



He had imbibed somewhat, but was "fairly sober," altho it had been necessary to eject him at about William Wright, proprietor of the hotel where the trouble began, swore

that Williams had called the prisoner sydney Hare of 500 Parliament-street had seen McGrain leave a half glass of beer on the bar in order to follow Williams.

Charles Trotter told of threats uttered by McGrain and of hearing him call threats after the deceased as he followed him from the bar, keeping, however, some distance to the rear.
