POLICE CHIEF AND FIRE CHIEF KILLED

Another Fireman's Life Lost in Stratford Blaze

CRUSHED BY STEEPLE

Knox Presbyterian Church Struck by Lightning Storm's Only Flash, Takes Fire and Men are Crushed as Steeple Falls

(Canadian Press)

Stratford, Ont., May 12—At their post of duty during a fine which gutted the handsome Knox Presbyterian church in this city early this morning, Police Chief A. A. McCarthy, Police Constable Matthew Hamilton and Fire Chief Hugh Durkin were instantly killed when the huge burning belfry crashed from a height of 160 feet, catching the unfortunate men before they could rush to safety.

Fireman Sydney Vanstone was struck by a flying timber and badly cut about the face and head, but will recover. During the progress of a light electrical storm about midnight, the one sharp flash struck the high steeple about half way up and it immediately took fire. The brigade was at the scene within a minute or so, but as they had no water tower, the men were helpless as the flames did not approach the burning spot. The fire ate its way through the steeple and the burning belfry set the roof ablaze.

Chief Durkin, who was standing by his ladder, placed against the building to enable the men to reach the roof, noticed the top of the ladder burning. He called for assistance to move the ladder and Hamilton and McCarthy jumped in just as the heavy timbers and thousands of bricks toppled and fell. McCarthy and Hamilton were instantly killed by the falling belfry. Durkin died on the way to the hospital after being taken from the debris which had covered his body.

The blaze burned itself out, but at noon today the ruins are still smoking. The loss will be very heavy, but cannot now be estimated.

The insurance on the church is \$34,000. A splendid new organ which cost \$10,000 and which was to be finished in a few days before the month was destroyed. If the standing walls are solid work on rebuilding will be commenced as soon as possible.

DEATH ENDS WATCH FOR SOLDIER LOVER WHO NE'ER RETURNED

For Forty-two Years, Every Day, Woman Took up Post in Berlin Street, Watching

Berlin, May 13—Linda Julie, who took her name from the Unter den Linden thoroughfare, in which she kept a vain watch daily for forty-two years for the return of her soldier lover, is dead.

A mild insanity seized Julie when her sweetheart failed to return from the Franco-German war in 1871. She never lost faith that he would come day by day, rain or shine, huddled up in a shawl kept watch in the streets each year growing more ragged and white-haired.

The police made an exception in her case in the rule which does not allow loiterers in the street, as they had compassion upon the faithful Julie.

A little more than a year ago she was so worn with age that she was taken to the Charity Hospital, where she has just died.

NEW MANAGER OF I. C. R. HERE TODAY

Mr. Gutelius to Make Two Weeks' Inspection Trip—Stealing Children's Banks Charge Against Woodstock Man

Moncton, N. B., May 12—P. P. Gutelius, new manager of the I. C. R., arrived here this morning. He will leave this afternoon accompanied by other officials on a two weeks' inspection trip.

Harry Hartland, about nineteen years old, formerly of Woodstock, was arrested here this morning charged with stealing children's savings banks from Moncton children. It is said he is a ticket of leave man. Moncton people do not want to prosecute, and it is thought he will be sent back to Dorchester.

MORE THAN 500 DEAD ON THE BATTLEFIELD IN MEXICO

(Canadian Press)

Nogales, Ariz., May 13—More than five hundred dead are lying on the field about Guaymas, resulting from three days of desperate fighting last week. Colonel Juan Cabral, who arrived today at Hermosillo from the front, reported that he had estimated the killed to exceed 800. A train load of oil and fire wood with which to cremate the bodies was turned south.

The official report of General Alberto Obregon, insurgent commander, is that the dead bears about numbered 500 with 200 Huerta soldiers taken prisoners. Both sides have been executing all commissioned officers captured.

There was little fighting on Sunday or yesterday. Driven to the last station north of the Gulf port, the remnants of the federal army of some 2,000, found itself cut off from further retreat. Believing that lack of food and water soon would force a surrender the state troops contacted themselves with holding the federalists in their position, occasionally harassing the extreme lines when any attempt was made to move toward Guaymas. The 200 federalists in Guaymas did not move from the town.

