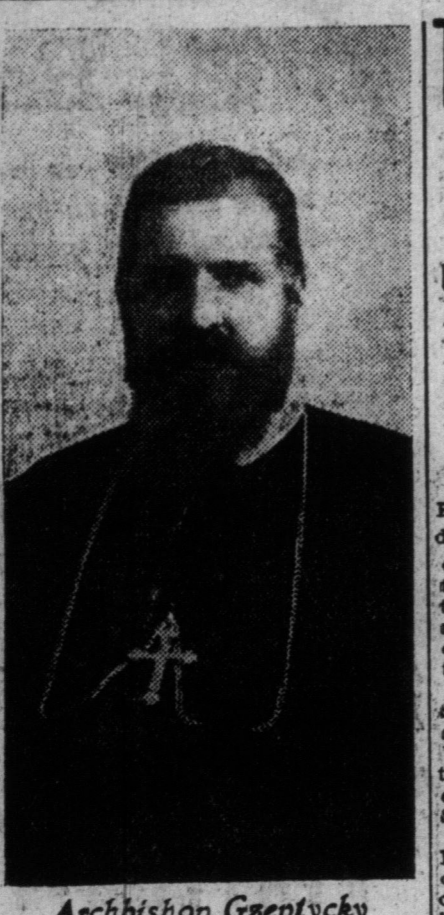

PREMIER IS TOO BUSY TO AFFORD VITAL HOUR

That's Why Manitoba Boundary Matter is Still Unsettled, Tho Roblin Has Called Twice.

OTTAWA, Nov. 25.—(Special.)—Premier Roblin of Manitoba returned to Ottawa to-day from New York, and left again in the evening for Pressport to meet his wife. He leaves for Winnipeg to-morrow. During a portion of the afternoon he occupied a seat on the floor of the house of commons.

TO CELEBRATE PEACE CENTURY

Unlimited Arbitration Treaty Suggested, Also Abolition of Custom Houses.

BOSTON, Nov. 25.—The American Peace Society gave to the press to-day a collection of suggestions received by it from publicists and educators in Great Britain and Canada and the United States in regard to the methods of celebrating the anniversary of the hundred years of peace since the war of 1815.

Lord Courtney of Benwith, president of the International Peace Congress at London, 1908, addresses that the historic agreement for disarmament on the lakes be followed by the removal of customs houses along the American-Canadian border to reduce the cost of living, and to away with the last pretext for guardships and causes for international conflict.

George N. Morang, publisher of Toronto, advises Canadians and Americans to study each other's history and institutions as a means of promoting a better understanding among themselves.

Prof. J. C. Carter, of the University of Chicago, suggests the publication of a centennial edition of Canadian authors and the selection by the heads of leading Canadian universities of orators for the celebration.

E. L. Borden, M.P., leader of the Conservative party in Canada, favors setting apart a day of thanksgiving with the ringing of bells and the observance of the Dominion and the Republic. Mr. Borden also believes in erecting a permanent memorial in each country.

REGRETS FROM HON. SPEAKER

Who Tells Why Methodist Ministers Weren't Allowed to Keep Gallery Seats.

OTTAWA, Nov. 25.—(Special.)—Before the house resumed the debate on the address to-day, Col. Sam Hughes (Victoria and Haliburton), arose to call the Speaker's attention to the treatment accorded Rev. Geo. Jackson and Rev. Dr. Henderson, who were expelled from the speaker's gallery on Thursday, as exclusively announced in The World to-day.

Col. Hughes explained that these gentlemen had come to hear Sir Wilfrid speak, and he had secured for them cards of admission to the gallery. They had scarcely taken their seats in the front row, when they were brusquely ordered out, and told to take a back seat. This discourtesy was sincerely to be regretted, as on two subsequent occasions he had noticed clerical men of other denominations occupying seats from which these gentlemen had been ejected.

Mr. Speaker here interrupted by saying: "I cannot allow the hon. member to discuss the conduct of the Speaker except in accordance with the rules laid down by parliamentary authorities."

After Col. Hughes had concluded, Speaker Macdonell said that, while not required to answer the question, he would do so in courtesy to the house. He explained that the first row in the gallery was reserved for the executive and party, the wives of the cabinet ministers, and of the speaker and wife of leader of opposition. As to members of other denominations occupying the same seats without invitation, the speaker said that he had, on the request of a member, granted permission to Bishop Guard of St. Mary's, Northwest Territories, to occupy the front seat in order to follow the proceedings more closely, but at that time the front row was unoccupied. He would see that the incident did not occur again.

Continuing the debate, F. S. Fowke (South Ontario) expressed his appreciation of the Fielding tariff. He rejoiced in the fact that Canada was economically free, and that it had not yet ready-made tariffs from Downing street. No doubt the country was prospering, and the policy of the Liberals was to keep improving the conditions, and for that reason the negotiations with United States had been inaugurated. Conservatives were disposed to regard the United States as a "hostile country," which had brought much grief to Canada. While doubtless there was some truth in this, there was no reason why the government should refuse to negotiate for the removal of some features of the "barbarous tariff" of that country.

MAY EXTEND QUEEN ST. TO HIGH PARK ENTRANCE

Works Committee Will Look Over Sunnyside Situation—Bloor Viaduct Misunderstanding Cleared.

Should the city be content with a bridge over the Grand Trunk tracks at Sunnyside, or adopt the plan, which City Engineer Rust says will be much more costly, of extending Queen-street from its present terminus at Sunnyside westerly to High Park gates, north of the G.T.R. tracks? This was the question before the civic works committee yesterday, and it was recognized as of sufficient importance to justify an inspection before rushing into action. Hence, the members were met at Sunnyside at 2:30 p.m. Monday. The board of control looked over the ground yesterday morning, but until the assessment commissioner reports on the land damages involved, as requested to do by the works committee, no decision will be reached.

