## STATEMENT BY THE SESSION.

---

**A**S a brief abstract of the work accomplished in each department of Christian life and activity in the Congregation is given in this Annual Report, the Session deem it unnecessary to repeat particulars in any case. They cordially recommend, however, a careful perusal of the interesting facts given, by which, they believe, all who inform themselves will be convinced of much good and honest work done for the Master.

They are very thankful to the Great King and Head of the Church for the peace, harmony and cohesion which indicate the spirit of the congregation. While there has been no extraordinary religious movement among our people there is evidence of a sure, though quiet, spiritual power at work, which should inspire us all with gratitude and encouragement.

Notwithstanding the universally felt stringency in financial matters the contributions of our people show a healthy liberality. There is, without imposing heavy burdens on any, a creditable amount for the general schemes of the Church, and a sufficient provision for present and prospective improvements.

During the pastor's holiday season the pulpit was ably and acceptably supplied by Mr. Donald Guthrie, B.A., of McGill University, Montreal.

The additions to the Communion Roll during the year were, by profession of faith in Jesus Christ 39, and by certificate 25. The withdrawals, by change of residence 23, and by death 17, being a net gain of 24; making the present membership 764. The baptisms, all of infants, were 20. The list of contributors averages 380.

THE FORTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT  
—OF THE—  
BOARD OF MANAGERS  
BEING FOR THE YEAR 1893.

---

**I**N submitting the Annual Report the Board of Managers have to report as follows :

The total receipts for the year ending 31st December, 1893, including the weekly contributions and collections, amounted to \$5,644.83, which shows a slight increase of \$25.41 over the previous year; and the expenditure for all purposes to \$6,240.51, but owing to a large increase in some items of the expenditure your Managers regret that they have not been able to meet these obligations by ordinary revenue, and in order to raise the amount due to the Sabbath Schools, they caused a notice to be read from the pulpit inviting donations by special envelopes, in behalf of the Sabbath Schools, during the month of December, which only resulted in raising the sum of \$54.50, consequently the Board was forced to borrow \$555, the necessary amount to pay all liabilities.

The Managers whose term of office now expires are Messrs. James Mills, James McSween, A. M. Gunn, John McMillan, Dr. Macarthur and Dr. Gardiner, but they are all eligible for re-election.

The horse sheds, which collapsed last winter, have been repaired, and cost \$160.00. The cemetery, which had been under the care of Mr. D. McDonald during the

summer months, has been kept in good order for the sum of \$60.00. A drain, which has been running from the church to Waterloo street, had to be opened and repaired, and cost \$29.64.

The Treasurer's books have been examined by the Auditors, Messrs. T. H. Purdom and C. R. Somerville, and their certificate is attached to the Financial Statement.

After the sale of the lot on Dufferin Avenue, in 1887, where Mr. Crawford, janitor, formerly resided, the Managers at that time rented another house for him at \$8.00 per month, but the present Managers decided at their meeting in March last to include the rent or \$100.00 in his salary and pay the rent himself, with the understanding that he shall reside within a convenient distance from the church.

In order that the congregation may have an idea of the possible expenditure for the ensuing year, the following estimates are submitted :

## Minutes of the Annual Meeting.

---

The Annual Meeting of St. Andrew's Congregation was held in the Bible Class Room on the evening of Wednesday, the 24th January, 1894.

Rev. J. A. Murray, pastor, opened the meeting with devotional exercises. On motion of Mr. McSween, seconded by Dr. Macarthur, Mr. James Mills, Chairman of the Board of Managers occupied the chair.

The Chairman read the minutes of last Annual Meeting, as no objections or amendments had been made, the minutes were confirmed and signed by the Chairman.

It was then moved by Mr. McSween, and seconded by Dr. Macarthur, that the report be taken as read, and that it be considered clause by clause.

The first clause was then read and caused considerable discussion and some amendments, but the amendment of Mr. Little, seconded by Dr. Macarthur, carried, and leaves the clause as now printed in the report.

The second clause was then read, after which the resignation of Mr. Gunn was read, and Mr. McMillan's request to retire from the Board. Both were accepted. A Nominating Committee was appointed and retired to make a selection of candidates, and recommended nine names. Voting cards were distributed to the meeting, resulted in the election of Messrs. T. H. Purdom, Dr. Macarthur, James McSween, A. Gil'ean, Dr. Gardiner and Jas. Mills.

