With the hope of putting more of a punch into their sermons, about three-scere pastors of various Pittsburg congregations met to take strenuous physical exercise in the Old English Street Reformed Presbyterian church under the direction of W. Earle Flynn, who is conducting a public campaign in Pittsburgh.

The subject dwelt mainly upon deep breathing as a means of warding off the blues and inspiring vigor into daily life. Under the supervision of Mr. Flynn the shepherds of the different flocks inflated and emptied their lungs for half an hour, becoming more enthusiastic with each breath until the effects resembled a miniature windstorm or the resonance of wintry blasts in the chimney.

Mr. Flynn impressed upon his followers the necessity of breathing deeply to secure the proper pinch in their sermons. He declared that as the lungs formed one of the greatest factors in obtaining and maintaining good health, deep breathing kept a man in perfect working order and contributed to his daily working efficiency One of the exercises consisted of doubling the fingers so as to form a hole and then exhaling the breath through the aperture





THIS PROVINCE OVERLOOKED

We are frequently told by visitors from the old country, and by people from this province on their return from a visit to the other side, that very little is known there about New Brunswick, and that greater efforts should be made to advertise the resources and advantages of this province. Confirmation of these statements is found in a special 32 page Canadian supplement issued by the Sheffield Daily Independent and the Birmingham Gazette. The Independent claims to have double the circulation of any morning paper in Sheffield and district, and the Birmingham Gazette claims to have a larger sile than any other smoothing paper in the Midlands. A Canadian supplement sent out with the Saturday issue of both these journals would mecessarily reach a very wide circle of readers. One therefore scans the pages readers. 





Party Vote Defeats Dr. Pugsley's Appeal—Other House Business

Ottawa, May 12-The Naval Bill was brought on late tonight without agree-

ment with the opposition.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley moved that the report of the committee on the Naval Bill be referred back, because the chairman had made a false report.

Speaker Sproule said that this was a reflection on the chair and could not be put.

Dr. Pugsley appealed from the chair and the government sustained it by 37 majority.

The Naval Bill will come on for a third reading tomorrow.

Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of railways, introduced a bill providing for an increase of \$2,500 in the salary of the chairman of the Dominion Railway Commission, making it \$12,500. It was given its first reading after being objected to by Mr. Lanctot and others.

Ottawa, May 12—In the senate touight the bill amending the dominion police act was given third reading, as was the bill amending the Intercolonial Employes Protective Fund act.

The bill to control wireless telegraphy was put through committee after the various clauses had been explained by Hon. Mr. Lougheed.

American Will Attempt to Swim The English Channel

By TOM ANDREWS



The recent report that several American long distance swimmers were to try to swim the English channel this summer does not seem to impress the British critics aeriously. It has been said that Charles Durborow, a wonderful Philadelphia swimmer, would make the attempt in May. This is not correct, as Mr. Durborow advises me that he will not make any effort to swim the English channel until 1914, having determined to first make several long swims under conditions similar to those attending a channel swim.

In chatting about these long distance swims, especially the channel swim, an Englishman well versed in such matters said to me: "If any swimmer tries it in May, as reported, he will fail. None of the Europeane has ever tried the swim so early in the fear for the reason that the water is a great deal too cold and that the cross currents are more difficult to beat at that season than they are in July, August and September. I understand Charles Durborow of Philadelphia swam Delaware bay under similar conditions to that which exist in the British channel, but with all due respect. I doubt if the Delaware bay is subject to such swift and varying currents as our narrow streak of water. Ever since Captain Webb accomplished the feat in 1875, the channel swim has been the objective of all our long distance swimmers, and though in recent years there have been innumerable attempts, Thomas Burgess is the only one to equal Webb's performance, and that was only after fifteen unsuccessful efforts. It is possible to cross in two tides, but the conditions would have to be perfect in every respect and the swimmer would have to be a man of remarkable speed. So far no one has tried the feat in two tides, as it is very rare that the sea is warm and smooth at the same time. Burgese in his successful swim was in the water twenty-two will have to prepare for a swim exceeding twenty hours.