The Queen-street extension plan, which has been revived by Ald. McBride, contemplates that the street should be extended, at a width of 80 feet, thru to Indian Road and Keele-street, and taken under tracks at that point thru an 80-foot subway in place of the 60-foot subway at Sunnyside ordered by the railway commissioners. While estimating the construction cost of the former scheme at \$110,000, as compared with \$145,018 for the latter, Rust says the former proposition will be "very costly from a land damage point of view."

Alternative Scheme Better. Mr. Rust, while favoring the subway scheme, proposed by the Dominion Railway Commission, as against the extension, thinks that an alternative plan is better. This provides for the construction of an overpass bridge about 100 feet east of the present crossing, the bridge to be 66 feet wide and heavy enough for carrying double track street railway. He estimates the cost at \$95,400, exclusive of land damages, which he says, will be much less than in the case of either of the other plans.

The engineer points out that there is another way out of the difficulty, namely, by constructing a subway 26 feet wide at a point 240 feet west of the existing crossing. He figures the cost, without land damages, at \$119,070.

In opposing Queen-street extension, Mr. Rust said it was highly doubtful whether the railway commission would call upon the Grand Trunk to pay any of the extra expense above that which would be incurred by the building of a subway which would answer the primary object of eliminating a dangerous level crossing.

The west end members are strongly for the more costly plan, and declare that when their colleagues view the situation they will be almost unanimously impressed with the advantages it offers.

Viaduct Bylaw Goes On. There are no obstacles in the way of the Bloor-street viaduct bylaw. City Solicitor Johnston reported to the board of control yesterday that he did not think the cost of acquiring the land necessary for extension had been taken into account in estimating the cost of the viaduct, and the report before the committee. It provided that there had been a misunderstanding on Mr. Johnston's part, he having been under the impression that the \$160,000 fixed as the cost was for construction work alone, whereas \$119,000 is the cost of the viaduct as estimated by the city engineer and \$150,000, the estimate of land damages by Assessment Commissioner Foyman.

The mistake arose from Mr. Foyman's remark to Mr. Johnston that he had not figured out the land damages, meaning that he had not reported his estimate to meet any changes that may have taken place in the past year. He told the committee yesterday that he did not think there would be much difference. He gave \$150,000 last year as the extreme limit.

AMNESTY FOR MUTINEERS ALL IS PEACEFUL AGAIN

Revolt of Brazilian Navy Ends in Victory—Safety of British Subjects Was Involved.

The mutinous battleship, Sao Paulo, had on board several British subjects, who accompanied the vessel on its first trip home after its construction in England. At the outbreak of trouble Sir Wm. H. D. Haggard, British minister to Brazil, notified the Brazilian foreign office that an attempt of the royal torpedo boats to destroy the revolting warships would be attended with danger to British subjects on board.

Following the action of congress, the mutineers went thru the formality of surrendering and before noon to-day the city had resumed its normal activities and the public excitement had subsided.

During the progress of the revolt, Hon. James Bryce, British ambassador to the United States, was the guest of Baron Rio Branco, the Brazilian foreign minister.

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In the month of August this year no less than 84 steamers arrived at Prince Rupert, B.C., in September 32 and in October 34. A total of 272 steamers calling at this new port in three months is the measure of the business up to date.

The last reports from Western Canada regarding the progress on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway announce that the grading, fencing, telegraph lines and track laying has been completed on the Yorkton branch, running north of Melville, the distance being 23 1/2 miles.

Track laying has also been completed into Canora, a distance of four miles from Yorkton, and the end of this extension.

On the Melville to Regina branch, a distance of 25 miles, the track laying, fencing and telegraph line has been completed to Balcarres, and from that point to Regina is now under construction, also 20 miles of the branch from Regina towards the boundary are now under construction.

WOULD KILL COMPETITION

By Underselling the London Electric Company at All Hazards.

LONDON, Ont., Nov. 24.—A stir was caused this afternoon when it became known that a statement of Mayor Beattie that the city should underbid at all hazards the London Electric Company, so as to kill off competition, was made the basis of an appeal to the Ontario Government and the hydro-electric commission at Toronto.

As a result of the appeal, it is stated, the hydro-electric commission will not allow the City of London to increase the discount to Niagara power users from 10 to 25 per cent., as the mayor proposed.

Hon. Adam Beck will say nothing as to the situation. The London Water Commissioners are likely, in order to avoid a long and tedious war with the London Electric Company, to consider the matter of the purchase of the plant.

Building Permits

J. C. Eaton is erecting a stable on Devenport-road, near Spadina-road, that is to cost \$15,000, and a permit therefor was granted yesterday by the city architect, Messrs. Booth, Coulter & Co. who were granted a permit to erect a one-storey foundry, brick, on Lovatt place, near Queen-street, to cost \$5000.

Hanna, secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance, in reply to a communication from Mr. Hanna, stating that the alliance had received a number of inquiries as to whether the shifting of the Don bridge on Sunday was a necessity.

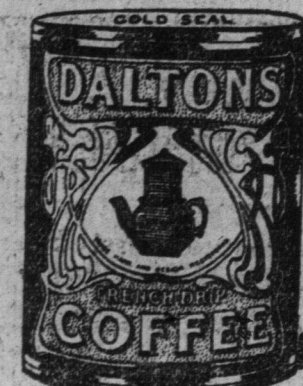