PROPERTY CASE IN CHANCERY COURT TODAY

Two Claims to Parcel at Erie and Brunswick Streets—A Carleton Ejectment Suit

In the case of Simon Moses vs. Thomas French and Charles Simon, hearing was held before Mr. Justice McLeod this morning in the Chancery Division. This was a suit brought to have a declaration of title with respect to the property at the corner of Erie and Brunswick streets, claimed by both parties.

The property originally belonged to Mrs. Leslie Moses, the plaintiff's mother and she made an agreement to sell with the defendants who made a part payment of \$800. The property was later assigned by Mrs. Moses to the plaintiff. The defence contended that the property should be conveyed to them as they have made a part payment and have taken into possession and made improvements on the strength of the agreement. The plaintiff contended that the agreement was only to sell if good title could be given and since the making of the agreement it was learned that the mortgage was unwilling to release a certain mortgage on the property and therefore a clear title could not be given.

The plaintiff, Mrs. Moses and Thomas X. Gibbons were examined this morning, closing the plaintiff's case. The defence called Charles Simon and at one o'clock adjournment was made until this afternoon. D. Mullin, R. C. and E. P. Raymond are for the plaintiff and Mrs. B. Bustin and E. S. Ritchie for the defence.

MISSING VERSES OF GOSPEL FOUND

London Times' Announcement After Study of The Manuscripts Discovered in Egypt

London, May 13—Some long missing verses of the New Testament are included in the manuscripts of the Gospels discovered in Egypt six years ago and purchased by Charles L. Freer, of Detroit, Mich., according to a study of the Freer manuscripts by the Times.

A facsimile of the manuscripts has been presented to the British Museum by the University of Michigan, to which Mr. Freer assigned the task of publication and, according to the Times' study, these have been found in the Gospel of St. Mark, several verses which occur in no other known manuscript of the New Testament, although they were known to St. Jerome, who quotes part of them.

GENERAL DRUMMOND TOO ILL TO ATTEND AT COURT FOR HER TRIAL

A doctor testified in court that owing to her illness she had been moved to a nursing home.

London, May 13—Discussing the problem of the whereabouts of the suffragette militant fund, the London Daily Mail says that it is apparent, from the fact that the work of militancy continues in the country, that the organ of the militants, announced in March, 1912, that contributions to the "£250,000 fund" amounted to £117,019. The balance sheet for 1912 shows a total income of £28,002. Apparently the £117,019 is considered as capital. Whether the interest on it is included in this income no more than £27,000 was spent.

PEACE DELEGATES AT BANQUET BOARD

Distinguished Speakers at Dinner in Washington

THREE THOUGHTS BY BRYAN

Monuments Along Canadian Border—Canadian Delegates Among the Speakers—Carnegie Says Fewer Battleships and More Embassies Abroad

(Canadian Press)

Washington, May 13—"We are here to substitute the spirit of peace for the spirit of war. The ideals of peace are greater than the ideals of war. We know of no cause that cannot be settled better by reason than by war."

These were some of the sentiments expressed last night by Secretary Bryan, who said he spoke for the population and for the administration under which he held office. He was addressing a gathering at a banquet given by the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace for the delegates from Great Britain who are here to prepare plans for the celebration of 100th anniversary of peace among English speaking nations and the signing of the Treaty of Ghent.

Mr. Bryan said he wished to present three thoughts on the subject to peace between Great Britain and the United States.

That proposed monuments along the Canadian border would testify to the merits of the living and the worth of the dead of a century ago;

That these monuments would give the lie to the thought that man must have war to be strong, and

That the two nations would in the days to come see before the world a higher ideal than the ideal of war.

Senator Root, who presided, said that this peace of a hundred years should be the occasion for such a celebration as the world has never seen.

