Despatches have been received from Ireland this morning at the Home Department, and a private communication was made to the Duke of Wellington relative to the alarming state of the county of Tipperary. It has been abnounced that the despatches sent to Dublin on Friday, gave full distretionary power to the Marquis of Anglesen to act according to circumstances. It is stated, in an official quarter, that no more troops will be sent to Ireland, unless new and important events should occur, than are sufficient to replace those which are leaving Ireland for the Mediterranean and the Colonies. In every place, however, near the usual points of embarkation, troops will be kept in readiness.

It is up to this hour thought, at the west end of the town, that Ministers have agreed to recognise the blockade of the Dardanelles. It appears certain, from the communications received this afternoon from Paris, that the French Government have accorded to it, and igiven authority to their ambassador here to state the fact to our ministry.

These are, of course, much more favorable to the Russians than the accounts previously received from other quarters, but it now appears, from the best authority, the balancing of the adverse statements, that the Turks have not only given considerable annoyance to the invading armies, but obtained great advantages in conflicts of a much more important nature than were expected to precede the grand attack upon their strong tholds.