The third, fourth and fifth clauses were read and passed.

The sixth clause, containing the estimates for the ensuing year, was read and supported by Messrs. Dr. Gardiner, Stevely and McCallum; and on motion of Mr. Stevely, seconded by Mr. McCallum, it was agreed that \$100.00 be

put in the estimates in behalf of the Augmentation Fund. The latter part of the sixth clause was then adopted, on motion of Mr. Macgregor.

After the seventh clause was read, Mr. Gillean's resignation as usher, who has acted in that capacity for a great number of years, was reluctantly accepted. Mr. McDonald was relieved from his services as usher on account of his inability to attend church. These gentlemen were appointed honorary ushers. It was agreed on motion that the two offices be filled by the Board of Managers.

On motion, the report as a whole was adopted.

Mr. Little reported in regard to the Improvement and Debt Fund, showing the amount subscribed, and amount paid, and balance on hand.

Mr. Wheeler's application for an increase of salary was read; after a short discussion, Mr. John Marr moved, seconded by Mr. McCallum, and supported by Messrs. Macgregor and McSween, that Mr. Wheeler's application for \$600 salary be granted. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Macgregor, and seconded by Dr. Macarthur, that St. Andrew's S. School expenses amounting to \$155 22, and North Branch S. School amounting to \$80, be paid. Carried.

Mr. Alex. McIntosh was reappointed Sec.-Treasurer, and Messrs. C. R. Somerville and F. W. Merchant were appointed Auditors, on motion of Mr. Gillean and Mr. Little.

Mr. Murray then closed the meeting with singing and the Benediction.

# St. Andrew's Sabbath School

REPORT FOR 1893.

In reviewing the work of the year, 1893, we desire humbly to acknowledge, with gratitude to our Divine Master, the spirit of earnest and hearty co-operation which has existed amongst us. The teachers have been regular in their attendance and faithful and earnest in their duties.

We are pleased to note that our church Board of Managers have at last realized the necessity of improving our school accommodation and that they are now moving in that direction. We hope they will not grow weary in well-doing until the school room bears at least a semblance of what it should be.

The average attendance is not as large as it was in 1892. The falling off has been in the infant class. The attendance in the intermediate classes is four better than last year, while in the senior classes it is six better.

There is a marked improvement in the Chinese class. There are seventeen on the roll, with an average attendance of twelve. Some of the pupils are learning the catechism and are giving evidence of a growing interest in spiritual things.

During the year a number of our scholars made a public profession of their faith in Christ, and their names have been entered upon the communion roll of the church.

The regular collections amounted to \$271.79, which is \$1.85 less than was received last year. Besides this, one class of girls contributed \$2.00 for Formosa; another \$3.00 for Home Missions; another \$5.00 for French Evangelization, and another \$7.00 for the N. W. T., making the total contribution for missions \$288.79.

We recommend that it be divided as follows: Foreign Missions, including \$5.00 to N. W. T. and \$2.00 to Formosa, \$60.00; Home Missions, including \$10.00 to Provincial S. S. Association, \$117.00; Augmentation Fund, \$25.00; Point Aux Trembles School, \$65.00; French Evangelization, \$16.00; Welland Canal Mission, \$5.00.

The library is in an exceedingly bad state of repair. With a view to replenishing its shelves a special collection, which amounted to \$45.08, was taken in May last in the vestibule of the church. On children's day Mr. Gillean, of Montreal, attended the diets of worship in our church and at the close of the evening service he handed our pastor \$10.00 for the library fund.

To Miss Gunn, organist, and Mr. Gillespie, choir leader, and his associates, great credit is due for the marked improvement in the singing.

We desire to tender our hearty thanks to Mr. Wheeler and the church choir for the valuable assistance they have given us on several occasions during the year.

With gratitude we acknowledge the efficient and hearty manner in which the teachers and officers labored to carry on the work. Too often have we been compelled to leave the routine and extra work to them. It has always been well attended to.

