you setle and appoint to the said Maister James and his successouris, ministers at our said Kirk, and honest and sufficient mantenance as you shall think fitting for the said place and charge.—Whitehall, the seavint of Januar 1630.

#### TO THE ERLE OF SEAFORT.

Letter to repair to Court, in the usual form.—Whitehali, the 7 of January 1630.

#### TO THE SESSIONE.

Right, &c.—Whareas there are actiones of law intendit and dependent before you betuix the burgh of Edinburgh and some inhabitantis of Leithe concerning the rightis and priveledges of our said burgh: These are to will and require you with all convenient expeditione to administer justice to both parties in the actiones, according to there rightis and the laws of that our kingdome: Soe we, &c. Whitehall, the 7 of Januar 1630.

#### TO THE COUNSELL

Right, &c.—Whareas wee have understood by your lettre of the inconveniences that are like to come to that our kingdome by strangers, whome, planting thameselves in the Ile of the Lewis by means of a patent granted to the Erle of Scafort not as yet exped, wold usurp the benefit of the fishing in theis seas adjacent thareunto, to the great prejudice of our subjectis wishing that the samen may be prevented: We doe approve your opinione, and have taken another course to our consideratione, whiche, as wee doe conceave, may verie much import the good of that our kingdome: Wharevpone we have required the said Erle and a commissioner for the be-rowes to repaire unto us at the first of Marche nixt to come, that after due deliberatione wee may think fitt what is to be done tharein: And in the meantime it is our plesour that you give ordour for stopping the said Erle his patent in Exchecquer, or otherwayis, till after the said time you shall heir farther from us, as likewayis that the strangers whoe are alreadic planted thare be made liable to the lawes of the cuntre, and find catione for there compirance when they shalbe cited to answer for transgressing our actis of parliament, and that noe others be suffered to plant thare till wee have resolved what shalbe fittest for the publict good of that kingdome.—Whitehall, the 7 Januar 1630.

#### TO THE ADVOCAT.

Trustie, &c.—Whareas there hath been ane signatour of some landis belonging to . . . Sir James Oliphant, Knight Baronett, presented to be signed by us, as wee are willing to doe him any laufull favour,

see wee are loath that any thing which might be prejudiciall unto us should pas, and therefore wold give noe ordour for expeding of the same till first your opinion warr hade thereanent: Therefore our plesour is, that iff you find noething theirunto which is prejudiciall unto us, or contrarie to our late decree or ony other reservations send home to our Exchequer, that you ether caus pas the same or returns it docated for our hand for that effect.—Whitehall, the 7 Januar 1630.

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#### TO THE KING OF FRANCE.

Treshaut tresexcellent et trespuissant nostre tres cher et tresame bon frere beau frere cousin et aucieu allie Le seiur de Suinton porteur de la presente qui a este cy devant Archer de vos gardes de corps. nous avant faict entendre le desire et entention qu'il auoit de sen retourner en France avec sa femme et ses enfans pour y passer le reste de ses jours, et neus ayant supplie de le favoriser de nos lettres de recommendation vers vous, nous l'avons bien voulu accompaigner de celle ey, pour vous prier, comme nous faisons effectueusement, qu'en consideration des bous et longs services qu'il a rendu au son roy de hereuse memoire vostre pere et a vous en la diete place de l'archer des gardes du corps, en laquelle il y a tesmoignage de vous avoir bien et fidelement servie le space de vingt et huiet aus, comme aussi en des autres occasions ou il y a este employe pendant ce temps la. Il vous plaise le laisser jouer de mesmes franchises et priviledges dont il a jouy par cy devant en vostre royaume et luy departir aus occasions le benefite de vos favours pour luy donner moyen de vivre et subsister en sa viellesse, et de vous rendre les services ou il vous plaira encores de l'employer selon l'affection entiere, quil tesmeigne tousieurs y avoir. A quoy vous le obligeres d'autant plus estroitement, et encourageres les autres de sa nation pour ceste faveur laquelle aussy deferre a nostre recommendation nous recognoisserons en pareille occasion enverz les vostres Et sur ce nous pricrons Dieu. Treshaut, tresexcellent et tres puissant prince, nostre tres cher et tresame bon frere, beau frere, cousin, et auncien allie, quil vous ait tousiours en saincte et digne garde.—A nostre pallace de Westminster, 7 Januarii 1630.

#### TO THE ADMIRALITIE.

Right, &c.—Whareas wee wer informed that our burgh of Edinburgh hath of late encreached much upon the priviledges and liberties of . . . the Duke of Lennox in his office of Admiralitie: And thareupon wee, haveing considered with the Commissioner of the said burgh, ffind that our said burgh is verie willing to cleer themselves from any usurpationes of whatsomever libertie or priveledge properlie belonging to our said cousen in his said office: Oure will and pleasour tharefore is, that you conveen with such commissioners as our said burgh shall nominat and trye what priveledges and liberties by the lawes of that our realme doe properlie belong to our said cousen in his said office of Admiralitie, that our said cousen may enjoy the same; Or els that you may in some peaceabill way soe compose the differences as all occasione of contraversic or debate may be taken away heirefter, and that you certifie us of your proceeding and of the trew estate of the said bussienes: Soe wee bid you fareweell.—Whitehall, the 7 Januar 1630.

#### TO THE COUNSELL.

Right, &c.—Whareas wee have been peticeoned by Johnno Innes of Crombie, showing the great losse and charges susteened by him in the leavieing and keeping together a companye of footmen for our uncle the King of Denmark his service, and wee, commiserating his distres, have thought fitt to refer the triall thareof to your consideratione: Oure pleasoure therefore is, that you tak speciall notice of the peticeone

heir inclosed, and after triall thereof that you certifie us bak again what you find requisit for us to doe thereanent, whereby his losses (if any be by that service) may be repared, and he in tyme coming enabled when occasione shall offer to doe us service.—Whitehall, the 7 of Januar 1630.

#### TO THE COUNSELL.

Right, &c.—Whareas there hathe been some articles exhibited unto us aganis our burgh of Edinburgh in name of the toune of Leithe, whareof such particulars as are submitted to us by Mr Johne Hay, in name of our said burgh, contined in there chartour in anno 1603, to be surrendered to us, conforme to the neat inclosed in the lettre writen by us to our advocat, willing him to secure us of the same, and after sight of thare evidentis, to acquent us what forther is necessario for us to advert heirto, assuring ourselves of the discharge of his ductic heirin: Likewayis wee have given commission for composing the differences between that our burgh and the noblemen and gentlemen of Wast Louthian, ament there chartour in anno 1603, in see farr as concerneth there interest, that they may ether setle the same or certific us what they find fift for us to doe therein: And for those things in contraversic betuix them and Leithe, Wee desire you to tak theis articles which we have sent you heirwithe to your considerations, and haveing hard both parties and thare lanfull defences, what is fitt in law for you to judge of, or refer to others judicatories to whome the judging thereof dothe properlic belong, that you tak such ordour as wee did lattic wreat touching that purpos, as is most agreeable to law and equitic; and if you think it necessary, that you certific us of your proceedingis and opiniones tharein: Soe, not doubting but you will have such care heirof as is requisit, &c.—Whitehall, the 7 of Januar 1630.

#### To THE EXCHECQUER.

Right, &c.—Whareas wee have been humblie peticeoned by . . . . Doctor James Chambers, one of our ordinarie Phisicians, making mention that he haveing payed four hunderthe poundis sterling unto Alexander and Robert Irewingis towardis there transportatione and subsistance abroad, in consideratione and for a lease of certane landis lent unto him by the saidis persones during there lifetimes, which he alledgeth he cannot legallis enjoy without our confirmatione or grant of there escheat and liferent, as fallen and become in our handis by there excommunicatione or denunciations to our horne: And forasmuch the said Alexander and Robert Irewingis have given band to leave that our kingdome for shunning all occasione of scandell unto the discipline of our churche there, and for that our said servand Doctor James Chambers humblic intreatethe for the guiftis of there escheatt and lifrent, for his better securitie of his said lease: Tharefore, and in regard of the long and faithfull service done unto our late dear father and us by the said Doctor James Chambers, wee have been graciouslie pleased to signe unto him a signatour of thare said escheat and lifrent, and doe heirby will and require you to pus the same accordinglie, and to ratific and confirme unto him his said lease or tak of the saidis landis in such legall forme and maner as you in your discretiones shall think most fitting for his securitie: And for your see doing, &c.—Whitehall, the 8 day of Januar 1630.

#### TO THE COUNSELL.

Right, &c.—Whareas wee did formerile write our lettres unto you concerning the place of our coronatione in that our kingdome: Oure pleasoure therefore is, that you considder what place is most

convenient, and that you adverte us of your opiniones concerning the same, and whither you think St Geillis church in Edinburgh or the Abbey churche of Halyerudehous to be more convenient place for such a publict actione, that upon notice of your opiniones wee may tak such forther course and give such forther directiones as may seem most fitting for setling the preparationes fitt for that actione, and with als litell charge as may be convenientlie.—Whitehall, the 8 of Januar 1630.

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#### TO THE ADVOCAT.

Trustie, &c.—Whareas our Commissione of surrenders and tithes hath not as yet determined anything concerning the Landis of our propertie and principalitie, nor concerning the changed tennouris in that our kingdome: And forasmuch as the time of prescriptione now approchethe, whareby our title unto the saidis landis and tennouris may perhappes tharefter ether be doubted of or contraverted under collour of the said prescription, except some summondis and process be timelie intended and execute at our instance for interrupting the said prescriptiones: Oure pleasure tharefore is, and wee doe heirby authorise, will, and require you, with all convenient diligence, duely to weighe and consider of the said prescriptione, and speedelie to advise and execute some legali course by summondis of improbatione, reductione, warning, and removeing, or some such other faire and laufull way, against our vassellis of the premissis as in your judgment and opinione may seem most meet for interrupting the said prescriptione, and for avoiding all such prejudice as the same may infer against oure croune and titill unto the saidis lands and tonnouris; and speciallie oure pleasour is, that you have a care of our propertie of Ettrick Forrest: All which we recommend unto your speciall care and diligence, &c.—Whitehall, the 8 of Januar 1630.

#### TO SIR THOMAS EDMOND, HIS MAJESTIES' AMBASSIDOUR IN FRANCE.

Right, &c.—Whareas the bearer heiroff, James Swentoune, haveing certificatts from France of his long and faithfull services done that their twentie-eight yeers past as one of the Archers of the Guard of the bodie of our brother the most Christiane King, hath humblie intreated our recommendations unto our said brother, that he may enjoy his royall favour, and the priveleges formerlie enjoyed by himas a Scottisman within the kingdome of France: And haveing been graceouslie pleased to grant his said desire, wee have writen unto our said brother for that purpose, and doe heirby will and require you to assist the said James Swentoune by all the faire wayis and means you can towardis his said Christian Majestie that he enjoy his royall favour, may subsist in the full fruitione of his wounted promises, and may be the better used heirefter as one specialic recommended from us, whose have taken particulare notice of his worthe and partis, and of his long and faithfull services, and of his birthe and descent testified unto us under the Great Seall of the kingdome of Scotland where he was borne; and soe wee bid you hartlie fareweell.—Whitehall, the 8 of Januare 1630.

#### TO THE ADVOCAT.

Trustie, &c.—Whareas wee did formerlie write unto you that wee hade agreed with the Lord Lowdoune for the heretable office of Shirrefship with the superiorities of Kyllesmoor and Barmoor, with his heretabill office of Baillierie and regalitie thereof, and to wedset unto him the saidis superiorities, few-deuties, and casualities of the same for the soume of eighteen thousand merkis, till be retayned by him till wee should be pleased to redeem the same from him by payment unto him thereof: And wee being humblis peticeoned by George Read of Dandilling, in behalff of himselff and the tennentis of

Killissmore and Barmoore, to accept of them as our imediat tennentis to the same, they paying unto us the source of twelff thousand merkis scottis as the greatest parte of the price of the few-deuties were are to give to the said Lord Lowdane, making resignations thereof in our handis: Though were doe like of that intention heirin, yet were will tak noe course heirin till first we have considered of there petitions which were have sent you heirwith inclosed: Therefor our pleasour is, that you consider of the demand's of there peticeone, and that you certific unto us what course yee think fitt to be taken heirin, that therefor we may signific our further pleasour unto you thereament.—Whitehall, the 10 of Januar 1630.

#### TO THE ADVOCAT.

Trustie, &c.—Whareas wee are informed that by the confessione of one Alexander Hamiltonne, questioned for witcheraft, thare are divers persones dilated as complices with him in some divellische practises against the life and estate of Sir George Home, Knight, whom the persones accused, with thare favorers, traduce as ane subornour of Hamiltonne to accuse them falslie, and doe all they can to hinder the triall, whareby the innocencie or giltienes of the said Sir George or the persones of the accused might be made apparent: Wee being moved to tak the bussienes into our serious consideratione as a thing concerning the glorie of God and good of that our kingdome, that such hynous crimes should not pas without severe punishement: And haveing therefor expressile recommendit the exact trial! of it to . . . the Erle of Monteith, our Justice-Generall of that our kingdome: Wee are likwayis pleased heirby to will and require you to give your best concurrance in the prosecutione and triall thereof, that noething may be omitted which may tend to the impartiall cleering of everic circumstans in the bussienes, that soe the innocent may be acquited, and the guiltie may receave such due punishment as by the laws of that our kingdome is to be inflicted upon them: Soe earnestlie recommending this unto your speciall care, &c.—Whitehall, the 13 of Januar 1630.

#### TO THE PRINCE OF ORANGE.

Mon cousen nous a este presentee par le commissiaire des villes royalles de nostre auncien royaume d'Escosse au nome dec magistrats eschevecus burgeois et conseilleirs de dictes villes avec remonstrance de plusieurs enfraints des articles leur accordes par contract faict entre aux et les magistrats de la dicte ville de Camphire en Zelande estant l'estaple et seule port et havre assignee pour recevoir les commodities et marchandises exportees hors de nostre dict royaume de Escosse aux provinces unies du pays bas Et combien que le dit commissaire nous a prie au nome de dictes villes royalles de les permettre changer leur dict estaple port et havre pour estre restablie en quelque autre endroict ou leur traffique pourra estre mieux accommodee, et nos marchands mieux traictes, Neantmoins nous avons trouve bon vous adventir de leur desyre et remonstrance afin que vous ayant donne ordre pour la preservation du dict contract avec mandament aux Magistrats de la dicte ville de Camphire de mieus traicter nos dicts marchants qu'auparavant, et de leur octroyer telles autres favours lesquells les pourroent encouragee de continuer leur dict estaple dans la ville de Camphire.—Whythall, le dixisesme de Januier 1630.

#### To THE EXCHEQUER.

Right, &c.—Whareas . . . James Carmiehell, one of our appointed by us to be chamberlen of our principalitie for receaving all the rentis and casualities thareof, and of all annueties ishueing out of the same, and of all compositiones arrising for or out of any parte thareof, alsweel superioritie as tennendrie: Oure pleasoure tharefore is, that you tak a speciall care to satishim in the said office according to the contentis of his guift or guifts thareof, and that noe other persones may be by you authorised or permitted ony way is to intermeddle with any point of the said office, or with the rentis, casualities, compositiones, or annueties due out of any parte of the landis and teithes off or within our said principalitie, but that the said James Carmichell and his deputies may have the sole and full intromissione tharewithe in all time coming, as one whome wee have specialic trusted with the receipt thareof, he alway is accompting for the same in our Exchequer as in his said gift or giftis is mentioned: And for your, &c.—Whitchall, the third of Februar 1630.

#### TO THE COUNSELL.

Right, &c.—Being credibillie informed of the prejudice arising unto that our kingdome by the abundance of formin coyne current there and great scarcetic of our owne, Wee wonder verie much that you should have suffered a thing soe hurtfull to our subjectis and aganis the custume of all weell governed estattes to have see farr prevailed: Theis are therefore to require you, that, haveing thought of the premissis, you tak such speedic course for redressing of the said abuse and for bringing in the wonted bulzeon as you shall think fitt for the good of our said kingdome, whereby noe such absurditic may heirefter be seen at the time of our coming to that our kingdome, and that you acquent us with your proceeding is heirin.—Whitehall, the 3 of Februar 1630.

#### TO THE ADVCCAT.

Trustie, &c.—Whareas wee have been pleased to present our trustie and weelbeloved servitour and chaplen Mr Johne Patersone to the personage of Oldhampstockis; and understanding that the Erle of Balcleuch pretendit right to the said patronage, whereby our royall intentione in planting the church may not be impedit, and our right of patronage thareof not prejudged, Wee will that you concurr with the said Mr Johne, and doe your endevore for persueing or defending our right of the said patronage, alsweell be way of actione as be way of exceptione; and alsoe that you intend reduction in our name, with your concurrance for our interest, or at the instance of the said Mr Johne, for reduceing or annulling of the said Erle his pretended right of patronage of the said churche, iff need be, and persue all other actione necessare and competent for estabillishing our right foirsaid in the persone of our said servitour, according to the lawes of that our kingdome, as you will doe us acceptabill service,—Whitehall, the 4 of Februar 1630.

#### TO THE COUNSELL.

Right, &c.—Whareas wee did latelie in August last wreitt lettres unto you for a dispatche of the caus concerning the tuoe privateer French schippis called the S<sup>5</sup> Peter and S<sup>5</sup> Michaell, alledged taken since the paciefications made with France: And forasmuch, as wee are informed by the parties interested, that the said caus is not as yet determined, nether any answer come from you concerning the same: Therefore, at

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the humble peticeone of the said parties, wee doe heirby again will and require you with all expeditione to caus decide the said contraversie according to justice and equitie, least the tediousnes of the suite should seem to be a delay of justice, and a greevance to the parties whome wee wold glaidlie have freed from any just caus of clamour: Soe houping you will not suffer any more to be trubled or importuned with this bussienes, wee bid, &c.—Whitehall, the 4 February 1630.

#### TO THE COUNSELL

Right, &c.—Whareas peticeone is exhibited unto us by Luba of Caleis, alledging that his achip, called the Amitie of Caleis, loadned with salt, was in September last bipast taken from him and his company neir unto the citie of Bergin, in Norway, by ane Capitane Andersone, upon pretence that the same did belong to Dunkirk, as by the within peticeone may appeir, wharein speedie justice is humbly prayed: Oure plesour tharefor is, and wee doe heirby authorise, will, and require you upon sight heiroff, to rainister justice with all such summary proceeding as may be best agreeabill to justice and equitie and the lawes of that our kingdome, the peticeoners being strangers and not able to attend any long sute without extream prejudice and loss: And for your soe doing, &c.—Whitehall, the 4 Februare 1630.

#### TO THE SESSIONE.

Right. &c.—Whareas peticeone hath been exhibited unto us by one Walter Romholtome, citizen of Lubeck, complaining of ane alledged undue sentence pronunced in the Court of Admiralitie of that our kingdome, whereby the schip called the St Laurence, taken from Marteen Muller in Lubeck in Anno 1627 by Sir William Alexander, Knight, loadned with salt, was judged to be good and laufull prise, as by the said peticeone within may appeir: And wee conceaving that our supream judicatorie of our sessione to be the onlie competent court of justice for reversing [or] reduceing of all undue sentences pronunced in any other judicatorie within that our kingdome: Oure plesure tharefore is, and wee doe heirby will and require you, to admitt the parties interested unto thate laufull summonds and proces of reductione before you, and if you shall find any errour into the proceedings in our said Court of Admiralitie, or any inquirie in the sentence or any other just or laufull caus or ground of reductione, that you doe speedelie releive the peticeoners from the same, and with als summarie proces as the lawss of that our kingdome can permitt, whareby the parteis may be restored to there said schip and goodis, or value thereof, if the same be sold or put away, and if you find not any laufull ground of reductione of the said decreet pronunced in our said Court of Admiralitic, then you are to justifie the proceeding is thereof by granting absolvitour from the said reductione as use is in such cases: See committing this particulare unto your care, wee bid you, &c .- Whitehall, the 4 Februar 1630.

#### TO SIR WILLIAME ALEXANDER.

Right, &c.—Whareas wee have by our Infeftment under the Great Seall of our kingdome of Scotland granted unto you and your heirs authoritie to be our Lewetennent of New Scotland and Cannada, with pourse to confer titles of honour thare upon such inhabitant is as shalbe aidding and assisting unto the plantaceon thereof; and whareas alsoe, for the better encouragement of our subject is of our said kingdome to plant and contribute touardia the plantations of the said cuntrey, we have erected the ordour and dignitie of Knight Baronet in our said kingdome of Scotland, and by our lettres have appointed and

#### To the Exchequer.

Right, &c.—Whareas our Right trustie, &c. [the Earl of Mortoune] hath done unto us good and acceptable services, whareof we have taken speciall notice: Therefore, and for divers others important causes concerning us, Oure plesure is, that with all possible diligence, against the terme of Witsonday nixtocum, you readilie pay unto the said Erle the soume of 5000<sup>lb</sup> sterling, out of any of our custumes, great or small, of that kingdome, and out of the first and reddiest of our rentis, dueties, and casualities, or other benefitt whatsoever now dew unto us, or which heirefter shal happin to be due and accres to us in our said kingdome, or out of any of the first taxationes that shalbe granted unto us thare: And incais the said soume be not payed unto him or his foirsaidis be ux this and the terme foirsaid, that he have the ordinarie annuelrent till he be fulliclie satisfict of the wholl soume: And that this precept be registrat in the bookis of exchecquer, and that one act of Exchecquer be made thareupon for the said Erle his better securitie; and for your soe doing, &c.—Whitehall, the eight day of February 1630.

#### TO THE ADVOCAT.

Right, &c.—Whareas . . . the Vicount of Drumlanerek, his sone, heving by a commissione from us apprehendit in the border these thrie theeffis, fugitives, and rebellis, Williame Weigin, in Whisgillis, and James Weigin, his sone, and Johne Armestrang, alias Tueden, was most contempteouslie opposed in the executione of the said commissione by a number of leud persones named in the roll heir inclosed, whoe did rescue in a most insolent maner, and assisted the said rebellis for thare better avoiding without respect of our said commissione, and sedetiouslie convocat others for that purpos to our heigh contempt, authoritie, and lawes, the like whareof was never committed in our late deir father's nor our time; fire the better preventing the like untollerabill and dangerous courses heirefter, Wee are heirby pleased to require you that you call before you all those that are named in the said roll, and others whoe shall be dileited by the said Vicount, or his sone, to have opposed our commissione; and efter triall of thare outrageous misdamanour, that you tak such a speedie course for thare conding punishement that others, by thare example, may be terrified from all such detestable insurrectiones and convocationes: And likwayis that you give ordour for apprehending the saidis rebellis, and being taken, that you caus committ them in some of our save wardis, thare to be keept till such punishement be inflectit upon them as is agreabill with our lawes provided in the like cases.—Whiteball, the nynth of Frebruar 1630.

Robert, Erle of Roxburgh (whoe as wee are informed), hath undoubted right unto them : Tharefore our plesour is, that you draw upp a sufficient lettre of dispositione, contining a procuratorie of resignatioun be our said trustic cousen and counsellare (with consent of Sir Williame Ballanden) to us of the premisses, as likwayis that you draw upp a sufficient right and securitie of the samen landis and others as is abone writtin, to our said trustie cousen and counsellare, and his heirs, that they may be fully secured thareof, acy and whill they be secured of the soume of to be given to him as ano parte of the price tha eof; and siclik that there be a speciall provisione sett doune and insert in his said securitie that it shalbe nowayis lesome to us to redeme the saidis landis and others abone nominat from them, untill such time wee mak thankfull payment of the soume of to be specified and continul in ane particulare band to be made be us to him to that effect, and that by and attour the other soume abone writtin, which will compleit in the haill the soume of ; The which band we likewayis desire you to draw upp: ffor doing thereof thir present is shalbe, &c.-Whitchall, the 9 day of Februare 1630.

#### TO THE LORD OF LORNE.

Right, &c.—Haveing understood by your father of ane great extremitie whareunto he is likelie reduced by reasone of ane debt due by him unto a merchand of Londone, which he expected should have been payed by a voluntarie contributione granted by his procurement from his freendis in Argill, ffor which he was desirous to have repared thither for some time: But becaus wee cannot convenientlie give way to his desire, wee are verie confident that he will use his best endevouris; These are to recommend unto your care the providing of his releeff according to the agreement for that purpose, &c.—Whitehall the Sexteinth day of Februar 1630.

