

History of the Fund's Inception

One stormy night in the cold winter months of 1909. what was once a fine specimen of a man, was discovered lying in a comatose condition, in a doorway on St. George's Street, Montreal, by the Police and taken to a local Hospital for examination. A cursory observation diagnosed the case as "only a drunk!" and the stalwart representatives of the Law were about to drag him off to the waiting Patrol Waggon, when the skilled eye of an "M.D." who appreciated something of "man's inhumanity to man," made a second and careful examination and found it was a genuine case of cold, misery, and starvation. Two days subsequently (though he never regained consciousness) death ended some poor Mother's son's misery in this world, whose identification was established by an Army Discharge Parchment. proving that whatever his human failures were, he had at least served his country faithfully and well as a member of the 2nd Dragoon Guards in the British Army.

Efforts were made to find some local Military Organization that had the power and means to act as legal "next of kin" to give this unfortunate "Derelict" Christian hurial and avoid abandonment to the Inspector of Anatomy.

No such organization existed except for those who had made provision for the "rainy day" hy memhership prior to death, and, consequently, the dissecting table was the only alternative. Surely an ignohle end for one who had offered his life in the Empire's Cause!

The local Press gave publicity to the case and called attention to the parsimonlousness of the Government in its failure to provide "six feet of the ground, such men had risked their lives for" when left womout a place to lay their bones.

National sentiment and "Comraderie" aroused indignation in the breasts of some who had shared the "ups and downs" of the Soidier's career and an effort to establish a means of preventing the recurrence of such a case, was the result. The support and eordial co-operation of other local Military and Patriotic Associations was sought and obtained, and on April 19th, 1909, the maugural Meeting was held under Vice-Regal Patronage with a view to obtaining Incorporation, the drafting of a Constitution and By-Laws, and the petitioning of the Provincial Legislature for special powers under the "Anatomy Act" to legally act as "next of kin" to any deceased Soldier or Sailor who might die in destitute circumstances within the Province of Quebec, and require burial.

While confining itself to its primary object (Obitual) this Organization's titnisr incorporation papers were drafted in such a way as to permit of dealing with other "Cortingencies" should it be found necessary and advisable. Furthermore, provision is made for dealing with members of both the Army and Navy, and the organization is absolutely undenominational in religious character.

The source of revenue for maintenance is obtained principally from voluntary considution. Recently an annual and life membership has been established, which the Executive is anxious to increase as a somewhat certain source of revenue. Membership is open to both sexes, and application forms may he had from the Secretary-Treasur

Fifth Annual Report

To the Trustees and Members,

Last Post Imperial Naval and Military Contingency Fund.

Ladies and Gentlemen,—During the year just ended, 1913, the fifth of our existence as an Association, nothing that might be termed extraordinary to the routine work of this Fund has occurred.

Possibly, the matter of most importance to the future of the Association is the action you may feel disposed to take in regard to the "Contingency object" or extension work—its latitude and method of application in the future if continued, or the advisability of its expurgency from our Letters of Incorporation.

May I suggest, that any action on our part that would tend to make the "Contingency" object of this Fund "hidebound" would be exceedingly detrimental to our future

I feel quite justified in saying that, the work of this Fund during the past five years has told on the Public appreciation, and we have favorably impressed the local Military men, in spite of a certain air of apathy at the outset.

This favorable impression was demonstrated recently by the generous subscription of \$300.00 from the Officers Commanding Units in the Craig Street Drill Hall—being part of the rental obtained by them from the promoters of the Automobile Show. The 5th Royal Highlanders, the Victoria Rifles, and the 85th Regiment, have also generously contributed during the year.

The Annual Membership, with a fee of \$1.00 a year, established at our last Annual Meeting, has not been worked up at all yet, but will eventually prove a source of revenue and "new blood," if the existing members will do a little soliciting and incidently bear in mind in canvassing new members that individuality should take precedence over numbers.