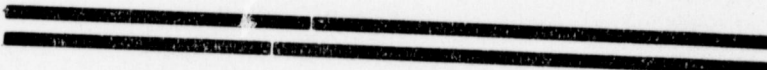

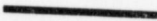

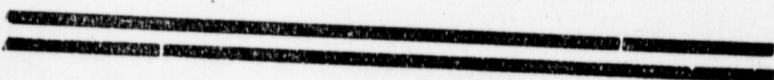

BRETHREN,—In submitting to you the Sixth Annual Report of our North Sabbath School, we desire to express our gratitude to Almighty God for another year of uninterrupted work and steady progress in the study of the word of God. Conscious of many things in which we have come short of faithful service, we still feel assured that the Master's blessing has been given to us and our service owned by Him.

There have been many changes in our School during the past year. Eight of our teachers and twenty-six of our scholars having left us, either from illness or having removed to other parts of the city. Especially would we refer to the loss of Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Nelles, who on account of failing health have gone for a time to Southern California. Their earnest and active co-operation in our school work is greatly missed, and we trust that by God's blessing they may be soon restored to their place among us. We also regret the loss of the Rev. Mr. Gordon from our staff of active workers. He has taken so much interest in

the School, and we are so much indebted to him for assistance and encouragement in many ways that his absence from the School leaves a blank not easily filled. We trust that our heavenly Father may soon restore these friends to health and active work again. In view of the loss of these two members of the Session Committee in charge of our North School, Mr. Thos. Bland was appointed to assist in the management of the School in the meantime. He has already greatly encouraged us and is doing good work as teacher of the Bible class.

Our membership has increased a little since our last report, being now 18 teachers and officers and 134 scholars, making a total of 152.

Seventy new books have been added to our library at a cost of \$27.60.

The Wednesday evening Prayer Meeting has been regularly held every week, with a few exceptions; the attendance is about 30; there are still a number of our people in that section of the city who ought to attend but do not. We desire to thank the Christian Endeavor Society who have so efficiently conducted this meeting during the past three months.

Our anniversary entertainment in winter, and picnic in summer were held as usual; both were successful.

Increased attention has been given to the study of the shorter Catechism in connection with the regular Bible lessons. 900 verses of the Bible, 2,000 questions of the smaller Catechism, and about 100 psalms and hymns have been committed to memory by our scholars; and nine of our scholars have made public profession of faith in Christ, (five from one class).

The Mission Band have collected \$10.00 which has been given to the Home Mission Committee.

In presenting this, our Seventh Annual Report, we are once more privileged to acknowledge the loving kindness of the Lord, and it may be truly said "He hath led us all the way." Our numbers have been small, yet we trust that our weak efforts may be owned and blessed by Him and that we may have been used as instruments in His hands for the extension of His kingdom.

During the year we have held twelve meetings, with an average attendance of twenty-two. Although this is by no means what it should be, yet we are pleased to say that all who attend enter very heartily into the work and do what they can to render our meetings edifying.

In these and in other ways we feel that we have made progress, and look forward to still better work in 1894.

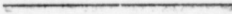
There are at present at college studying for the ministry three honorary and one active members and two more actives preparing for the work.

# The Woman's Visiting and Aid Society

## REPORT FOR 1893.

---

At the Annual Meeting for 1892, it was decided to curtail the visiting of the congregation, as with such a small membership it was really burdensome on those who took an active part in it.

This past year therefore we have visited quarterly instead of monthly, as formerly, and we are glad to be able to report that the change has not affected the finances of our Society in the least, for whereas in 1892 there were collected \$143.90, this year, with fewer visits, we have received \$162.15.

The Thanksgiving and Communion collections have been generous, and with donations from several friends and membership fees brings our income for the year up to the sum of \$420.34.

Four of our aged friends, to whom we have been privileged to minister for a number of years, have been removed by death during the year, but as there have been added to our list the names of several needy members of the congregation our expenditure is about the same.

We have this year 30 members, an increase of five, and, as in former years, a number of ladies have assisted with the visiting who are not members. Our thanks are due to these latter and we earnestly hope that they, as well as all the women of our church, will see it to be their duty and privilege to connect themselves with our society, and by attending the meetings and sharing the responsibility help to make it the power for good in our midst which we all wish to see.

The average attendance is better than last year, which is encouraging to the officers and indicates an interest in the work on the part of those who attend.

We thank the ladies of the congregation for contributing so liberally to the funds of the Society, also the Session and Managers for the Communion and Thanksgiving collections.