Whareas warrantis hath been issued from the Lordis of our privie counseil of Scotland for apprehending of Johnne Neall, whoe hathe been thir many yeers bypast reputed a notorious witche and delaitted guiltie of a most bussie practiser of that cryme within our said kingdome of Scotland; and we being informed that the said Johnne Neill, being presently in Tuedmouth or Clusher, within the bordour of this our kingdome of England, doth by that means avoid apprehensione and punishment: Theis are tharefore to will and require yow and everie one of you to caus tak and apprehend the bodie of the said Johnne Neill, wharesoevir he may be found within our said kingdome of England; and him soe apprehendit, that you send him from constable to constable untill he be brought into Scotland, thare to be delivered unto

Sir Williame Cokhurn of Longtoune, Knight, Barronet, our Shirreiff of the shirrefdome of Berwik, and his deputie, to be by him convoyed and delivered unto the Lordis of our privie counsell of our said kingdome of Scotland, thare to be dealt withall according to the lawes of that our kingdome: And for your soe doing, &c.—Whitehall, the 19 of Februar 1630.

To our trustie and weelbeloved Heigh Shirreff and Justice of the Peace of our cuntrie of Northumberland, and to all others our Shirreiffis, Maiouris, Justices, Coroners, Baillies, Constables, and all others oure officiars and loving subjectis, whome their presentis doethe or may concern.

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#### TO THE EXCHEQUER.

Right, &c.—Whareas wee are informed by . . . the Duke of Lennox that divers of our subjectis doe wrong and encreach upon the offices of Admiralitic and chamberleenrie of that oure native and ancient kingdome, and that they acquire divers grantis and rightis in prejudice of our said cousen and the saidis offices: In consideratione whareof, and that wee are most willing to restore the said offices to the full integreetie and for the good of our said cousen, Oure expres pleasour and will tharefore is, that you heirefter the passing of all grantis and rightis which shalbe presented to you in hurt and prejudice of our said cousen, concerning the said offices, or what belongis tharto: And wharein our said cousen is prejudged by the passing of the late tak of Orknay to Williame Dick, including the admiralitie thareoff, that prescryve speedie remedic heiranent; and for redres thareof wee ordane you to grant to the said Williame Dick a new tak of Orknay, conforme to that which is past to him of late, leaving out what concernis the saidis offices and prejudice thareof, and bearing noe prejudice or hurt to our said cousen; and that you mak speciall actis heiranent into our buikis of Exchecquer; ffor which theis presentis shalbe unto you a sufficient warrand.—Whitehall, the secund of Marche 1630.

#### TO THE CHANCELLARE.

#### TO THE ERLE OF MONTEATHE.

Right, &c.—Wharcas wee are informed that there is a nomber committed to Jeyell in Drumfrees for theift, recript of theiffs, and fugitives, which abuse, by neglect of punishment this some time past, is become soe frequent that unles strict ordour be taken with the committers thereof, there is small hope to bridle such disordouris: We desire therefore that after you have been at the Justice Court in Jedburgh, and have used justice aganis such as are to be punished in that place, you faill not to goe to the toune of Drumfrees and use justice aganis such as are in Jeyll, or such others as are fit to be called in questione there, ffor we think it most convenient, both in the case of our subjectis and for the good of that service, that the male-factouris abyde there triall in partes where there wifes are best known: We doe likewayis recommend to your speciall care that the resaittouris of the theeffis themselves and fugitives be noe les punished than the theeffis themselves, since the lawes of that our kingdome doeth strictlie appoint the same; And it is impossible to frie that cuntrie from such villanie iff the reseatters and fosterers of theeffis be not exemplarile punished: And becaus we have trusted our servand, Sir Richard Cockburn, Knight, and hath alreadic receaved good prooff of his affectione to the quiet of our late borders, it is oure speciall

pleasour, and by theis present wee command and authorise you, to call the said Sir Richard to be present, and to assist with you and the rest of the commissioners at all times heirefter, considering how requisit it is to have his opinione at all occasiones in that border service: Wee desire you likewayis, for the forther encouragement of our said servant, that you acquent our Counsell with that trust wee have imposed upon him, and will them, if occasione shall offer, to give there best assistance for ease of his panis: Which commandement we likewayis will you to mak knowen to our wholl commissioners of that our kingdome, wharby mutuall correspondence may be interteyned among them to the joynt commissione which wee are about to exped: Soe recommending thir particulars to your special care, as our trust is in you, We, &c.—Whitehall, the sight day of March 1630.

#### TO THE EXCHEQUER.

Right, &c.—Whareas wee are informed that the Infeftment of the Lord Douglas and his Ležie is not as yet past for the implement of these Contract of Mariage, be reasone that Sir James Douglas his signatour is stopped by you, which should be passed for the securing him of the moneyis due unto him by the Erle of Anguise, his brother: Tharefore, we being veris desirous that the said Lord Douglas and his Ladie be weell and speedelie secured, the said Erle and his creditouris being first secured for the soume of ane hundreth thousand merkis Scottis reserved to him in the said contract, Oure pleasoure is, that with all expeditioun you pas the said Sir James Douglas his signatour, without questione of itt any forther inserting onlie in the said signatour ane claus that it shall not be prejudiciall to our revocatione in any sort: And for your, &c.—Whitehall, the tenth of Marche 1650.

#### TO THE EXCHEQUER.

Right, &c.—Whareas we have been moved in the behalff of the Lord of Balmirrienoche and James Creichtoune of Fendraucht, and the toune of Selkirk, for granting unto them signatours of thare landis: Oure pleasour therefore is, that you peruse and reforms the said signatouris by the advise of our advocatt, and that you pas the same accordingly without prejudice unto us, as is usuallie in such caisses, remembering alwayis to insert ane claus therein that noething therein mentioned be prejudiciall unto our revocatione, annuetie, ministers' stipendis, and others pious uses, or to the generall submissione and our decree following thereupon: And for, &c.—Whitehall, the 10 of Marche 1630.

#### TO THE ARCHBISCHOPP OF ST ANDROIS.

Right, &c.—Whareas wee are informed by your lettre of the frequent Simonicall compactes between the patrones and the presentatione ministers within that our kingdome, which is ane abuse worthie of our

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princelie reformatione and your pastorall animadversione, for the good and mantenance of the church from delapidationes and unlawfull admissiones: Oure pleasoure therefore is, and wee doe heirby strictlie will and require you, to caus the cannons of the church to be orderlie observed for preventione off all kind of Simonie in time coming, and that no persone be admitted, instituted, or inducted in any church heirefter untill he doe first tak his corporall eath before his ordinarie that he hath not anywayis come to his presentatione by any Simonicall compact whatsoever, directlie or indirectlie; and if you have alreadie found, or shall heirefter find, any Simonicall errour committed by any, wee require you to punish the partic alsweell named in your lettre as all other offenders in that kind, by proces in the heigh commissione, or by deprivatione, suspensione, or otherwayis, as you shall find agreable to the cannons of the church, or lawes and practique of that our kingdome: Requiring you also to intimat this oure plesure unto all the rest of the Archbischopps and Bischopps within that our Kingdome, whereby they may carefullie look unto such abuses heirefter.—Whitehall, the 10 March 1630.

#### TO THE SESSIONE.

Right, &c.—Whareas wee are informed by our clergie thare that Mr Patrik Hepburne, the sone of the late Minister of Oldhamstockis, haveing confessed the giving of ane soume of money to the Erle Balcleuche for his presentatione to the said churche after his father's deceis, doethe endevore to defend and mantein his said impious act of Simonie under collour of the generalitie of the wordlis of ane act of Parliament made in anno 1612, which he and his lawers labour to wraist for thair owne purpose: And forasmuche as the generall wordlis of many actis of parliament which hath not been in use nor practise are not fitt to be raschlie put in executione, or wraisted into any impious sence, contrair to the intentione and true meening of the estates of parliament, Oure pleasure is tharefore that you seriouslie and conscibillie advert unto the said case of Simonie, and that yee cautiouslie prevent any precedent which may be urged for the defence of see wicked a cryme as is not only pernitious to the estate, but alsoe may prove to be the uter overthrow of the clurch thare, whose decayed rwines we wold glaidlie to be repared by all the faire and lauchfull means and wayis which can be devised: See recommending this particulare unto your serious consideratione, unto our nixt parliament may provide some wholesome remeid, we, &c.—Whitehall, the tenth of March 1630.

Right, &c.—Whareas wee are pleased to signe a signatour for some yeers to James Philp upon a motione made unto us in his behalff that the transportatione of milnstones and all others kind of stones fitt for building and dressing of houses and divers others uses, from thence into this our kingdome, never heirtoefore (as we are informed) practised, or by any might or means to set many of our poore subjectis thare a wark, and in some sort better our custumes both boir and thare; which, if you as yet have not caused exped, wee require you to doe it with all convenient diligence, granting unto him and his partiners, for the forthering of his intentione heirin, all such priveleges as you shall find to be requisit and usuall in the like nature: For doing whareoff, &c.—Whitehall, the tenthe of March 1630.

#### TO THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE PARLIAMENT.

Right, &c.—Whareas wee did latelie caus prorogate our Parliament unto the first day of Junij nixt to come, in houp that wee could have been our selff in persone at that time: And now considering that the present estate of our affairis can not permitt us to be there convenientlie as we desyred, And yet being

Sir James Baillie of Lochend, Knight, and his affectione to our service, wee think it necessare, and it is oure pleasoure, that you direct him hither, being instructed with all that may concerne our service in this bussienes, and that you satisfie of that which was formerlie allowed unto him for his repairing hither according to the warrand which he formerlie hade when he was send for, as likewayis at this time,—Whitehall, the eleventh day of Marche 1630.

Right, &c.—Whareas wee have granted unto . . . #### TO SIR ROBERT GORDOUNE.

Trustie, &c.—In regard wee approve the laudable custume of that our kingdome in choosing thare commissioners yeerlie in everic shire for attending at Parliamentis, conventiones, and other generall meetingis of the estates of the said kingdome, Wee have thought fitt, out of our princelie care both for church and commonewelth, to require you to proceed to a new electione of twoe such persones as you know to be sufficient and able, weell affected to our service and the publict good of that shire whareof you are ane shirreff against the nixt parliament, which wee intend in persone shortlie to hold thare: And wee haveing alreadie good prooff of your sufficiencie and affectione to our service and the publict good, wee wishe that yourselff might be chosen as one of the said twoe commissioners, if by any faire and laufull means you can procure the same to be done: Soe wee bid, &c.—Whitehall, the 16 of Marche 1630.

#### TO THE BISCHOPP OF CAITHNES.

Reverend father, &c.—Whareas wee did formerlie wreitt unto the Archbischopp of St Androis that notwithstanding of ane ordour of our privic counsell, whareby you are appointed to repair unto your dyocic and mak your aboad thare, yet he should suffer you to remain in the pairtes of your ordinarie residence during the winter seasone, in regard wee wer to use you in some thingis touching our service; and sieing now we intend verie shortlie to doa the same, Wee have thought good heirby to require you to remain still in your ordinarie residence till you heir forther from us, and (if need be) you acquent the said Archebischop with theis presentis: And for your soe doing, &c.—Whitehall, the 18 day of Marche 1630.

#### TO THE COUNSELL.

Right, &c .- Whareas it hathe been complaned unto us by . . . the Duke of Lennox that divers of our subjectis, and specialie the burgh of Edinburgh, hath encroached upon the offices of Admiralitie and chamberlanrie of that our native and ancient kingdome of Scotland, usurping honouris, privelieges, and benefictis belonging thareunto: And in regard that Mr Johne Hay, Commissioner for our said burgh, did affirme in our royall presence that they hade not acquired any thing belonging to the said offices; and forthermore, that iff our said burgh hade acquired any rightis in prejudice thereof that they wold willingly denude themselffis of the same in favouris of our said cousen: Oure expres will and plesour tharefore is, that you conveen before you the Magistratis of Edinburgh, Leith, and all others requisit in requiring them to give satisfactione to our said cousen, or to them intrusted by him, according to the said assurance made and given us by the said Mr Johne Hay, and our Advocatt concurr with the Advocattis of our said cousen in doing anything that may tend to the recovering of that which is wrongfully deteyned from him, or in securing of him in that which is or shalbe condiscendit upon, as they will answer upon there trust: And that you caus speedelie advise and raise summondis, righting our said cousen, to be called in the nixt parliament of that our kingdome aganis any persones whatsoever that have wronged or encroached upon the honouris, priveleges, and benefeittis of the saidis offices: And that you provide and use speedelie all others laufull means for preventing any inconveniences and redressing all prejudices that hes or may heirefter ensue and befall to our said cousen heiranent by prescriptione or otherwayis; the doing and performance whareof we recommend to your speciall care; And soe wee bid you fareweell.-Whitehall, the 18 of Marche 1630.

#### TO THE ERLE OF MARR, THESAURER.

Right, &c.—Though wee have ever been confident of your affections to our service, and of the continouance of your endevouris to the place wharein you serve; yet haveing by your lettre unto us, that in regard of your present infirmitic you are willing if wee be pleased tharewith to demitt the office of Thesaurer in favouris of . . . the Erle of Mortoune, wee approve of your resoluceone tharein, and upon your demissione shall presently grant the said place unto him, not doubting bot, as you wrett unto us, you will still be carefull to attend our service as one whome wee specialic respect: And soe, &c.—Whitehall, the 20 day of March 1630.

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#### TO THE ADVOCAT.

Trustie, &c.—Haveing perused the answer that yee sent unto up for preventing any inconvenient that might arrise unto Frances Steuart, sone to the late Erle of Bothuell, be means of the late act of prescriptione: After divers considerationes, the noblemen heir present whose have interest in that which he doeth clame are willing to renunce all benefit that they, there heirs or successouris, or any haveing right from them or to there belove, can pretend against the said Frances, be vertew of the said act of prescriptione, to the effect that the powere may still remain in our persone to determine therein as wee think best, as if the said act hade never been made: Therefore our plesour is, that you with all diligence imediatlie caus draw upp all such securitie or sureties as you think requisitt in law for the effect foirsaid, that the tuos noblemen heir present may presentlie renunce all benefitt that they, there heirs or successouris, or any haveing right from them or to there believe, may clame against the said Frances, be vertew of the said act of prescriptione; And it is our forther plesour that you mak interruptione in our name to . . . the Erle of Bulcleuch, and to all other persones whoe doe not renunce in due time all benefitt that may arrise to him or them, or to any of them, of the saidis landis, tithes, wadsettie, and others by vertew of the foirsaid act of prescriptione, as the noblemen heer present are content to doe, see that the said Frances be put in noe worse case by means thereof, But that the said estate may still remain in our handis to be disposed upon; and if the said Erle, or any other interested in that state, shall not as they doe renunce all benefeitt that can arise by vertew of the said act, if you find the interruptione made in our name will not be sufficient against the said Erle or others whoe doe not in due time renunce for the effect foirsaid. Wee are likewayis pleased you draw upp a pourre for the said Frances from us in his owner name to mak interruptione to the said Erle or to any whoe doeth not renunce in maner abone specifeit; Provyding alwayis that he have noe pourre to proceed forther then to mak the said interruptione, unless he have a further warrant from us for that purpose: And soe, becaus of the schortnes of the time, recommending carnestlie unto your care that all diligence possible be used for effectuating that our intentione abone expressed, Wee bid you, &c .- Whitehall, the 21 March 1630.

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pretend to the said patronage, and persew all or ether actions necessare and competent for estabilishing our right for 'reaid in the persone of the said Maister Johne, according to the lawes of that our kingdome.—Whitehall, 24 Marche 1630.

#### TO THE ADVOCAT.

Trustie, &c.—Whareas there hath been a signatour of some landis belonging to . . . the Erle of Buchane presented to be signed by us, as wee are willing to doe him any laufull favour, soe wee are loath that any thing which may be prejudiciall to the general! directiones which you have from us should pas, And therefore wold give ordour to doe the same till last your opinione were hade thereanent: Therefore our plesour is, that iff you find noething thereinto which is prejudiciall unto us or contrarie to our late decree, or any reservatione sent thereon to our Excheequer, that you ether caus pas the same or retorne it docated for our hand for that effect: Soe wee bid, &c.—Whiteball, the 24 Marche 1630.

#### TO SIR ALEXANDER HAY OF FOSTERSEAT.

Trustic, &c.—Whareas wee are informed that you have conceaved some informatione to have been made unto us against you: As in our princelie judgment wee ar not accustumed to give ear to any report made unto us against any of our subjectis whatsoever without verie apparent evidence and importent respectis, much les will wee hearken to any thing that might derogat from you whoe hath been in soe eminent a charge as one of the Senatouris of our Colledge of Justice, and whoe tharein hath soe long served us and our deir father of worthie memorie, without wee hade both seen just caus and reall groundis for the same, and hade caused acquent you tharewith for the better justicficing of yourselff: Bot wee are soe farr from any such conceptione as may tend to your disadvantage, that wee will not be unmyndfull to expres our forther respect unto you when ony occasione shall convenientlie be offered unto us for doing the same. Whareoff haveing thought fitt at this time to give you notice, Wee bid you, &c.—Whitehall, the 4 day of Aprill 1630.

#### TO THE EXCHEQUER.

#### To the Thesaurer and Deputie Thesaurer.

Right, &c.—We have been willing to have some muttons yearly from that our kingdome, at such seasones of the year and in such number as was formerlie brought in custume for the use of our late dear

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father, to which purpose wee have been formerlie pleased to give ordour at severall times; and understanding that Johne Goddes, whoe hath taken great panis and been at charges to doe us service thatein, was be our appointment imployed in this earand: Oure pleasoure is, that you authorise him tharein to bring hither for our us, such and the like number of sheep as wer in use to be brought of before; And that you pay him the like allowances and feels as wer paid by Sir Godeon Murray, our late Deputic Thesaurer, to any persone whoe at that time hade the like charge: And for that purpos that according to our first intentione furness unto him upon accompt present moneyis at his first begining to serve us in that kind; ffor doing whareof, &c.—Whitehall, the fourth day of Aprill 1630.

#### TO THE EXCHEQUER.

Right, &c.—Whareas we have been informed by our servand James Maxuell of Innerweek that his landis and barony of Innerweek are holden of our principalitie by the tennour of ward and releeff whareby the maringe of his dochters by his death may fall in our handis and at our guift if they should happen not to be matched in his lifetime: And wee being weell pleased at his humble sute to compound with him by your advise for the wardschip and mariages of his saidis dochters, if the same shall fall: Oure pleasour tharefore is, that you secure him and them from the danger of the said wardschip and mariages for such compositione as is usuall for the like barrones, or as you think fitting for a man of his qualitie and place, and in such a legall maner as our advocat shall devise, in a signature to be presented by him to your handis to be passed for that effect.—Whitehall, the 16 day of Aprill 1630.

#### TO THE COUNSELL.

Right, &c.—Haveing intentione upon verie good considerationes at this time to aid our brother the King of France with such forces as wee can convenientlie spare, We required . . . the Lord Gordoune to leavie in that our kingdome a companye of Tuoe thousand footmen, ffor doing whareof it is fitt that he be authorised by our commissione under the Great Seall of that our Kingdome of Scotland appointing him to be folle Colonell of the said regement, with pourare to him to elect, nominat, and appoint such commanders and officiars as are usuall to be appointed by a Colonell: These are therefore to will and require you upon sight heirof to caus exped unto the said Lord a commissione under our Great Seall aforesaid in competent forme, giveing and granting unto him full poure a licience to leavie and transport the said regiment . . . into France for our said brother's service, out of all such persones within that our kingdome as he shall find willing to goe with him thither, granting him libertie to tuck drummes for that purpose, with as large priveleges as any other hath hade heirtofore in the like kind, he alwayis giving such satisfactione to everie one of the said number as shalbe agreed upon betuix him and them according to the like cases: ffor doing whereof, &c.—Whitehall, the 20 of Aprill 1630.

rebellione, and excommunicated persones in the Northern partes of that our kingdome: And now conceaving the time agreed upon betnix you and him for imbringing of the said is excommunicated rebellis to be too schort in regard of his present imployment in the other service concerning our brother the King of France: Our pleasoure is, that the said former time condiscended upon betnix you for executing of the said commissione be prorogated till the first day of July nixtocum, &c.—Whitehall, the 20 of Aprill 1630.

#### TO THE EXCHEQUER.

Right, &c.—Seing, as wee are informed, it picased our late deir father to give ordour by a lettre from him that noe guift of the Erle of Nithesdale his liftent or eschet should be disponed of untill he wer first acquented tharewith: And wee, being noe les carefull of that which may concern the said Erle or the good of his house, doe require you by their presentis that you pas noe gift of his liferent or escheat till he, or such as shall have warrand from him, be first hard, that the benefit thareof may be applyed for his debtis, and rayment of the same, and releefling of his cationers, whome we recommend unto you in like maner, in soe farr as they stand bound for him, &c.—Whitehall, the 20 of Aprill 1636.

#### TO THE VISCOUNT CLANNEBOURS.

Right, &c.—Being informed by... the Erle of Nithesdale of the care and diligence taken by you in all thingis that might tend to the advancement of our service, and how carefull you have been to apprehend and send againe some notorious maliefactouris, whoe, haveing committed hyenous crymes in Scotland, hade fled from thence to Irland, thareby preventing the due course of justice fit to be execute upon all such malefactouris, Wee doe rander you hartlie thankis for the same, And doe heirby will and require you that, upon adverteisment from our Counsell, or Commissioners of the Middle shires, called the borders, you cans search and apprehend any such persones afoi:said as shalhappin to be within your boundis, or elswhare, as you shall think fitt, and that you caus send them bak againe, which we will tak as acceptable service, &c.—Whitehall, the 20 of Aprill 1630.

#### TO THE VISCOUNT MONTGUMBIE.

Another lettre conforme to the former was directed to the Viscecount Montgomrie, verbatim, of the foresaid dait.

#### TO THE ERLE OF MONTEATH.

Right, &c.—Being informed of the great abuses which arise in the bordouris by a custume latelie used in the holding of Courtis, whereof noe man, how giltie soever of thift or receipt of thift, is put to triall by the Commissioners except the partie accuser doe suer and persue at the tour, by which abuse many notorious theeffis doe daylie escape punishment, the partie from whom the goodis are stolline not darring openlie so to follow the same for fear o. forder harme from the maister or freendis of the theeffis; as likewayis many haveing committed thiftis from Englishemen which are notoriouslie knouen are libered from punishement in regard the parties from whome the goodis are stollen doe not compeir to follow, whee, ether upon collusione or many other reassones, may pretend cause to be absent from the Justice Courtis: Tharefore our pleasure is, that you, or the rest of the Commissioners of the borders, a dittay being sufficientlie suerne to any one of the Commissioners, or to the clark of the commissione, or the dittay being knouen by

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h consent as wer in pregnant probabilities, conforme to the custume which bath been used Lefor times, caus the partie accuser by this triall, and with all that you give or dour that noe cautione be admitted before the generall Justice of such as are inhabitantis in the shires of late called the borders, whoe are accused of thift, recent of thift, or recent slauchter, but that they be appointed to by their triall at the Justice Courtis upon the borders: And whareas likewayis there are divers the effis and male factouris whoe, haveing for there superiouris the Lordis of the regalitie, are protected by them, see eschewing due punishement which should be executed against them, Wee will that you desire the saidis Lordis, ether by themselves or that baillieffis, to assist and concurr with you for thate triall, whereby justice may be ministred; and for the benefit that shall arrise thareby it is noe way is our meening that they be prejudged thereof: And for your see doing, &c.—Whitehall, the 20 of Aprill 1630.

