"We had been told that our people

chief pastor of all that people. I could
not think of the Ruthenians accepting the evangelical faith, for they are
highly artistic in their tastes and glory
in elaborate ritual. They have always
been catholic and ritualistic, and I
would not even comprehend how they, PREMIER IS TOO BUSY would not even comprehend how they, deprived of their own priests, could desert the faith which alone could make them good citizens.

Prayed for the Pope. "I did not understand either this sort Protestantism. I find their mission ocieties paying anybody that can peak their language to celebrate a ogus mass, hear confessions, adminter the sacraments and, strangest of openly and publicly, so that the all, openly and publicly, so that the deception might be more complete, pray fervently for our holy father the Pope. It is a great shame. Good, honest Protestants are more consistent than to do it. It may destroy religion in our people where they have not their own priests and rite, but it will make them unbelievers in the end and the property of the control of the c

"Canada should not permit this. We want our people to be good citizens, good Christians and good Canadians, and therefore they should not be proselytized. Why, I know of a case where a Ruesian Jew was paid by Presbyterian missions to go thru the terrible mockery of a mass in order to defude the people.

"Noticing what Dr. Maclaren says, that they did not say the entire mass, but only a portion of it, I say that is altogether improbable, because the people would have immediately detected the deficiency and refused to have anything to do with it. Indeed, I know of a case in which a slight ceremony was omitted and immediately the people detected the fraud, and sent the pseudo-priest about his business. 

## MAY EXTEND QUEEN ST. TO HIGH PARK ENTRANCE

Works Committee Will Look Over Sunnyside Situation-Bloor Viaduct Misunderstanding Cleared.

Should the city be content with a ridge over the Grand Trunk tracks Sunnyside, or adopt the plan, which City Engineer Rust says will be much more costly, of extending Queen-street

more costly, of extending Queen-street from its present terminus at Sunny-side westerly to High Park gates, north of the G.T.R. tracks?

This was the question before the civic works committee vesterday, and it was recognized as of sufficient importance tojustify an inspection before rushing into action. Hence, the members will meet at Sunnyside at 3.30 p.m. Monday. # GUELPH HAS A NEW PLAN

Will Fit Up Disused Factory Building to Nurse Along Industries That Promise Well.

GUELPH, Nov. 25 .- (Special.) -Sick and tired with the unsuccessful experiences with big bonus hunting industries, that speak of locating here, but fail to do so unless bonussed to an unreasonable degree, the City of Guelph is taking a new course. A nursery for incustries, a sort of incubator for the hatching of factories, is to be established, where promising manufacturers can start in a way, and be assisted in their efforts to stand and establish big factories that will ultimately mean the employ-

ment of many hands and the building up of the city industrially.

The idea originated with Chairman Sam Carter of the Light and heat commission, who stated to the Board of the Commission of the Light and heat commission. Trade at a special meeting to-day that the commission were contemplating having an old burned-out furniture factory, that belongs to the commission, reofed over and put into first-class condition. They will rent flats, or manufacturing apartments, to promising the small manufacturing con cerns, giving them room and power at actual cost. They will only make sure that the people they help are realiy ambitious to establish larger industries when they can The commission might spend about \$6000 fitting up the build-

ing and putting in motors for the ten-The main scheme for which the special meeting of the board was called. lowever, was the establishment of a co-operative furniture factory in a vacant building which the city has had on its hands as the result of a failure of the Morlock Co. The scheme met with approval. The co-operative company is to be organized and the ne essary \$10,000 capital raised by stock subscription right away. The city is giving them the building and machinn it almost free of rent, or at

least at a nominal figure.





In a report to the board of control yesterday, Dr. Hastings, medical health officer, approved the submitting of a bylaw to provide \$200,000 for a grant to the Toronto Free Hospital for Consumptives and the King Edward Sanitarium at Weston, on condition that an arrangement be made with the trustees of the board to take in incipient cases, provide facilities for scientific treatment and also provide a farm

The medical health officer says that The medical health officer says that while the National Sanitarium Association has been doing good work, certain changes should be made in the present system. The Muskoka Cottage Sanitarium and King Edward Sanitarium are both "pay" institutions, and he thinks they hould be under separate management from the free institutions. He also suggests that Toronto Consumptive Hospital should be enlarged and should include a department for incipient cases from Toronto. He fayored establishing a dispensary within at least half a mile of pensary within at least half a mile of the city hall so that the hospitals could teach students the principles of the treatment of the disease.





Expressed Opinion That Situation is Not Serious -- Frontier Reports Exaggerated.

PARIS, Nov. 25 .- General Bernardo Reyes, the Mexican soldier, who came to Paris some time ago on a mulitary mission for the Mexican Government, denied to-day the report that he intends to return to Mexico to take a hand in the revolution. To a representative of the Associated Press, Gen. Reyes expressed the opinion that President Diaz, who he described as a great patriot, would succeed in restoring order, and afterwards adopt effective measures for allaying the present popular discontent in Mexico. General Reyes declined to go into details regarding the causes which id up to the present condition of affairs in his country, but expressed the belief that the unrest could not be considered as serious, and would not last long.



Tobacco Growing on Large Scale Planned for Emerald Isle.

Tobacco Growing on Large Scale

Planned for Emerald Isle.

It may not be so long before the "Irish perfecto" will be as familiar as the "clear Havana." Tobacco-growing is being developed with some rapidity in Ireland. It is about twenty years since Col. Nugent Talbot Everard commenced experimenting in growings tobacco on his estate at Randlestown, County Meath. Others have imitated him, and the result is that now, in addition to his twenty-five acres, there is Lord Barrymore with ten acres, Lord Dunraven with twenty-five acres, Capt. Otway Cuffe with seven acres, and many others with small plots. The total area under cultivation in Ireland is 120 acres, comprising 79 acres of pipe tobacco. 28 acres of cigaret and 13 acres of cigar tobacco. In Dublin a company employs sixty workmen and turns out pipe tobacco and cigares and igarets all made from the home-grown product. Tobacco was grown extensively at one time in the Emerald Isle for commercial purposes, but the iron heels of successive English rulers effectually stamped out the industry. It was with a view of increasing opportunities for the peasantry that. Col. Everard took up his experiments. After combating many obstacles, and six years ago the government came to his assistance, the industry now being to his assistance.
