CAPE BRETON COAL COMES WEST AT THE RATE OF 5000 TONS A DAY

That is the Statement Made in Montreal by Mr. James Ross of the Dominion Coal Company, Who Has Just Returned From the Mines.

Montreal, June 12.—(Special.)—We will mine this year 2,000,000 tons of coal, will the estimate placed in the Dominion Coal Company's output by Mr. James Ross, who has just returned from Sydney. The vice-president declared that 5000 tons of coal per day were now being shipped to Montreal and the other St. Lawrence ports, and 150,000 tons will be the quantity sent up here during June. Contracts, he added, amounting to 850,000 tons, would be filled for the St. Lawrence trade during this season, and he predicted a still greater expansion in the near future. Then he added that 60,000 tons would likewise be sent to Everett, Mass.