#### TO THE HEIGHE COMMISSIONE.

Right, &c.—Whareas, at the humble sute of the Bischoppe and ministeris of Gallowa, and upon certificat from them of the great necessitie of building and providing a churche at Portt Montgumric, alias Port Patrik, not onlie for the good of the inhabitantis at the said port, and others neir unto itt, bot also of all our subjectis of our kingdome of Scotland, Engiand, and Irland that doe travell to and from Irland, Wee wer graciouslie pleased to give ordour to our advocat to caus a signatour be drawen upp for our hand, that the church which was then abuilding by . . . Viscecount Montgumrie might be thareby erected into a paroch church, and provided with means competent for the interteinment of a preacher to serve the cure thare: And now, understanding that the said Church is weell builded and finished by our said . . . Viscount Montgomrie at his charges, and that by our lettres under our Great Scall of that our kingdome of Scotland the said churche is erected into a paroch churche, and certane landis disguised [dovised ?] and alloted thareunto for a paroschine, but as yet there is noe provisione for a minister, Oure pleasure tharefor is, that you tak a speciall care to sie the said churche weell provided out of the first and reddiest of such tithes, great or small, or other essualities, kirk-rent, which ether are or shalhsppin in our handis, and that the samen be annexit to the said churche for ever heirofter for interteinment of the minister thare: Which recommending seriouslie to your care, we bid you fareweell, &c.—Whitehall, the 20 of Aprill 1630.

#### TO THE COUNSELL.

Right, &c.—Whareas wee are informed that divers parties, goldsmithes, gravers, cutters, and others artificers, take upon them to grave, paint, cutt, and give coatis of armes to such persones as are not privelidged by the law of armes nor any way warranted by us to wear coatt armour or cognissance of gentrie; which disordour wee will not suffer any longer to be continued, sieing that both wee, our ancient nobilitie, and gentrie of that our kingdome are heirby wranged, and in particulare our King of Armes, whose cheeff mantenance hath heretofore depended (as wee are informed) upon the like services: Tharefore our plesure is, and wee doe heirby require you, to call before you all such persones as shalbe alledged by our said King of Armes to transgres in that kind, ordayning to deliver upp to him all bookis of armes, genologies, papers, and all other draughtis touching that purpose which can be found by you to be in thare handis or custodie: Likewayis our plesour is that you fyne and imprissone all offenders in this kind according as the nature of the offence shall require, Ordaning them to find suretie and cautione, under such panis as you shall think expedient, that they doe not in any time heirefter transgres in this maner.—Whitehall, the 20 of Aprill 1630.

#### TO THE CHANCELLARE.

Right, &c.—Haveing preferred . . . Sir James Balfour of Kinnard, Knight, to be our King of Armes in that our kingdome of Scotland, And being willing that noe honour belonging to that place and office should be diminished or impared, It is our royall pleasure and will that you with all convenient diligence inaugorat him with all ceremoney due and requisit in als goodlie maner and forme, and als solemnlie in all respectis as ever any Lione King at Armes hath bene crouned in that our kingdome; ffor doing whareof, &c.—Whiteball, the 20 day of Aprill 1630.

#### TO THE COUNSELL.

Right, &c.—Whareas (wee are informed) that divers insufficient persones of noe worth nor reputatione hath latelie, by the neglegences of our late King of Armes, bene promitted, contrare to the law of armes, the honour of us, and of that our ancient kingdome, to be herauldis and pursevantis, whoe for the most pair being ignorantis, without learning or letters, keepers of tavernes and victualling houses, does soe blemishe and defile that honerable office of armes, contrarie to the oathe given by them at there admissione: Wee, thinking ourselves heirby verie much interested, doe will and require you that you call oure King of Armes before you, ordouring him to cite the wholl herauldis and pursevantis of that our kingdome, and in our presence, according to the accustume used in the like causes, trie and examine them; requiring you likewayis to discharge from any forther exercise of that office all such as shall not be judged worthie by you of soe honorable an office and calling: ffor doing whereof, &c.—Whitehall, the 20 of Aprill 1630.

#### TO THE ERLE OF LINLYTHQUHO.

Right, &c.—Whareas wee are informed that you of late, by advise of our Privic Counsell, have not for some causes proceedit against some persones (whoe hade tortered some of the subjectis of our brother the French King) according to the sentence of deathe given against them by your court of Admiralitie, till oure plesour should be first knouen tharein; as wee doe approve of your moderat maner of proceeding in this in seeking the approbatione of us and our counsell, whare you might have caused execute justice of yourself, according to the privelege of your office: Soe now (sieing yee desire to know our plesure heirin), wee will the rather trust your oune judgment and discretione; And therefore wee remitt unto yourself to tak suche a course touching them as you shall think most fitt and equitable: Soe we, &c.—Whitehall, the 20 of Aprill 1630.

#### TO THE COUNSELL.

Right, &c.—Whareas we have been petitioned by William Ramsay of Pettenweem, in the cuntrie of Fyff, for some duetie to be imposed upon everic tune of goodis which shalbe imported or exported into or out of that our kingdome, in any stranger's bodden, accordinglie as is done with our subjectis in other forrane partis: Though wer think it ressonable that thare should be a difference betuix our native subjectis and strangers in such causes, yet we wold not doe anything heirin till first your advise wer hard of; and tharefor, haveing thought fitt to send you the petitione heir enclosed to be considered of, that haveing certified us bak of your opinione tharein, we may tak such courses tharefter as we shall think most fitt: Soe we bid, &c.—Whitehall, the 20 of Aprill 1630.

Right, &c.—Wee are informed by petitione from James Hereot, our jewaller, that his brother George in his laufull legacie bequethed a legacie of 1000<sup>11b</sup> sterling to Thomas Hereot, and other brother, with speciall appointment that iff any of the said soume, or any part of itt, should be unpayed after the decease of the said Thomas, it should descend upon the said petitioner, and that at least two thirdis read in the said George his executouris handis, or our toune of Edinburgh, upon ane heretable band, whareby the petitioner, as being his nixt heir, besidis the will of the testatour, hathe the undouted right to at the least the said two-thridis; Bot that notwithstanding thereof the executouris of the last deceased Thomas his brother acclame the wholl, and by reasone of the peticeoner's absence, and that there clamouris, importonis, or povertic may possibillie prejudge him in his right, These are therefore to recommend unto you our said servand his right, and to will and require you to look carefullie thereunto, that hee be not prejudged by his absence, it being for our speciall and daylie service but that he may find as a just and equitable, see a speedie and quick dispatche: Wharein not doubting of your care and diligence, wee bid you faroweell.—Whitehall, the 24 of Aprill 1630.

#### TO THE EXCHEQUER.

Right, &c.—Wee are informed by peticeone from Andro Dicksone that he haveing taken great panis and layed out great soumes of money in reparing and setting furth of those shippes which have ordour for the use of the estate thare, hath not onlie been prejudged in his healthe, but lyen out of his money all this whill, to his great domage and almost utter undoing: Wee tharefore, in justice and out of our princelie commiseratione, have thought fitt to will and require you fforthwith to examine the accomptis of his debursementis, and give ordour for speedie payment of such money is as you shall find to be due unto him thareupon, &c.—Whitehall, the 24 of Aprill 1630.

#### TO THE EXCHEQUER.

Right, &c.—Wee are informed by peticeone from Peter Hay that his childring haveing been made executouris to thare grandmother for apprehending certane legacies bequethet from hir unto them, have notwithstanding been keept from the benefit thareof by the adversouris of hir husband George Bonyman during his lifte, and since his death by the pouare of his freendis, see as now he hath noe other remedie of thare losse but by our grant of all the chattellis, reall and personall, pertining to the said George during his liftime, and being escheated unto us by vertew of his rebellione: These are tharefore, out of our princelie commiscratione, to will and require you, if the information be trew, to exped in name of the petitioner a grant of the said George his escheat: Yet see as you tak him bound to mak noe forther use thareof than for the recoverie of the saidis legacies to the behove of his childring; wharein not doubting of your care, Wo, &c.—Whitehall, 24 Aprill 1630.

#### TO THE ADVOCAT.

Trustie, &c.—Wee are informed by peticeone from Archebald Wood, keeper of our moore of Moore Eamonth, that it is mightic increached upon by some of the nobilitie and gentric haveing landis neir adjacent thereto, whereby not onlie the peticeoner is endomaged, but wee alsoe divers wayis, and especiallie in our right prejudged: These are also to will and require you, if the information be trew, to tak a legall and speedie course for vindicating our right, and the peticeoner's prejudice from any forther intrusione or present encroachment, but housever to certifie us of your diligence, and enquire heiranent: Wharein not doubting of your care Wee bidd you fareweell.—Whitchall, the 24 day of Aprill 1630.

#### TO THE COUNSELL

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valess the saids Commissioners shall find a just reasone in the contrair, ather in the behalff of some number or some particular persones, and for some speciall respects as ther continewing in contempt and neglect to compone and agrie for ther transgressions, or for some other causes thoult fitt be the saids Commissioners for the reformation of such a dangerous abuse: Therefter his Majestie have thought fitt to committ the trust and manageing of this bussines to such selected persones as he knowis to be well affected to his service and carefull of the well of his people; and haveing good prooff and experience of his Right, &c. the Viscount of Daplin, Lord Chancellour, William Erle of Morton, Lord Thesaurer, William Erle of Monteith, President of his Majestels Privie Counsall, Thomas Erle of Hadinton, Lord Privie Seall, Sir William Alexander, Principall Secretarie for Scotland, Sir Thomas Hope, his Mateis Advocat, and the Thesaurer-deputie for the tyme, Giving, granting, and committing, lykas his Matie doeth heirby Give, grant, and committ to them, or any tuo of them, with the said Thesaurer, full power and commission to compone, transact, and agrie, with all persones alreadie tryed and fund guiltie, or that heirefter shalbe tryed and fund guiltie in offending sgaust the said Act, for such sowmes of money as they shall pay vnto his Majestie for the penaltic incurred be them; which composition to be made with them, and the moneyis componed for being payed for his Mateis vse to the said Thesaurer or his deputie or deputeis authorized be him, and his or his forsaids acquittancis and discherges gevin therepon, His Matic decernes and declairis that the saidis acquittances and discharges so to be given shalbe as sufficient exoneration to the persones offending in this kynd as if everie one of them had a particular pardon vnder his Majesteis great seall: And lykwyse with full power and authoritie to the saidis Commissioners to call for and intromet with all such part or parts of the saidis taxatiouns as have bene intromitted with be the saids Collectours, ther deputts or vnder receavers, or any vther persone or persones whatsumever, whairof they or any of them have not made accompt of in Excheker, or which have not bene imployed be them be particular warrandis from his Malio, which moneyis being lykwyse delyvered to his Malios said Thesaurer, his acquittance or acquittances vpon receipt theirof shalbe a sufficient exoneration and discharge to the said Lord Chancellour and Erle of Mar, ther deputeis, under receavers, and others as aforsaid for the delyverie thairof in maner above writtin, and generallic with full power and commission to the saidis Commissioners to doe and exercise, &c., firme and stable, &c., and that the said Letter be extendit in the best forme, with all claussis neidful; and his Matte ordanes this present signature to be a sufficient warrand to the directour of his Majestic's Chancerie for wryting of the said Commission, and to his Mateis Chancellour for appending his highnes great seall therto without any precept to be passed for that effect under his Mateis signet or privie seall -Gevin at Whythall, the ellevint of Junij 1630.

Our Soveraigne Lord ordeanes a Letter to be made under his highnes great seall of Scotland, Makand mention that wheras his Mateis trustie and weilbeloved Mr David Fullerton, one of the receavers of his Mateis rents of the said kingdome, did by speciall direction from his Mateis receave for his Mateis vse, for provisions and other things fitt to be in readines at his Mateis intended goeing at that tyme to the said kingdome, from some persones in his Mateis kingdome speciallic entrusted in some of his Mateis affaires, the sowme of eight thoward pundis sterling money; and his Mateis haveing now upoun good considerations, and for the well of his service in the said kingdome of Scotland, made speciall choyse of his Mateis right, &c. the Erle of Morton to be his Mateis Thesaurer thairof (who by reasone of the great want of moneyis at this tyme in his Mateis Exchequer occasioned upon many and important causes) is to seik all the lawfull wayes and meanes wherby moneyis may be had for dischargeing such necessar affaires as his Mateis tyme hath speciallic entrusted unto him, and as speciallic doe concerne the good of his Mateis present and urgent affaires to be performed ther: Therfore his Mateis, and for diverse other good considerationns moveing his highnes, have gevin, granted, and committed, lykas his Mateis thir presentis Gives, grants, and committed

vnto him his Maleis full power and commission to call for ane accompt of the said sowme of Eight thowsand pundis, and everie part theirof, at the handis of the said Mr David Fullerton, and at the handis of any other officers whatseever, persone or persones to whome the saidis moneyis, or any part thairof, had bene delivered by the said Mr David, wheref account hath not bene made be him and them, or any of them, in Exchecker, to be made appear vnto the said Thesaurer, and which he the said Mr David or any of the saidis persones hath not bene alreadie imployed by hic Mateis speciall warrand appearing under his highnes' hand, and for the speciall vse of his Mateis service, with full power and commission to the said Thesaurer to receave and vplift from the said Mr David, or from other persones as aforesaid, the said sowme of eight thowsand pundis, or such part or parts theirof as hath not bene made accompt of in Exchequer as aforsaid, and particularlie imployed by speciall warrand from his Mate, and for the vse of his Mateis service, as said is, And with power to his Mateis said Thesaurer to dispose thairof for the good of his Mateis said service: And his Matte doeth heirby declare that the said Thesaurer his acquittance or acquittances granted vpoun the recept "hairof, or any part thairof, pro tanto, shalbe as sufficient exoneration and discherge to the said Mr David, and others officers and persones aforsaid, as if he and everie of them wer particularlie discherged be his Matie efter what maner they could best devyse, and with power to the said Thesaurer all and sindrie vther thingis to doe, vse, and exerce, &c., firme and stable, &c.: And that the said Letter be extendit in the best forme, with all clauses neidfull; And his Matie ordeanes this present signature to be a sufficient warrant to the directour of his Mateis Chancerie for wryting of the said commission, and to his Mateis Chancellour for appending the great seall thairto, without any precent to be pass for that effect vnder his Mateis signet or privie seall .- Gevin at Whythall, the 11 of Junii 1630

Trustie, &c.—Wee haveing at some lenth writen to our Exchecquer touching some causes of the resignatione to be made in our favouris by the Reverend father in God the Bischopp of the Iles, which you, as one of that number, will perceave, Oure pleasoure is, that you draw upp in sure maner a resignatione of the superiorities, temporall landis, and benefices whatsoever of the Bischoprik of the Iles, the Abbacie and Nunrie of Icolnekill, and Priories of Ardchatan and Orensey, or of any other landis, superioritie, and benefices belonging and annexit to that Bischoprik, reserving specialie the spiritualitie thareof, whareby he may provide the ministeric in that diocie, that wee be not heirefter burdened with thare mantenance: And tharefter that you in our name intend process and insist by law for drawing bak of that temporall estate for our use, in soe far as justly and laufullie can bee done by you; at the full recoverie whereof wee will (according to our royall promies made unto the said Bischopp) that the same be restored unto him or his successouris Bischoppis of the Iles, oure yeerlie allowance of thrie hunderith pundis sterling granted unto him being at that time drawen bak to our Exchequer: Soe, not doubting but that you will prosecute this purpose without exceptione of persones or occasions, haveing legall and convenient groundis for doing thareof, wee, &c.—Whitehall, the eleventh day of Junij 1630.

Wee have moved our Thesaurer to engage himself and freend is for paying of Ten thousand pound is sterling to the said Erle of Marr (which wee wer pleased to bestow upon him as a mark of our princelic favour for his bypast services), and for releafing of him of all sounces of money levied and expendit by him for oure use, and of the super expensis of his accompt is in the charge he hade from us, whareby, finding our self is in honour [bound] to provide for our said Thesaurer's releaf since he and his freend is have undergone their burding is for the good of our service, heing besid to leave great soumes of money for our necessare charges during our aboad in that our kingdome: Oure pleasoure is (for his and thare more frie and readie payment of die is money is), that there be granted unto him and them, and such of them as shalhappen to be bound with him heirefter for

### TO THE GENERALL CONVENTION.

Right, &c.—Wheras we have bene humblis moved, in behalff of . . . Robt Buchan, that ather some moneyis might be levyed from all such persones ther as would willinglise contribute to the repairing and vpholding of the way, called the King's Calsey, in Courmont, being the ordinarie road from the north to the south parts of that our kingdome; or, if any landis can be fund formerlie appropriated for vpholding therof, that the rents of the same may be converted to ther vse. 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his earnestnes to sie that work effected, wherof (in respect, as we ar informed, of the nearnes of his duelling to that passage) we think fitt that he have the charge; which recommending to your care.—Whythall, 14 Junij 1630.

### TO THE COMMISSIONERS FOR SURRENDERS.

Right, &c.-Whareas wee have given our determinatione upon that which was submitted to us concerning tithes, appointing price and the maner of the payment that the heretouris should performe for the same, which accordinglie wee desire to tak effect: But being informed that there is an great hinderance heirin by the slow progres of the valuationes, occasioned by some indirect means used in the same, and that divers heretouris and titulars are earnest to conclude for thare tithes according to our decree: Oure pleasure is, that you use all reasonable means in hastening the valuationes, and in the meantime that you tak a course with diligence for preventing any inconvenient that may come by leading of tithes, by appointing the titulars who have powere to caus value the tithes which they wer accustumed to lead to doe it before the time of the nixt leading, that the heretouris may lead the tithes of his owne landis, paying or securing there tithemaisters for the same according to the valuationes made or to be made, ffor wee sic noe reasone why the heretour should not posses his owne tithes if he ether satisfie according to our decree, or till the valuationes be ...fectit (where the delay is not his fault), pay or secure by your appointment the titular, conforme to the said valuatione made or to be made, at least noe lettres of spoliatione should be granted in that caice, the expeditione whereof we will you to tak in your consideratione and signifie the same to our Colledge of Justice; and wee doe not esteem any partie, ether titular or heretour, of the benefitt of our decree, in whose default the perfectione of that work is hindered, the speedie perfecting whereof we specialie recommend unto your care, leaving the means where they are not cleir to your owne judgment: Soe we, &c .- Whitehall, the 14 Junij 1630.

Right, &c.—Being credibillie informed that James and Alaster Grantis, being accompanied with a nomber of other rebellis to the number of fyve or sex scoir, have, in great contempt of our auctoritie and lawes, banded themselves, and in oppen and braving manner oppressed some of our good subjectis in these partes, especiallie such as dwell upon the landis of the Laird of Frendright; and having heard that they are assisted by some of your tennentis and followers, whareat wee did verie much wonder, seing wee expected that noe thing concorning our service in using your best endevouris to settle peace in these partis should have been neglected by you, though not warranted from us or our counsell thare: Oure pleasour is, you haveing particularlie informed yourselff of these rebellis, and of there hantis and residentis, that you [take] the first opportunitie of comming or being within your boundis, whare ye are knowen to have any command or freendship, and that you apprehend and send them to our counsell or Justice Generall for undergoing such punishment as there offenses shalbe found justile to meritt: And as wee will not think weel of any neglect or delay heirin upon your part, soe if you doe proceed (as wee doubt not) according to our royall plesour heirin, wee will accompt it is a verie acceptable service done to us, whereof wee will not be unmyn-ifull when any occasione shall offer whareby wee may laufully and conveniently expres our respect unto you.—Whitehall, the 15 day of Junij 1630.

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### TO THE COUNSELL

Right, &c.—Wheras we ar importuned by diverse petitions from Alexander Hay, Indueller in Leith, compleying upon a wreng done by letters directed from ws; considering how much this did concerne ws in honour and justice, if any such just cause had bene gevin, and not onlie ws and our ministers heir, bot likewayes yow of our Counsell and session, to whom our letters wer directed, if yow or they had fund any such thing and not acquainted ws therin, we wer pleased to give ordour to such of our Counsell as wer heir for the tyme to call him before them, and to peruse the extracts of these letters, from whom it was reported to we that his complaint did proceid from a mere calumnie, without any just caus: And as if we had fund it otherwyse we would have takin ordour therwith accordinglie, so, haveing understude that such seditious persones deserve to be punisched, we gave ordour and caused declair our pleasur tuitching the sending of him to that our kingtome, which, since he has neglected and doeth absent him selff heir, therby adding contempt of our royall direction to his former fault, Our pleasur is, that yow caus apprehend him at his comeing ther, and committ him to prissone till you have conferred tuitching this purpois with some of our privic counsell who were heir, and therefter that yow censure and caus inflict such punischment ypon him as yow shall find his offence shall deserve, taking assurance of him that ypon no occasion whatsoever he shall repair to our Court.—Whythall, 22 Junij 1630,

Right, &c.—Wheras humble complaynt hath bene made vnto ws by James Law, one of our heraulds, that he hath not receaved the reward due to him, provydit by Act of parliament made in anno 1621 for such persones who discover conceillers and wrongous vpgivers of ther lent money to deceave ws of our taxatiouns, and that besyds the service alreadie done by him and charges expended therein, for which he hath not receaved any satisfactione, he is able to doe ws greater service in that kynd, wherin for his better encouragment Our pleasur is, that yow hear his accompts, and if yow shall find any thing dew vnto him for his reward and disbursmentis, that proportionablic as he shall mak appear that any of these moneyis have bene levyed and imployed for our vse by his meanes, that he be satisfied for the same out of the readiest moneyis belonging vnto ws, togidder with his charges which shall lykwyse appear vnto yow that he hath justlie and necessarile disbursed therin, or if yow find such moneyis levyed by his meanes, and no accompt made thairof as yet for our vse, that yow requyre our Collectour haveing charge theref to tak that course for his satisfaction, and if you find it requisite for the good of our service in that kynd, that yow continew him in that imployment efter such maner, tyme, and condition as yow shall think fitt, and is provydit by the said Act.—[No date.]

These grant to Sir George Abercrombis and Sir Colins Campbell, ther administratours, are sole Licence within Scotland for tuentie-one yeres, to dy and fix all maner of cullours in grayne vpon cloth, yarne stuff, and silks, without help or composition of Cucheneill, and to mak the best vse of that invention both at home and abroad: These ar to be as sufficient warrand for some strangers to reside ther for advanceing that invention, as if they had Letters of denization: All persones (others then the patentees and ther forsaidis) vseing ther said Invention dureing the said space ar to be censured as your Ma<sup>teis</sup>. Counsell shall think fitt, and the halff of the benefite aryseing by things heirby prohibited, to be vsed or made therin to your Ma<sup>tis</sup>, and the vther halff to the patentees; if this be not reallie putt in practeis within 3 yeres these presents ar void.—Whythall, 28 Junij 1630.





arreist, search, hinderance, or molestation whatsoever, as yow and everie of yow will answer the contrarie at your perrells: Giveing and by these presents Granting to the said Williame Clayborne full power to direct and governe, correct and punishe such of our subjects as shalbe vnder his Command in his ways and discovereis: And for your see doeing these presents shalbe your sufficient warrand.—Gevin at our maner at Grenwich, the 16 of May 1631, the sevint yeir of our regne.

To our trustie and weil beloved our Governour and Counsall of Virginia: To all our Livetennents of provinces and Cuntreyis in America, governours and others haveing any charge of Coloneis of any of our subjects ther, and to all Captanes and Masters of Schipps, and generallie to all our subjects whatsoover thom these presents doe or may concerne.

Right, &c.—Wheras, vpon humble sute made vnto ws in behalff of Robert and Alexander Irwings and Thomas Meinzeis, that they may have libertie to trade in merchandice in that our kingdome of Scotland, and to setle some of ther necessar affaires, wher with they, in humble obedience of our lawis for the sudden departing from thence, could not have tyme to tak ordour, and in all things else to be restraned in what is not ordinarlie allowed to any stranger repairing thither for trade, We have been pleased to wryt vnto our Chancellour concerneing that purpois, and to grant them licence to setle the saids affaires and trade as strangers within our said kingdome, with a restriction that they doe nothing therin to hurt or derogat from the estate of the posent professed religion: Therfor we have thoght it fitt to recommend them vnto yow, that if they performe what is heirby provyded by we tuitching the religion, yow give way vnto them, in so far as may concerne the dispatch of ther lawfull affaires.—Grenwich, 28 May 1431.

