# Was Critical For Allies on The Aisne Last Week; Joffre Hurried To Scene

## German Assaults Made Things WORSHIPPERS **Serious But Danger Period Passed**

In Spirited Fighting, Allies Lose Ground But Regain it — Germans Blow up Trench But Soldiers Jump Into Excavation and Hold it — Russian Reports **Favorable** 

Paris, Jan. 20-It became known today for the first time that the situation upon the Aisne was regarded as so critical as a result Fewer Than 400 Saved Among of the German assaults last week, that General Joffre, commanderin-chief of the allied armies, hastened there in person to direct op-

erations of the French troops.

Now, however, despite the massing of German reinforcements south and southwest of Laon, the French military authorities are confident that the inavders have shot their bolt north of Soissons, and that the next operations there will see the allies upon the offensive in an effort to retake the ground they have lost.

Great importance is attached here to the French gains in the forest of la Pretre, north of Pont a Mousson. The French forces, lying southwest of Metz, have strongly entrenched their positions, and report the repulse of all German counter attacks. Artillery engagements are in previous first trees.

Paris, Jan. 20—(2.45 p. m.)—The French War Office this afternoon reported as follows:—

"From the sea to the Somme, in the region of Nieuport, there was yester-day a fairly spirited artillery engagement in the course of which the enemy endeavored in vain to destroy our bridge at the mouth of the Yser. "In the meantime we were successful in demolishing a portion of his de-fences at this point; also we were successful at the Union Farm near St.

Georges' where the enemy had strongly organized his positions.

"In the sector of Ypres and near Lens, there were, yesterday, artillery exchanges of varying intensity. There was also a very violent bombasedment of Blangy, near Aras, but it was not followed by an infantry attack.

"From the Somme to the Argonne, there has been nothing to report, not has there been any activity in the sector of Soissons or in the vicinity of Crances are as a Blainer.

"In the region of Camp De Chalons, as well as to the north of Perthes and of Massiges, our artiflery directed a veryeffective fire on the field works of the

"In the Argonne, in the forest of Legruris, the enemy delivered a violent attack upon one of our trenches. Our troops, who for a moment gave way under the shock, later recaptured in two counter attacks all their positions and maintained themselves therin. The first of these attacks gave us a greater part of these positions and the second completed the work.

"At St. Hubert the Germans blew up, by means of a mine, the north-eastern projection of our trenches. Our troops threw themselves into the excavations caused by these explosions and prevented the enemy from taking possession of them."

"To the northwest of Pont-A-Mousson, in the forest of Le Pretre we established ourselves at a distance of 100 yards in front of the German trenches, captured by us the day before yesterday. At the end of the day (Tuesday) the enemy here delivered a counter attack but without success.

"In the vicinity of Thann there have been artillery engagements in which the advantage rested with us."

RUSSIAN REPORT FAVORABLE Petrograd, Jan. 20-An official communication by the general staff of the

Petrograd, Jan. 20—An official communication by the general staff of the Russian army says:—

"During January 17 and 18, on the right bank of the lower Vistula, upon the front running from the river to the railroad from Warsaw to Milawa, a portion of our troops, having come in close contact with the enemy, had a series of collisions of secondary importance.

"Fighting of a more grave character, though having the nature of separate actions, took place in the village of Konopki, where the heavy artillery with which the enemy bombarded us was silenced by the fire of our batteries and near Bodsanow and Bonjonia, opposite which the enemy occupied well organized defensive positions. Heavy fighting also occurred near Dobrezyn, where an offensive attempt of the Germans was blocked and the enemy was driven back, sustaining grave losses.

"During the day of January 17, the enemy bombarded, from his positions on the west bank of the Vistula. our lines near Wyszogrod, but our fire, direct-td upon his front and flank, silenced the German artillery.

"On January 18, the Germans violently cannonaded the village of Vitko-vitze, and the entrenchments occupied by us on the left bank of the Brura.

"There is no material change on the other fronts."

# THE ENEMY'S AIR RAID

New York Herald Editorial Scores Germans For Attack on Undefended Places -- Four Deaths Known to Have Been Caused by Bombs

New York, Jan. 20—Under the caption of "More slaughter of innocents," the Herald comments editorially on the German aerial raid of last night on the east coast of England, as follows:

"Is it the madness of despair, or just plain every-day madness that has prompted the Germans to select for attack the peaceful and undefended resorts of England's east coast? First a squadron of Germain equipment approach dearn upon Heretened. Whithy and See dermain cruisers swooped down upon Hartlepool, Whitby and Scar-corough to take their toll of death of non-combatants, women and

"What can Germany hope to gain by these wanton attacks upon undefended places and this slaughter of innocents? Certainly not the good opinion of the peoples of neutral nations, for these know that the rules of civilized warfare call for notice of bombardment, even of places fortified and defended."

KILLED IN YARMOUTH

Yarmouth, Jan. 20—Careful inquiries thus far go to show that public buildings and the railways escaped damage in last night's aerial raid. The damage is almost wholly confined to private houses and shops.

So far as is now known, only two persons, a a man and a woman, were killed here. Most of the inhabitants were indoors. Fragments of metal, supposed to have been thrown by the bombs, are being found in all directions. Another aircraft appeared here soon after midnight but dropped no bombs.

The chief constable of Yarmouth, telling of the raid asid:—

"The people stood the raid very well. About 400 special constables were called out and arrived with the utmost promptitude. All Red Cross and hospital arrangements proved perfect. All lights were extinguished and public performances at the theatres and music halls were eabandoned. The people went home and the town was without light till morning."

The first air raider passed along the sea front and dropped the first bomb into Norfolk. Square Garden, close by the beach and the Brittania Pier. This did no damage. The raider then proceeded in a northwesterly direction across town and when near the centre dropped several bombs in the neighborhood of St. Peter's road, the main thoroughfare leading to the parade grounds. 

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



# CANADIAN CRAWLS TO GERMAN TRENCH

Intrepid Officer Writes Thrilling Story of Fighting At Close Range

TRENCHES "MUCK-PITS"

Even Insides of Houses Are Deep in Slush-Gifts of Warm Clothing and of Tobacco Are Most

Picked Off Officer "Nothing happened for ten minutes. Then there was noise and talking, and a lot of Germans came along through the wood behind the trench, about forty yards from me. I counted about twenty, and there were more coming. They halted in front. I picked out the one I thought was the officer. He stood facing the other way and I had a steady shot at him between the shoulders. He went down and that was all I saw.

"I went back at a sort of galloping crawl to our lines and sent a message that the Germans were moving in a certain direction in some numbers. Half an hour afterwards they attacked on the right, in massed formation, advancing slowly to within ten yards of the trenches. We simply mowed them down. It was rather horrible. They counted two hundred dead in a little bit of a line, and we lost ten.