It affords me much pleasure to advise you that during the year, we have added eight worthy members to our roll; though I see no reason, why with very little effort, we should not add as many hundreds. I regret to advise you that the "Card scheme" organized to raise the necessary sum to purchase the option we have on ground in the respective Cemeteries, has not met to date with the success that we anticipated, though the returns obtained, indicate that the failure may he due to weak organization, rather than to public apathy towards the Cause.

It was felt this year it would he in the Fund's best interest, to have the Accounts Audited (extending over the full period of the Fund's existence) hy a Chartered Accountant, and a printed copy of the Annual Reports and Financial Statement sent to all who have subscribed or

have hecome in any way interested in our work.

I am advised that the restitutional work resulting from our representations at Ottawa, subsequent to the desecration of the old Military Cemetery on Papineau Avenue, will he completed in the early Spring, and in that connection I might mention that there still remains a matter worthy of attention—I refer to the inscription plates that have been broken, or have fallen away, from the Monument to General D'Urhan.

In view of our success in the past regarding this old landmark, I would respectfully suggest that this Association take some further action to hring this historical spot more before the public gaze in the future, and to this end an effort be made to hold a restitutional ceremony on the completion of the work now under way, in which all local Military and Patriotic Associations he invited to take part.

In concluding this fifth Annual Report of our work, I desire to take this opportunity of tendering my sincere thanks for the confidence all connected with the Fund have

shown in me as your Secretary-Treasurer.

It has been a work of great pleasure to me, and I have been encouraged in my efforts by the faithful attendance at our meetings of gentlemen whose time is too valuable, and residence too far distant to attend, were they not convinced that we are doing a work worthy of some personal sacrifice and effort on their part.

RECORDING SECRETARY'S REPORT

To the Trustees and Members,
The "Last Post" Imperial Naval and Military Contingency Fund.

Ladies and Gentlemen,—I heg to submit herewith a record of the cases dealt with during the period of this Association's existence as follows:—

There have been 37 cases, in all, to the 31st of March, 1914, of which 36 were Soldiers and one Sailor. Dealt with hy years, they were as follows:—

Five were Canadian horn, British subjects, and thirtyone British horn. Sixteen were huried by special request
in our Plots. Three were huried, under the supervision of
this Fund, in family graves. Owing to the circumstances
of death, one necessitated burial in unconsecrated ground,
hut registration of the number and position of the grave
has been made.

The Funeral expenses have been partly or wholly defrayed hy friends or relatives in 16 cases, and the balance of 21 have been wholly defrayed hy this Fund. One man remains totally unidentified, as far as relatives are concerned. Those buried in our Plots have seen service in the following Campaigns:—

South Africa (1900-1-2). Crimea (1854-5). New Zealand (1867-71). Egypt (both Campaigns) (1882-3-1898). Fenian Rald—Canada (1867-1870). Afghanistan (1878-80). Indian Frontier (1885-90). Burmah (1885).

By virtue of power granted this Association in the Anatomy Act (Revised Statutes, Article 4884) of the Province of Quebec, we were enabled to intervene on hehalf of Relatives in one case where, owing to poverty, they were compelled to abandon the Body to the Inspector o Anatomy.

In two cases where Widows and Orpnans were left destitute, this Association was the means of obtaining relief for
them from other Associations, and action is now being taken
by your Executive, with the possibility of success, to obtain
a "Compassionate Grant" for a third from the the War
Office. Special note of the foregoing cases is made in view
of the fact that they were legitimate and deserving ones,
which but for the persistent effort and pressure that this
Association was able to bring to bear on the highest Canadian Authorities and the War Office, would have gone unheeded. Those who have benefited have expressed their
gratitude in the highest terms, and many letters of gratitude (and in some cases, donations) from relatives and
friends in distant lands have been received, which could not
fail to excite the pathos of the hardest Materialist.

During the past year, cement foundations have been put under the Guns on the Cemetery Plots placed there at our request by the Militia Authorities, in 1912, and the Ordnance has been painted.

Owing to lack of means, we have not yet been able to erect the proposed Monuments on the respective Plots.