We have duelie examined and considered the caus wherin the Erldome of Lothian and Lordschip of Newbotle doeth presentlie stand, both by sieing the patent therof granted by our royall father, of happie memorie, to Robert, the late Erle therof, vpon his resignation of the former made to Erle Mark, and the Act of Parliament Confirming the same: And having takin advyse of these with whome we have thought fitt to consult about it, being persones of honour and vnderstanding, and well acquanted with the bussines, we doe planelie perceave that his purpois was that, if failzeing of heyris-male of his bodie, his eldest daughter without division should be his he, re, both to his whole estate and honour, in so far as in him lay, to establish it vpon condition that schoe should marie a well borne gentlman of the surname of Ker, who should be bund to bear the said Erle's Armes; and sieing that according to his intention his eldest daughter, the Lady Anne Ker, hath maried Sir William Ker, sone to Sir Robert Ker of Ancrum, knyt, gentlman of our bedchalmer, and so on hir part hath fulfilled the condition sett on hir by hir father; and hir husband as also willing to bear these armes and leave his owin, and that Sir Robert Ker, his father, hath ypon the mariage redeamed the Lordschip of Newbotle out of ther handis who had comprysed the same for the late Erle's debts, and by adding his owin estate to it, and other Compitent meanes, wherby of a perplexed and almost ruinated estate, by God's assistance, he hath made it capable of the former dignitie; haveing also provydit a portion to the Lady Jeane, the late Erle's younger daughter: All which considered, out of our grace and favour to the saids persones, and, if God will, to keip vp the house to them and ther posteritie, who have done see much for it, we have thought fitt to creat the said Sir William Ker of Ancrum, and his aires-male, erles of Lothian and Lords of Newbotle; and becaus that we hear that Sir William Ker of Blaikhope, brother to the late Erle of Lothian, hath takin on him (as pretending to be airmale of the house) to style himselff by that title without our licence and authoritie: Therfoir it is our express will, and we command yow, that yow call befoir yow the said Sir William Ker of Blaikhope, and freindlie reprove him in our name for so great presumption, letting him know what we have bene pleased to doe, and stratlie chargeing him that he nor nane of his successours, ather gottin of his bodie or brethren, who might perhaps pretend the same heirefter, if he should die without aires, presume to vse that title heirefter; and if he have anything to alledge why this should not be done, lett him seik his releiff by the Lawis of that our kingdome, and shall have such just hearing as we doe willinglie grant to all our subjects; bot if the said Sir William Ker of Blaikhop keip himselff out of the way to avoyd this just reprooff, or that he cum not readelie to hear ta's our declaration, then it is our will that yow so mak knowen this our pleasur, that by his freinds he may be adverteised of it, and that none give that styll bot to these vpon whom by letters patents we have conferred it.—The last of Octor 1631.

Right, &c.-Wheras, vpon severall informations made vnto we by some of our subjects haveing lands and tythis of the Abbacie of Lundoris, and ypon your opinion in Law, certifeid (as we ar informed) to the Commissioners of Exchequer, of the valawfulnes of a grant of the herstable offices, superioriteis, and others mentionat therin, procured by William Forbes, late of Cragiovar, wherof not onlie we in our right, bot these vasalls, wer lyklie to have bene exceedinglie prejudged, we wer pleased to require yow to reduce the said grant in our name; whervoon a submission being offered vnto ws by Sir William Forbes, his sone, whairof we would not accept becaus of the reservations and provisions therin, We did wryt vnto some of that Commission and your selff for composeing the differences betuixt him and the vassalls tuitching things to be performed by each pairtie to other, and the benefite that might therby aryse vnto ws; otherwyse to certifie vnto ws the reasones and your opinions therin: Notwithstanding (without answer returned) we are now informed by James Chalmers, phisician in Ordinarie to ws, and our dearest sone the Prince, that vpon the said Sir William his preferring of a new signature to our Exchequer, wherby, to wrong we and the saids vassalls, some of them have bene moved to compone and agric onlie with the said Sir William for new grants, and that such of them as would not bot stand our right have bene forced at severall tymes to cum from ther duellings to Edinburgh, wher, never being called youn by the said Sir William, they have returned, to ther great prejudice: Our spetiall pleasur is, and we doe heirby command yow, that without further delay yow proceid and prosecute the reduction of the grant procured by his said father, and that according to our lawis, as yow will tender the good of our service; and that in all other things concerning that purpois yow carefullie advert that nothing be done therin that may anywayee prejudge we in our right, and to that effect that yow acquant the Lords of our session and Exchequer with our pleasur heirin, -Whythall, 17 Jar 1632.

# TO THE COUNSELL.

Right, &c.—Haveing considered the great prejudice that We receave in our dominions by the abuse of Coyne, the best of our gold and silver being exported to Forraeyne nations, and a base sort of money imported in place therof, We have the more willinglie hearkned to such propositions as wer made for remedie of the same, that we may therefter, with your advyse and with advyse of our Counsell heir, resolve what course is best to be takin for reformeing the present abuses and preventing the lyk heirefter: Our

pleasur is, that yow tak the proposition which we send yow heirwith into your consideratioun, as lykwayes any other that shalbe made by Johne Achiesone, general of our Mynt, or any other of our Mynt heir, haveing called for them for that effect; And efter yow have seriouslie considered of them, that so soon as convenientlie yow can, yow certifie we of your opinion what yow think best to be done therin, that we may therefore tak such a course theranent for the well of our kingdomes.—[Not dated.]

# TO THE EXCHEQUER.

Our Soveraigne Lord, vnderstanding how that Colonell Lumisden, haveing charge vnder the King of Sweden for levyeing of some men in Scotland be his Mateia permission for the said King of Sweden his service in the warres of Germanie, and how to that effect his Matie have gevin a Commission to the said Colonell, who haveing made choyse of Captan David Wallace to be his serjant Major, for the sufficiencie and knowledge of the said Capitane David Wallace hath in militarie discipline, did for that purpois send for the said Capitane Wallace out of Irland, wher he hath the Charge of Livetennent in the Regiment of the Erle of Buccleugh: But the said Captan Wallace hearing that in his absence from thence he was putt to the horne, or lyklie to be troubled in that kynd for some debt or other civill cause, wherof as yit he doeth not trulie know the estate, wherby he dar hardlie repair to that kingdome for dischargeing that place conferred vpoun him be the said Colonell, so that that service committed to his charge is lyk to be neglected, to the great hinder of the said levy: And his Matie being informed that if the said Captane Wallace had some compitent tyme allowed vnto him for taking ordour with his creditours or other persones with whome he hath to doe, he would quicklie tak a course for ther satisfaction, wher if he at his first approach to that kingdome they should vnseasonably trouble him, it would both dissapoynt the saids Creditours or other persones, and disable him lykwayes from the said imployment: Therfor his Matie, both haveing a speciall regarde heirin to the advancement of these levyis, and that a course may be takin be the said Capitan Wallace for satisfieing the saids persones within a schort tyme, according to justice and equitie, of his princelie power and royall authoritie, Ordeanes a protection to be made vnder his highnes' great seall of Scotland accepting the said Capitane Wallace vnder his spetiall power and safeguard, giveing and granting to him dureing the space of thrie moneths, beginning from passing of the presents vnto the said seall, Licence, power, and libertie to peaciablic and safelic duell, stay, and remane within any part of the said kingdome, without molestatioun, trouble, challenge, persute, or danger of apprehending or warding of his persone: dischargeing expreslie by thir presents all his Mates schireffs, stewarts, provests, bailleis, constablis of barrons, Justices of peace, and all other Justices, Judges, Officers, and Ministers of his highnes' lawis, both by burgh and land, ther deputeis, servands, and all others whom it effeires within the said kingdome, That they on nawayes presume, attempt, nor tak in hand, directlie or indirectlie, by day or night, to seik, tak, or apprehend the said Captan Wallace, his persone, or mak any disturbance, interruption, or violation of this his Mateis protection, vnder pane of incurreing his highnes' vtter wraith and high displeasur, notwithstanding of any Letters of horning, Captions, warrandis, Commissioners, charges, or commandis alreadie gevin or to be gevin by his Matie himselff, the Lordis of Session, or any of his Mateis Judges, officers, or other persones whatsoever within the said kingdome, in favours of whatsoever persone or persones for apprehending and warding of the said Captan his persone, for any debts or sownes adebtit by him as suretie or principall, Wheranent his Matie, of his highnes' royall and princelie power, be thir presents

dispenses in that part during the space of thrie monthis, Ordaneing thir presents to be a sufficient warrant to the writter to the great seall and keeper thar for wryting of thir presents to the said seall, and appending the said seall thervnto, without passing of any others sealls or registers; wheranent thir presents shalbe vnto them a sufficient warrant,—Geyin at our Manour of Grenwitche, the 26 of Junij 1632.

And to all fevis, casualiteis, proffeits, digniteis, emoluments, and dewteis whatsumever righteouslie perteneing and belonging to the sample, or to be mortified or dotted therto, now vacand in his Maties handis, and at his highnes' gift and disposition be dimission made of the samyne office by Robert Weir, last keiper of the said Chappell royall, in his Mateis or his highnes' Commissioner's handis, or by the seiknes and inhabilitie of the said Robert not being able to keip and exerce the said office, or by his deceis, when it shalhappin to vaik and becum in his Mateis hands, Requyreing and desyreing heirby Our Reverend father in God, Adam, bischop of Dumblane, deane of the said Chappell royall, to admitt and receave the said Peter Andersone in and to the said office ypon his eath of obedience, And that the said letter be extendit in the best forme with all clausses neidfull. And with command therin to the Lordis of Counsall and session ypon the sight of his admission and presentation to grant and direct Letters at his instance vpon ane simple charge against all and whatsumever persones within this realme subject in payment of the fevis, casualiteis, and dewteis belonging to the said office at any tyme bygane, or that shall happin to be subject therto in tyme comeing ffor eauseing the said Peter Andersone, his factours, servitours, and others in his name, to [be] readelie answer it and bev it of the saids whole fevis, casualities, profits, emoluments, and dewteis perteneing and belonging to the said office of the said Chappell royall at any time bygane, or shall happin to pertene and belong therto, And that of the Cropt and veir of God 1632. Right, &c.—Wheras we ar informed that the patent of honour of the late Lord Castelstewart hath bene long deteyned from the seall by the occasion of the death of Francis Edgworth, late Clerk of the Hamper of that our kingdome, the same patent haveing fallin into the hands of his executors who, efter many delayes, have now of late delyvered the same vnto the late Erle Castelstewart's eldest sone and air, wherby the seall may be appendit therto, according to the intention of our late royall father; and we being vnwilling that his said sone and air should be any wayes frustrated of that honour or place of precedencio intendit for him, or that any lyk later erections should be prejudiciall vnto him, he being ane whom we doe verie much respect, both for his owin abilities and roble descent, and also for his said late father's many publict services performed to our late dear father and ws: These ar therfor to will and requyre yow, with all convenient diligence, to append the seall to it and delyver it vnto him as a mark of our royall favor vnto that familie; And for your soe doeing these our letteris shalbe your sufficient warrant.—Gevin at our Court of Oatlands, the last of July 1632.

### TO THE THESAURER AND DEPUTIE.

Right, &c.—Wheras we wer formerlie pleased with advyse of the Commissioners of our Exchequer to give a monethlie allowance to the Masteris of Works ther for vpholding our houses and palaces in that our kingdome, secureing the same vnto them by ane assignement vpon the assignements which we have

bene pleased of late to dispose of otherwyse, wherby they find themselffis dissapoynted of ther payments, and therby disabled to performe ther dewtie to the great hazard of the ruyne of our houses, The vpholding whairof doeth much concerne we and the honour of that our ancient kingdome; and haveing heard thairof from our saidis Commissioneris, We have thoght fitt that tymelie ordour be takin: Our pleasur therfoir is, that haveing considered of the best meanes wherby they may receave satisfaction, yow give ordour to our Advocat for drawing vp such further warrant for our hand, wherby they may be secured in alse ample maner in tyme cuming as they wer formerlie, And in the meanetyme that yow give satisfaction in what is alreadie due vnto them to the effect they may be the better enabled for performeing ther dewteis in vpholding our housess in that kynd which is necessarie, wherin not doubting of your conformite to this our pleasur, &c.—Oatlands, the last of July 1632.

### To THE ERLE OF LINLYTHOOW.

Right, &c.—Wheras we are informed yow intend to dispose of your heretable right to the keiping of our palace of Linlythgow and Castle of Blakness by your best advantage, we are desyreous to have the same in our handis, to be disposed of heirefter by we as we shall at all tymes find expedient, and being willing with all that yow should receave such satisfaction as in reasone is due, we have gevin ordour to our right, &c. the Erle of Stratherne, President our privice Counsall, to treat with yow theranent, which we recommend to your consideratioun, and expecting the issue that may be answerable to our desyre and your satisfaction, We bid, &c.—Oatlands, last July 1632.

## TO THE ERLE OF STRATHERNE.

Right, &c.—Wheras we ar informed that the Erle of Linlythgow is to dispose of his heretable right to the keiping of our palace therof and Castell of Blakness, by selling of the same to some pairtie for his best advantage, And in regard of our generall intention to draw vnto our owin handis vpon everie convenient occasion all such rights, we have thoght good in this particular to mak choyse of yow by treating with the said Erle for to obtene his interest for keiping of these tuo housses at the easiest rates yow can agrie vpon, and whatever pryce yow shall reasonablic Condescend vpon to advance vnto him for that his right, we doe heirby promeis in verbo principis to refound vnto yow whensoever we shall desyr to retire that sume bargaine from yow vnto ourselfies, togidder with all the interest and losses yow may in the meanetyme sustene by this advancement of moneyis, which for the present we recommend vnto your care.—Oatlandis, last of July 1632.

#### TO THE COUNSELL.

Right, &c.—We ar informed that our right trustic and weilbeloved Cousen and Counsellour the Marqueis of Huntlie, is charged for presenting befoir yow ane Findlay McGrimon, rebell, who had secretile abandoned the kingdome befoir, wherin though we doubt not bot yow have some good consideratiouns, moveing yow to tak that course; yit vpon humble motion made vnto we in his behalff, that sicing hardlie the rebell can be brought bak (it being vncertane what part abroad he is gone), which conceavoing to exhibite him, if at any tyme heirefter he shall returne to that our kingdome, which conceavoing to be reasonable, we think fitt (vnless ther be some speciall reasone to the contrair) that yow accept of his offer, and to that effect that yow authorize him (if neid beis), or the Viscount of Aboyne, his sone, with what warrand and commission yow shall think fitt to that purpois, taking of them such surtic as yow shall find expedient, &c.—Ostlands, last of July 1632.

## To the Scotts resideing in Polland.

Trustic, &c.—We ar informed that ther ar diverse abuses committed amongst yow by some of your owin number, that yow suffer often by others, and that onlie by want of your joynt concurrences wherby some ordours might be establisched for preventing the miscariages of your owin, and for enabling yow the better to remedie any losses yow might sustene from others, and out of our royall care that your cairages may not be deregatoric to the honour of our ancient kingdome wherento yow belong, nor your negligences be aney more occasion of your owin losses, we have thoght good heirby to recommend vnto your generall cares that, considering the place wher yow ar and the necessitie of your affaires ther, yow would by a joynt and mutuall consent determyne vpon some course that might be answerable to our desyres in the advancement of your commoun good, according as we have gevin particular directions to our agent ther; and as we shall heirefter hear from him of your diligence heirin, we shalbe readic to contribute what we shalbe informed may be further requisit from ws by our letteris or mediation with our brother, the King of Polland, for your advantage.—Beawlie, 15 August 1632.

#### TO THE COMMISSIONERS OF SURRENDERS.

Right, &c.—We have heard of the good progresse made by yow in the matter of tythes and valuations theref, approveing both of the ordour takin by yow for drawing of the same befor yourselfits if the heretours and titulars doe not ther diligence at the tymes appoynted by yow, and of your care takin for rectificing the reports at the instance of our Advocat wher the tythes ar undervalued to the prejudice of the Churches mantenance and of ws in our annuitie, and being informed of the course lykwyse takin by yow for giveing to all heretours indifferentlie the leading of ther owin tythes, upons surety for payment of the tythes valued to the titulars they haveing submitted or not (it being a course which in all equitie oght to be universall), we give yow hartie thanks for your care and diligence therin, and doe will yow to proceed in that work according to these rules alreadie begun till it be finisched, and wher the tythes be undervalued wherin the Church and we must suffer most: Our pleasur is, that though both titular and heretour be silent that yow have a speciall care to rectific these valuations, and that the persute goe on in our Advocat's name, least ther might be collusion between them to our prejudice: Which recommending, &c.—Beawlie, 15 August 1632.

# To THE COUNSELL.

Right, &c.—Wheras we have bene petitioned by the Mr of Maxwell that a ryot hath of late bene committed by some persones depending vpon the Lard of Johnestoun, wherby the tennents of his brother, the Erle of Nithisdall, and others, our subjects, hath bene much wronged contrarie to any ordour of law or justice as by the enclosed petition and roll of the delinquents names, which for your better information we have sent yow heirwith, may appear; for preventing of the lyk heirefter, and least any new occasion should be govin for kindling of the old rancor, which (as we ar informed) hath bene betweene the names of Maxwell and Johnestoun, Our pleasur is, that yow eall the pairteis interested befoir yow, and efter exact tryell heirn if yow find the persones accused or any of thom guiltie, that yow cause punish or censure them as yow shall find the offence to deserve, taking of both pairteis if yow shall find it requisit sufficient cautioun for preserveing our peace heirefter in these boundis.—Beawlie, 15 August 1632.

# To the Thesaurer Deputie, Traquair.

Right, &c.—The treatie of the fisching bussines, wherin we our selffs have takin great paines, being now concluded, so that nothing so much resteth as that our good subjects goe on according to the course

prescryved, We have to that purpois gevin instructions to our right, &c. the Erle of Stratherne and M<sup>r</sup> Johne Hay: Our pleasur is, that yow informe yourselffis from them of what may conduce to this purpois, and that accordinglie yow vse therin your best and your most readic endeavours, wherby at the vpcomeing of our said cousen and of the said M<sup>r</sup> Johne, the bussines may be the more speedelic putt to a finall conclusion, so remitting this and some other thingis concerning our service otherwyse to be imparted vnto yow by our said Cousen, &c.—Beawlie, 15 August 1632.

Right, &c.—Wheras by our others letteris and patents that ar sent vnto yow with the progresse of what doe concerne the work of the generall association for fisching, and have gevin yow our furth directions theranent, whairof we expect a speedie accompt thairof from yow. Ther ar yit severall propositions for the advancement of that work which we have thought fitt to recommend vnto your considerations by our right, &c. the Erle of Str., therne: And it is our pleasur that according to the propositions, or as yow and the Counsell of that association for that our kingdome shall best resolve vpoun for conduceing to the begining and advancement of this great work yow proceid accordinglie, and with all acquant ws therwith by the said Erle.—Beawlie, 15 August 1632.

## TO THE BURGH OF EDINDURON.

Trustie, &c.—Though we have been pleased by ane other letter to acquant the burrowis in generall with the great regard we have had to the honour and weilfair of that our ancient kingdome, and to ther interest in it in this leat treatie of a generall association for fisching, which is now happelie concludit recommending carnestlie to them the vesing of ther best endeavours to contribute to the advancement of it, wherin we doubt not bot they wilbe dewticfull to we and cairfull of ther owin good, yit we have thoght good in particular to recommend the same to your care, as whom amongst them it doeth "rst and most concerne, we have formerlie fund your good exemple powerfull and effectuall in that which concerned our service and the good of the cuntrie, and we doubt not bot yow will continew in this particular with your best advyse to others and assistance from yourselffis to secure our desyres in advanceing this great work according as we have gevin particular direction to this hearer, wherewith he will acquant yow.—Beawlie, 15 August 1632.

# To the Deputie of Irland.

Right, &c.—Wheras we have bene pleased, for the generall good of all our subjects, to caus proclamation be made in these our kingdomes of England and Scotland that none of our subjects of any of our dominions shall pay in aney of them ather more or other customes or dewteis mentionat in the proclamation than what the natives of the place wher the custome is takin ought to pay: To which purpois, our royall intention heing that the lyk course be takin in that our kingdome, we have sent yow the lyk proclamation vnder our owin hand: Therfoir our pleasur is, that yow caus exped and publisch the same in such sort that all our subjects ther may tak notice of our pleasur heirin, and that yow sie the same dewlie observed.—Beawlie, 15 August 1632.

Instructions givin by his Matte to the Erle of Stratherne to be communicated to the Counsell of Scotland anent the advancement of his Mateis royall [intention] of the fisching of Great Britain and Irland.

Yow shall recommend to ther consideratioun the Act of Parliament made by his Ma'eis predicessours, vmquhill King Ja. 4, Part 4, cap. 4, anent the putting out of Busches be the nobilitie, gentrie, barrones,

and others of that his Ma<sup>tota</sup> kingdome of Scotland, and in his Ma<sup>tota</sup> name to requyre them to use ther best meanes and endeavours that the same be put in executious for the advancement and continewing of the busch fisching.

Yow shall recommend to ther consideration how necessarie it is for the Yles fisching that plantations be made in the most commodious places of the Yles, and therfoir to condescend vpoun the places wher the same shalbe, and of the meanes how the same shalbe continewed and brought to perfection.

Yow shall recomend to them the taking of sufficient suretie of the Land Lordis of the Yles and Loches of the Continent nixt adjacent to the same, for Indemnitie of the feloueis of the societie of the said fisching, in ther persones, schips, boats, goods, and fischings, from all kynds of oppression and violence, for themselflis and vessells and others inhabitantis in that boundis.

That they discharge all the Landlords of the Yles and Loches nixt adjacent to the same, wher the fischings ar, and ther vassalls and tennents, from vplifting and exacting from the felloues of the said societie, ther fischers and servandis and others our subjectis fisching ther, of any other dewtie, impost, sowmes of money, or other casualitie whatsoever than is warranted and our predicessours granted, and to this effect that proclamation be made with all possible diligence intimating this his Ma<sup>tels</sup> pleasur to them and all others whom it doe and may concerne.

That they caus are exact tryell be takin of all customes, dewteis, or other impositions whatsoever payed by his Matie or aney his subjects within that kingdome, vpon whatsoever pretence be the fischers theref, and the warrandis and groundis of same.

That they caus ordour be takin for removeing of all strangers repairing to our Yles for fisching and other tradeing ther aganst the lawis of that our kingdome, and speciallie in the Lewis and Schetland, and sie the Acts of Parliament made theranent putt to executioun.

That they caus such ordour be takin as that all the follows of that societie, alswell natives of that kingdome as others his Ma<sup>tots</sup> subjects of Ingland and Irland, repairing ather to the Yles, loches, or seas of that our kingdome for fisching in these places wher they ar lawfullie authorized, be kyndlic and well vsed, and by all meanes encouraged to prosecute the said work.

That they informe themselffis in all things may tend to the advancement of the said work, and to his Ma<sup>tie</sup> ther advyce in writt, als well in the particulars abone writtin as in all other things offered to ther Consideration by yow and remanent Committie of the fischings in that kingdome, and returne the same with all diligence by yourselff at the tyme preserved by his Ma<sup>tie</sup>.

#### To THE BORROWIS.

Trustie, &c.—Wheras we have bene ever carefull in all thingis to preserve and continew your liberteis and priviledges, wherof we have gevin evident prooff not onlie in this treatie of the generall association of fisching, which yow will find much to contribut to your good, bot also in these suittis presented to we by this bearer, wherof he will give yow a full accompt; so haveing fund your readines to our service, speciallie in this our great work of fisching, wherin we doubt not bot yow will continew to do that which may be worthie the favour we have schawin yow, and answerable to the Litention we have for the honour of that our ancient kingdome, wherof yow ar to reap the fruit; in particular, if yow shall preserve the same with that care which yow have promised by this bearer, we thoght good to recommend the same to yow, willing yow to contribute your best endeavours to bring the said work to perfection, wheranent we have declared our royall pleasur to the Lordis of our Counsell, who will acquant yow therwith: As also we have requyred this bearer more particularlie to acquant yow with what may concerne your good, assureing your selffits that yow will not be wanting to ws, your cuntrie, nor yourselffs in what may tend to the accomplishment of our royall intentions, for the which yow will find we ever willing to manteane and defend your liberteis and priviledges, and to tak particular notice of your service.—Beulie, the 15 August 1632.

