London, March 19.—In the House of Commons today the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, announced that the total number of applications for the war loan had been 39,000, and the total amount of subscriptions £285,000,000. The largest application had been for £10,000,000. Applicants for £10,000 and upwards would get 6 per cent. of their application. Below £10,000 the assignments would vary from 6 per cent. to an amount in full.

The Trouble as to China.
Being asked a question in the House of Commons today regarding the report of the Budget Committee in China, the Parliamentary Secretary of the Foreign Office, William S. Dill, said that the Government had taken and would continue to take necessary steps to protect British interests in this connection. He also denied the story published in the United States that the American Government was sending warships to China.

Best Passed Second Reading.
During the budget discussion Mr. John Redmond, the Irish leader, said the Irish members abstained from the discussion, as it imposed upon Ireland an additional £20,000,000 of which, of course, Ireland would get the benefit. The bill passed its second reading by a vote of 152 to 80.

Free Staters in Force Around Smithfield—Canadian Mounted Infantry Now at Carnarvon, Cape Colony—Afrikaner Leaders Want Independence.

London, March 20, 4 a.m.—The War Office has no news up to this hour confirming the report of the relief of Mafeking, but Mr. George Wyndham, Parliamentary Under-Secretary for War, replying to a private enquiry in the lobby of the House of Commons about midnight, smilingly said: "I think it is all right."

Free Staters at Smithfield.
The Free Staters seemingly have not quite collapsed. They are in considerable force around Smithfield, although much dispersed.

Kronstadt a Bad Spot.
A British spy from Rouville reports that Kronstadt is a bad spot. The Canadian Mounted Rifles, under Col. Herchmer, and the Canadian Artillery, commanded by Col. Drury, have arrived here with a contingent of 2000 men. The presence of this force here has had an excellent effect in the district.

Insurgents at Van Wyksvlei.
It is reported that a large force of insurgents is in the vicinity of Van Wyksvlei.

What Roberts' Plans May Be.
London, March 20.—During the pause in the military operations in South Africa, Mr. Spenser Wilkinson, writing in the "Times," says that the British authorities have possible plans for the future. Lord Roberts may send a strong cavalry column more unexpectedly on various points, thus upsetting the Boer plans of defence. It is possible that an advance of three converging forces on Pretoria, without any heavy preliminary fighting.

Portuguese Are Active Now.
London, March 20.—The London Morning Post says that the Portuguese authorities have been hurriedly despatched by special train to the Transvaal border.

The Safety of Johannesburg.
London, March 20.—The Times, commenting on the report that the Boers are in the vicinity of Johannesburg, says: "We decline to believe that any republican German force would be able to capture Johannesburg. Certainly the Government will not make agreements at foreign instigation."

Kruger Admitted His Defeat.
London, March 20.—A despatch to the Daily Telegraph from Johannesburg says: "It is a relief to hear that Kruger has admitted his defeat. He has been in the city for a few days before the British entered. His men would be unable to keep to the field for another week."

Washington, March 19.—Adjutant-Gen. Corbin received a cable message from Gen. Davis, commanding the department of Puerto Rico, saying the condition of the inhabitants of Puerto Rico was distressing and the suffering so general and widespread over the island that he was desirous of procuring at least 600 tons of food supplies weekly until further notice, in proportion to the extent of the suffering.