SHE HAS BEEN MOTHER TO THOUSANDS OF IMMIGRANTS

Mrs. Marie Wiltzie of Edmonton Celebrates 15th Anniversary as Matron in Alberta

Edmonton, May 12.—Mrs. Marie Wiltzie, matron at the Edmonton immigration hall, who has been a mother to tens of thousands of homeseekers from all parts of the world since May, 1898, when she received the appointment from the dominion government, was remembered today by the pioneer residents of the capital of Alberta and settlers at the fifteenth anniversary of her connection with the institution.

Mrs. Wiltzie came to Edmonton from eastern Canada, where she taught school before her marriage, two years after the Klondike rush. The immigration hall, then located in Strathcona, on the south side of the Saskatchewan river, was inadequate to accommodate all the prospective settlers, and among others were active-duty Galicians, who found shelter in a big tent. During a storm she brought the women and children into the permanent building, in the face of protests from the English-speaking immigrants, and gave up her bed and stove for their use.

The local immigration officer sought Mrs. Wiltzie's assistance the following day, and when the old Columbia hotel was secured as an immigration hall Mrs. Wiltzie was invited to take charge. However, the federal government declined to finance with the hall until it was shown to be a success. The rent of the establishment for the first two months was paid by local stockholders.

GOOD ROADS PROBLEM

Something About Its Solution in Province of Saskatchewan

(Continued.) The improvement and maintenance of good roads in the rural districts is a vital problem in all parts of Canada. Inevitably, perhaps, the phenomenal development of railway and waterway navigation has largely overshadowed the necessity that exists for properly built wagon roads. However, it is steadily being more fully realized that the absence of such roads causes an economic loss of great importance to every citizen, and especially those in the rural districts.

In view of the scarcity of gravel and stone in many parts of Saskatchewan, extensive experiments have been carried out at provincial expense to ascertain the best means of constructing clay roads. It has been found that Saskatchewan clay burned at comparatively low temperatures produces an excellent surfacing material for graded roads. Owing to the reddish color of this burned clay these roads are known as "the red roads of Saskatchewan." Their cost, where underdrainage is not necessary, has been found to be from \$2,000 to \$2,500 a mile.

SURPLUS OF \$55,000,000

Good Results of Liberal Rule Continue in Canadian Prosperity—Tories Practically Stand Pat on the Tariff

Ottawa, May 12.—A fifty-five million dollar surplus, a billion-dollar commerce, general prosperity, and a few tariff changes were announced today by Finance Minister White in the budget speech.

The financial statement had been announced for this week, but was not expected so early. The minister of the finance minister is critically ill, and on that account he desires to leave the capital. The speech was delivered today by agreement between the two parties.

There is little striking in the measure of the way of tariff changes. Hon. Mr. White stated that the government had considered the matter and had come to the conclusion that a general tariff revision was not required this year.

There were some changes in lines, coconuts and other products of the south, customs duties upon the West Indian agreement.

Sugar refiners are cut out from their present privilege of importing from foreign countries at preferential rates, twenty per cent. of the raw sugar they receive.

The duty on cement is cut from 43.54 cents a barrel to 35 cents; type-setting machines and traction-ditching machines are put on the free list, along with some scientific articles.

There is nothing done respecting steel or shipbuilding, woolens, lin or any other other interests which have been pressing for changes.

The speech required two hours in delivery.

The total receipts for the year, ended March 31, 1912, reached the sum of \$106,000,000, being a little over \$1,000,000 more than his estimate given to the house, and the increase over the revenue of the previous year of over \$10,000,000.

Coming to the fiscal year ended March 31 of this year, the minister said that would prove even more satisfactory. When the books of the fiscal year 1913 are closed it will be found that the total revenue will have reached the stupendous total of \$108,000,000, an increase over the year 1911 of over \$20,000,000.

The minister said that the surplus is \$55,000,000. The result of the year's operations will be the reduction of the debt

GOVERNMENT SPRINGS

NAVAL BILL AGAIN

Party Vote Defeats Dr. Pugsley's Appeal—Other House Business

Ottawa, May 12.—The Naval Bill was brought on late tonight without agreement with the opposition being obtained.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley moved that the report of the committee on the Naval Bill be referred back, because the chairman had made a false report.