#### TO THE BAHONETTS.

Trustie, &c.-Wheras our late deir father, out of his pious Zeall for the advancement of religeon in the remote parts of his dominions, wher it had not bene formerlie knowen, and out of his royall care for the honour and well of that our ancient kingdome, was pleased to annex to the Croun therof the dominion of New Scotland, in America, that the vse of it might aryse to the benefite of that kingdome: we being desyreous that the wished effects might follow by the continuance of so noble a designe, wer pleased to confer particular marks of our favour vpon such as should voluntarlie contribute to the fartherance of a plantation to be established in these bounds, as appeared by our erecting of that ordour of baronetts wherwith yow ar dignifeid, whervnto we have ever since bene willing to add what further we conceaved to be necessarie for the testifeying our respect to these that ar alreadie interested, and for encourageing of them who shall heirefter interest themselffis in the advancement of a work which we so reallie tender for the Glorie of God, the honour of that nation, and the benefite that is lyklie to flow from the right prosecution of it: But in regard that notwithstanding the care and diligence of our right, &c. the Viscont of Stirling, whom we have from the begining entrusted with the prosecution of thiswork, and of the great Charges alreadie bestowed voon it, hath not takin the root which was expected, partie, as we conceave, by reason of the Incommodite's ordinarlie incident to all new and remote beginnings, and partlie, as we ar informed, by want of the tymelic concurrance of a sufficient number to insist in it, bot especiallic the Colonic being forced of late to remove for a tyme by meanes of a treatie we have had with the French; Thairfor, we have takin vnto our royall consideratioun by what meanes agane may this work be established; and conceaveing that ther ar none of our subjects whom it concerneth so much in credit to be affectioned to the progres of it as these of your number for justeficing the groundis of our princelic favours which yow have receaved by a most honorabill and generous way, we have thoght fitt to direct the bearer heirof, Sir William Alexander, knyt, vnto yow, who hath bene ane actor in the former proceidingis, and hath sene the cuntrie, and knowen the commedite thereof, will communicat vuto vow such propositions as may be at serve for making the right vse heirefter of a plantation trade in these boundis, for encouraging such as shall adventure therin, and we doubt not bot if yow find the groundis reasonable and fair yow will give your concurrance for the further prosecution of them: And as we have alreadie gevin ordour to our Advocat for dray such warrandis to pass vnder our sealls ther, wherby our loveing subjectis may be fred from misconstruction of our proceidings with the French anent New Scotland, and secured of our protection in tyme cuming in ther vndertakeris vnto it: So we shalbe readie to contribute what we shall heirefter find we may justlie doe for the advancement of the work and the encouragement of all that shall joyne with yow to that purpois: Which recommending vnto your care, we bid yow farewell.—Beawlie. 15 August 1632.

# TO THE TOUN OF EDINBURGH.

Trustie, &c.—Wheras we ar informed that our late royal father did ordeane that at the election of your deacones and tradis, and counsellours for the same, yow should mak choyse of the most expert handie laborers and tradismen, as persones best experienced and able to give advyse in things concerning they trades and improvement of manufactoreis, we being carefull to have that continewed which by our said father was ordeaned for the publict good; and haveing of late writtin to our privic counsell tuitching the erecting of manufactoreis, wherby the native commoditeis of that our ancient kingdome may be putt to the best vse, and poore and ydle people sett a work: Our pleasur is, that in all tyme comeing, at the election of these deacones and counsellours yow mak choyse of none bot of such as are handie laborers, chope keiperis, vsere of ther tradis, and best skilled therin, That when occasion shall requyre, we may have ther advyse in such thingis as concerne ther trads: Which recommending vnto your care, as yow will tender the good of our service: We bid yow farewell from our Court at Beawie, the 15 August 1632.

These approve Sir Henrie Wardlaw in dischargeing the office of Chalmerlanrie at Dumfermeling, Rosse, Ardmansgh, and Ettrik Forrest, of the office of receaver of your Mateis rents, and of the taxatiouns of the said Lops of Dunfermeling and Ettrik forrest, dischargeing his aires and executours of all clams and question that may be moved against them in that behalff.—Beawlie 17 August 1632.

A Commission was signed for hearing the E. of Mortone's accompts by the Chancellour St Androis, &c.—Beawlie, 17 August 1632.

Our will and pleasur is, that for our vse yow bring from our kingdome of Scotland about Michaelmes ensueing, the lyk number of muttons, and in such maner as was formerlie accustomed to be brought from thence by Charles Murray for the vse of our late royall father or for our owin by yourselff, according to our forner appoyntment for your imployment in that service, and that accordinglie yow continew yeirlie to doe the same till we shalbe pleased ather to approve that service by a further warrant or discharge it; And in the meane tyme the lyk allowance and feyis shalbe yeirlie payed vnto yow as wer gevin for that purpois in the tyme of our said late royall father, wheref doe not yow faill as yow will answer vnto ws.—Gevin at our Court of Beaulie, 17 August 1632.

Right, &c.—Haveing formerlie fund by experience your affection to our service, and being now informed of the continuance thairof in advanceing (in so far as in yow lyeth) the bussines of the Tythis, and what else doeth at this tyme concerne we ther we give yow harty thanks for the same, desyreing yow to continew as yow have begun, speciallie vseing at this tyme your best endeavours to advance the generall bussines of the fisching of great Britane and Irland now sett afoot by ws, tuitching which purpois sieing we have gevin particular instructions to our right, &c., the Erle of Stratherne, we ar willing that yow informe yourselff from him of what ma<sub>f</sub> concerne your endeavours for furthring therof, and that yow proceid accordinglie as lykwyse in all other things tuitching our service which he shall impart vnto yow from ws.—Beaulie, 17 August 1632.

#### To THE CLERGIE.

Right, &c.—We have vnderstude by your letter your earnest care to have the psalmes translated by our late royall father receaved in the Churches of that our kingdome according as we did recommend vnto yow by our former letteris to that effect: And hearing from yow that the delay of that work proceideth from the want of a number of copies fitt to be distributed thrugh the dyoccis of that kingdome, we have gevin ordour that such a number be sent vnto the Archbischop of St Androis as convenientlic can be had as may be most expedient, and have by our letter vnto him particularlic significid our mynd heirin to be imparted vnto yow: Our pleasur is, that yow setle some speedic course how they may be receaved, and sung in the Churches ther, and therepon we will furthwith give ordour for the reformeing or adding to the said work what shalbe fund necessarie, that therefore a course for a full Impression from tyme to tyme may be establisched, wherin expecting your care and diligence, we bid, &c.—Wanstead, 13 Sept. 1632.

#### TO THE ARCHDISCHOP OF ST ANDROIS.

Right, &c.—We have vnderstood from our Clergio the continuance of ther desyres to have the Psalmes translated by our royall father receaved in the Churches of that our kingdome, haveing vndertakin to doe the same, bot that the want of a number of copeis fitt to have bene distributed in the severall dioceis theref, occasioned a delay in putting that work to a speedie poynt: Therfor we have gevin ordour that such a number of copeis be sent vnto yow as convenientlie can be had at this tyme, to be disposed of as yow shall think most expedient: And becaus the Impression of such a number of books as from tyme to tyme wilbe fund necessarie for the publict vse will requyre a present charge, we have requyred them to setle a course how they may be receaved and song in the Churches ther; And thervpon we will furthwith give ordour to hasten the said Impression, and for reformeing or adding to that work what shalbe fund necessarie: And wher at the last meitting we hard that your seiknes was some hinderance to the progres of that work, we will now expect at your handis some speed. In furthrance therin as your charge and affection to our late royall father's memorie will lead yow vnto, that the work may be fund setled at our conseing, God willing, at the nixt spring of the yeir to that our kingdome, which we will tak as verie acceptable service done vnto ws.—Wanstead, the 13 Sept. 1632.

## To THE THESAURER.

Right, &c.—Wheras we have gevin ordour to our Advocat to persew the Lard of Lusse for the cryme of Incest alledged to have bene committed by him: Though he can deserve no favour for himselff in what the course of our Lawis can inflict vpon him in his persone or estate, yit haveing compassion of the suffering of his wyff and children, and of so antient a familie, Our pleasur is, that if his escheit, lyfrent, or landis sall fall in our hands, in the disposeing therof yow have a speciall care that no creditour of his be defrauded of that what is justlie dew vnto them; and that the mantenance of his wyff and children and the standing of his house be provydit for, he onlie suffering in his owin persone all that by the course of our Lawis vsuall in the lyk caice may be imposed vpoun him: Which seriouslie recommending vnto your care, we bid, &c.—Wanstead, 13 Septr 1632.

## TO THE ADVOCAT.

Trustie, &c.—The foulnes of the cryme alledged to have bene of late committed by the Lard of Luss haveing justlie moved we to have the same tryed according to the Lawis of that our kingdome, and him punished if fund guiltie, that others be terrifed from committing the lyk heirefter; our pleasur is, that yow cause summond him to appear befor the Judges compitent for his tryell, and that in our name yow insist therin, according to our saids lawis and custome in caices of the same or lyk nature: ffor which, &c.—Wanstead, 13 Sept. 1632.

scruple should aryse concerning these who ar and should be thought vassalls to we by the said generall surrander, we have thought good to declair, Lykas by these presents we declair, that all these must be accompted our vassals by the said generall surrander, who and ther predicessours bruikit the landis the tyme of the said generall submission and of befor, be vertew of Infeftments, Chartours, and seasines granted vnto them and ther predicessours and authours by whatsumever Abbot, pryour, or other beneficed persone whatsamever, befoir the generall act of annexatioun of kirklandis to our Croun, or therefter, by vertew of the rights made to them ther predicessours and Authours forsaidis, flowing from ws or our ymoubill dearest father, by vertew of the said act of Annexatioun, or from the saidis Lordis of Erection since the dait of ther erections, or who bruik the same by retouris, to be haldin of the saidis benificed persones or of our said vmquhill dearest father, by vertew of the Act of Annexatioun, or of anev of the saidis Lordis of erection as Lordis of Erection: And declaires that it shall not be lawfull to the saidis Lordis and titularis of Erections to call, convene, and persew aney of the persones forsaidis for reduction or improbation of ther rights to the saidis kirk landis so bruiked by them, as said is, under pretext of whatsumever defect therof, ather in the originall rights and progres thairof, or for not confirmation in dew tyme, sieing the whole benefite that may aryse by defect of the saidis rights doe accresee to ws by the said generall surrander; and none can quarrell the samyne bot we, who ar becum immediat superiours to all such persones by the said generall surrander: And it is our speciall pleasur that vpon this our declaration, and conforme thereto, yow mak ane act of your table, and insert the samyne in your books,---Whythall, 4 March 1633.

Right, &c.-Wheras we have often by severall letters recommended vnto your care that Justice might be dewlie and spedelie administrat according to Law in ane Action of reduction prosecuted at our instance and by our expres command to our Advocat for recoverie of certane Lands, tythis, superioriteis, and other thingis which did appertene to the Abbacie of Lundoris, being procured without our knowledge by Mr Wm Forbes of Cragievar, deceised, to our great prejudice and grevance of many of our loveing subjects, antient fewers inhabiteing these Lands, the prosecutioun whairof hath now of late bene stayed by a reference vpon a petition of Sir Wm Forbes, now of Craigievar: We at this tyme taking spetiall notice of the prejudice done vnto ws by the procureing of the said grant, and of the former obstinacie of the said Sir William in refuising to submitt and resigne vnto ws in such maner as was fitt, and of the great trouble and charges these fewers and takemen of tythis have sustened by his meanes, ar resolved, by these and others considerations known vnto ws, to have the benefite of our lawis by causeing assist in the said reduction in a legall [manner], and therfor have thoght fitt herby to recommend vnto yow of new (that notwithstanding of the said reference) speedie Justice be administred in the said action, with [out] respect of persones or furder delay, according to our pleasur so often signified to that purpois; And that heirefter yow accept of no submission from the said Sir William, without ane absolute resignation, alsweill of his action against the Vassalls as of the superioriteis cum omai causa; wheref expecting the performance, we bid, &c .-- Whythall, 10 May 1633.

To the Commissioners for tryeing of the Erle of Airth, Geancellour, Archbischops, Thesaurer, and Deputie Carnaoie, Sir John Hat, V. Air.

Right, &c.—Wheras we have bene informed by our trustie and weilbeloved Sir James Skene, kny<sup>‡</sup>, President of our Colledge of Justice, that he would vendertak to prove that it was said to him that our right, &c. the Erle of Airth, president of our Privie Counsell, affirmed that he should have bene King of Scotland, and that it was said to him that he affirmed to have better or as good right to the Croun as we our selffs: That it may be truelie tryed whether these treasonable speiches wherwith the said Erle is accused, if they be trew, or if they be bot columne is, It is our pleasur that yow to whom these presents ar directed, or any six of yow, the Chancellour, or any of the tuo Archbischops being one, doe convene and call befoir yow the said Sir James, and caus him condescend ypon the names of his reporters; and incaice

Right, &c.—Wheras vpon certificat of the Cheiff Justice of the Kingis Bench tuitching diverse scandelous speeches and abuses committed by ane Ann, your naturall daughter, we wer pleased to authorize yow by our warrant to apprehend and send his out of the kingdome, haveing heirby declaired that if sche retured without our licence selve should be punisched according to the Lawis and custome in the lyk caices, ynderstanding sche hath returned in contempt of our command, Our pleasur is, and we doe heirby will and requyre yow to naus diligentlie search and apprehend hir to be by yow sent vnto Scotland, from whence our further pleasur is that sche did not returne without our licence, and if sche did transgress therin, we are heirby pleased to declair that ypon dew notice gevin their of schoe should be punisched as hir offences should be fund to deserve by the lawis and customes of this our kingdome: And for the better and more specdic executeing of this our command, we heirby will and requyre all Mayors, Shirreffis, Justices of peace, bailleis, constablis, searchers, governours, and keipers of our ports and harbours, and all masters and commanders of schips within our dominions, and all others our officers and subjects whom it doeth or may concerne, to be ayding and assisting vnto yow, your servant or servandis in the searching, apprehending, and transporting of the said Ann, to the kingdome of Scotland.—Theobaldis, 18 Sept. 1633.

### TO THE ARCHBISCHOP OF ST ANDROIS.

Right reverend, &c.—We have occasion, vpon our late being in Scotland, observed some things which we think fitt to putt in better ordour, which we shall doe as we find caus; bot noe one thing appears to we more necesserlie then the weill setting of our Vniversitie of St Androis, both for the service of God and good education of youth ther; now, as we were then gevin to vnderstand, the whole companie of that Vniversitie, alsweill the doctours, as governours of Colledges, as the younger men, vse to goe to the ordinarie paroche churche to service and sermons, and ther sitt promiscuouslie with the rest of the auditours, which loses much of the honour and dignitic of the Vniversitie, and is quyt contrarie to the course holdin in other weill governed places of lyk nature, and is in diverse other respects verie inconvenient: Our expres will and pleasur therfor is, that all the students in that our Vniversitie, alsweill the governours of Colledges as they that live vnder them, shall at all tymes, alsweill terme as vacation, everie Sonday and everie holiday (that the church observes), repair at the hours both of morning and evening prayer to the Chappell of the Old Colledge in St Androis, commonlie called St Salvator's Colledge, and shall ther religiouslie continew all the tyme of divyno service and sermon; nather will we have any scoller, of what rank and degrie whatsoever, at the tymes aforsaid, goe to common paroche churches, nor any of the Inhabitants of the tonn leave the paroche churche and mix themselfils with the Vniversitie; The service ther red shalbe the English

liturgie, vnto such tyme as another be made and publisched by authoritie in that church, and they shall have a communion efter that forme, and kneling, upon the first Sonday of everie moneth: And as for the sermons everie Sonday, bothe morneing and efternoone, and everie holie day in the morning. Our pleasur is, that they shalbe performed (aut per se ant per alium), by all and everie of the divynes liveing in that Vniversitie, beginning with the Junior that is [in] holy ordours and ascending to the senior, and in course, provyded that the governours of Colledges, being divynes, doe lykwayes preach by turnes, begining also at the junior of them, youn the first Sonday morning in everie terms, and by reasons of ther government shall not be putt to any other turne, vales; they pleas voluntarily to tak it: And further, in regard that this Colledge Chapell is thus to be made as a publict Vniversitie church, we think fitt that it be decentlie repaired, both within and without, so far as convenientlie it may, and that everie scoller in the Vniversitie doe contribut according to ther meanes and devotion: And last of all, we doe expreslie heirby command and require you, as chancellour of that our Vniversitie, that you doe reallie and strictlie putt these our commands in executioun, and sie them kept, and that the scollers repair to the chappell or church aforsaid in decent gownes, according to ther severall degrees in schoolis respective; and we will that these sermones begin at the church ypon the first Sonday of Januar nixt efter the date heirof, and so continew, and that yow give we are accompt by letter when this course is begun, and efterwards once a yeir at leist how it continewis vt supra.

Right, &c. - Forasmukle as George Lawder of Bass, and Issobell Hepburne, Lady Bass, his mother, as we ar certanelic informed, ar denunced rebells and putt to the horne at the instance of diverse of our subjects, and speciallie at the instance of James Levingstoun, our servitour, for not payment of great sowmes of money, and for not delyverie to the said James Levingstoun of the evidents of the Lands and baronic of Beill, sauld to him by them, and for not fulfilling vnto him the remanent heads of the Contract past betuixt them theranent, and that they remane most obstinatelie vnder the said proces of horning as our rebells, to the great contempt of our authoritie, and for manteneing them in the said rebellion have retired themselffis to the Yle of the Bass, wherin they have remaned thir many veres bygane, and intends still to duell securelie therin, not permitting access of any persone to them from whom they fear any executious of Law: And sieing this tend is to the fostering of rebellion, and is and evill and bad preparative, speciallie in parts so neir the place of Justice; Therfoir it is our will and pleasur that yow direct letters at the instance of the Creditours formidis, and spetiallie at the instance of the said James Levingstoun. chargeing them to compeir befoir yow to delyver the keyis of the said Yle of Bass to our Shirreff of Hadinton and his deputeis, and to devoyd and red themselffs theref, with certification to them, if they failzie, our others Letters shalbe direct to charge them to doe the same, under pane of Treasone, and lak all other legall course which by Law may force them to satisfie ther said creditours, and speciallie the said James Levingstoun, our servand.—Whythall, 4 Octor 1633.

#### TO THE SESSION.

Vnderstanding that ane extraordinarie place of Session, befor discharged by the E. of A'rth, doeth now vaik in our handis by removeing him from that charge, we have thoght fitt to present thervnto the reverend the bischop of Ross, requyreing yow to admitt and receave him therin according to the maner accustumed to be discharged and possess by him, with all honours, priviledges, immuniteis, and prerogatives therto belonging, and alse frielie in all respects as any extraordinarie Senatour in the said Colledge hath discharged and possessed their place therin at any tyme preceiding; ffor which, &c.—Whythall, 4 Octor 1633.

#### TO THE VNIVERSITIE OF ST ANDROIS.

Trustic and weilbeloved, &c.—We ar informed at our late being in Scotland, that our Vniversitie of S<sup>5</sup> Androis did not keip and observe, ather in the habits or otherwayes, such decent ordour as befitts men that lives in such a societie, whois good exemple should not onlie be a direction to the younger sort that live amongst them, bot the whole bodie of that kingdome: And becaus our princelie care cannot extend itselff better to any ane work then to the reformeing of this, we have directed our letters to our right, &c. the Archbischop of S<sup>5</sup> Androis, Chancellour of that our Vniversitie, for the setling of some good ordours ther, both tuitching the service of God and otherwyse; and we expect that all and everie of yow of what Colledge, degrie, or place scover yow be, shall reddelie and willinglie yeild your conformitie and obedience to them, as we doubt not bot yow will, both to give we the better satisfaction, and to contribute your endeavours to the weill ordoring, and so to the honor of that Vniversitie, for we purpois to cum ourselff in persone at our nixt comeing to that our kingdome to visite that place, and it will be a great dale of joy to find it, as we hope we shall, full of ordour and conformitie to rules of governement; we are verie confident that yow wilbe so readie to yeild obedience to we in these things, which so much tend to your owin good, that as vpon the hearing of them yow will outrun our commandements according as our royall progenitours and ourselff have ever fund yow vpon all other occasions.—Whythall, 6 Octo<sup>7</sup> 1633.

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#### TO THE ARCHBISCHOPS AND BISCHOPS.

Right, reverend, &c.—We observed many things at our late being in Scotland, whairof we conceave wer not so full in ordour and decencie for the service of God in that Church as we hartelie wish and desvre; And we doe conceave that our leveing and levall people ther, being weill and verie religiouslie affected, would easelie be brought to embrace all good ordour if yow would goe befor them in a good exemple, and yow cannot goe better nor more befitting your calling then in the way of prayer: Our express will and pleasur therfoir is, that everie of yow, the archbischopis and bischops, carie your selffis with the gravitie and devotion that beseames your place and calling; and particularlie that yow have in your severall duelling houses prayers twyse everie day for your famileis, and be present your selffis, valess at be at such tymes as indisposition of hodie, or necessarie bussines caus your absence; and we think it verie requisite vntill such tyme as yow will consider of and agric vpon a fitt and full liturgie and forme of divine service for that church, that everie of yow respectivelie doe vse in your severall oratours the liturary of the Church of England, by vse of which, as yow shall performe due service to God, so shall yow also come to be better acquanted with the formes of that Church, which will in tyme produce good effects for our service in both kingdomes: One thing more, we think fitt to requyre that whensoever yow shall appear at Edinburgh, vpon any occasion to mak stay, that yow vse your gownes and Typpetts, and appear with that gravitie which beseames yow in that and the lyk publict places, and particularlie in your places of residence and abroad : Bot especiallie we doe expresslie command all and everie of yow that ar of our privie Counsell of that kingdome, that yow cum not to the counsell table in cloaks bot in gownes and Tippetts, as beseemes yow to doe, in which, if any tak libertie to breck this our command, the persone so offending shall not onlie receave check by ordour of Counsall, but shall further fall into our displeasur, which we presume yow wilbe verie carfull not to doe; for other particulars, we doubt not bot yow will of your owin accord mak them answerable to these which will give we a great daill of contentment, in a school tyme bring much honour to that church and your colffis, which we hartlie desyre,-Dat. vt supra,

#### ARTICLES.

- 1. Our expres will and pleasur is, that the deane of our Chappell royall that now is, and his successours salbe assistant to the right reverend father in God the Archbischop of S<sup>t</sup> Androis at the Coronation so oft as it shalhappin.
- 2. That the book of the forme of our Coronatioun latelie vsed be putt in a litle box, and layed into a standard, and committed to the care of the deane of the Chappell successivelie.
- 3. That ther be prayers tuyse a day with the quyre alsweill in our absence as other wayes according to the English Liturgie, till some course be takin for making ane that may fitt the constitutions and customes of that church.
- 4. That the deane of the Chappell look carefullie that all that receave the blessed sacrament ther receave it kneeling, and that ther be a communion held in that our Chappell the first day of everie moneth.
- 5. That the deane of our Chappell that now is, and so successivelie, come corductie thither to prayers vpon Sondayes and such holy dayes as that Church observe, in his whyts, and preach so when ever he preacheth, and that he be not absente from thence, but vpon necessarie occasion of his dyocie or otherwyse, according to the course of his preferment.
- 6. That these ordours shalbe at our warrant to the deane of our Chappell, That the Lordis of the Privie Counsall, the Lordis of the Session, the Advocat's Clerks, Writters to the Signet, and members of our Colledge of Justice, be commanded to receave the holy communion once everie yeir at leist in that our Chapell royall, kneling for exempls saik to the kingdome, and we lykwyse command the deane aforsaid to mak report yeirlie to we how we ar obeyed heirin, and by whom, as also if any man shall refuis in what maner he doeth so.
- 7. That the coupis which ar confiscated to our vse be delyvered to the deane to be keipit by inventarie by him, and in a standard provided for that purpois, to be vsed at the celebration of the sacrament in our Chapell royall.

To these orders we shall heirefter add others if we find any more necessarie for the regulating of the service of God ther.

