Also Difficulty in Securing Material is Delaying Work on City Pavements.

MANY ASPIRANTS FOR MAYORALTY

Better Car Service on West King St.—Some Notes From the City Hall.

Owing to a scarcity of good workmen and good material, the City Engineer's Department is hampered in pushing along the various public works which have been authorized by the Council.

Since the Exhibition opened the King-street cars have all turned at Dufferin-street and gone down to the Exhibition grounds. For the convenience of residents west of Dufferin-street, a street line has been in operation, but it has proved unsatisfactory, inasmuch as there was an insufficient number of cars.

Mayor Howland has now definitely announced that he will be a candidate for the Mayoralty next year. From desultory chats with various authorities on municipal matters, it appears that the Mayor will have a long list of opponents.

Mr. W. B. Rogers, president of the Toronto branch of the association, told of the great need of organization. There was a fever of organization among all classes of the city.

The holiday spell at the City Hall will be broken to-day by a meeting of the Fire and Light Committee. As a result of the fatal McIntosh fire, there are several demands upon the committee.

A familiar face around the hall on Tuesday was that of Controller Crane, who is impressed with the manner in which radial railway lines are managed in Rochester.

Mayor Howland has received a letter from Sir John Forrest, appreciative of the hospitality extended to him while in Toronto, and Sir John is delighted with the strong feeling of affection which exists here, as well as with the prosperity of the country which he so apparent.

Cabinet who have been using the vacant lot on Station-street have complained to the Mayor that it is a nuisance and a source of annoyance.

The divergent condition of College-street continues to be a matter of complaint and discussion in the Engineer's Department. The fault seems to lie with the property owners, who do not seem to want a decent street.