Speaker Sturges said that this was a reflection on the chair and could not be put. Dr. Pugsley appealed from the chair and the government sustained it by 22 majority.

The Naval Bill will come on for a third reading tomorrow.

Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of railways, introduced a bill providing for an increase of \$250,000 in the salary of the chairman of the Dominion Railway Commission, making it \$12,200. It was given its first reading and referred to the committee on the subject.

Ottawa, May 12.—In the senate tonight the bill amending the Dominion Police Act was given third reading, as was the bill amending the Intercolonial Employees Protection Act.

The bill to control wireless telegraphy was put through committee after the various clauses had been explained by Hon. Mr. Loughheed.

In committee on the bill to confirm the agreement between Canada and the West Indies, Senator Denville stated that he could see no prospect for trade expansion. Canada needed more West Indian sugar, but as the West Indies there appeared to be little likelihood of Canada's products being taken.

Hon. Mr. Loughheed said that improved steamship service had been provided for and the steamers shall have accommodations for freight and passengers, with no higher rate than those to American ports. The bill was reported without amendments.

COMMON COUNCIL

Important Market Change—Paving and Other Matters

Citizens who do not voluntarily join the city cleaning movement on Thursday will be summoned to court to answer for the state of street cleanliness.

An announcement was made yesterday by Commissioner McNeilan at the weekly meeting of the Common Council.

American Will Attempt to Swim The English Channel By TOM ANDREWS

The recent report that several American long distance swimmers were to try to swim the English channel this summer does not seem to impress the British critics seriously. It has been said that Charles Durborow, a wonderful Philadelphia swimmer, would make the attempt in May. This is not correct, as Mr. Durborow advises me that he will not make any effort to swim the English channel until 1914, having determined to first make several long swims under conditions similar to those attending a channel swim.

In chatting about these long distance swims, especially the channel swim, an Englishman well versed in such matters said to me: "If any swimmer tries it in May, as reported, he will fail. None of the Europeans has ever tried the swim so early in the year for the reason that the water is a great deal too cold and that the cross currents are more difficult to beat at that season than they are in July, August and September. I understand Charles Durborow of Philadelphia swam Delaware bay under similar conditions to that which exist in the British channel, but with all due respect, I doubt if the Delaware bay is subject to such swift and varying currents as our narrow stretch of water. Ever since Captain Webb accomplished the feat in 1875, the channel swim has been the objective of all our long distance swimmers, and though in recent years there have been innumerable attempts, Thomas Burgess is the only one to equal Webb's performance, and that was only after fifteen unsuccessful efforts. It is possible to cross in two tides, but the conditions would have to be perfect in every respect and the swimmer would have to be a man of remarkable speed. So far no one has tried the feat in two tides, as it is very rare that the sea is warm and smooth at the same time. Burgess in his successful swim was in the water twenty-two hours and thirty-five minutes, and it is pretty certain that the American swimmers will have to prepare for a swim exceeding twenty hours.

STRICKEN WHILE UNLOADING HIS GOODS IN MARKET

Wm. A. Scribner of Kingston Dies Within Few Minutes, of Heart Trouble

Death came without a moment's warning this morning to William Allison Scribner of King's county, when he fell unconscious in the city market, stricken with heart trouble, and died a few minutes later. Scribner left his home at two o'clock this morning and drove to the city with a wagon load of produce. This he was unloading when he was stricken. Doctor Addy arrived in a few minutes, but by the time he had arrived the unfortunate man had expired. The body was taken to Powers' undertaking rooms to be prepared for burial.

Mr. Scribner, who was sixty-three years of age, had been in fairly good health, but had consulted a doctor only last week on account of trouble with his heart and had been warned against straining himself. He was unmarried and is survived by the father, Charles Scribner, of Kingston; two sisters, Miss Anastasia, at home and Mrs. Otis Hazen, of Kingston; and four brothers, Norman and Lee, he also of Kingston, and Cory and Norval, in the United States.