#### TO THE BISCHOP OF DUMBLANE.

Reverend, &c.—We have thoght good for the better ordoring of divyne service to be performed in our Chapell royall ther, to sett down some Articles vnder our owin hand to be observed heirin, which we send yow heir enclosed, and it is our special pleasur that yow carefullie sie overie thing performed according as we have directed by these our enclosed Articles, and lykwayes that yow certifie to the Lordis of our Privie Counsall if any of these appoynted by our former letters to them to communicat in our Chapell royall shall not accordinglie performe the same to the effect such ordour may be takin by our Counsall therin, as by our saidis former letters to them we did appoynt; wherin expecting your diligence and care, we bid, &c.

#### TO THE CHANCELLOUR.

Right, &c.—Wheras vpon the Commission by tryell of some treasonable speeches spokin by the Erle of Airth, we fund sufficient prooff to believe the same, and in regardlykwayes he by his owin acknowledgment confessed in effect as much, togider with the great fault he committed in his service to the Erldoma

of Stratherne, and is conteyned vader his hand in his late submission, we therfor find that he is not worthie to enjoy the charges which he hath formerlie borne in the State by our gift and appoyntment, nor the pension allowed to be payed vato him out of our Exchequer, wherfor we have thought good heirby to signifie the same vato yow: And it is our pleasur that yow requyre the said Erle in our name to surrender vp to our handis these his charges of Presidentschip of the Counsell, Justice Generall, and place in Session, to be disposed of as we shalbe pleased to appoynt, as lykwyes the gift of his said pension, and that in the meane tyme yow confyne him to his owin houses and boundis belonging thervato, which ar not neir to Halyrudhous, where the publict meitting of our State ar keiped.—Dat. vt supra.

### To the Tuo Archbischops of Sr Androis, Glasgow.

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Right reverend, &c.—Wheras we intended in so far as may stand with the Lawis in that our kingdome to have the right of patronage of all Churches of erection, and of other Churches not apperteneing to bischoprikis, where the patronage did belong to our late dear father, of worthic memorie, to be establisched in our persone, it is our pleasur that yow or ather of yow conven your suffragan bischops, and efter good advyse and deliberation had with them, that yow sett down some solide course wherby a List may be made of all patronages of Churches within everie presbyterie of the kingdome which apperteyned to our said late dear father, and which ar enjoyed or acclamed by any of our subjects, and that with all convenient diligence yow delyver the said list under your suffragant bischops handis to our thesaurers principall and deputie or ather of them, to the effect that they may give ordour to our Advocat to quhom we have writtin tuitching that purpois to intend summondis of reduction aganst these who pretend right therto; which recommending to your care, we bid, &c.—Dat. vt supra.

### TO THE THESAURERS, PRINCIPALLS, AND DEPUTIE.

Right, &c.—Wheras we intend to have the rents and other things which belong to our Chappell royall restored to the full integritie, and to have all such patronages and Churches established in our persone, which by the Lawis of that our kingdome appertened to our late dear father and now appertene vnto we by our late revocation and the general Lawis of that our kingdome, to which purpois we have gevin ordour of the tuo Archbischopis to give a list vnto yow vnder ther and ther suffragan bischops hands of the saidis patronages, Our pleasur is, that yow call and convene befor yow all persones pretending right to the Landis, Churches, or tythis apperteneing to our said Chapell royall as the same shalbe gevin in list vnto yow by the reverend father in God, Adam, bischop of Dumblane, deane of the said Chapell, as lykwyse that yow call for the list of the saidis patronages vnder the saidis Archbischops and bischops handis, and that in both these particulars yow give ordour to our Advocat for intenting and following furth summondis of reduction and improbatioun therof, in so far as can be done by the Lawis of that our kingdome.—Dat. vi supra.

#### TO THE ADVOCAT.

Trustie, &c.—Wheras we intend to have all such patronages of Kirkis established in our persone, which by the Lawis of that our kingdome appertened to our late dear father, and now appertene by our late revocatioun, and the generall lawis of that our kingdome, to which purpois we have gevin ordour to the tuo Archbischops to give to our Thesaurer and Deputie Thesaurer a list under ther and ther suffragan bischops handis of the saidis patronages: And wheras we have gevin ordour to our Thesaurer and deputie to call and convene befor them all persones perteneing right to the landis, churches, or tythis apperteneing

to our Chappell royall as the same shalbe gevin in List to them by the Right, &c., the bischop of Dumblane, deane of the said Chapell, to the effect the rents and other thingis belonging therto may be restored to the full integritie: Our pleasur is, that in both these particulars yow proceid according to the salvyse and direction of our said The aurer and deputic Thesaurer, and that accordinglie yow intend summonds of reduction and improbatioun against all such persones as pretend right to the said patronages, and to the landis, tythis, rents or other thingis belonging to our said Chapell royall.—Dat. vt supra.

#### TO THE ADVOCAT.

Trustie, &c.—Wheras humble sute hath bene made vnto ws in behalff of the reverend, &c., John, bischop of Ross, that in all actions of Law that shall cum befor our Colledge of Justice for recoverie of the prtronages and rents belonging to the bischoprick of Ross, he can have all the lawfull favour can be affoorded vnto him, Our pleasur is, that ather in our name or in name of the said bischop, or in both, as it sall seame most expedient vnto yow, yow compeir and give your best assistance in all actions of Law intended or to be intended by him before our said Colledge for the effect forsaid, wherin as yow shall doe we acceptable service, so we will tak particular notice theref.—Whythall, 6 Octor 1633.

### TO THE CHANCELLOUR.

Right, &c.—Wheras we have bene informed concerneing the abuse of forrane coyne current ther, and great scarcitie of our owin, we ar exceidinglie desyreous that a speedie remedie may be fund for the same: Therfoir it is our pleasur that togidder with our right trustic cousens and counsellours the Erles of Morton and Traquair, our principall and deputie Thesaurers, yow call vnto yow such others of our privic Counsell as yow shall think fittin to the effect that haveing earefullie informed yourselfiles of the forsaids abuses in the matter of Coyne, yow may with all consider by what meanes the same may best and most speedelie be reformed, and that with all diligence yow certifie we of your opinions theranent, that thairefter we may give such further ordour as in our princelie judgment shall be fund most expedient for the weill of that our ancient kingdome; which recommending earnestlie to your care, we bid, &c.—Whythall, 6 Octor 1633.

#### TO THE SESSION.

Right, &c.—Wheras we ar informed that it will conduce to the good of our service that in all matters that heirefter shall cum befor yow, wherin we have a speciall interest as persewer or defender, or wherin yow shall find we to have a special and particular interest by any other maner of way that our Thesaurer and deputic Thesaurer be present, Our pleasur is, that befoir yow proceed in any such action, yow hear our saidis officers for our interest; ffor which, &c.—Whythall, 6 Octor 1633.

### To the Commissioners of Surbanders.

Right, &c.—Wheras we intend to have the few maills of the superiorite of erections bought to our vse from such persones as did subscryve the generall surrander, conforme to the tenour of our generall determination, and becaus ther hath bene some scrupall moved heirtofoir (as we ar informed) anent what salbe accompted superioritie, which in our judgment is cleir and evident, That all most be compted superioritie to which the titularis of erections had not lawfull right of propertie befor there erections, or whairof they have not acquired rights of propertie, and by vertew of these rights have bene in possession

thair of befor the generall surrander: Therfoir it is our pleasur that yow proceed in the course for buying vnto ws of the few mails of the saids erections, notwithstanding any doubt or scruple that may be made by the occasion forsaid.—Dat. vt supra.

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### To the Exchequer.

Right, &c. - Forasmuch as the superioritie of all erections perteneing to ws by the late act of parliament made in our favours, reserveing to such titularis of erection who subscryved the generall surrander ther few maillis till they be satisfeit therfoir. Conform to our generall determinatioun; and for as much as diverse of the vassalls of erections (as we ar informed) ar willing to advance the money for buying the few maillis for such yeres efter ther advanceing of the moneyis as in reasone and equitie may compense the money to be advanced by them; and sieing we approve this course, and ar willing that these who advance have retention of ther few maillis for such space of yeres as yow shall think reasonable: Therfoir it is our pleasur, that yow caus mak publict intimatioun heirof to all our leidges, who have interest, be oppin proclamation at the mercat cross of Edinburgh, to the effect such of the vassalls of the Erections as ar or shalbe willing, may cum in befoir yow, and agrie with our Thesaurer and deputic-thesaurer for advanceing of these moneyis, and receave warrant and securitie by act of, Exchequer for reduction of the saidis few maillis and few fermes for the space to be agried vpon; and becaus ther hath bene heirtofoir some scruple made what shalbe compted superioritie, wheranent we signifed our royall pleasur by tuo severall letters registrat in the bookes of Commission: Therfor we have thought good to acquant yow heirwith, and with the equitie of our proceedings therin, which is, that in justice all is to be accompted superioritie to which the titulars of erection had not lawfull right of propertie befor ther erections, or wherof they have not acquyred rights of propertie, and by vertew of these rights, have bene in possession therof befor the generall surrander; and we will yow to proceed according to this rule: And in the meane tyme it is our speciall pleasur, that yow pass no eignature of any kirk land perteneing to erection in favour of the saidis Lordis of erection, or in favours of any other, vpon ther resignation, bot of that which was ther propertie, in maner forsaid, to be holdin lykwyse of ws in few ferme, according to our late act of parliament made thereanent; and becaus we ar informed that some Titulars of erection intend to ingresse agane to them ther superioriteis. in whole or in part, by procureing resignatiouns from the vassalls in ther favours, whervpon they intend to pass new infeftments, and than to give subalterne rights and few to these who have resigned: It is our will that no such signature be exped of the saidis superiorite in our prejudice; to which recommending to your care, we bid. &c .- Whythall, 6 Octor 1633.

### . To THE BISCHOP OF ST ANDROIS.

Wheras we, vpon your remonstrance, have disvnited from the bischoprik of S<sup>t</sup> Androis the landis and kirkis lyeing vpon the south syd of the watter of Forth, haveing erected the same in a severall bischoprik, as by the patent of erection may appear: Our pleasur is, that with all diligence yow assemble the Archbischop of Glasgow, and all the bischops of that our kingdome, representing to them the just reasones moveing yow to petition, and ws to condescend vnto the same, with the great charges and expenses we had vndergone, to provyd a compitent meanes for the honorabill mantenance of that Seat, all which we have done for the good peace and quyetnes of the Church of that kingdome, whairof we did and ever have bene verie cairefull: And that yow caus mak a generall act, with ther vniforme consent, allowing the said disvnion and erection of the said bischoprik vnder ther handis and sealls, which yow shall caus delyver to our Clerk of Register, to be keipit amongst the recordis of that kingdome, to which purpois we have written to them, wherof the letter we have sent yow heirwith, for causeing reid the same in your assemblie; which recommending vnto your care and diligent performance, we bid, &c.

### TO THE TOUN OF EDIFBURGH.

Wheras, of our princelic motive and zeall for the advancement and governement of the Church of that our kingdome, we have, by the advyse of the cheifest of our Clergy thairof, crected at our charges a bischoprik of new, to be called the Bischoprik of Edinburgh, wherby none of your privilodges nor liberteis ar anywayes to be infringed, bot rather preserved and increaseed; and wheras to that purpois it is verie expedient that Si Geills churche, designed by ws to be the Cathedrall church of that bischoprik, be ordored as is decent and fift for a church of that eminencie, and according to the first intention of the Erectors and founders thairof, which was to be keiped conforme to the Largnes and conspicuitie of the foundation and fabrik, and not to be indecentlic parcelled and disjoyned by walls and partitions, as now it is, without any warrand from any of our Royall predicessours: Our pleasur is, that with all diligence yow caus raise to the ground the east wall in the said church, and that lykwayes yow cause raise the west wall therin, between this Lambes ensueing, at or befor which tyme we requyre yow to caus finish the new tolbuith, to the effect it may be for the vse of our Excheker, and other Judicatoreis and Commissions, at the tyme and occasion shall requyre.—Dat. vt supra.

#### TO THE COMMISSIONERS OF TYTHIS.

As we have heirtofoir writtin vnto yow at diverse tymes to proceid with all diligence in the valuatioun of tythis, as a purpois much conduceing to the good of our service, and speciallie the publict good of that our kingdome: So we ar heirby pleased at this tyme to chaw yow which way it is our pleasur yew proceid in the same, and therfor we command that yow proceid in the valuation of tythes of all the kirkis of erections befor any vther valuation whatsumever, and that, for the quicker expedign of the said valuation, and other particulars committed to your charge mentionat in your commission, yow appoynt another day of the weik for sitting then Wednsdays and Frydays: All which we speciallie recommend vnto your care.—Whythall, dat. supra.

# TO THE EARLES OF MORTOUN AND TRAQUAIR, CLERK REGISTER AND ADVOCAT.

Wheras it is expedient for the good of our service that a speciall care be had for the preservation of these submissions made vnto ws by the erectours and others persones mentionat in our decrie, tuitching Tythis and surranders, to which purpois we have heirby thoght fitt to requyre yow to consider if by a legall and convenient course the same can be registrat, and if it may be that yow give warrant to our Advocat to delyver them to our Clerk of Register to that effect; and if by a dew and legall forms they cannot be registrat, that yow caus lykwayes delyver them to our said Clerk of Register to be saiflie keipit amongst the recordis of that kingdome: and for your soe doeing, &c.—Dat. vt supra.

#### TO THE COUNSELL.

Wheras ther was a petition prefered by the toun of Edinburgh to the late Parliament holdin by ws in that our kingdome tuitching the Ministers' stipends in setling therof, wherby it was desyred that the imposing of the same might be layed rateablie vpon the Inhabitants, as they wer fund able, the consideration and determyneing of which petition was remitted vnto yow, sieing the establisching and provydeing of the Church of that toun is a purpois wherof we doe verie much approve: Our pleasur is, that yow consider of the said Petition, and if yow find that the course propounded by them cannot convenientle tak effect, that the said imposition may be rateablic layed and takin vy according to the proportion of the maill of the said burgh, appoynting therby to everie minister a compitent stipend and a commodious duelling-hous, according to ther degree.—Dat. vt supra.

#### TO THE ADVOCAT.

Haveing now fullie concluded what we intended at our late being ther for erection of a bischoprik, to be called the bischoprik of Edinburgh, the furtherance of which designs we did then recommend to your care, we have thought good, out of our acknowledgment of your carefull endeavour thairin, whairof we have fund the effects, to give yow harty thanks; and as hitherto we have alwayse fund the lyk care in anything might concerne our service, so we doubt not bot yow will still continew, being the more encouraged by this our particular taking notice of your bypast diligence and affection, which we shalbe readic further to acknowledge when any good occasion shall offer to that purpois: Se speciallie recommending vnto your care to ayd and assist from tyme to tyme the bischop of Edinburgh, appoynted by ws, in all things that may concerne the setling and advancement of the bischoprik, we bid, &c.—Dat, vt supra.

### TO THE COMMISSIONERS OF SURRENDERS.

Wheras we have directed a bischoprik of new, to be called the bischoprik of Edinburgh, haveing for mantenance thairof appoynted thervnto certane kirks, tythis, and others benefices, as by the patent of erection may appear, to the end the Tythis, personage and viccarage, of the said bischoprik (which is our owin royall wark) may be in the same case and as frie as the tythis of any other bischoprik whatsumever within that our kingdome: Our pleasur is, that yow proceid no otherwayes therin then in the saidis tythis, personage and viccarage, of other bischopriks, and that yow remitt the provisions of the patrimoniall Churches of the said bischoprik to the modificatioun of the bischop and his successours, and that yow certific the vnjust valuations of any tythis belonging thervnto whensoever the bischop shall intend proces to that effect.—Dat, vt supra.

### TO THE COUNSELL.

Wheras it is expedient that the blanks in the Commission of the Lawis tuitching the number of persones to mak a session, the Quorum the tyme of endurance, and prorogation be filled vp: It is our will that sevin mak a session: That our Chancellour, the Erles of Mortoun and Traquair, President of the session for the tyme, be of the quorum, and that they, all or any of them, be alwayes present: The tyme of endurance of the said Commissioun to be betuixt this and Witsondey 1635 yeires, and to be prorogat dureing our pleasur; to which purpois we requyre yow to give warrand to our Clerk Register by ane Act of our Privic Counsall for filling vp of the said Commission accordinglie; ffor which, &c.—Dat, vt supra.

#### TO THE TOUN OF EDINBURGH.

Wheras for the good of that toun we have established our Colledge of Justice, and have now ordeaned our Counsall and Exchecker still to sitt within the same, and wheras it is verie expedient that the recordis and publict registers of that kingdome be keiped and made vse of for our service and good of our subjects neir vnto our saidis Judicatoreis, and the rather becaus the Chartour-hous in our Castell of Edinburgh is not of sufficient capacitie to receave and conteyne all the recordis tuitching our Croun and others concerning the publict esteat: Our pleasur is, that yow cause provyde a fair and large hous, with two-thrie rowmes, for keiping of the said register and recordis within that toun, which shalbe most vsefull for our service and commodious for our leidges: This faill not to doe with all expedition, as ye tender the good of our service and the good of our toun: We bid, &c.—Dat, vt supra.

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#### TO THE ERLE OF TRAQUAIR.

Wheras our service is much hindred in the Commission of Tythis, in regard of not admission of ane clerk to the same: It is our will and pleasur, lykas we heirby give vnto yow full power and commission to call hefor yow M<sup>1</sup> W<sup>20</sup> Hay, Clerk to the said Commission, and admitt him thervnto, receave his oath de fideli administratione, that he may give furth summondis ather at our Advocat or leidges instance, for which these shalbe vnto yow and him a sufficient warrant.—8 Octor 1633.

### TO THE LORD NAPER.

Right, &c.—Wheras by reasone of the present wants in our Exchequer, and of some of our particular commandements laid at this tyme vpon our Thesaurers, principall and deputic, for imploying moneyis for our present and speciall service, it may fall out that these sowmes of money for which they ar bund vnto yow cannot be so convenientlic payed vnto yow as they intended and yow expect, in which caice we have heirby thoght good to desyre yow not to vrge our saidis officers or ther cautioners with extremitic of Law for payment of your moneyis, vntill the necessitic of our present vrgent affaires may convenientlic permitt them to give yow satisfaction, which we will not tak weill at your handis, and if yow shall find it neidfull therefter, we will not be wanting in what we can lawfullic and convenientlic doe, for your more speedic satisfaction of these moneyis dew vnto yow: We bid, &c.—Whythall, 8 Octor 1633.

### TO THE COUNSELL.

Right, &c.—Wheras our late Royall father by severall Acts of Parliament ordeaned that thrugh all the schirrefdomes of that number a selected number of Justices of Peace should be choysen in each schyre for the more quyet and peacable governament thairof, setting down ther Instructions in the Parliament holdin in anno 1617; and wheras the same was ratifeid in our late Parliament holdin in Junij last, and commission govin to yow for granting vnto them such further instructions as the necessitie of the service sall requyre: It is our pleasur that yow furth mak choyse out of each shirrefdome of a compitent number of the best and ablest gentlmen inhabiteing the same; and that Commissions be issued furth of the Chancerie be the directour thairof to whome the same apperteneth, to be exped vnder the great seall,

Right, &c.—Wheras we vnderstand that the Clerk of Register by himselff and his depute ar and ought to be sole clerks to Parliaments and to all commissions issweing from the same, and all decreits gevin by vertew of these commissions have the force of acts of Parliament, and therfor cannot be subscryved bot be him and them: And wheras our trustic and weilbelovit Counsellour Sir Johne Hay of Baro, kny<sup>t</sup>, our present Clerk of Register, hath by his gift presented Mr Wm Hay, his sone, to be Clerk to the Commission of Tythis, which present occasione we have of late ratifeid: It is our pleasur and will that yow receave and admitt the said Mr Wm Hay to the said office of Clerk to the Commission of Tythes and surrenders, taking his oath de fideli administratione; and that from tyme to tyme yow receave to be Clerks thervnto such persones and non others as shalb presented by our said Clerk Register, in caice the said office of Clerkschip to the said Commission shall happein at any tyme to be voyd.—Whythall, 8 Octor 1633.





# TO THE VICE PRESIDENT OF YORK.

## TO THE ADVOCAT.

It is our pleasur that all the Lordis, Archbishops, and Bischops within that our kingdome of Scotland shall in all publict places wear goones with standing cappis (such as they used at our late being ther) and cassoks, and the inferiour Clorgy, especiallie efter they have takin the degrie of doctours and batchellours in divinitie, or be preachers in any toun, shall wear the same for a fascheon, bot for worthie, according to ther meanes, and no typpetts, valess they be doctours; And farder, our pleasur is, that the Archbischeps and bischops shall, in all churches wher they shall cum in tyme of divyne service or sermones, be in whytts, that is, in a rockel or sleives, as they did wear it at the tyme of our Coronatioun, and especiallie whenseever they administer the holy communious or preach, and they shall lykwyse provide themselffis a Chimer (that is a sattin or taffetie gowne without lyneing or sleives) to be worne over ther whytts, and the tyme of ther consecration: And we will that all Archbischops and bischops aforsaid, that ar of our privie counsell or of our session, shall cum and sitt ther in ther whytts, and manteane the gravitie of ther places : And for all inferiour elergiemen, we will they preach in ther blak gownes, bot when the reid divyne service, christen, burie, or administer the sacraments of the Lordis supper, they shall wear ther surplis, and if they be doctours, ther tippettis over them; and as well Archbischops and bischops as other ministers when they administer the holic communion in our chappell royall, or any cathedrall church within that our kingdome, shall wear copes; and not onlie they bot all inferiour priests shall, at tymes and places befoir mentioned, vse ther square coppes, especiallic in all our Vniversiteis.—Whythall, 18 Octor 1633.

Right, &c.-Wheras by our direction Sir Johne and Sir William Scotts, tuo of the Erle of Buceleuch's tutors, have repaired to our Court to know our pleasur tuitching the particulars of our decreit-Arbitrall and exposition theref, with whom we have conferred therin; and sicing formerlie we gave ordour to our Advocat to draw vp a mynut for a contract betuixt the Erle Buccleuch and Francis Stewart for setling of them conforme to our decreit, which mynut was not then subscryved be the pairteis, Therfor it is now our pleasur that the said mynut be extendit in forme by advyse of ther mutuall Advocatts, if they be present, and by advyse of our Advocat, whom we doe heirby will yow appoint to sie the same formallie done according to the intent of the inclosed mynut in all poynts; and our pleasur is, that the said Francis be entred to the volifting of the fermes and dewteis of the landis dew to him since the dait of our decreit, and in tyme cuming, and being secured in these landis formerlie possessed by the late Erle and his father, and whairof they or oney of them wer in vse to vplift the maills and dewteis, that he renunce all title to the rest of the saidis Landis, tithes, and superioriteis in favours of Francis, now Erle of Bucclouch, except such landig and tythes as wer not valued by the said late Erle, and also cam not ynder our decree, nor wer by him, the said Erle, recomend in your presens, at leist any right thairof which he had thervnto by the forfeyt of the late Erle of Bothwell, whervnto we formerlie did and now doe declair that we will enable the said Francis pro tanto that he may plead ather for the vnvalued or renunced lauds and tythis as saidis, to the end he may recover the same to the lawes of the kingdome if he hath right thervnto, and that ordour may be given to draw a signature or gift of forfaultour therof to the said Francis, conforme to the intention of our decreit-arbitrall and acts of counsall made theranent of befoir; And the contract being so exped, it is our pleasur that both the saids pairteis subscryve the same in your presens or some of your number appoynted by yow, and which, if ather of the pairteis refuis, we will that our Advocatt concurre with the other pairtie and vrge the fulfilling of the said decreit-arbitrall and our exposition therof by ordour of Law, whereanent this shalbe his warrant; All which seriouslie recommending to your care, we bid, &c .- Grenwitch, May 1634.

