Conciliation Body's Report. OTTAWA, Feb. 13—The report of the Winfield Conciliation Board respect-ing the dispute between the Cape Breton coal miners and the British Em-pire Steel Corpoartion declares that "no permanent inprovement in industrial relations can be expected until complete confidence is established between the operators and employes." The board is unanimously of the opinion (a) that due to the unfortu-nate relations existing for many years between the operators and the employes, as set forth in the statement of the em-ployes submitted to the Minister and further elaborated in the statement sub-mitted to the board, no permanent im-provement in industrial relations can be expected until complete confidence is established between the operators and the employes, which may be possibly brought about by a fair and impartial inquiry by a competent authority, with a view to ascertaining the actual neces-sary cost of mining, transporting and selling coal, the ability of the com-panies to pay a rate of wages satisfac-tory to the employes, to earn a fair re-turn on capital invested, and the bear-ing which the attitude and action of the employes have in relation to the efficient and profitable carrying on of the operations."