Right, &c.—Haveing at lenth conferred with our right, &c. the Erle of Roxbrught in a proposition made by him to we testieficing his willingnes to putt in our hands his right of all such churches and tythis as doe belong to the Abacic of Kelso, and that ar vndisponed by him, others then these churches and tythis which lyes within Teviotdaill and the Forrest, and doe concerne his owin landis and some of his particular freindis, with whome he hath alreadic agried for the right of ther tythis, according to the

ordinance that we did sett down that everic man should have his owin tythis: And considering that this overture made by our said right, &c. to we may much contribute to these lawfull and just endis, and to the good of our service, we have thoght it expedient to remitt the further consideration of the particulars to your conference with our said right, &c., earnestlie desyreing yow that the most convenient course may be taken for establishing of his right of these churches and tythis in our persone, satisfaction being gevin him as we acknowledge reasone and equitie dooth allow; and sieing the bussines will requyre tyme and leasure befoir it can be weill digested, and we adverteised of that course which shalbe fund fittest and best to be taken, Our will and pleasur is, that yow tak such course as that ther be no further proceeding concerning these churches and tythis, bot that all may be contened and stand in the same caice they now ar in, till our farther pleasur be signified theranent; which recommending, &c., we bid, &c.—Greinwitch, 21 May 1634.

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## To MR JAMES HOME.

Trustie, &c.—Haveing beine moved by the Erles of Murray and Lawderdale to admitt of 'ane appeall to ws in this proces depending concerneing the Erldome of Home; bot considering the troubles and inconveniences which may ensue if we should but hearken to the said Appeall, we have thoght rather fitt that both of yow condescend vpon a submission vpon equall termes to tuo or thrie weill affected on ather part for setling all bussines amicablic between yow, and one to be oversman, cutt schort and end all differences that may fall out (ourselff not being vnwilling to vndergoe the said trouble of oversman, both pairteis requeisting we thervnto); concerneing which motion of ours, haveing the willing consent and approbation of the Erles of Murray and Lauderdale, in name of ther sones and daughters in Law, we doe heirby demand and expect of yow the lyk where being verie confident, we bid, &c.—Grenewitch, 24 May 1634.

# TO THE SESSION.

Right, &c.—Wheras we have signified our royall pleasur to our right, &c. the Erles of Murray and Lawderdaill, in name of ther sone and daughters in Law, and to our, &c. James Home of Coldinknowis, for submitting of all questions amongst them anent the succession to the estate and liveing of Home to the amicable decision of freinds: It is our will that yow not onlie forbear any further proceiding in any processe depending theranent befor yow, bot lykwayes that yow stay all proces intended or to be intended, ather at the instance of any of the saidis tuo pairteis aganst others, or at the instance of any other aganst them or any of them, as aires or successours to vinquill James, Erle of Home, till yow shall vinderstand our further pleasur.—[No date.]

# TO THE ADVOCAT.

Trustie, %c.—Haveing fund it more expedient that all questions anent the succession and right to the estate and liveing of Home be decydit amicablic [rather] than be Law, we have acquanted the Erles of Murray and Lawderdai with our will heiranent; and finding them, in the names of their sones and daughters in Law, willing to obey, we have by this other letter (which yow shall delyver) demanded the lyk of the other pairtie, James Home of Coldinknowis: It is therfor our pleasur that yow draw vp a full submission, conceaved vpon equall termes, wharby all matters questionable amongst them may be absolutelie referred to freinds; and least in the meane tyme ather pairtie receave prejudice, we have gevin warrant to the Senatours of our Colledge of Justice to stay all process by this letter direct to them, which yow shall delyver at the first sitting: Which recommending, &c.—Dat. vt supra.

#### TO THE SESSION.

Right, &c.—Wheras the distressed esteat of Sir W<sup>m</sup> Keith of Ludwharne hath bene humblic represented vnto ws, as being vnable any longer to attend the issue of ane action of Law depending befor yow betweene him and Johne Gordon of Haddo; in which cace we, taking into our princelic consideration the hard estate of such persones, ar heirby gratiouslie pleased to recommend vnto yow that speedic justice be administred in the said action, admitting of no dilatours that convenientlie can be avoyded to putt him in further charge or delay.—Dat. vt supra.

# To THE SESSION.

Right, &c.—Wheras we ar informed of ane action in Law depending befor yow betuixt the now bischop of the Yles and the bischop of Rapho, late of Yles, tuitching a yere's fruit of that bischoprik; becaus the one's ordinarie residence is in Irland and the other in remote parts of that our kingdome, from that our seat of Justice, and that his charge requyreth more then ordinarie panes and vigilancie in persones of the lyk function, we ar heirby pleased seriouslie to recommend vnto yow that speedie Justice be administrat, not onlie in that action, bot in all others that shall cum in befor yow concerning the said bischop of Yles, which we shall tak as acceptable service done vnto ws.—Grenwitch, 24 May 1634.

In regard your subjects of Scotland had never any continewed trade in Affrick, wherby to benefite themselffis or your Custome, These give power for 31 yeres to the persones above written to trade with all native and forrayne commodite to and from Scotland, in and to the bounds beginning at the river Senega. lyeing in the 164 degree of northerlie latifule, and southerlie to Cap de Bon esperance in the 344 degrie of southerlie latitude. They ar to pay to your Matie dues and customes for outward and inward commodities. Others of that kingdome ar discharged vpon pane of confiscation of thair schipis and goodis, whairof your Matie is to have one-halff and the Patentees the other. Your Matie promeises to give no power of that tenour to any others dureing that tyme without ther consent. They may assigne ther interests to other persones who ar to have the lyk power. They may sett to sea so many schipps furnisched with Ordinance as they shall think necessar to incress and secure ther trade. No access to be made of ther schipis and mariners bot for saftie of the kingdome. Thay er to have what Commissions shalbe further requisit for the more safe trading. Your Matie is to assist them in procureing right if they be wronged by any forraigne Prince or state. They may adjoyne to them such compitent number of Dutch merchands and other strangers as they shall think fitt to be denizens, and to have the lyk friedome in that trade. They may convens and establisch such ordours as shalbe fitt for regulating their trade which your Matie requires to be keiped if not repugnant to your lawes. All your Officers whom it concerneth ar to assist them when occasion requyris. The names of the persones to whom this signatur was granted went home in blank,— Grenwich, 26 May 1634.

# MYNUTE.

Francis Stewart is to have all the Lands in Lothian which belonged formerlie to his father, paying bak to the Aires of Buccleuch for the superplus which shalbe fund above eight thowsand fyve hundreth merks of yeirlie rent, being ane thowsand punds for everic hundreth merks, which was estimated befoir his Matie to extend to thretie-tua thowsand pundis Scotts money or therabout, and that in full satisfaction of the whole thrid part of all the estate which the Erle of Buccleuch did value and mak subject to his Mateia decree as belonging vnto him by vertew of the Erle Bothwell's forfeyture.

And whatsoever landis or rents the said Erle did renunce, or wor not valued and made subject to his Ma<sup>tols</sup> decree, as lykwayes whatsoever tythes or patronages of churches out of which the said Erle had any rent, they being renunced or not valued and made subject to his Ma<sup>tols</sup> decree, the said Françis is to be enabled pro tanto to plead for them by Law, and to recover them to his owin vse, they taking them to ther other rights and quyting Bothwell's forfaltour in that.

Everie of them is to delyver to the other all the evidents that they have of the proportions of Lands that is disposed to the other, renunceing all right they can pretend thervnto, and giveing warrandice fra ther owin deidis. Non of them is to hold any stok, tythis, or superioriteis of ane other whatsumever, but immediatlie of his Ma<sup>tio</sup> if they wer holdin so formerlie, or otherwayes as they wer holdin of old.

As for the patronages that shall appin to be questioned betweene them, it is his Ma<sup>tela</sup> pleasur that his Advocat consider of his right therunto. If any question shall aryse vpon new grounds betweene the pairteis further than is explayned, his Ma<sup>tle</sup> is to be acquanted therwith that he may declair his further pleasur theranent.—Grenwitch, 26 May 1634.

Wheras by our former precept we appoynted 3000<sup>lib</sup> sterling to have bene payed to Sir Alex\* Strauchan of Thorntoun, kny\* baronet, vpon consideration he had frielic dimitted our commission to him tuitching omissions and conceilments, wherby for the panes and charges he was at it was fitt he should have receaved recompence; To the end that both we who ar so engadged by our precept, and yow who ar particularlie bund for paying these moneyis vnto him may be tymelic disengadged, and he by that meanes releived of debts contracted by him for his charge in that our service, Our pleasur is, that yow pay vnto him, his aires and assigneyis, the said sowme of 3000<sup>lib</sup> sterling with all convenient diligence, and that out of the first and readiest of these taxatiouns last granted to ws, with interest for such tyme heirefter as the said sowme shalhappin to be vnpayed to him or his forsaids, and that ye accept of this our warrant, testificing vnto him vnder your hands your acceptatioun heirof, and therefter that yow sie we discharged of that debt and yourselffis releived; for which, &c.—Grenewitch, 26 May 1634.

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## TO THE EXCHEQUER.

Right, &c.—Wheras our royall father, of happie memorie, wyselie considering how much it did import the good of that our kingdome, that the administration of criminall justice should not be communicat to ilk subject, bot that the same should be committed to such judges as should be able and qualifeid persones for exerceing the same, and befor whome pairteis may plead for themselffis, and have these ordinar helpes which ar allowed by the lawis of that kingdome, to the which ther wer no greatter lett then the liberteis and priviledges granted by our predicessours by infettments to ther weill deserveing subjects, which as we doe nowayes intend to abrogat nor infringe, so we doe not see it agricable to reasone that they may mak saill of these Liberteis, nor transact the same to whome they pleas, nor that ther new erections of barroneis should be granted in that kynd; Our pleasur is, that yow grant no new infettments to any subject of Lands, with power to hang, head, imprisson, putt to death, scourge, or anywayes priviledge in that kynd, nor that yow accept resignations of the same priviledges, bot onlie of the Lands and euch other priviledges as ar inherent to them, without any new grant of these royall priviledges inherent to the croun, which we cannot think transmissable nor fitt to be exposed to seall; wherin expecting yow will be cairefull, we bid, &c.—Grenwitch, 26 May 1634.

#### TO THE COUNSELL.

Right, &c.—Wheras it is not vnknowen vnto yow with what care we have intendit the good of the Assotiation of the fischings within these our kingdomes for the vse of our subjects, and that we wilbe provident to protect them from the exactions of the heretours in the Yles, who, as we are informed, without a warrant exact sindrie dewteis from them, to ther great prejudice, bringing in strangeris and loading ther vessells with fisches and other native commoditeis, contrair to our lawis: Our pleasur is, that yow call befor yow the Landislordis of these Yles wher the fisching is, and take accompt of them by knowing vpon what warrant they tak these dewteis, and that yow discherge what yow think not dew in that kynd vpon verie good grounds, sending vnto ws a note of all that is exacted; and that yow tak ordour with strangeris who resort and trade ther, contraire to our Lawis and the course intendit by the patent of Assotiation: So, expecting that no such demeanour be committed in tyme cuming, &c.—Grenwitch, 26 May 1634.

## TO THE COUNSELL.

Right, &c.—Wheras, in our late parliament holdin within that our kingdom, ther was complaynt made of diverse insolence and oppressions made in the hielands of that our kingdome, the caus of which complant is not as yit removed, we being willing to represse the same, and to establisch such solide ordour wherby our peace may be manteaned, and these rebellious and dissobedient subjects reduced to the obedience of our lawes, or punisched accordinglie: It is our pleasur that yow caus putt in executioun the acts of Parliament made the 7 parliament holdin by our dearest father, of happie memoric, cap. 93, 94, 95, 96, 97, aganst the induellars in the hielands and borders, or vt.ier places wher these rebells resort or duell, as lykwyse the act of our late parliament made anent the Clangregour; And that yow tak such further course for quyeting in these and where parts in that our kingdome, as in your judgments shalbe thought fittest for interteneing of our peace and protecting our good subjects from all violence and oppressions, and that from tyme to tyme yow mak we accompt of your diligence heirin; but where yow find any lett or stay we will, vpoun your signicining thair of vnto ws, and our opinions tuitching the same by our further authoritie to remove the same: Which recommending, &c.—Grenewitch, 26 May 1634.

Right, &c.—Wheras for reformation and prevention of the abuses and inconveniences heirtofoir occasioned throw the ungoverned sale and immoderat use of Tobacco, we have resolved for to ordour the

sale of that commoditie throughout our dominions, that non bot such as vpon examination shalbe fund to be fitt may be permitted to sell or use the same by small or retaill, and these to be licenced by authoritie from ws, putting in at the receaveing of the licence sufficient band alseweill for selling wholsome and uncorrupt tobacco as for keiping good ordour and rule in ther severall housses and shops: The prosecution and ordereing of which service within that our kingdome we have bene pleased to committ (dureing the space of sevin yeires) to our trustie Sir James Leslie, kny, and Thomas Dalmahoy, as by our gift, daited at Whythall the 19 Aprill 1634 yeres, may appear: Our pleasur is, that, according to this our royall intention, yow tak ordour that efter the 15 of Sept. nixt ensueing, no persone whatsoever presume to sell or utter tobacce in small or by retaill within that our kingdome bot such and so many as shalbe therunto licenced by our saids commissioners, under pane of our high displeasur and such a penaltie as yow shall think fitt to impose, on such as shalhappin to transgres, the one halft to belong to the informer and the other halft to the saids Commissioners; and that yow mak this our pleasur knowen to all our loveing subjects by letters of publication theref, direct by yow in dew forme; ffor doeing wheref, as also to yow of Exchequer for expeciding the said grants, these presents shalbe a sufficient warrand.—Grenewitch, 29 May 1634.

Right, &c.—Wheras we had formerlie writtin unto yow concerning ane petition exhibited unto ws by our trustic Sir Alex Setone, kny, one of the Senatours of our Colledge of Justice, for some moneyis dew unto him for imbringing to our use of the concealment of our taxations, which he alledged to be payable unto him by the Erle of Mar as being then Collectour of Taxations, and now finding by your letter that according as we had required yow yow have convened both pairteis, and that efter dow tryell yow have fund the said Erle to be frie of the same, and the sowme of 6077 merks of that our kingdome resting justlie dew unto the said Sir Alex, and besyds being certified by yow of the extraordinaric panes and charges he hath bene at in the said service, Our pleasur is, that out of any of the saids concealments ungevin out, or which he shalhappin discover himselff heirefter yow pay unto him his aires and assigneyis the said sowme of 6077 lib., or otherwayes that yow tak oney such trew course for his speedic satisfaction as yow shall think fitter, ffor the which, &c.—Grenwitch, 29 May 1634.

# TO THE SESSION.

Right, &c.—Wheras we understand that W<sup>m</sup> Scott of Ardross, who is mariage we bestowed upon our trustie and weilbeloved M<sup>r</sup> William Drummond of Hathornden, is verie schortlie to marie ather without consent of him who is the donatour, or of his owin cum ours, contrarie both to Law and his dewtie, and wherby he intendeth to defraud we and the donatour of the double availl of the mariage, Our pleasur therfor is, that if the donatour efter the solemnization of the said intendit mariage shalhappin to intend action in Law befoir yow for the double availl thairof, that without delay ye administer unto him speedie justice according to our Lawis, without unnecessarie protraction of tyme, which we doe the rather requyre to be the more speedelie putt to a poynt, in respect it wilbe a preparative important for ws in diverse causes of the lyk nature, wherin we find our selffis prejudged; we bid, &c.—Grenewitch, 29 May 1634.

# To the Commissioners for Tythes.

Right, &c.—Wheras by ane Act of our late parliament holdin in that kingdome dischargeing all leading of Tythes, ther is a provision conceaved in favours of Churchmen possessing thairof, haveing

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irtofoir our the relation to ther submission and the meaneing of our decree gevin thairvpon, not intending to extend the benefite thairof to any laick persones who by themselflis or a thours have procured taks of the tythis of other men's Lands from any bischop or beneficed persone: Our pleasur is, that so long as these tythes doeth remane in the persones of laymen, yow tak such present order for the heretors leading and intrometting thairwith vpoun sufficient suretie to pay according to the valuation as yow doe in the tythis of erections, and wheras we intend so to meassur our favour to all our subjects as we may enjoy the same without hurt and detriment of ane other: To which purpois being informed of the prejudice sustent by these who doeth not receave payment for ther tythis till the finisching of ther valuations which by our former letters ar delayed till all the tythes of erections be first valued, we ar heirby pleased to remit to your consideration some propositions for remedie of this prejudice seameing fair to ws, which yow may hear from our servand and Sir James Lockhart: So recommending to your care the approveing thairof, or finding some better expedient to that purpois.—Grenewitch, 29 May 1634.

# TO THE COUNSELL OF SCOTLAND.

Right, &c.—Haveing understude by a letter from our President of York that one Ralff Fetherston-halgh being sentenced in a caus befor them to frustrat the effect of Justice in contempt of our Authoritie hath fled to that our kingdome, and being nowayes willing that any of our kingdomes should be a saiff refuige to shelter them that retire thervnto, being consured as malefactours in ane other bok, that our Justice should reach them wherever they are in any of our dominions: It is our pleasur that if the said Ralff be within that our kingdome, yow caus apprehend him with diligence, and send him with a saiff convoy to our toun of Berwick to be delivered to the Mayor therof, to the end he may send him to be convoyed from Sb-irreff to Shirreff to our Citie of York to be answerable to Justice: For doeing quherof, &c.—Grenewitch, 29 May 1634.

# To SIR JAMES BALFOUR.

Trustie, &c.—Wherin at our late being within that our kingdome, we wer pleased to conferre vpon our right Robert, Viscount of Belheaven, that title as a degree of honour which we have estemed due vnto his merite, to the end ther be nothing wanting (vsuall in this kynd), wherby this our favour and the remembrance of his good and faythfull service dew vnto ws may be preserved, we requyre yow according to the dewtie of your place to insert and register in your books his coat of armes sent heirwith vnto yow according to the custome, and as is fitt, provyded it wrong no other; for doeing whairof, &c.—Grenwitch, penult May 1634.

Right, &c.—Wheras we ar informed that about the begining of our Reigne the petitioner Alexr Blair was, by act of Connsell, made to abandon that kingdome, which we ar confident yow caused doe vpoun verie good consideratiouns, bot being now humblic petitioned by him that in regard of the death of his brother to whom he doeth succeed in his right to certane Lands in that kingdome, he may repair thither for recoverie thairof, Our pleasur is, that yow grant him such a tyme for that purpois as yow shall think necessarie, that he may seik for his right according to Justice and the Lawis of that our kingdome; for doeing, &c.—Grenewitch, penult May 1634.

Our Soveraigne Lord ordeanes a commission to be made vnder his Ma<sup>teis</sup> great seall of the kingdom of Scotland, making mention that his highnes, being crediblic informed that a great part of his Ma<sup>teis</sup>

Roxburgh, E. Stirling, E. Lawderdale, E. Southesk, E. Traquair, B. Ross, Clerk Register, Advocat, and such of his Mateis officers who shalbe in these places for the tyme, or any thrie of them, his Mateis commissioners conjunctlie, with power to visite all and sindrie his highnes' said plenisching and wardrob stuff whatsoever within the custodie of the said Sir Johne, and to call for the said book and whole particulars therin, to try in whois custodie they ar, and to bring them bak and repose them in his charge, and therepon to tak ane Inventure of new of all the plenisching which yow shall find in his custodiie and as shalbe reposed in his charge agane by vertew of this commission, and delyver it to the Clerk of Register to be keipt amongst his Mateis records, and that he be no further charged than according to the said ne.7 Inventar, valess a farther supplie of plenisching be made by his Matte or his highnest royall successours ffirme and stable holding, and for to hold whatsomever the saids Commissioners shall doe and ordeyne to be done in the premisses, and that the said commission be further extendit with all clausses neidfull,

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
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


pay of everie seck, ather by vertew of any acts of burrowis, or by ther voluntar grant, for making vp of the minister's stipend; Commanding and ordaneing all the saids factours which at the said staple, present and to cum. to mak thankfull and readic payment of to the said Conservatour and his Collectours in his name during his lyftyme of the lyk quantitie of dues of everie seck of goodis wherto they ar imployed factours, which they now pay for the vse of the minister and payment of his stipend by any maner of way whatsoever, With power to the sald Conservatour or his Creditours of the forsaids dues to depryve them of the office of factorie and all liberteis of that kingdome: And his Matte vnderstanding that Fleymings and other strangers doe for ther benefite repair to the said kingdome, and sayll from thence with coalls and other merchandice, as thogh they wer his subjects, who nevertheles refuis to mak payment to the sald Conservatour of the dewis of ther coalls and other merchandice and wares, pretending immunitie becaus they are strangers, althogh they not onlie enjoy all the same liberteis which his Mateus naturall subjects doe, bot lykwyse doe hinder his Mateis owin subjects much in ther trade: Therfor his Mate ordeanes the saids Flemings resideing in Scotland or tradeing to the Low Cuntreyis, and his Mateis subjects, and particularlie Cais Mais, sumetyme of Roterdame, and now of Burrowstouness, to mak good and thankfull payment to the present Conservatour or his Collectours of all such dues as ar payed or oght to be payed vnto him by his Mateis natives of the said kingdome, or oney of them, in all and everie respect whatsoever, and that for all tymes bypast and to cum, as these dewteis shall happin to accress at any tyme heirefter throughout the whole bounds of the saids sevintene provinces, and all parts therof, and that of all coalls and other sort of goods and waris whatsoever transported to the said bounds, or any part thairof, out of the said kingdome; With power to him to arreist and poynd and distraine for not payment of the saids dues, for all tymes bypast and to cum, when and whersoever he can apprehend the persones or goodis of the infringers of this present act within any of his Mateis dominions: And in caice the said Cais Mais refuis to mak thankfull payment to the said Conservatour or his Collectours of all bygane dues, and for the tyme to cum, we doe heirby declair the said Cais Mais nor no stranger whatsoever to mave no benefite or libertie within the said kingdome of Scotland, or without the same within the saidis 17 provinces, or oney of them, by reasone of any warrant, certificat, power, exemption, or writt whatsoever from his Mateis Admirall of the said kingdome, or any under or from him, or from any other officeris or persones whatsoever, ordancing the said Admirall to draw bak from the said Cais Mais any such warrand, certificat, or writt whatsoever which is alreadic govin, and that he give nane such to any stranger in tyme cuming, valess they obleidge themselffis by good sufficient bandis that they shall pay to the Conservatour and his Collectours readelie and trulie the fall dues of all coalls and others goods which they shall transport at any tyme out of the said kingdome, or any toun or haven within any of the saids 17 provinces of the Low Cuntrevis, And shall vndergoe such burdens and fulfill these dewteis which the natives of the said kingdome doe; Which Acts and Ordinances above specifiet his Matte ordeanes to be acted and registrat in the books of the privie Counsall of the said kingdome ad futuram rei memoriam, and the samyne being registrat, his Matte lykwyse ordenes his highnes' great signet to be appendit thervnto; for which these presents shalbe

sufficient warrand to all whom it may concerne.

Trustic, &c.—Wheras we ar informed that notwithstanding of your Acts, wherby the inhabitants of these brughes tradeing in the Low Countreyis ar ordeaned to pay to our trustic and weilbeloved servand the present conservatour the dewteis for his charge and intertenement, yit some of them have defrauded him thairof, to his great prejudice and dissabling of him in that charge, as we have appoynted him to procure the good and benefite of all our subjects of that kingdome tradeing in any of the sevintene provinces; so we hold it to be just and necessarie that, according to your acts, these dewes (which ar the

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meanes allotted him for his maintenance) be generallie and indifferentile vplifted by him of all goodis belonging to any of our saidis subjects arryveing within these 17 provinces, or any pairt thairof, the consideratioun whairof, and of the good and panefull services hitherto performed by him in that charge, wheref (as we ar informed) he did of late give an extraordinarie prooff by procuring a speedie redresse of a wrong done to some of your nighbours, hath justlie moved ws to recommend vnto yow in a speciall maner to sie a speedie course taken for paying such dewteis as ar resting vnpayed to him, and that they be punctuallie payed heirefter to him, as they shal happin to grow dew: And wheras he hath informed ws how willing yow ar to augment his dewes, in legard of the hie rates and pryces of all necessare in these tymes, respecting what formerlie they wer, we give yow hartie thanks for the same, and doe heirby speciallie recommend vnto yow, to sie him so weill and compleitlie provydit, as both may best befitt his his charge and your credit, and may be a meanes to him, and by his readie endeavours heirefter to testifie his further care and affection for advanceing your trade in these parts.—Whythall, 23 Feb 1635.

## TO THE SESSION.

Right, &c.—Wheras it hath bene humblic schawin vivo we that our trustic and weilbeloved David Murchead, merchand, of London, haveing about thrie yeires sinc: lent some moneyis to the late Erle of Home, he cannot be repayed thairof becaus of a letter from we prohibiteing the vplifting of any dewteis of that estate till the differences betweene the pairteis interested in the title of succession thervito wer determined, wherin our intention was onlie to seclude ather of these pairteis from medling with these rents, but did not therby meane to dissapoynt the trew creditours to seik what is justlie dew vinto them, least by want of their moneyis beyond the time condescended virtue to be prejudged, and possiblie, by the inhabilitie of the tennents or others interested for the tyme, they be put to vinceessar trouble and charge to recover the same by Law, which is newayes our royall meaning: Therfoir we have heirby thought fit to recommend vito yow that, in so far as can be agricable to equitie, yow prescrive a way wherby the said David may be speedelic repayed of the rents of the Lands resting in the tennents' handis, or which shall accress heirefter, till he be satisfied of what shalbs justlie dew vito him, that (being proved) the bandis may be withdrawin, and by yow reserved as discherges of that debt to the pairtie interested, to whom this course cannot be prejudiciall, bot rather in vantage, by being exonered from payment of vinceessarie interest heirefter, and consequentlie fred of so just a debt.—Whythall, 23 Feb\* 1635.

#### To THE SESSION.

Right, &c.—Wheras we ar informed that in ane action depending befor yow between William Seaton of Meldrum and George Chalmers of Balbithan, tuitching a trust reposed in the said William by the other of his lands of Balbithan in the tyme of his absence, yow had gevin out your decrie in favours of the said George tuitching the inheritance, and that the poynt now left disputable doeth onlie concerne the said William's accompts or disbursments for the other, and the rents of his Lands receaved, or which he might have receaved; wherin, sieing his cariage may prove such as in the preceiding case of trust which he did disclame, in hope to game the propertie of these landis to himselff, and that he new endeavoureth, as lykwayes we ar informed, to protract tyme by delayes, becaus of the others aige and occasion of some necessarie bussines in this our kingdome: We ar pleased, in consideratioun thairof, and of the interest that our trustic servant Doctour Chalmers, his brother-german, hath at this tyme acquired in that estate, who cannot convenientlie follow that action himselff, according to the vsuall course in the lyk cases, becaus of his attendance in our service heir, to recommend to yow that speedie justice be administred tuitching the clearing of these accompas and debursments, according to the course of our Lawes; And in all other

causes which may concerne our said servant his interest in the said Estate, and hurt done therento in absence of his said brother, in so far as is competent to your Judicatorie, that he be not diverted from attending his charge heir.—Whythall, 23 Febr 1635.

## TO THE BISCHOP OF EDINBURGH.

Reverend father in God, Vnderstanding the good abilite of Mr Johne McMath, minister at Symprene, hath to serve we and the Church, and that hitherto he hath lived conformable and conscionable in his charge: It is our pleasur that, sieing he may elsewher doe we and the Church better service than wher he presentlie serves, that when soever any good occasion shall offer wherby he may be preferred within your dyocie, to aney charge wherof we or yow ar patron, that he may be preferred and presented, not onlie for his better encouragement, but that others, sicing our and your care of such, they may be encouraged to keip and constant course in our church service; wherin expecting your obedience.—Whythall, vt supra.

## TO THE ARCHBISCHOP OF ST ANDROIS.

Right, &c.—Wheras out of our princelie respect of the good education to our Nobilitie of that our kingdome as ar of younger yeires, speciallie of these who ar our wardis, we have bene pleased at this tyme to have a care of the good and religious breiding of our right trustie and weilbeloved cousen the Erle of Buccleuch in letters and what else is fitt and necessarie for ane in his place and qualitie: To which purpois we have hoirby thoght fitt to recommend vnto yow that by the advyse of our right trustie and our right weilbeloved Cousen and Counsellour the Erle of Stirling (to whome we have granted the gift of his ward and mariage), and of aney two of such of his most speciall freinds and kinsmen as yow shall think fitt to mak choyse of, yow sie a course taken with him and setled accordinglie, which we will tak as acceptable service done vnto ws.—Whythall, 27 Febr 1635.

#### TO THE EXCHEQUER.

Right, &c.—Haveing heard that yow have stopped the passing of that gift which we wer latelie pleased to grant vnto our right trustie and weilbeloved Sir Anthonie Alexander, knyt, Mr of our Works, of our kingdome of Scotland, by reasone of some objections made by Sir Wm Sinclar of Roslin, knyt, pretending ane heretable Charge over the maissones of our said kingdome: Though we have never gevin warrant for strenthning of aney heretable right, yit we intend not to wrong aney man who is sufficientlie secured therin, bot to recover it by dew course of Law: Therfoir it is our pleasur that yow caus the said Sir Wm Sinclar mak it appear anto yow and to our Advocat what right and title he hath wherby the passing of the said signature should be stayed, and if yow find that ther be just caus in his part why the said signature should be stayed, and that it conteyne any new clause more to his prejudice than other Masteris of Works formerlie had, we desyre that our Advocat may certifie we of the trew estate therof,

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and if ther be no just caus of stay, sieing we will that the present Mr of Work have as much priviledge as aney of his predicessours in that place have ever had, it is our pleasur that immediatlic yow cause pass the same throw our sealls, and we will lykwayes for the better clearing of the said bussines that yow examyne the massones of that our kingdome, and that not by paperis whervnto ather of the pairteis may have procured ther handis in a privat way, but that yow give ordour to the magistrats of everie toun, and to the scherreffis of everie schyre, or to aney other officers whom yow shall think fitt, that so they, haveing called befor them and heard the saids massones, may report vnto yow what they shall find in the same.—Whythall, 27 Febr 1635.

### TO THE CHANCELLOUR.

Right reverend, &c.—We expected befor this tymo the Lord Balmerino should have submitted himselff to our mercie in a satisfactoric maner by some publict expression, or that otherwayes with all diligence he should have bene present to his tryell, as we had signifised our pleasur to the Erle of Traquair, who we doubt not did communicat the same with yow and such others as we wryt vnto, that yow might have joyned your endeavours for the advoncement of that service, and though it had some stay by prorogating the day in regard of the absence of the Cheiff Justice, who could hardlie repair thither becaus of the stormic weather, it is our pleasur, that advyseing with the said Erle of Traquair, to whome we formerlie imparted our pleasur therin, and such others as ar entrusted from we by Commission from that bussines, that in caice he did not submitt yow proceid with all diligence to his tryell according to the course of Justice, and that yow certifie we bak as soone as possiblie yow can what is done or resolved to be done heirin.—Whythall, 2 March 1635.

#### TO THE EXCHEQUER.

Right, &c.—Haveing bene pleased vpon good considerations to signe a gift of the escheit and lyfrent of George Buchanan of that ilk to Robert Drummond of Medhope, Our pleasur is, that with diligence yow pas it, suffering no former gift therof (if aney be alreadie granted by yow) to tak place, and if aney declaratour be gevin thervpon, we requyre that the said Robert be secured in such legall maner as he can devyse of the benefite of the bakband gevin to our Thesaurer, becaus that as heirby we intend not to defraud aney creditour of what he hath disbursed, or of what at first he was engadged for the said George, without amassing of other men's moneyis adebtit to them, and to the which they have taken assignations, so that our royall meaneing is that his estate should not be takin from him without verie just and equitable consideratiouns flowing from the Creditours ther owin simple disbursments: To which purpois it is our further pleasur that (if neid be) yow signific our will heirin to the Lords of Session for preventing what may be done to the contrarie, and to proceid in justice for granting a declaratour vpon that our request, stopping all others of this kynd; for which these presents shalbe vnto yow and them a sufficient warrant.

#### TO THE LORD KINTYRE.

. Wheras we ar fullic resolved vpon speciall considerations knowen vnto we that the bargane tuitching the Lord of Dunluce his purches from yow of the Lands of Kintyre shall ceise, haveing to that purpois gevin ordour to the Erle of Stirling, our Secretarie, to sie a renunciatioun signed by him for relinquisching his interest therin, Least such bandis or moneyis as hath bene gevin to yow by his father the Erle of Antrim or himselff be a hinderance to this purpois, it is our pleasur, and we doe heirby will and requyre yow furthwith, to pay and delyver bak vato the said Lord Dunluce all such moneyis and bandis as yow have receaved tuitching that bargane.—Whythall, 3 March 1635.

The gift of the escheit and lyfrent of George Buchanan of that ilk was granted by his Ma<sup>tie</sup> to Ro<sup>t</sup> Drummond of Medhopo, which did fall and was at his Ma<sup>teis</sup> dispositioun by vertew of the said George his being putt to the horne and declared rebell at the instance of Agnes Berclay, relict of vmquhill M<sup>r</sup> James Haig: Stilo ordinario.—Whythall, 4 March 1635.

## To the Erle of Arrell, Cheiff Justice.

Right, &c.—Being adverteised of the delay of the tyme appoynted for Balmerinois tryell in Februar last by reasone of the extraordinarie tempest of weather, and that the same is prorogat to the ellevint of March instant, we have thoght fire heirby to requyre yow to caus the said tyme be kept, and to remitt the bussines to the tryell of ane assyse, for as we desyre nothing bot right to be done, so we will not have tyme lost by the discourse and disput of Advocatts: Therfor, as at the first yow did well to give them tyme areach for oppugneing the relevancie of the lybell, yow will advert now when the interlocutour is pronunced to have no more dayes apent into that in that sort, bet that yow cause the Jurie to be sworne and to give out ther verdict, which, whatsoever it be, yow shall immediatlie adverteise ws of, and haveing pronunced the sentence in caice he be convicted, yow shall continew the executioun therof till our pleasur be knowen; and otherwyse, if he be absolved, yow shall remitt him bak to his prissone till yow have signified the same vnto we and hear from we bak agane: In all this we expect your carefulnes according to the trust we have in yow.—Whythall, 5 March 1635.

#### TO THE CHANCELLOUR

Right, &c.—Haveing bene pleased of late to signific our pleasur vnto our right, &c. the Erle of Erroll, our Justice Generall deputed by we for the tyme, that the Lord Balmerino should be put to the tryell of ane assyse, according as it is mentionat in our letter to that purpois, and haveing fullic resolved, in caice of the absence of our said Justice Generall by seiknesse, indisposition of bodie, or otherwayes, that the tryell of that bussines shall not be further delayed, we ar heirby pleased to requyre yow to caus our Justice deputeis and the assessours appointed by we to goe on in that tryell with all diligence, and to that effect that yow signific vnto them that such is our pleasur, and for which these presents shalbe to them a sufficient warrant.—Whythall, 10 March 1635.

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#### TO THE LORD DEPUTIE OF IRLAND.

Right, &c.—Wheras we ar informed that the late primate of Ardmach had the fynes of recusants of that realme by letters patents of our late dear father, which wer broght bak for our vas, wherin the bearer Johne Butler, Esquyre, had takin great panes by improveing that casualtie, and wheras our late father had (for the better prosecution of that bussines) givin ordour for granting commissions to him to collect these fynes for our yse, with power to nominat a receaver and auditour, according to articles condescended ynon between our said royall father and him latelie befor his death; To which purpois the said Johne Butler hath now made humble sute vnto we to have our letters patentes for 31 yeires of the moytie or halff part of these fynes that shall accrew over and above the 20,000lib alredie payed to ws, with all commissions and writts requisit for collecting therof, though his panes therin by improveing our revenews doe appear by these articles and other circumstances; vit being loath to proceed in such a purpois without dew advese, we have heirby thought fitt to remitt the consideratioun of the bussines vnto yow, that if yow find it to be beneficiall to we, and that the prosecution theref will tend to the good of our service mentionat in these articles, or to other writts tuitching that purpois, yow grant vnto him letters patents for 31 veires of the moytie or halff part of all these fynes which shall accrue over and above the 20,000lib, with all commissions and warrants necessarie to him and his assigneyis, togidder [with] the nameing of a receaver and auditour; for which these presents shalbe vnto yow a sufficient warrant.-Whythall, 10 March 1635.

## TO THE EXCHEQUER.

Right, &c.—Haveing bene pleased to signe vnto yow a commission for hearing of the accompts of the taxations, ordinarie and extraordinarie, the accompt whairof hath not bene as yit gevin vp vnto ws by our late Chancellour, Collectour of the same, and of our Treasurie, Collectorie, and treasurie of our new augmentations befor the entrie of our new treasureris, as by the said Commission yow will perceave, it is our pleasur that yow accept of the said Commission, and proceid carefullie therin according to the trust we have committed vnto yow; and efter yow have finisched the said accompts, yow adverteise ws what yow have done therin.—Whythall, 12 March 1635.

## TO SIR LAUCHLANE MCCLEANE.

Trustie, &c.—Wheras we wer informed that of late yow and your vmquhill brother Hectour McCleane did without ordour or any right violentlie intrude yourselff in the possession of the Yle of Icolmekill, which belongeth to the Bischop of the Yles for the tyme, whairof they have bene in peaciable possession these many yeres bypast, and that yow still doe deteyne the same from the present bischop therof; We holding such a violent and indirect a course as a contempt done vnto the Church, and consequentlie vnto ws, and withall taking to our princelis consideratioun the detriment therby arrysing to the patrimonic of that bishoprik, wherof we doe rather desyre the incress than anywayes to sie it impaired, It is our pleasur, and we doe will and command, that furthwith yow restore vnto the said bischope the absolute possession of the said Yland without further hearing or delay.—Whythall, 14 March 1635.

## TO THE SESSION.

Right reverend father in God, and trustie and weilbeloved—Wheras we ar crediblie informed that, vpon letter in favours of the late Bischop of Yles, now of Rapho, the taksmen of the tyth-ficshes of the Yles

did dimitt ther taks in his favouris, the right and possession whairof he suffered to be assigned to a laick persone, who now enjoyis the same, it being the cheifest benefice of that bischoprik; whervnto, sieing it was, and still is, our royall intention that these tythes should be inseperablic conjoyned, we doe seriouslie recommend to yow that, haveing takin into your consideration the loss the present bischop of the Yles hath suffered by the want thairof, and the other's benefite by his bypast possession, yow sie the said reverend father in God receave the lyk benefit and favour his saidis predicessours had in the lyk kynd, and that yow administer spedie justice in all other causses concerneing him, whensever they shall cum befor yow; Which we are rather pleased the more carefullie to recommend to yow becaus of the remotnes of his See off that our seat of Justice, the meannesse of his benefice, and greatnes of his charge, To which purpois it did pleas our royall father and ourselff so often to wryt vnto yow and others Judicatore is in that our kingdome.—Whythall, 14 March 1635.

Reverend father in God—We ar informed that Andro, late bischop of Rapho, at his transportatioun from the bischoprik of Yles, did, without just caus or aney warrant from our late royall father or ws, carie with him tuo of the principall bells that wer in Icolmekill, and place them in some of the Churches of Rapho, To which purpois we doe remember that at the tyme, your being bischop of Yles, yow wer a sutter to ws for effectuating that thing at your predicessour the bischop of Raphoes hands which we now requyre of yow: Therfor, and in regard we have gevin ordour to the present bischop of Yles for repairing the Cathedrall Church of that bischoprik, and that it is fitt that such things as doe properlie belong thervnto be restored, it is our pleasur that yow caus delyver vuto the said bischop those tuo bells for the vse of the said Cathedrall Church with such tymlic conveniencie as may be, which we will acknowledge as acceptable service done vnto ws.—Whythall, 14 March 1635.

#### TO THE ERLE OF TRAQUAIR.

Right, &c.—Haveing by our warrant required Nicolas Briott, our servand, to buy and prepair within this our kingdome a certane proportion of copper plate for the fabrication of copper money within that our kingdome, condescended vpon as necessarie to be coyned ther, for which impost, custome, and all other dewteis wer payed heir, and that, being transplanted thither, it is stopt, as we ar informed, for further custome and impost, which is contrarie to reasone, it being for our and the cuntreis service, and not merchinable commoditie: Therfoir it is our pleasur that yow furthwith command our Customeris, and others interested, that they mak no further stop of that commoditie, to be disposed of for the vsc forsaid, nor tak aney impost or custome for the same, or for aney other necessarie provision for the said fabrication, ather inward or outward, not exceeding the quantitie ordeaned by ws for the said coyne, causeing them mak restitution to our said servant of all such money is taken by them for custome of the said plaite since November last; ffor which, &c.—Whythall, 14 March 1635.

#### TO THE COUNSELL

Reverend father in God, and trustie and weilbeloved, &c.—Wheras we ar informed that Patrik Maull, indueller in S<sup>5</sup> Androis, being of late mutilat and dangerouslie wounded to the great hazard of his lyff by Patrik Lyndsay of Wolmerstoun, his tuo sones and sone-in-law, that cautioun and assurance is not taken as yit of them for being lyable to Justice that is requisit in such caces, we have taken speciall notice of the foulnes of the fact; and being willing that the doers be exemplarlie punisched in so far as

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vpon Yles lawfullie can be done, it is our pleasur that yow tak sufficient cautioun and assurance of them, as justice be nather prevented or delayed for aney respect whatsoever, in so far as can be agricable to our lawes.—Whythall, 16 March 1635.

## TO THE EXCHEQUER.

Right, &c.—Wheras the reverend father in God the bischope of Yles is by our direction to repair the Cathedrall Church of Icolmkill, the doeing whairof in such maner as is requisite will requyre (as we ar crediblic informed) great panes and charges, which he cannot possiblic vadergoe without our assistance and help: Therfoir, and in regard it is a work which we affect, we have thoght fitt to allow vato him and his assigncy is the sowme of four hundreth pundis sterling, for the more readic payment whairof we doe heirby requyre and authorize yow to assigne him and them to all the few-dewteis payable vato we by Sir Lauchlane McCleane, till the said sowme be completilic payed, the first termes payment whairof to be at Mortimes nixt 1635; and, in the meane tyme, that yow be carefull he goe on with the said reparation, authorizeing him with full power to requyre service of all such persones in these parts as doe ow the same vato ws, and that for caryeing and transporting of commodities vato that work; ffor desing of all which these presents shalbe vato yow and everie ane of yow a sufficient warrant.—Whythall, 24 March 1635.

#### TO THE LORD LORNE.

Right, &c.—These ar to recommend vnto yow to send vnto ws by the bearer ane of the Mangrell haulkes that ar in some of the bound wherin yow have interest, tuitching which purpois we did formerlie wryt vnto [yow], and that with as much convenient diligence as may be; and that yow he carefull according to our former pleasur to sie the syre of these haulks carefullie preserved, wherin yow shall doe we acceptable pleasur.

Trustie, &c.—Haveing caused renew our Commission for the Midleschyres vader the great seall of this our kingdome, and haveing added of new to the number of our Commissioners too of our subjects heir verie vsefull for the good of that our service, authorizeing them to give notice to the nearest of our Scotts Commissioners of the occasion of holding of goale delivereis, and in caice of the absence to sic of themselffis, and execute justice according to the Commission, as by the duplicat which we have sent by our servant Sir Ritchart Grhame, kny\* and baronet, yow will perceave, Our pleasur is, that yow draw vp a Commission of new agricable to the lawis and custome of that kingdome, to be exped vader our great scall with diligence, inserting the lyk clause of equall power to our Commissioners ther, as it is in the Commission for this our kingdome, and that yow ad to the number of the Commissioneris Johne, Lord.

Herreis, appoynting in the quorum William, Marqueis of Dowglas, Robert, Erle of Nithisdale, William, Erle of Queinsberrie, Johne, Erle of Traquair, and the said Lord Herreis; For doeing whairof, &c.—Grenewich, 18 Junij 1635.

Right, &c.—Haveing for the furtherance of our service in the Midleschyres gevin ordour to our Advocat to renew the Commission thairof, it is our pleasur that yow caus expeid it vnder our great seall with diligence, and haveing thervpon convened the Commissioners for that our kingdome togidder, that yow publisch our Commission and duplicat of that which is exped heir, which we have heirwith sent vnto yow, wherby yow will perceave the equall power yow have in these parts of this our kingdome, as the English have ther for executeing of Justice according to the Commission: And it is our further pleasur that yow appoynt certain tymes thryse a yeir for meitting with our English Commissioners, wherby they may confer and setle such things as will conduce to the good of our service and preservation of our peace ther; wherin not doubting of your care and diligence, &c.—Grenewich, 18 Junij 1635.

## TO THE ERLE OF TRAQUAIR.

Right, &c.—Wheras we ar informed that diverse grantis and signatures doe pass our register and sealls without the warrant and ordour which in such cases is requisit for the good of our service: It is our pleasur that no letter or signature whatsoever, though signed by our selffes, be exped thrugh our registers or sealls till first it be presented to our judicatore or officers to whois charge it doeth properlie belong, to the effect the nature thairof may be cleirlie knowen, and therefore or ordour gevin by them for passing or staying thairof; and that yow signific this our pleasur to all the keipers of our sealls and registers to whom these presents shalbe ane sufficient warrant: We bid, &c.—Grenwich, 24 of Junij 1635.

# To the Erle of Traquair.

Right, &c.—Wheras we understand by letter from yow to the Erle of Mor'on that yow have made stay of a signature of the Abbacie of Lundoris for Mr Andro Lermouth, wherin we approve your proceiding, and wills yow that nothing pass in Exchequer concerning that purpois, unless we shall pleased to signific our further pleasur therin, and in the meane tyme that yow call for the signature and keip it in your custodie; ffor which these presents shall your warrant: We bid yow farewell.—[its][w][a], 24 Junij 1635.

### To THE COUNSELL.

Right, &c.—We wer fermerlie pleased to give order that ther might be some speedie course takin for the reformation of the abuses of the gold and silver coyne within that our kingdome; And now being informed that ther ar lykwyse diverse complaints made aneut the copper coyne, we have therfoir the rather ordeaned our servant Nicolas Briot, whois judgment in that kynd is approved vnto ws, to hasten his repair thilther with all possible diligence: And it is our pleasur that at his comeing thither, haveing called him befoir yow, and heard him for our interest, with such others as ar interested in it from ws, togidder with these that ar the compleiners of the abuses of the same, that then yow acquant ws with ther reasones and answer on both sydis, that therefter we may give such ordour concerning the same as we shall find expedient; And that in the meane tyme the coynage of the said copper coyne may goe on, and that with all possible

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diligence yow proceid in the tryell of the abuses past concerning the gold and silver coynes, and of the cheiff occasions of the said abuses, togidder with the hest meanes of keiping gold and silver from being transported out of the cuntrie, and how they may be best drawin into the cuntrie, that vpon your report thairof we may give such ordour as the present evill may be redressed, and the lyk prevented in tyme coming; ffor doeing whairof these shalbe vnto yow sufficient warrant.—From our Court at Grenwich, the 24 of Junij 1635.

# TO THE COMMISSIONERIS FOR SURRENDERIS.

Right, &c.—Being informed that our trustie and weilbeloved cousen the Viscount of Kenmure hath some Lands vnvalued which ar desyred to be valued, and considering that he is as yit ane Infant, we are the rather gratiouslie pleased to recommend to your care that whiche may concerne him; And therfoir it is our pleasur that, with such speed as may be, there he a course taken for valueing the saidis Landis according to the course vsed in the lyk caces; ffor which these, &c.—Grenwich, 24 of Junij 1635.

## TO THE CHANCELLOUR.

Right reverend, &c.—Haveing bene humblie petitioned in behalff of the late Wyff of David Drummond, deceissed some tyme, and of our late royall father's gentlman pensioners, that haveing acquyred some meanes in his service heir, and haveing at his death appoynted (according to the lawis and custome of this kingdome, wher he died) and Archibald Drummond and of his executours, to distribute the same to his wyff and children, he will tak no course to performe what was entrusted vnto him, but remanest there in Scotland, where the Lawis heir can tak no hold of him; It is our pleasur that yow consider of the enclosed petition, and if yow find just evidences for what is affirmed, that in our name yow command the said Archibald ather to give satisfaction with convenient diligence to the pairtic entrusted according to the Lawes heir, otherwayes that he furthwith repair hither to answer vnto the same.—Dat, yt supra.

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
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



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
